### FOOLS ON WHEELS

Is your car a killer?

The Kernel, along with other publications, is attempting to call attention to the amazing slaughter which takes place each year owing to automobile accidents and other mishaps in which the automobile figures prominently.

Last year \$6,000 people were killed in motor-car accidents in this country, and \$64,000 were injured. Carelessness was the cause of this horrible death toll; yet, we can't blame solely the motorist, for both miotorists and pedestrians are motorist, for both motorists and pedestrians are responsible.

responsible.

Here we submit the geatest man-made de-struction of limb and life ever recorded outside of "war." So far as we Americans are concerned, not even war has inflicted so heavy a toll.

Worse still, we seem to be making very little headway in our efforts to reduce the number of deaths and injuries. According to the Trave

ers Insurance Company, the number killed in 1935, 36,000, was approximately the same as it 1934. The record was actually worse last year for the reasons that the rate of death per acci dent increased nearly 7 per cent. We had fewer but worse accidents in 1935.

Driving errors were involved in two-thirds of the 828,000 accidents reported. Carelessness in driving killed 24,000 people. So far as the facts show, the terrific tragedies of previous years have taught us very little. Apparently more carelessness was exhibited last year than ever

traffic control have been undertaken and aban doned. First we had laws and ordinances which established ridiculously low speed limits. These limits were ignored because they were ridicu-lous. Most of these ancient laws and ordinances

have been repealed or tacitly ignored by en forcement authorities. We must establish some effectual discipline for motorists. It is absurd to wait until a reck less driver has killed someone before depriving him of his license. Much sharper inspection of driving practices must be established, and those whose road habits are clearly a source of danger must be prohibited the use of the road.

The motorist isn't the only reckless user of the roads. Pedestrians have their share of responsibility. In fact, figures indicate that at least half the adult pedestrians killed in automobile accidents failed to exercise due care

Reckless pedestrians and reckless motorists alike are responsible. The motorcar is an indispensable tool of our civilization, but we have not learned how to use it without incurring in-calculable losses of life, health and property. The present waste is tragic and intolerable, and it should not be allowed to continue.

nection with the movement in other cities. Nothing, however, has been done to alleviate the plight of the play.

The management of the Opera House has announced that it will bring a first-rate road show to Lexington if sufficient interest is manifested by the citizens. In this case, it is the duty of all playgoers to support the movement. If the plan is adopted, actors will begin to grace our stage in person. Their shadows will blend with those of another day. Charles Timblin's "Jeeter Lester" will pave the way for others to add their voices to those such great actors as Sara Bernhardt, Maude Adams, Alice Brady, William Gillette, Richard Mansfield and all the others in the host who have played to capacity houses here. houses here.




