# Governor urges education changes

# Ky. universities must increase program efficiency, Jones says

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Gov. Brereton Jones told members of his new commission on higher education yesterday that public universities had "dodged a bullet" during the latest round of budget

cuts.

His statement came with a warning though. Jones said that if the group cannot work to reform higher education, Kentucky's public universities could find themselves in the cross hairs if cuts happen again.

# President announces ambitious budget plan

UK President Charles Wethington put forth yester-day an ambitious request for state funding over the next two years, despite the Com-monwealth's continuing eco-

monwealth's continuing economic troubles.

The Board of Trustees approved the request, which asks for money to complete a new central library, enhance academic quality and increase employee salaries.

"We always recognize what the state's financial returner is, but I think we have a responsibility as administrators and as a board to put out to the funding agencies and funding individuals what the true needs of the University are." Wethington said.



Belafonte's battles during career culminated in 'Calypso' album

Calypso singer Harry Belafonte revealed yesterday that his first love was horses, not music.

"When I was nine years old, I knew exactly what I wanted to do with my life — I wanted to be a jockey," Belafonte said. A race-track was located near his home in the West Indies, and he enviously watched the jockeys practice.

"And then I began to grow, much to my consternation," he said. He said he even began smok-ing to stunt his growth, but to no avail.

Luckily, Belafonte has still found success — with musical, rather than equine, tracks.

Belafonte's third album, Calypso, became the first album ever to sell more than one million copies in one year. His most well-known song, "Banana Boat" ("Day-O"), became a standard for any calypso

Belafonte, relaxed and casual in a navy blue crewneck sweater and mocha slacks, spoke about his youthful dreams and musical ca-reer to a group of about 100 UK fine arts students at the Otis A. Singletary Center for the Arts.

He fielded questions from the students a few hours before his performance at 8 p.m. for the annu-al College of Fine Arts Benefit.

After horses, theater became Belafonte's love. He was working as a janitor in Harlem after serving in the Army when he received a pair of theater tickets as a bonus.

After putting himself through theater school in New York City, Belafonte starred in several Broad-way plays, including "Island in the Sun," and Hollywood films like "Porgy and Bess." He won a Tony Award for the first Broadway play he ever performed.

Belafonte's entrance into the musical world happened fortui-tously, as well. He used to hang out at jazz clubs in New York City where now-legendary performers Charlie Parker, Ella Fitzgerald and Miles Davis anneared.

One day the manager asked him to fill in for intermission entertain-ment. "I knew I wasn't a singer," he said with a touch of irony, "but I figured what the hell?"

Belafonte's signature voice is actually the result of a genetic anomaly. His larynx is tilted, so the air passes through as a ripple instead of a clean sweep. However, he said he has still managed to sing despite "nature's hoax and God's sense of humor."

Belafonte, 66, has been involved in a variety of political causes in addition to his artistic projects. The "We are the World" campaign, which raised millions for famine relief, was his brain-child

"People were dying in Ethiopia ecause of a lack of moral strength of truth in the global community black and white," he said.

Belafonte recalled the difficul-ties inherent in being a black per-former during the 1950s and 1960s. Movie studios tried to type-cast him as a submissive character, but often he refused to portray such stereotypes.

"That process kept me in a con-stant guerilla warfare with the stu-dios," he said. "The social and cul-tural environment would only permit me to go so far in those days."

Belatonte currently is involved in several film projects, including a film adaptation of the Pulitzer-Prize winning novel *Parting the Waters*, which details the struggles of the the civil rights movement.

# Sodomy law instrument of social control



Friday marks the one year anniversary of the Kentucky Supreme Court decision overtuning Kentucky's sodomy law. The court overtuning destination of the sodomy law prohibiting certain private sexual acting certain private sexual action of the same sex. Opposite-sex couples were not affected by such laws.

were not affected by such laws. Technically, this law covered both acts and solicitation of acts involving genital-oral, genital-anal and orate. This decision does not make prostitution legal, nor does it allow people to have sex in public parks, as some people claimed a year ago.

