Commission findings

The Futures Commission made several suggestions to the General Assembly and to the UK Community College System.

▼NEW MEMBER: Add a Community College System alumna/alumna to the Council on Higher Education.

▼COOPERATION: Develop more collaborative efforts that result in joint ventures with Kentucky TECH System.

▼BASIC SKILLS: Increase emphasis on basic skills education to foster attitude of life-long learning.

▼ADVOCACY: Provide for statewide advocacy and networking of the community colleges throughout the system.

▼TECHNOLOGY: Increase use of distance learning technologies.

Group recommends change

When last compared with state schools in the south, Kentucky's public universities and postsecondary systems ranked last. But one commission is working to change that.

The report of the UK Community College System's 1995-96 Futures Commission, released on Friday, included 16 ideas to help improve the system. The commission presented the report to Gov. Paul Patton, whose administration appears focused on improving all of higher education.

"The report is clear in its concern that the most critical need of higher education, and especially the UK Community College System, is adequate and equitable state funding," said Bill Sturgill, the commission's co-chair, during his presentation.

Another concern held by the Futures Commission is the relationship between the UK Community College System and the Kentucky TECH System. The com-

mission recommended that the two take steps toward a merged system.

"In the long term, merging the Kentucky TECH System and the UK Community College System would enhance the state's efforts to ensure a job-ready workforce," Sturgill said in a release.

The commission's report overall reaffirmed the work of the Community College System and the "tremendous progress made" since the first Futures Commission meeting in 1988-89.

"We were very encouraged by the work of the commission and the recommendations that they made," said Jackie Bondurant, Community College System public relations director. "We felt like this gave us good sets of directions for moving into the 21st century."

Of the commission's 16 recommendations, six were directed to Kentucky's executive and legislative policy-makers.

On the night before the commission's presentation, Patton emphasized his commitment to improving higher during his State of the Commonwealth and Budget Address.

Under his budget plan, higher education would receive a 4-percent increase.

That would break down into at least a 3.2 percent increase for each university and a 9.5 percent increase for the Community College System.

"There's a lot of interest in the Community College System in general," Bondurant said. "The governor has said that he is going to make higher education one of his top priorities, and he is going to establish a task force to study it."

Several of the commission's recommendations concerned funding for the Community College System. Those recommendations included keeping the system in mind when administering block grants, moving overall funding to a level that is equal to benchmark states and ensuring equity in funding among the Kentucky higher education institutions.

Other recommendations centered on the Community College System's curriculum. For example, the commission called for more technical degree programs to meet the needs of business and industry.

Students find ways to deal with spouses

Biology graduate student Kris Beckman, who has been married a year and seven months, didn't feel getting hitched was so different.

"I didn't notice a big change making a step into marriage... I found no more stress than we had when we were living in separate apartments, because we typically would eat our dinners together and schedule our days together anyway," Beckman said.

"We had been together for roughly six years before we got married."

Some college sweethearts use graduation as a kind of artificial deadline to get married. Beckman was concerned more with having financial stability.

"Basically, once I was guaranteed a T.A.-ship starting grad school, I was guaranteed a method of supporting both myself and my spouse," Beckman said.

Getting married also solved another problem.

"Since she had an apartment and I had an apartment, we could consolidate those expenses into one."

Beckman and his then-fiancee, UK Women's Basketball player Julie Swarns-Beckman, did not take advantage of the counseling offered at the UK Family Center.

"Never even heard of it," he said. The center offers counseling for couples.

"We offer Relationship Enhancement groups for couples, which last for six to eight weeks," said Anne Winn, assistant director at the family center. "We work out communication skills and listening skills... learning how to solve problems together."

The center offers individualized therapy sessions. People having relationship difficulty also can go to the UK Counseling and Testing Center.

"We don't have any specific program, any assigned exercises," said Charlie O'Neill, associate

director of the Counseling and Testing Center.

Sometimes, though, even counseling isn't enough.

Electrical engineering graduate student Chris Cash, who was married for nine months during his junior year, said: "Actually, I didn't think it was that difficult in itself. Living with a wife as opposed to living with a roommate wasn't that big of a deal."

School did sometimes get in the way, though.

"One thing that hurt our marriage was that I was in school and she had dropped out of school and wanted to be back in. I think that she resented it a little bit, even though it was her choice," Cash said.

"She had a lot more time than I did, and would want to spend more time together, whereas I didn't have the time to go hang out with her. She would be out way late, and I had early classes."

Chris and Tracy did undergo pre-marital counseling within the Catholic church, which he said the church requires. It also requires an organized work-

shop, where one goes through an issues checklist.

"They're trying to make sure that you've discussed all of the important issues before marriage, and at least have an idea of what the other person thinks," he said.

Speech language pathology graduate student Shannon Grissom, who has been married for about a year and a half, was a little surprised by the transition from single life.

"I had lived in the dorm for four years, and going from that social situation, going from that to living with a man was a big change," Grissom said. "I wasn't necessarily a bad change... I was real ready to settle down."

