

A + M. College of Kentucky Nov. 6 - 1903.

The faculty met in the president's office whose present being Pres. Patterson, Messrs. White, W. K. Patterson, Kastle, Roark, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Brooks, Mackenzie, Norwood, Gaig, Capt. Byroads and Miss Offutt.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Miss Offutt's  
Gymnasium  
Work.

Miss Offutt presented a request that athletic events should not be played upon any other day in the week than Saturday, because of the serious interference with the work of her department on such days.

Prof. Anderson, chairman of the Athletic Com. explained that it had been customary for some time, by general consent, to allow the playing of three games each during the Football and baseball seasons, upon other days of the week than Saturdays, but that his committee would so far as possible arrange the schedules for games so that they might not conflict with Miss Offutt's class-work.

Upon motion of Prof. Roark it was ordered that the lists of prospective graduates of 1904 should be submitted at some later meeting.

R. B. Walsh.

Prof. Roark presented to the faculty for their consideration the case of Mr. R. B. Walsh who is now a student of the college and expects to take his Bachelor's degree in the classical department at the end of this year. Mr. Walsh is also taking the special pedagogical work of the Normal course and desires to secure the degree of B. Ped. also at the close of this year.

Question of two

After some discussion of this case, it was ordered upon motion of Prof. Roark seconded by Prof. Gaig, that the general question of giving two degrees in one year, be referred for consideration to the Deans of Courses of study.

In this connection it was suggested that doubt may arise regarding the requirements for completing a given college course, when a

students attendance has been interrupted by an absence of one or several years, during which interval changes have been made in the prescribed schedule of studies for his course.

By general consent this matter also was referred to the same committee.

Disorder in  
Chapel.

A somewhat extended discussion, introduced by Prof. Mackenzie, followed, upon the subject of the increasing disorder manifest in the chapel during the daily religious exercises, and upon methods of checking such conduct.

It was generally agreed, that while this state of affairs was partly due to the crowded condition of our assembly hall, the introduction into the chapel period of humorous speeches, class meetings, or other exercises which lead to enthusiastic applause or other more or less boisterous demonstrations upon the part of students, had had a large influence in the past in promoting a disregard for the proprieties pertaining to the place and period of public worship.

It was therefore ordered, upon motion of Capt. Byroade seconded by Prof. White, that in the future no notices, speeches, meetings, or other exercises which are not in harmony with a proper observance of the chapel service, shall be admitted into the period of such chapel exercises, or immediately thereafter.

Upon motion of Prof. Anderson seconded by Prof. Fairg it was ordered that the faculty chairs upon the rostrum should be placed in definite and regular positions.

The faculty, upon motion, adjourned.
