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Department Commander's Address.

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Comrades of the twenty-fifth Department Encampment now assembled, it is a great pleasure for me to meet the noble Comrades of this department whom I trust have left their homes to attend this meeting of our noble order. I trust the great principles of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty may be the guiding star of our work during our stay here. At the encampment held at Berea you placed me on duty as the Sentinel to have the watch-care over our order for the year past. I assumed that charge at once and went to work with all my power. I was fully advised that the ravages of age, desease and death were sweeping our order down the hill of time fast. Our Department had been going down for years past at such a rate we had but 85 Posts left on the rolls, out of 219 Posts, and our members ship had gone down to 1934 members. Our finances had been lowered to the point that Capt. J. H. Browning, late Asst. Q. M. General, had but \$88.46 to turn over to Comrade Tharp, the present Asst Q. M. General. I am frank to admit that the situation looked very gloomy indeed. But things are now looking much bettertomeafter a year of hard work. We have raised the banner of our noble order and we have gone up instead of down. We today, as is shown by the Assistant Adjutant General Report, have on our roll 108 Posts and 2154. members in good standing. have had eighty-eight Comrades to answer the silent roll and have passed over the river to rest with the Army of Comrades gone before. During the year we have had two hundred and seven old Comrades to grow weary and let their names be suspended from our noble order which is to be regretted. Thus by death and suspension we had to meet the loss of 295 Comrades. Yet over all this we have gained 236 members. The Assistant Adjutant General Report will give you further information regarding these matters.

Our Finances.

The matter of finances is one of paramount interest to all orders and all business concerns. Our order surely has the history of doing as much or more work for less money than any other order in existence. But the records of the past seven years have shown that we have lived beyond our income. As before stated our

finance had reached the zero mark \$88.46; but the careful and faithful work of my Assistant Quartermaster General we have lived on the inside of our income and we will be able to turn over to the incoming Assistant Quartermaster General as much and more cash than was paid us. I invite you to the careful consideration of Comrade Tharp's report.

Department Patriotic Instructor.

The above office was created at the Denver National Encampment in 1905. Commander-in-Chief Gen. R. B. Brown appointed Gen. Warren Lee Goss, of Rutherford, N. J., National Patriotic Instructor, and in obedience to Gen. Brown's order I appointed Col. T. A. Day, of Olive Hill, Department Instructor. I had the proper blanks sent to all Post Commanders, and I instructed them to appoint a Post Instructor and to report to Col. Day. I hope the result will be all right. Personally I think work on the old Comrades should grow less each year. It will be hard to get proper results from this line of work.

The Lincoln Park Association.

During the year it has been our pleasant duty, under the instruction of our noble Commander-in-Chief, to give this association our aid and endorsement. No name is more precious to a Kentucky soldier's memory than that of Lincoln. We trust and hope that every Comrade in our noble department will aid in this noble work. Let the home and birthplace of this National Patriot be made the great attraction of Kentucky, that the present and future generations of young America will honor this place as one of the grandest old Kentucky homes.

The Lincoln Tablet.

It has also been our pleasant outy to give our approval to the noble work of our Commander-inChief, Gen. R. B. Brown, and his Adjutant General, Joseph W. O'Neill, and Gen. Warren Lee Goss, the National Patriotic Instructor. They have had the great war speech of Lincoln, made on the battle field at Gettysburg while the war had its dark mantle spreadover our country, engraved on a bronze tablet that will last for ages to come: These tablets can be procured from the Quartermaster General for the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine dollars. At this price many Post of our State can procure them for their halls or such

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place as might be selected for that purpose. That grand speech is one of the most remarkable in war history.

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The Ladies of The G. A. R. and Women of The Relief Corps.

These two noble organizations by the old Comrade's lady friends has our best wishes in their splendid work; but during this year we have not heard from them in any way; therefore we are not advised as to their work.

The Sons of Veterans.