Grissom said school does drain away a lot of time she'd rather spend with her husband, Chad, but "I guess work would do the same thing," Grissom said. "I think being married gives you a bigger perspective on life."

NATION Senators urge trying for new budget

WASHINGTON — Congress should make another try at a balanced budget compromise before resorting to the piecemeal approach of limited savings and tax cuts being promoted by House Speaker Newt Gingrich, two Senate leaders said yesterday.

"I think we're close enough," said Senate Majority Whip Trent Lott, R-Miss., citing what he said was growing support in the Senate for a bipartisan plan to balance the budget over seven years.

Gingrich, R-Ga., last week said the effort to find common ground with President Clinton on a balanced budget was hopeless, and proposed attaching up to \$100 billion in savings and \$29 billion in tax cuts to a bill raising the debt ceiling.

Appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press," Lott said there will have to be some conditions on the debt ceiling bill to get it through Congress, but he was not enthused about Gingrich's down payment idea. "I think that's too small. I think we need to do more. We can do more."

Republicans have been courting conservative Democrats in hopes of putting together a strong majority for a compromise plan and Lott said there was growing support in the Senate "in a bipartisan coalition that has really come up with a very realistic budget."

du Pont heir captured after standoff

NEWTOWN SQUARE, Pa. — An heir to the du Pont fortune was captured by SWAT team members yesterday as he stepped outside his mansion, ending a 48-hour standoff that began with the shooting death of a top wrestler.

John E. du Pont, who had been without heat since police cut off his boiler system Friday night, told negotiators he was cold and was leaving his house, said Newtown Township Police Chief Michael Mallon.

He did not carry one of the many weapons he kept on his 800-acre estate. No one was injured in the capture. Police, who had cleared the entrance to the estate hours earlier, picked up du Pont at about 3:30 p.m.

Patton allows UK to work on stadium

In his budget proposal Gov. Paul Patton gave UK permission to spend \$24 million to expand Commonwealth Stadium.

The stadium would be expanded to 72,000 seats and luxury sky boxes would be added.

Larry Ivy, senior associate athletics director, said he believes the additional seats will sell, especially because of this year's recruiting class.

"We wouldn't build it if we didn't think there was a need," Ivy said.

"If you build it they will come."

The proposal Patton outlined in his budget is only one concept UK is looking at, Ivy said.

"Everything is preliminary at this time," Ivy said. "We definitely want to build some of the sky boxes."

Another possibility for the expansion is a stadium club and offices, Ivy said.

"Those are things we have to get from the design (people)," Ivy said.

Commonwealth Stadium, built in 1973, currently seats 57,800 people. Enclosing the south end of the stadium into a horseshoe could bring the capacity to 72,000, Ivy said.

"This is a pattern that follows other state universities," said Karl Raitz, faculty member of the Athletics Association Board of Directors. Raitz said that Penn State expanded its stadium several times to accommodate crowds.

Raitz said whether or not the new seats will depend on the record of the football team.

After the Athletics Association board approves the design, the project would have to be approved by the Board of Trustees. Then UK could accept bids for the construction of the project.

"We hope that within the next couple years we will be able to do something on it," Ivy said.

Former pilot recounts change of heart for Japanese

Jerry Yellin did not realize that the Japanese were humans until 1984.

The former World War II fighter pilot said his dislike for the Japanese began at age 13, when he saw newsreels of Japan invading China. By 1945, when he dropped bombs on Tokyo, his dislike was now hatred.

"It never occurred to me that there were people on the ground," he said. "They were not humans, they were Japanese."

Upon returning to Japan in 1982 on a business trip, Yellin had an enlightening experience.

"I saw human beings not unlike myself," he said.

In front of an audience of about 20 people in the Student Center Friday, Yellin explained how he recalled the bombing while he was on his trip.

He imagined himself as the recipient, not the bomber. Yellin said he and his wife enjoyed their stay so much that they offered their son Robert, then a senior in college, a trip to Japan. He went in 1984 and still lives there.

Yellin fell in love with a Japanese woman and announced his plans to marry her. The woman's father, who was also in the war, hated Americans and refused to allow the marriage.

However, he gave the couple his blessing after meeting Robert. Yellin

said that Japanese weddings are between families, so the two families met in March 1988. Yellin and the woman's father found that they had much in common.

"We talked and we laughed and we cried through the interpreter for three

hours," Yellin said. "I felt that we bonded, that we became brothers."

He also explained how his life might have been different if the meeting had come earlier.

"Had I known him prior to World War II," he said, "I could not have fought."

Royce Bishop, a natural resources conservation and management senior, said he found Yellin's speech intriguing. He was also interested in Yellin's comments about the atomic bomb.

"It really put some perspective on (the bombing)," Bishop said.

Yellin said that the bombing of Hiroshima actually saved many lives, both American and Japanese. It also prevented later use of nuclear weapons.

Royce said that he came because his girlfriend had to attend for a class, but that he actually enjoyed the speech.

