On-campus TV station moves to student-run format

Channel 50, a UK station broad-casting to on-campus TVs, is shifting from being a movie channel to a stu-dent-run station with student-produced

shows.

The channel reaches about 7.500 people and is broadcast in campus reduce halls, on-campus Greek houses, K-Lair Grill, the Student Center and the UK Chandler Medical Center. Util recently, the channel has shown movies from a computer program instead of being run by students.

"We went to the National College Media Convention in St. Louis and got a chance to see what other college TV stations around the country were doing," said Chip Heilman, a political science sophomore and Channel 50 stations manager.

"Some of the really small tech schools had amazing news stations and it made us wonder, "why can't UK have this sort of thing?" he said.

mester. Now Channel 50 is waiting to move into permanent headquarters in the Student Organizations Center and is looking for greater student involvement and more shows.

As one of the first projects, Heilman said Channel 50 hopes to air a daily news show starting next semester.

"Part of Channel 50's success will be directly teld to its ability to partner with students interested in obtaining broadcasting experience." Thuringer said. "JAR News has been broadcast even the post and will continue to be in the future."

Beth Barnes, director of the UK School of Journalism and Telecommunications maderady aired several episodes. The show is made up of interviews with

students on random subjects such as worst pick-up lines, favorite movies and rival basketball players.
Students are working on a music show featuring local musicians and a sports show featuring both mainstream UK athletics and club sports.
"In the future we hope to broadcast some of UK's athletics including some of our outstanding club teams like the hockey team or maybe even the dodgeball team," Hellman said.
Thuringer said he was confident that enough student involvement would surface for the channel to be successful.














UK should improve auditing system in Stores department

A recent string of thefts involving more than \$40,000 worth of stolen UK property has resulted in the arrests of three former UK. Stores employees, the Kernel reported last week.

Mark Renfro, former director of UK Stores department and two former assistant directors, Stefon Carter and Starcy Crossley, we all the start of the st

tion to determine who was responsible for the thefs and to punish them.

But the investigation raises questions about the auditing system in place within the UK Stores department. According to the Kernel article, the stolen items included computer hardware, software, furniture and TVs. Add to that the fact that UK Police claim all three individuals were working alone, not collectively, and UK Stores appears to have a major auditing problem. How could three individuals steal items including TVs and furniture without campus authorities taking notice? First, TVs, tables, couches and chairs are large items, and would presumably leave gaing holes wherever they are stored. It would also be hard to miss someon carrying such a large item to their vehicle in order to take the

goods home.

Second, such items, along with computer equipment, are also expensive. UK Stores bills departments for such items. Were no bills issued for the stolen equipment?

Did no one notice that tens of thousands of dollars worth of merchandise had disappeared?

Acting UK Police Chief Joe Monroe told the Kernel, "If you don't have good checks and balances in place, things can slip through the cracks and go unnoticed like this did."

Apparently, that's exactly what's happened in this case. Unfortunately, with an average daily inventory worth around \$1.8 million, and with inventory coming and going one-statily, it is hard to keep track of where everything is at any particular time.

But incidents such as this should never occur on campus, or anywhere else for that matter. In the future, UK and the Stores department must be more vigilant with merchandise tracking and inventory control. The three former employees, if convicted, should be punished handily for their actions. The state must show that stealing from the university is unacceptable, so that future employees might not be tempted to go down the same road.

UK can do better in its inventory auditing. And to prevent future thefts like these, drastic changes must come soon.