This order, too, has our best wishes and approval in their noble work, and we are greatly surprised that the old Comrades extend to this order so little aid in ir their work. I feel that we should give them the helping hand while we can, so that they will be ready to take our place in the line of march after the last tatoo has sounded lights out with us.

Our Duty to Our Order.

Comrades, it has been said, "experience is our great school teacher." This is surely so in the working of our noble order. I don't feel that I ought to close this address without offering some suggestions for the future welfare of our order, drawn from experience of two years of department work. We have met here on this occasion, as we do each year, for the purpose of doing work for the welfare of our noble order. One of these duties is the election of officers. Every Comrade who will be elected to any office, from Department Commander down to the smallest office, should be workers. The selection of Comrades because of favoritism should not be done. The guiding star in the selection should be the worker, and I hope this Encampment will, when the selection of Comrades for offices takes place, select workers. Every Comrade who is selected for any office should, as soon as he is obligated, enter the work to bring some old Comrade back into ranks. There is no doubt but that our department can be raised to three or fourthousand again. Work by every man elected will fully demonstrate this assertion. Let us try and see the result.

Memorial Day.

This day, above all others in our noble work, should

be properly attended. Many Post in our Department pay little or no attention to this part of our work. We trust this work will be taken up by the Comrades of our Department and be more sacredly observed in the future. Let all people see the respect we have for our fallen Comrades.

Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

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Comrades, these principles have been violated some where. There has been during the passing year a howl of complaints reaching our headquarters, all refering to some mistreatment, in one way or another. We shall not attempt to refer to any particular one of these troubles. But let every Comrade in this Department drop those petty ideas from their mind and start again to live as a band of brother Comrades, as our work will soon end, as the roll call is going on all the while. These petty troubles have worked great injury to our order, causing many a Comrade to drop from the noble order. Let them be passed forever.

Conclusion.

Comrades, I have now given you a short account of our work for the year, and I trust that our work will merit the approval of this Department Encampment, and that some good may be the result in the future to our noble order. I want to extend to the Staff Officers of our Department my thanks for their uniform kindness during my administration, and to my fellow-worker, Comrade Tharp, I cannot express, in words, my feelings to him for his faithful and untiring work in our noble order. He knows no rest when he can aid our great cause. Once before I had the honor to be associated with him in or noble work. I parted with him with regrets, and more so now than before. as we are brothers in a noble cause. I hope the proceedings of this Encampment will be in accord with the principles of our order, and that much good may be the result of this meeting. My thanks are extended the Comrades of this Department for the honor conferred on me at Berea last June by electing me your Department Commander; for that honor I shall always be thankful to you, and now submitting our cause to Him who does all things well, I close,

In compliance with the rules and regulations of our noble order, I take pleasure in making to you and to our Department Encampment my combined report as Assistant Adjutant and Assistant Quartermaster Gent eral, for the period of eleven months, from June 12th, 1906, to May 11th, 1907, inclusive. The report of the Assistant Adjutant General comes first in order, to which I will now invite your attention.

At the close of General Mathews' administration we had on the roll of our Department 85 Post with 1934 members. This being the low water mark for our Department, it was apparent to us that we were nearing the end unless we could stop the downward tide in both ways-in numbers and finance. We at once entered upon the most vigorous work in our power to stop this downward drift in our order. Our work in that direction has been very satisfactory to us in two ways: For the first time in seven years the loss of finances and members is stopped and the Departmen', is on the up grade once. 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As will be seen from the above statement the cash had reached the low water mark of \$88 46, at the close of Gen. Mathews' administration; but this year, the first in seven years, we have lived on the inside of our income. We not only have the \$88 46 handed to us, but have \$184.23 above all expenses to hand over to our successor. Our expenses vere reduced and collections better, which accounts for the great difference. I have herewith given a full list of the Post on the roll of the Department, showing the amount each Post paid per capita and the number of members. We invite your kind perusal of that statement.

