American Retaliation: 'We are using all of the tools available to us to go after this network'

Secretary of State Colin Powell said Wednesday a prospective mili-tary strike in Afghanistan against the al-Qaida terrorism network would be only the first step in the U.S. campaign against terrorism.

Powell received unqualified support Wednesday from Qatar, a Persian Gulf emirate. "This is the first phase of this operation," Powell said.

As Powell left open the possi-bility of taking the U.S. fight be-yound Afghanistan, he offered as-surances that "we are not looking for conflict with other nations." Powell, addressing Arab wor-ries and even demands that the Bush administration promise not to strike Arab countries, said this is not the beginning of a conflict

with them.

Almost all Afghans are Muslims, but they are not Arabs.

With the Qatari emir at his side, Powell added at a news conference that while focusing at the outset on Osama bin Laden's network in Afghanistan, the U.S. campaigm "also takes note of those nations that provide haven, provide succor, provide support to terrorist organizations."

In the three weeks since the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington, Powell has condemned Iraq frequently as a supporter of terrorism.

Some senior officials in the Bush administration are known to support a strike against Baghdad as well as Afghanistan.

There also are Arab governments disturbed by the possibility that the United States might go that far in pursuing the al-Qaida network.

median paycheck in 2000, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. But it is far more than
the minimum wage, set by federal law at \$5.15 an
hour but slightly higher in 10 states and the Disrict of Columbia. Last year, 2.7 million Americans worked for the hourly minimum wage,
about 2 percent of all workers, not counting those
with annual salaries at the same level.

"Ingesting this right away is actually a lot less dangerous, though, than picking the food up, storing it for a day and then eating it."

Brian Raymond, a molecular and cellular biology faculty member, said the likelihood of getting sick from eating the food would depend on the type of bacteria and total number of microbes on it.

"It takes most bacteria 30

minutes or more to divide, so there probably is little difference in your chances of getting sick if you wait five seconds or five minutes," Raymond said. "Leave it vovernight, and you are much more likely to get in trouble." Phillip Bonner, an organismal and integrative biology faculty member, said the five-second rule is preposterous. "Gaeteria) won't attack the food, but they will certainjust the tot, often so intimately that washing won't dislodge them," Bonner said. Though bacteria may attach to the food, Doug Harrison, a molecular and cellular

biology faculty member, said people ingest various forms of bacteria everyday, so humans have a certain amount of immunity. But there can be health risks if bacteria are ingested in large numbers.

"Just ask Jack In-The-Box patrons," Harrison said.



dropped. The location could make a difference.







"There are problems with food choice, exercise, as well as psy-chological issues such as treating diabetes during a period of life in which most people want to experiment with different lifestyles,"

Living with diabetes: 'It doesn't get easier but it becomes a part of your life'

A typical morning for most college students consists of getting out of bed, throwing on some clothes and grabbing a Little Debbie snack cake before heading out the door. Except those students with diabetes type 1. They leave the Little Debbies sitting on the counter

James Rogers, a Spanish and German junior, was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes three years ago, one semester into his college

While most type I diabetes cases are diagnosed before the age
of 18, a select few are not diagnosed until the person is in their early 20s. For most, 20 is an age marked with changes. For Rogers, the
change was two-sided. He was in college and he had a new
lifestyle.

lifestyle.

"For me, the changeover from not having diabetes to having it all of the sudden was really hard," he said. "At first I scheduled everything around my disease, but gradually I got used to it." Professionals have similar views and offer support to college students. "Getting diagnosed with type I diabetes in college is certainly difficult," said Dr. Stephen Pohl, a partner in the Kentucky Diabetes Endocrinology Center.

The first thing on most college students' mind when they receive the diagnosis is the question of 'lifestyle change.' They often want to know what and why they will have to change. 'It felt like it complicated my life at first. For instance, eating normal college food like pizza and pop-tarts is not an option for me anymore, Rogers said. 'Right away, stuff like that scared me, but I realize now that all I can do is try my best to take care of myself.'

There are two types of diabetes, type 1 and type 2. Approximately 90 percent of the diabetic population is type 2 and 10 percent is type 1.

Type 1 diabetes is also known as juvenile diabetes. It is a disease in which the body does not produce insulin. It occurs in children and young adults under 18, according to the American Diabetes Association. People with type 1 diabetes must take insulin injections to stay alive. There is no known way to prevent type 1 diabetes, according to the American Diabetes Association. New studies suggest part of the reason lies in genetics and environmental causes.

About one-third of these don't even realize they have diabetes. Awareness and helpful advice is the best solution to take care of the situation.

"I would tell people to take it slow — figure out what's going on first. It doesn't get easier, but it becomes more a part of your life," Rogers said.

The benefits of being open

Lawsuits involving racial and gender discrimination have be-come commonplace in recent years. It seems anytime someone is not treated exactly as they wish, they sue. As a result, an in-creasingly skeptical public looks at these cases, even when some-

one has a legitimate grievance, and thinks "whiner."

Likewise, the facts are not yet clear enough to come to any specific conclusions regarding the decision by the UK College of Law to deny Darlene Goring, an assistant professor for seven years, tenure.

Regardless, this incident, combined with the creation of dual commissions to study gender and diversity issues, provides further evidence that such issues simply need to be studied.

Yet, UK denied students (and anyone else, for that matter) access to raw data concerning the race, gender and date of birth of its employees. In doing so, UK is missing an enormous opportunity.

its employees. In doing so, UK is missing an enormous opportunity.

If, instead of ducking and weaving every time the issue is broached, UK would open up and allow interested parties to study these problems, one of two results would occur.

On the one hand, UK could indeed have serious problems in its hiring and pay practices. Good and bad policies are floated about to fix such problems, but the quality of the solution is irrelevant to the need to admit the problem in the first place.

On the other hand, outside groups could use the data and, after taking into account other factors like experience and student opinion, decide that UK does not fare all that bad. Certainly there are some out there who would never accept that conclusion, but an open and friendly process would weaken those objections. those objections.

Either way, UK becomes a better place to work, study and teach. All the difficulties will not disappear, but they never will. There will still be unfavorable criticism, much of it probably unfair as well, but there is already plenty of that.

By opening up the process, UK can bring in new voices and minds to help find a resolution to this important issue.

Sunlight does indeed heal wounds, and UK now has the opportunity to roll up the shades.

A few bad apples mar police image

All of the sudden Americans are demonstrating vigilance like I've never seen in my lifetime. Our determination to avenge the death and destruction wrought on Sept. Il has become the most important governmental issue in our lives, and rightfully so. 





WHY TAKE THE RISK? **GET VACCINATED**

Hepatitis B is a virus that infects the liver and can cause permanent liver damage, even death. The hepatitis B virus is transmitted through exposure to infected blood and other body fluids during sexual contact, sports injuries, first aid situations, sharing a razor or toothbrush, and sharing needles for tattooing, body piercing or illegal drug use. In some settings, the virus is up to 100 times more contagious than the virus that causes AIDS. Approximately 240,000 Americans are infected each year, with 40 percent of new infections occurring in young adults. There is no cure for hepatitis B, but it is preventable with a three-dose vaccination series.