An improved understanding of Japan is important to American students for both practical and cultural reasons, said Paul Karan, a UK geography professor. Japan is the second most important economic power in the world, he said, so knowledge can be an important tool in the job market.

Wildcat track team sees weekend action

UK's Vadim Nemat set a provisional time of 14:01.83 for the NCAA's in the 5,000-meters this weekend at the Terrier Classic in Boston.

Other members of the UK track team participated in the U.S. Air Invitational at East Tennessee State University.

The women's 4x400 relay team of Roshell Russell, Meka Rembert, Alexis Simmons and LaTanza Stephens set its UK record performance from a week ago with a third place time of 3:44.31. (NCAA Provisional Time).

The men's 4x400 relay team of Mark Miller, Ray McLaurin, Darryl Gaines and Arnold Payne qualified for the NCAA Championships and set a UK indoor record with a third place time of 3:08.39.

Suzie von Bernuth finished fourth in the shot put with a throw of 44-4 at the US Air Invitational at East Tennessee State University. Ben Bird finished ninth in the men's shot with a throw of 51-7 1/4.

Raina Turner, the UK indoor record holder in the high jump, finished sixth with a leap of 5-11 1/4. DeMarcus Lindsey finished fifth in the 200m with a time of 21.58. Nathan Plager, the UK indoor record holder in the pole vault at 17 1/2, failed to clear the opening height in the pole vault.

Sundin falls in semis

UK junior Ludde Sundin lost to Mississippi's Johan Hede, 1-6, 6-2, 4-6, in the semifinals of the 1996 Southeastern Conference Coaches Tennis Championships in Columbia, S.C.

In the finals of the doubles championship, UK's Marcus Flatt and Dan Spenser lost to Georgia's doubles tandem of Jamie Laschinger and Steve Baldas, 8-5 in a pro set.

Gym Kats down Auburn

It took a return to Kentucky for the Gym Kats to turn up the heat on their opponents.

Fresh off their fourth-place finish in the Sunshine Cup in Nassau, Bahamas, UK defeated the No. 19 Auburn Tigers 190-83-183.55 before a highly vocal Memorial Coliseum crowd.

Leading the way for the No. 17 Kats was three-time NCAA All-Around champion and senior Jenny Hansen. She won the all-around competition with a 38.975, placing first in the vault (9.95) and floor exercise (9.85).

But it was her performance on the bars, a 9.75, that pleased and relieved Hansen the most. She scored a low 8.25 at the Sunshine Cup.

"In the Bahamas I fell twice, and — I don't know — I guess it's just the first-meet jitters," she said. "I still was really nervous going on bars tonight, but I just relaxed a little more."

Overall, the Gym Kats dominated the Tigers on the bars, capturing four of the five spots. Sophomore Beth Chuxton led the way with a 9.825, just shy of her career-high 9.85.

"I'm pretty consistent on bars," Chuxton said.

"It's probably my favorite event, and I can do that bar routine in my sleep. So for me it's just a matter of form and keeping tight."

Robin Ewing, a junior, scored a 9.75 to tie with Hansen for second place on the

bars, earning an all-around score with a 38.1.

Freshman Carrie DeJarnett came in fourth with a 9.725. Auburn's Erin Gannon kept the Kats from sweeping, coming in fifth with a 9.625.

The Tigers struggled all night, slipping off the beam and failing to stick landings during their floor routines.

The lone bright spot for Auburn was Gannon, who came in second in the floor (9.75) and third in the all-around (38).

The defeat of Auburn was UK's first dual-meet victory of the season, and first in Southeastern Conference competition.

Gym Kats head coach Leah Little said she was excited about the team's improvement.

"We were almost three points better than we were in the Bahamas," Little said.

"Our goal is to improve each week."

She said the team's ability to get better is a positive. Little explained that the squad's floor routine is "watered down a bit," in that its degree of difficulty is not as high as it could be.

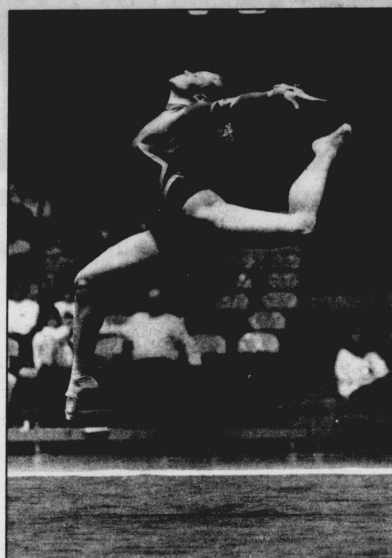
"The kids aren't ready to throw two double-backs in their routine, yet, but they're capable," she said.

Little added that she is always happy with any SEC victory, given the strength of the conference. The preseason Coaches' Poll ranked six SEC teams among the Top 25.

It doesn't get any easier for the Kats. They will journey to Baton Rouge for a meet against No. 6 LSU Friday.

Cats get first SEC win in 69-65 upset of No. 22 Arkansas

After coming close so many times before, the UK women's basketball team finally picked up its first Southeastern Conference win of the season, upsetting No. 22 Arkansas 69-65 at Memorial Coliseum yesterday.