It is a fact that a great many of our comrades enlisted in the army at an early age, before they had an education, and after their return home have been laboring men ever since, and while they are grand, patriotic comrades, and are zealous Grand Army men, but they cannot write well and they send in their returns so that it is with difficulty that we can read them all. One of the worst errors is they fail to give the name of their Post and their number. The Post Commanders will please notice that on the blank returns you will notice a red line. Be sure and write the name of your Post, and don't fail to write the

address of the Post Commander in a plain hand write. Please note this request.

FOURTH--Post Commanders, your attention is called to the credential sheet sent you with the blanks for December report. Please notice that carefully, as above requested. On that sheet notice the red line. Be sure and write the name of your Post and its number and location on that line. Then put on the list of officers you elect for next year. Don't fail in this. Then put down all your past Post Commanders who are living and in good standing. Then elect one delegate for each twenty-five members you have, and a fraction of thirteen members over the twenty-five members. For instance, thirty-eight members will give the post two delegates, and then elect one alternate for each delegate. Bear in mind that this report must be sent to this office with your December report. This must be done to give your Post representation at the next Department Encampment, that will be held in the city of Louisville, Ky., on the 15th and 16th days of May, 1907, and from this report the next roster of the Department must be made up. We trust the Post Commander will use great care in having the report written in a plain hand write, names carefully spelled, so we can avoid mistakes. SIXTH-Post Commanders, your kind and special attention is called to the fact that in disbanding a Post, if you have respect for your obligation, you must do so honorably. It has been our lot to have only one such Post to deal with That Post is Robt. Story Post, No. 104. After persistant efforts to get a report from them, I at last got a letter from Comrades Ed Vincent and R. P. Briston, saying their Post was disbanded on June 10th, 1905. I at once advised these comrades that they could not disband unless they paid their per capita tax for the quarter ending June 30th, 1905. This they refused to do and thus the matter stands. These comrades claimed they had notified headquarters at Louisville of their being disbanded June 10th, 1905. Of this I could not understand how General Barney Mathews would appoint Comrade Edwin Vincent Chief-mustering officer on his staff on Oct. 2nd, 1907, and Vincent was not a member of the Grand Army. This matter is referred to in order to give other Posts of this department to understand their duty. They must pay for the quarter in which they disband. Let disbanding be the last surrending you do this side of the great roll call. I am glad to refer the old comrades of Kentucky to the Post at LaGrange. Three faithful old comrades are holding the fort and keeping their Post on the roll of this grand old department. God bless such faithful old comrades, is my wish and hope. Well, I know that when you were battling for your country, you would rather have died than to have thrown your musket away and run to the rear. Let that pride follow you now through the obligation you assumed when you became a member of our noble

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order, which should never end until the final roll call.

SEVENTH—As before mentioned in this order, the Department Encampment will be held in the city of Louisville, Ky., commencing on Wednesday, May 15, 1907, and continuing two days. The announcement is made this early for two reasons, namely, to give the comrades ample time to make their arrangements to be there, and to let the Post at their December meeting, select comrades for delegates who are willing to attend this meeting. Comrades of Kentucky, let me insist on your attending this gathering. Don't stay at home, and then when the encampment is over set up a howl about things going wrong. Come, see and vote against things you don't like. Let your voice be heard Come and be with us, it will do you good.

EIGHTH—We wish to extend our thanks to the Post Commanders of this department for the favors and kindness shown us in transacting the business. There are but few Posts on the roll in good standing, but what have paid the per capita tax. There are so few that have not paid, that we shall not publish any list of delinquents, as we believe every Post will pay in a short time. We are gratifled and thankful for this kindness, and have had but few losses reported either by death or suspension. One Post reported 25 suspensions, which equal all the rest of the department.