In effect, this decision gets the government out of Kentuckians' bedrooms and does not penalize certain sexual acts and not oth-

certain sexual acts and not others. With this decision, Kentucky joined the other 24 states that did not have sodomy laws in 1992. Legal cases in Massachusetts, Maryland and Michigan also have effectively overturned such laws by interpreting that they do not apply to private, consensual, non-hire acts.

Since last year, both Nevada and the District of Columbia have repealed their sodomy laws, Legal challenges in Texas, Louistana and Tennessee also are working their way through the court system.

do not distinguish between same sex or opposite sex. For a nation that sells almost everything via sexual advertising, we are yet surprisingly ignorant because of our society's apparent fear of frank discussions of sexual-

ity.

This summer is memorable, if for nothing else, for the hilarious debate between Sen. Strom Thurmond, the ancient legislator from South Carolina, and another senator after Thurmond argued that sodomy doesn't exist between heterosexuals.

Roth Braun and Thurmond need.

erosexuals.

Both Braun and Thurmond need to read just what sodomy laws make illegal. Most state laws outlaw not only anal intercourse but also oral intercourse.

Today this double standard is employed along lines of sexual orientation. Gays and lesbians face very real problems from such laws.

Heterosexuals are almost never arrested under these laws. As well shown by the debates over gays in the military, the military codes of justice and its sodomy laws are not enforced equitably against heterosexuals.

The recent military budget even strips the Clinton "compromise" of a passage calling for equitable enforcement. Many people think that these laws still are not used.

Unfortunately, some states still invade the most private aspects of individuals' lives.

Sodomy laws are not about morality. They are not about public health. They are about social control. In effect, sodomy laws are instruments to keep gay people in the closet and hidden from society.

I don't know about Thurmond, but sex surveys point out that oral sex is fairly common in the United States. Thus, given the right state and a little sexual variety, Thurmond and his wife could become convicted sodomites.

Of course, this is most unlikely to happen.

Sodomy laws are not about morrality. They are not about public health. They are about social control.

Control or implied control of the most private, intimate parts of life is a major weapon to repress the marginalized groups.

an mother in the Sharon Bottoms custody case.

One of the judge's reasons was an admission by Bottoms that she and her partner of several years had made love and thus violated Virginia's sodomy law, an archaic statute from colonial law.

Caught in periodic police sting operations near or in gay bars, men and women arrested for simply asking someone home usually plea bargain to keep their names from the newspapers.

Revelation of a person's homosexuality can lead to a very real danger of loss of employment, housing, insurance or even the custody of one's child.

Only a handful of states and cit-

Only a handful of states and cities prohibit this type of discrimination. Thus, the human pain of these sodomy statutes goes largely unreported and hidden.

In effect, sodomy laws are instruments to keep gay people in the closet and hidden from society.

Even the Montana Health Department has tried to have Montana's sodomy law repealed.

Why? Health officials feel that the state's males-only, same-sex-only sodomy law, with its \$50,000 fine and felony charge, is a health risk to fearful gay men who will not come forward to access AIDS prevention materials and HIV testing.

Other recent research finds a correlation between higher than expected AIDS rates and sodomy law states.

Argued before the Kentucky Su-preme Court that sodomy laws are a deterrent to high risk behaviors for AIDS, it is becoming clearer that sodomy laws are an indicator of a state-induced fear that hurts effective health education and con-struction of positive, healthy, long-term relationships.

I am proud that our state Su-preme Court stood up and said that it was wrong for the government to come into people's private lives and bedrooms.

Sodomy laws are invasive, ar-

Sodomy laws are invasive, archaic and destructive to the jobs, lives, self-esteem, health and children of millions of people.

So the next time you go to Myrte Beach, S.C., or Atlanta or Florida, remember to be on your best behavior with your husband, wife or partner: The state and law of the land are in your bed with you.