The win ended a nine-game losing streak for the Cats (5-14 overall, 1-6 in the SEC). It also marked the first conference win for coach Bernadette Locke-Mattox.

"I want to start by saying how proud I am with the way my team played," Locke-Mattox said. "I'm really proud of how they hung in

even though Arkansas tried to come back. They hung in and worked hard. They executed. They looked for the opportunity to pass the ball and they hit the open shots."

UK maybe showed it's biggest improvement in the poise it demonstrated toward the end of the game with the Lady Razorbacks (15-7, 1-6) trying to cut into a 10-point UK lead.

With 1:30 left in the game and the Cats up 67-57, Carrie Satterfield hit a three-pointer to key an 8-0 Arkansas run.

With the Cats clinging to a 67-65 lead, the Lady Razorbacks fouled Christina Jansen, who proceeded to miss the front end of the

one-and-one with only 30 seconds left.

Arkansas rebounded, but Sytia Messer turned the ball over with 7.9 seconds remaining and UK's Julie Swares-Beckman hit two free throws to seal the win.

"I like to commend Bernadette for having her kids play really smart basketball," said Arkansas coach Gary Blair, whose squad was led by Shaka Massey's 20 points. "I said before this game Kentucky would beat somebody, because they've played everybody close."

Shaunda Roberts, who led UK with 19 points, said the Cats felt confident coming into the game.

"We knew it was going to be a good game when we first came out

everybody came out of the locker room," Roberts said. "This is the first game we were really in sync as far as wanting to win and wanting to take it to the other team."

UK and Arkansas played a back and forth first half, with neither team gaining a solid advantage.

In the second half, UK was able to jump out to an 11-point lead before the Lady Razorbacks mounted their comeback.

Blair credited Jansen, the UK point guard, for the Cats' play. She finished with only eight points, but had eight assists and only one turnover.

"Jansen was the best player on the floor," he said. "I don't care what the stat sheets say."

Cats turn up tempo in second half, down Gamecocks

South Carolina not the first team to try slow down against Wildcats

Wisconsin-Green Bay tried. So did Tennessee. On Saturday night, South Carolina gave the Rupp Arena fans yet another nostalgic look at life before the shot clock.

The Gamecocks actually managed to keep the high-powered UK offense in check for a half, but the Cats turned up the tempo in the second half, using a 30-2 run to down Eddie Fogler's squad 89-57.

On numerous possessions in the first stanza, Fogler's team ran the shot clock down to single digits before spreading the court and letting guard Melvin Watson take a Cat defender one-on-one.

Watson led the Cats with eight points in each half, playing nearly the entire second stanza with four fouls.

"I thought South Carolina had an excellent game plan and they executed it very well," Pitino said.

"They played very intelligent basketball and they were controlling the tempo."

It was pressure defense that forced the Cocks into high gear.

Pitino said the Cats split trapping Wildcat defenders with ease in the first half. But some halftime adjustments sealed holes in the UK traps which led to more steals and fastbreak baskets.

"I'm used to running up and down the floor and then somebody comes in here that just holds the ball up top," Allen Edwards said. "It's frustrating when you got to wait 30 or 35 seconds for them to run a play."

That's the downside. "Anytime you look at different teams that do different things it can only help you out in the tournament," said Derek Anderson, who tossed in eight points on the night.

Milestone victory
The South Carolina win was

Pitino's 300th as a head coach. The UK boss became just the ninth coach in NCAA history to reach 300 victories in 14 seasons or less.

Pitino, who is in his 14th season as a collegiate head coach, has a 300-118 overall record, including a 167-44 mark at UK. In addition to his seven seasons at UK, Pitino served as head coach at Boston University and Providence.

"I'm really more pleased with the way we played defense in the second half than I am with getting the 300th win," Pitino said.

Three-point barrage

Tony Delk wasn't alone behind the three-point line against the Gamecocks. The Cats, who hit 12-of-28 from behind the arc, had seven players connect from long range.

Forward Walter McCarty had a team-high three treys, including two consecutive to open the game, and freshman Wayne Turner drained his first collegiate three-pointer.

"We have other players on the team that shoot the three besides me," said Delk, who tallied two threes on the night.

"They just don't get as many opportunities."

South Carolina managed just three treys.

"The only chance we had is if they don't shoot the threes very well," Fogler said.

Takin' a break
The Cats get a break from mid-week competition with an open date on the schedule. UK's next action comes Saturday at Rupp Arena against Florida.

Pitino plans to spend Monday and Tuesday on the road recruiting, entrusting practices to Associate Coach Jim O'Brien and staff.

"This week should give us time to get better defensively as well as offensively," Delk said. "It'll give us time to rest and enjoy the week."

Pitino gets 300th win as the Cats use a 30-2 spurt to down Cocks

UK has a knack for turning close games into blowouts in a matter of minutes.

Just ask South Carolina head coach Eddie Fogler.

