In collegiate golf, the top four scores of the five golfers are added from each round to get each team score for that round. A No. 5 golfer is commonly expected to contribute one score from either three of four-rounds, depending on the tournament.

"I've always said that a team is always as good as its fifth player," UK Coach Evans said. "You defi-nitely need a well-rounded team."

"I've never shot a round that low in college before," Kroot said. "I was just aiming for the pin and hit-ting it really well." Kroot, a for-mer Indiana high school state

George Bush, signaling he won't sit on his lead in the campaign's final weeks, returned to the attack yesterday and said Michael Dukakis shauld 'Stop running down our defenses." Dukakis charged Bush with ignoring the nation's loss of industrial jobs.

Battling the notion that he is slipping hopelessly behind, the Democratic presidential nomines began cratic presidential nomines began example the standard of the

With three weeks left in the pres-idential race, aides to Dukakis said he would seek to sharpen the dif-ferences between himself and the vice president, particularly on eco-nomic issues.

But as he arrived in Ohio, a big state crucial to his chances, a new statewide poll by the Akron Beacon Journal showed Bush holding a double-digit lead.
Bush, buoyant but cautioning against overconfidence, toured a Denver-area defense plant when "Star Wars" research is con-ducted.

He used the setting to say Duka-kis has a "total lack of understand-ing of our military" and is "trying desperately to jump into the mains-tream" by acknowledging a need to modernize land-based nuclear missiles.

Rigid black lung testing stalls claims

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — Newly tightened regulations and testing requirements are causing a drop in the number of successful black lung claims brought against mining companies, a Charleston lawyer said yesterday during the National Black Lung Conference.

Lawyer Grant Crandall said the stricter rules may be a by-product of the Mine Health and Safety Act, which enforced better working conditions for miners. He said that led the public to assume black lung is no longer a hazard of working underground.

"Despite improved working conditions, there is still substantial respiratory dust in the mines," he said. "And we've seen greater decrease in claim approval. At this stage, any real change must come from Washington."

Black lung, or pneumoconiosis, is

caused by the inhalation of coal dust. It leads to a hardening of the lungs and severely restricted breathing.

While comments were severely restricted to the comment of t

cost cost \$100,000 to \$150,000 in benefits, Crandall said.

The mandatory medical examination, a highly technical procedure in which the claimant undergoes assessment while exercising, costs \$1,000. ments to the widow. Sometimes, though, the widow must bring another lawsuit proving her husband died of the effects of black lung disease, he said.

Crandall, with 13 years' experience, said he had trained all 12 and he supported a call for the West Virginia University Law School to mig class.

"We as lawyers in coal mining states have a moral obligation to get people a hearing of these claims," he said. "Only 4 percent of cases even get past the initial furdle, so you should charge clients only if you win the claim."

PORT-AL/PRINCE, Haiti — The military government said yester-day it had foiled an attempted rad-day it had foiled an attempted rad-varil by two military officers. 