NINTH—Post Commanders will, at the December meeting select a suitable comrade for the Post Inspecting officer, and have him fill out the inspection blank report carefully and mail in the addressed envelope to George W. Saunders, Department Inspector, at Mayfield Ky., also have your Post Surgeon make his report and mail the same to Dr. William Bowman, Tollerboro, Ky., in addressed envelope, and don't forget to have the Post Chaplin fill out his

report and mail to G. W. Lewis, Midway, Ky. Don't fail to have these reports all properly mailed to the department office so they can make a lively report to the Encampment. They cannot report unless you help them by sending the reports here called for. Blank reports for all the officers have been mailed to every Post Commander in the department. If any Post Commanders failing to receive blank for his December report by the time he gets this order he will please write this office so that another set of blanks can be mailed him. Post Commanders, we hope, will have these matters promptly attended to at the December meeting of your Post.

TENTH—Post Commanders, in making your December report be sure to give name, company and Regiment of all comrades who have died during the uear 1906. Many in June report would give the loss of one or sometimes two by death, but gave no name. Let your report for December give this information for all the year. Use great care in your December report as it ends the year, and our representation in the National Encampment next year is based on this report; so give us a full report if you please.

ELEVENTH—We trust that department officers, Post Commanders and comrades will do all in their power to carry out the suggestion of our Commanderin-Chief in general order No. 3. In recruiting for our order it is a fact that there was more white comrades in Kentucky that do not belong to our order than there are belonging to the order. This state of affairs should not exist. Every comrade should belong to the Grand Army if your record as a soldier is clear. To belong to the Grand Army is evident to your country that you have an honorable record. Why not join this noble order and show your friends your record is good?

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TWELFTH—Some of the Post Commanders have written this office asking for the new National countersign. We wish to advise all Post Commanders that the present National countersign is good until January 1st. 1907. The new countersign will be sent out to Post Commanders with receipts for December per capita tax.

Agair thanking the comrades of the department for their generous kindness, and asking their continued favors during the future, and trusting in the divine power to guide us through life until we reach the last roll call at the river brink where we may reach the Happy Camp Ground of the Comrades gone before.

manders will please give these orders a careful reading to their Posts. All orders, both National and Department, should be read without fail to your Post, so that the Comrades can be fully advised concerning the working of our noble order. Post Commanders don't fail in this important duty. Keep the Comrades fully advised if you want to keep them interested and in line for duty.

EIGHTH. Post Commanders: We trust you will have your December meeting promptly and use great care in having all the reports due from each Post carefully filled out and return promptly to this office.

GENERAL ORDER \ No. 4

ATTENTION, POST COMMANDERS:-

It is necessary to again call your attention to the manner of making your Quarterly Reports to this office in General Order No. 2, issued from this office, calling Post Commander's attention to the way the returns should be made. From the way returns are being received at this office, we feel satisfied no attention has been paid to the request of that order. You are again referred to Sections 3, 4, and 5 General Order No. 2

SECOND. We wish to call special attention to the Rules and Regulations of our order. Article 4, Section 3, which reads as follows:

Any member of a Post who is six months in arrears in the payment of his dues shall be notified thereof in writing by the Post Quartermaster, and if the same are not paid within two months thereafter, he may be suspended from all privileges of membership by the Post,

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and be then so reported in the semi-annual reports to department headquarters until such dues are paid. While so suspended the Post shall not be subject to the per capita tax on such member, and he shall not be counted in the representation of the Post in the encampment of the department, nor of the department in the National Encampment; Provided, however, that when a Comrade is unable, by reason of sickness or misfortune, to pay his dues, they may be remitted by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at a stated meeting.

THIRD. Post Commanders will please comply with the above section of the law. You must send the name, company and regiment of all Comrades suspended if you expect to be relieved from paying per capica tax on such members. The Post failing to proform this duty will not be given the State or National countersign because of disobedience to this order. Its again necessary to call Post Commanders attention to the fact that you must send in the names of all Comrades who have died during the year.

FOURTH. The National countersign is now ready and will be promptly mailed to all Post Commanders on receipt of the December report from their Post. There are some Posts that have not sent in their June report. We trust they will send that report with the December report. We have thus far avoided publishing any list of delinquent Posts. We trust the few Posts that have not reported will do so and save us from the unpleasant task.