On Saturday, he found this out again as he watched his team give the ball up to UK nine times over a nine-minute stretch.

Then, the Cats capitalized with a 30-2 run to end any chance for a Carolina upset.

"I thought we played pretty darn good for 24, 25 minutes," Fogler said. "Then it really caved in."

The last time UK played South Carolina in early January, the Cats were caught in a dog fight for most of the first half—pretty much like Saturday's game.

But just like an instant replay, UK put together runs in the second half to help blow out the Gamecocks.

The first run in the first game against USC was a 17-5 run to put the Cats up 56-39.

The second one came with 10:37 left in the game. That was when the Wildcats ripped off 19 straight points to make it 77-47 as the Big Blue cruised to an 89-60 win.

How history seems to repeat itself.

The Cats (17-1 overall, 7-0 in the Southeastern Conference) only led the Gamecocks 46-45 prior to the run in Saturday's game at the 17:24 mark in the second half.

But by the time starting point guard Wayne Turner had banked in a jumper with 8:09 left in the game, UK led 76-47.

From there, the rest of the game was just a formality as the Cats rolled to a 89-57 win over USC (11-5, 5-3 SEC) at Rupp Arena.

"I'm really proud of our ball club," UK coach Rick Pitino said. "They did a great job of turning up the heat in the second half, and they had some big runs because of it."

The win marks the 16th in a row for UK, the longest streak for

any team since the 1965-66 team won 23 straight. It was also Pitino's 300th career win as a college coach.

"In the second half, we got caught up in the tempo and turned the ball over too many times," USC forward William Galman said.

This run started modestly with a Mark Pope jumper.

But this run was anything but modest.

Following the jumper was a rim-rattling alley-oop dunk by Walter McCarty, a three and a layup by Derek Anderson, and a free throw by Pope.

Then the Cats demonstrated their three-point shooting proficiency.

First it was guard Anthony Epps, then it was his mate in the backcourt, Tony Delk, getting into the three-point shooting clinic.

Even the 6-foot-10 McCarty got into the act of hitting the long ball.

"I think we get our runs by our defensive pressure," said Pitino of his team's ability to blow open close games, "and what separates us from other teams is our ability to hit the three-pointer."

After the three-point shooting contest, the Wildcats decided to insert a dunkfest into its monster run.

McCarty's entry was a turnaround dunk in traffic, but Mercer's brought the crowd of 24,229 into a frenzy with a one-handed tomahawk dunk on the fast break.

It was 72-47 UK at that point.

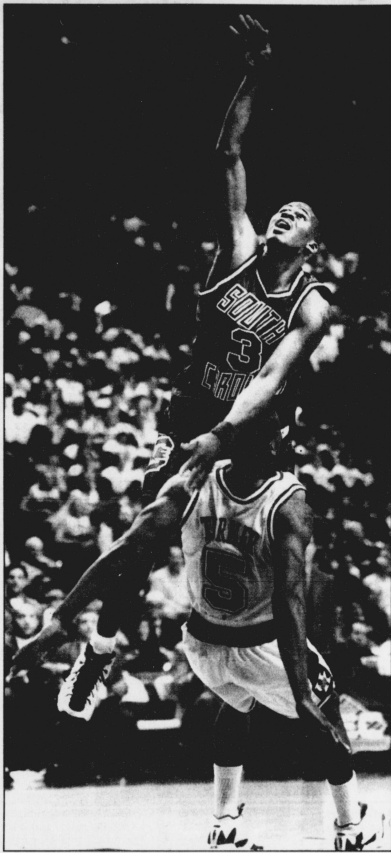
After the run, it was hard to imagine that this game was even close in the first half.

"USC just played intelligent basketball (in the first half)," Pitino said.

"We had a few turnovers and they beat us with some easy shots. But they were controlling the tempo."

UK and USC were actually tied at two separate occasions in the first half of play, at 28-28 and 30-30.

But the Cats managed to pull ahead by eight at halftime, thanks in part to a three by Mercer at the buzzer.

Balanced league

Despite the two blowout losses to UK, Pitino thinks South Carolina will earn a berth to the NCAA Tournament. In fact, Pitino predicts six SEC teams—South Carolina, Mississippi State,

Georgia, Alabama, UK and Auburn—will be invited to the Big Dance.

"I don't think the conference is really down this year," Pitino said. "I just don't think it's as top-heavy."

I've seen in a very long time. The film begins with Jordan White (James Duval) and his femme fatale girlfriend, Amy Blue (Rose McGowan) trying to get it on in the back of Amy's car. The couple are quickly interrupted, however, when Xavier Red (Johnathon Schaech) falls into the car after being attacked by a pack of goons.

From there, the trio set a course for into a downward spiral of murder, sex and reckless abandon. A gruesome yet comical murder at a quickie mart bonds the three, forcing them to flee across a distorted suburban America. During the rest of the film, Xavier (nicknamed "X" because Xavier was "too hard to pronounce") pulls the couple into his own subversive sexual perspective, changing the

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Foreign cinema a great alternative

Living worked in a video store for two years, I had the distinct pleasure of encountering a variety of interesting people who shared my love of film. These people, sadly, were the exception rather than the rule, as over 80 percent of the clientele comprised shallow, brain-dead dolts.

Not only does this closed-mindedness imply something wrong with society in general, it influences the variety of selection for those who seek foreign films.

Because cinemas and video stores judge films on the potential amount of money they can bring in, subtitled movies are often last priority.

Working at largest video chain

in the world. I was disgusted when they recently failed to carry the re-released classic *Belle de Jour*, the French epic *Queen Margot*, and Academy Award nominee *Farinelli*. Although I was able to find these titles at other locations, it's upsetting nonetheless that they've been denied mainstream access.

This sector of the public's refusal to expand its viewing into various cultures is peculiar. I'm not sure if there is a stereotype of these films being boring, overly artsy or if people simply don't enjoy reading. Maybe, if they could get the number of American films that are influenced by or are remakes of international pictures, an appreciation may sprout from their feeble minds. In a recent survey of directors, they were asked to formulate a list of the 10 best-directed films of all time.

The results showed half of 10 films were done by Ingmar Bergman, Federico Fellini and Akira Kurosawa — all foreign directors.

Several foreign directors and actors have been recruited by American filmmakers for the movies we've become so familiar with: Juliette Binoche, Julie Delpy, Irene Jacob, Gerard Depardieu and Antonio Banderas are among many foreign actors and actresses to make an impact on modern American cinema.

The late director Louis Malle's

Vanya on 42nd Street, John Woo's upcoming *Broken Arrow*, Robert Rodriguez' *Fram Dusk Till Dawn*, Luc Besson's *The Professional* and Ang Lee's Best Picture contender *Sense and Sensibility* are all examples of successful international directors brought over to make English-language films.

These actors and directors didn't experience some kind of metamorphosis while doing American films — their subtitled versions are also excellent.

Taking it even further, American film has taken the liberty of re-making several foreign films: *La Femme Nikita* with *Point of No Return*, *The Vanishing*, and the soon to be released *Diabolique* with Sharon Stone.

Aside from this obvious influence, more subtle directorial and camera techniques have found their way to our theaters.

If you're looking for a place to start your subtitled experience, you might try Krzysztof Kieslowski's three colors trilogy; Zhang Yimou's *Raise the Red Lantern*, *Ju Do on To Live*; or Giuseppe Tornatore's *Cinema Paradiso*.

Like *Water for Chocolate*, the only foreign film to receive wide release, recently became the highest grossing subtitled film in America. This, along with the prosperity of *Il Postino*, are positive trends of an ever-increasing popularity.

This, however, is not enough as the majority of movie-goers still shun from reading subtitles, no matter how well the film is made. If you're a true lover of the movies, try out the lushly cinematic, often more direct, realm of foreign films.

Hip-hop stands as one of the most potent, stripped-down musical styles available. Like it or hate it, few can deny the power of its hypnotic rhythms and lyrical ranting.

However, it is inevitable that the direct, in-your-face power should be subverted by subtlety, mixing the music up and twisting the lyrics. That, friends, is not a bad thing.

Aceyalone, formerly of the Free Style Fellowship, has made an amazing creative tag on the ear of West Coast rap.

Taking the usual elements of beat and word, he's layered in touches of live vibes, string bass, and an overall laidback Modern Jazz Quartet feel.

The real accomplishment of this record lies in the lyrics. The usual macho b-boy BS that thickly sickens most hip-hop only shows up on the first three tracks.

The rest of the record is dominated by clever wordplay and rhythmic changes that would stun

the average blunted mind. The rhyming style is fast and rich, not unlike what Charlie Parker would have done with a thesaurus and a lack of arms. Every word is clear, riding free of, but deeply linked with, the music.

On one of the true album standouts, "Makeba," Acey tells you it's a slow song and then proceeds to flip words in a story about a former girlfriend, cleverly wrapping nostalgia into an indictment of both parties.

I hope this won't be the last we hear of Aceyalone. Regardless of how many people buy the album, *All Balls Don't Bounce* will stand as a statement for the legitimacy of hip-hop in any collection.

Recordings of people talking have come back into public attention in the '90s. Part of this is due to the popularity of books on tape, but the other credit is the revival of "spoken word," a genre born from the prosody of the Beat Generation.

This record is an erotic dream and a numbing nightmare. It is friend and enemy. Consume and consuming, it's entirely human, and entirely needed.

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The economy of the 21st century will require that our educational system responds directly to industry demands through vocational training. In Kentucky that has traditionally been the job of the TECH schools run by the state workforce cabinet.

But many have found state-run vocational schools to be limiting, and TECH students often discover other interests through their training that can only be satisfied in an institution of higher education, namely in the UK Community College System.

The problem is that most skills acquired in the TECH schools, though often compatible to or servicable with knowledge acquired through a community college degree, are not transferrable as credit hours should the vocational student choose to move on to higher education.