FIFTH. Commanders of Posts should give special attention to all orders from both State and National departments. We are made to believe from the many numerous mistakes in the returns to this office, that

this duty is not attended to. Don't fail to read the Orders carefully and let us avoid so many mistakes in our reports.

The collecting at the Encampment is always much trouble, and this time will not be permitted.

SIXTH.—We wish to call the attention of Post Commanders and comrades of our department to a circular letter being sent to the Posts and comrades of our department not having the signatures of the author, but bearing the names of five comrade candidates for office at the Encampment at Louisville, May 15 and 16.

We quote you one paragraph entire, so you can see the picture he draws of Kentucky. Our reason for taking notice of it are the words "incompetency and selfishness," which is a direct slap in the face of the present department officers. The present headquarter officers have been entrusted with the honor of caring for our noble order for two terms. We cannot think the comrades of our department voted and elected us because of our INCOMPETENCY OR SELFISHNESS, or that the comrades were incompetent to vote for their choice. Please read this statement carefully; here it is:

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"For some years past there has been a decided uneasiness among our comrades. A majority of the posts once existing have died. Many of those still alive have but a small party of their former membership. This great mass of our comrades are staying outside of the order. Dodge's election was made unanimous. The election of Senior Vice Commander being in order, C. C. Vaughn nominated E. P. Marrs, O. A. Reynolds nominated E.

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B. Hewetson. On motion by Capt. Minton that the vote for S. V. C., J. V. C. and Chaplin be made by representatives of each Post on calling the roll said motion was adopted. The vote being taken on the roll call E. P. Marrs was duly elected Senior Vice Commander for the ensuing year. On the second roll call, E. Douglas was duly elected Junior Vice Commander for the ensuing year. In the same manner C.C Vaughn was elected Chaplin. W. J. L. Hughes was elected Historian and Samuel Manly Surgeon.

The place of the Encampment meeting for 1908 was next in order. Louisville was nominated and was unanimously elected for the place of meeting next year, 1908. The following comrades were elected delegates to the National Encampment to be held at Saratoga in August next: William Pedrick, George Seither, L. W. Lindly, H. Rucker. The following comrades were elected alternates: S. D. Van Pelt, D. R. Carr, Pat Rush, and John Barr. The following comrades were elected on the Council of Adminstration: John T. Gunn, A. P. Settle, Leroy Alcorn, R. R. Perry, and Green B. Miller.

This concluded the election of officers. The installation of officers being the next business in order. Capt. M. Minton, Past Department Commander, was appointed installing officer by the Commander. He at once installed all of the officers elected.

Commander Dodge in taking charge of his office delivered a very appropriate speech as to his plans for his future work. He was followed by comrade Tharp in a short address on the welfare of our order.

After this there being no further business before the Encampment, the song "God be with you till we meet again" was sung and prayer for our continued favor and welfare in God, by chaplin, C. C. Vaughn, Commander Dodge then adjourned the twenty-fifth Department sine die, to meet in Louisville in 1908.

Thus ended one of the largest Encampments that has been held for several years. Let us hope that next year will bring the old comrades to a better feeling and that better order may prevail.

I want to appeal to all the officers just elected to take up this work soon as you return home and let us push the work of bringing the old comrades in line again and place the little copper buttons on their breasts, that represent so much.

My comrades, have you taken the time to think what that button does for you? Let us see why you should be glad to wear it until your end comes. Oh it tells a wonderful but true story. It tells that you are a member of the only organization on earth, where every lodge room in it is a teacher of loyalty to our comrades, country and flag. Many other organizations have noble purposes in view, but do not honor our flag It teaches to others you are one of the as we do. spared ones of that mighty army that gave four hundred thousand of its comrades to save the country and its flag. Yes, my comrades it tells to others we are the only order that plants the flag at our comrades grave once each year in honor of his sleeping dust. Yes, my comrades wear that button. It makes me glad to meet the comrade who wears one in honor to our noble cause.