Until now, community college officials have been painstakingly working with the workforce cabinet to hammer out agreements to help decide on exactly what courses are transferrable, but the process is slow and unnecessary. The Community College Futures Commission says the inevitable solution is a giant merger between the TECH schools and the UKCCS.

It sounds like a good idea, and it is, but UK nevertheless has good reason to be alarmed.

As a result of this new proposal, many jealous opponents of UK's statewide mission in the General Assembly and in competing regional college towns will want a merger that takes the community colleges out of UK's hands.

That would be a big mistake. If anything, the University — not Frankfort — should be the management headquarters of the merger, overseeing a cooperative effort to create an efficient system of vocational and higher education, and subsequently should be given additional funding to match.

In essence, what we're actually talking about is what should be an expansion of the Community College System with the willing aid and assistance of the workforce cabinet.

UK has proven its ability to handle the needs of community college students and has demonstrated eager dedication to the extension of those services to the communities that need them most.

Taking that mission away from UK would leave the state's educational and economic future in the hands of Frankfort bureaucrats disinterested with the long-term and ruled by backwoods politicking.

'Negro for a day:' Racism is still on trial after O.J.

Last Tuesday night, millions of people across the nation tuned in for what was probably the highest rated program in Black Entertainment Television history: the O.J. Simpson interview.

As I watched O.J. wiggle his way out of difficult questions, I really didn't listen to Simpson's predictable responses. I just thought about what others were probably thinking about his answers.

I also thought about the trial. Whether Simpson is guilty or not, the Los Angeles Police Department did an awful lot of cheating to make him look like a guilty man.

I am amazed that people can overlook blatant police corruption, racism and perjury when arguing Simpson's guilt.

Simpson was painfully correct when he said that the uproar and public attacks would not exist had the victim been his first wife, who is black.

America's reaction to the verdict reminded me of the Dick Gregory phrase "Negro for a day."

After the verdict, a whole lot of people suddenly found out what it is like to be black in America.

Perhaps now we can agree that the criminal justice system needs some changes.

At the very least, we should make sure that injustice is passed on equally.

In an odd, sick sort of way, Simpson's dilemma has made some interesting contributions to the black community. By agreeing to do his first television interview with BET, he gave the network a huge dose of credibility.

Of course BET wasn't Simpson's first choice.

His appeal probably came from the fact that none of the major networks would sell him advertising spots to promote his video. At the same time, these networks agreed to allow the Brown and Goldman families to buy ad spots asking for contributions to fight Simpson in court.

The result of this racist temperament was that all of the mainstream networks were passed by in favor of BET. So, BET got its interview, and O.J. can advertise his video nationwide.

This should be a lesson to the networks that racist, band-wagon behavior will make you a loser every time. After all, the man was

acquired! In the eyes of the law, the only criminals in this trial were Mark Fuhrman and the LAPD.

This event should also be a lesson to blacks that working together, we can achieve great things.

On the other hand, Simpson's "return" to BET was really just the same old song: Negro can run real fast. Negro gets lots of money. Negro forgets he's a Negro. Negro gets in trouble. Negro remembers he's a Negro again. Negro asks for help from other Negroes.

The funny thing is that in spite of the fact that Simpson has shunned the black community for so many years, we still circled around him when times got rough. Maybe it's a good thing, maybe not, because there is a good chance that he killed

two people. Another coincidental contribution Simpson made during his ordeal is that his brilliant attorneys were able to expose the very same LAPD corruption that blacks have been yelling and screaming about for decades.

As a result, police departments across the nation are being overhauled, and the LAPD is the subject of a federal investigation. LAPD chief Willis Williams' insistence that there is no corruption on his force is drowned out by the fact that he has reopened hundreds of closed cases and taken badges from dozens of officers.

However, we must not forget that there is a cost to all of these contributions.

Black men across the country are being sent to the slammer at record rates after being convicted by all-white juries who are still steaming over the Simpson trial.

Unlike O.J., the only thing between these men and the penitentiary is an over-worked public defender. Legal gambling creates social degeneration

In 1987, businessman Wallace Wilkinson propelled himself to the Kentucky governorship using the promise of a lottery to fill the state coffers without a tax increase. Now other states have, on the basis of similar reasoning, allowed casinos to be built. It is hoped that casinos will alleviate unemployment and expand the tax base.

In 1982, only 15 states had a lottery. Today that number has increased to 36. Only 7 states today do not have casino-based gambling and are not considering legalizing it. The gambling industry grosses \$480 billion annually.

However, the most obvious problem with the prolific spread of gambling in American society is that its primary justification does not withstand critical scrutiny.

It is true that casinos and state-run lotteries bring in additional tax revenues and increase employment rates, but this fails to grasp the totality of the situation that develops in the wake of the importation of gambling. One scholar has calculated that for every dollar that casinos contribute to the state in taxes, government spends \$3 in expenditures to deal with pathologies that accompany them.

In Iowa, for example, one study found that in 1989, prior to the arrival of riverboat casinos, Iowans had a compulsive gambling rate of 1.7 percent.

Four years after the casinos had first started their operation, that rate had jumped to a whopping 5.4 percent. Compulsive gambling obviously presents a problem for the gambler and his family. But

society is impacted, too. It has by a national news magazine been estimated that an addicted gambler will cost \$13,000-\$35,000 in law enforcement and treatment related costs.

A second pathology is increased rates of crime. Cities with casinos have crime rates of up to twice that of those without them. Additionally, from 1993 to 1994, the national crime rate fell by 2 percent. However, in cities that had casinos, it rose by almost 6 percent. Cities that first got casinos in 1993 saw their crime rate climb by almost 8 percent.

Studies have repeatedly shown that one's propensity to play the lottery is directly related to one's income and level of education.

According to one study, less than 20 percent of college graduates play the lottery. For those who have not even graduated from high school, the rate is at least 50 percent. There is a similar relationship for income. Those who have incomes of over \$55,000 spend 2 percent of their income on lotteries. The figure for those who earn less than \$5,000 is 7.1 percent.

Not surprisingly, casinos tend to attract a clientele that is generally from higher socioeconomic groups than does the lottery.

However, in Minneapolis and St. Paul, welfare recipients withdraw approximately \$400,000 annually from ATMs located on casino grounds.

Recently, one woman who works at a Dunkin' Donuts store, a business that is apt to pay only minimum wage, revealed to a correspondent for the national magazine that she goes to riverboat

casinos every Sunday and gambles up to \$100. When asked why, she responded that "Somebody, I'm going to hit it big."

Governments encourage this. A billboard located in a Chicago ghetto showed a rendering of a lottery ticket with the slogan, "This could be your ticket out."

This shows just how degenerated the whole phenomenon really is. Society has an appetite for almost unlimited government services while at the same time refusing to enact broad-based taxes to pay for them.

So, government, directly and in partnership with the private sector, holds out the promise of quick riches to those least able to critically evaluate the claims.

In arguing against amending the Kentucky constitution to allow the legislature to legalize casino gambling, Rev. Nancy Kemper said "we are better people than this."

anne Lorensen, home economics education freshman. She did have an opinion on the outcome, though.

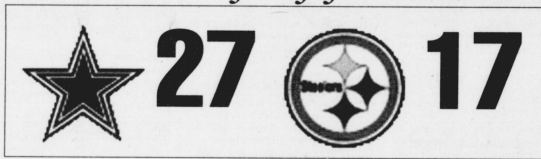
"I used to live in Texas, so I'm a big Oilers and Cowboys fan."

Cowboys hurdle Steelers for fifth Bowl win

TEMPE, Ariz. — Those limo-riding 'glamour boys from Dallas backed up their bluster — barely.

And they can thank one of their least glamorous players, defensive back Larry Brown, for their third Super Bowl victory in four years.

The Cowboys beat Pittsburgh 27-17 last night to extend the NFL's streak of victories in the NFL's showcase game to an even dozen.

"There were high expectations but it was a relief just the same," quarterback Troy Aikman said. "It wasn't the prettiest game we played, the defense really stepped it up, but a win is a win. We knew it would be a tough game."

For coach Barry Switzer, who had to win a Super Bowl to be considered anything but a failure, it was more than enough.

"We did it our way, baby! We did it! We did it! We did it!" Switzer shouted.

They did it without a big game from Troy, Emmitt, Michael and Deion during a second half in which Pittsburgh had the ball for 21 of the 30 minutes. Instead, the Super Bowl's most valuable player was Brown, a former 12th round draft pick.

Brown's 44-yard interception return in the third quarter of Neil

O'Donnell's pass set up a 1-yard touchdown run by Emmitt Smith that put Dallas up 20-7. This came after Pittsburgh, which fell behind 13-0, seemed ready to take the lead.

Then, after Pittsburgh had closed to 20-17 and had the ball with four minutes left, Brown, just as he did to seal the NFC title game with Green Bay, made another interception, returning it 33 yards to set up another Smith TD run, this one of four yards.

Only then did the Cowboys celebrate a struggling Super Bowl victory that capped a struggling season. And the hugs in the end zone reflected relief more than the "in-your-face" braggadocio with

which the Cowboys faced Super Bowl week.

Aikman, who at one point in the first half completed 10 straight passes, tying Phil Simms for second place in Super Bowl history behind Joe Montana's 13, was good early but finished 15 of 23 for 209 yards.

And Smith, whose fourth and fifth rushing touchdowns passed Franco Harris and Thurman Thomas for the most in Super Bowl history, was held to just 49 yards in 18 carries, far short of the 115 he needed to become the leading rusher in Super Bowl history. Twenty-three of his yards came on the third play of the game.

Dallas, 13 1/2-point favorites, controlled the first half, with help from O'Donnell, who was high and outside most of the time.

But while they scored on their first three possessions, they could convert those only into 13 points, leaving the Steelers within striking range, even with O'Donnell struggling so much.

Pittsburgh, which won four Super Bowls, lost for the first time in five appearances.
