The invention's anniversary

This year, the month of December does not just represent the long-awaited academic break. It also marks the 100th anniversary of the discovery of the X-ray.

the X-ray.

Although the discovery of the X-ray occurred in Wurzberg by Wilhelm Roentgen on Nov. 8, 1895, UK also played a significant role in the history of the X-ray.

After the announcement from

or the X-ray.

After the announcement from Roentgen on Dec. 28, 1895 that he had discovered a new type of ray, it only took Americans until the last week in January 1896 to recreate Roentgen's findings.

The first American credited with the production of X-rays was Arthur Williams Wright of Yale University on

Available vision of all conversity on Jan. 27, 1806. Even though these are the recognized founders of X-rays, University archives show that researchers on campus were reproducing these same findings.

The earliest recorded documentation of work done at UK is Feb. 20, 1806.

The work at UK on the experimentation with X-rays was done by M. L. Pence, the first chairman of the physics department. Pence also is considered to be Kentucky's first medical physi-

Including Pence, three other UK

rofessors experimented with X-ray

Dr. Joseph W. Pryor, professor of anatomy and physiology, showed an interest in using X-rays in the medical field.

Pryor is best known for his research in the ossification of carpal bones of the hand, which gained him international attention and recognition.
He also is known widely for his dedication to the University and its students.

Accompanying Pryor, two others were also working with X-rays: Paul Anderson, dean of the College of Engineering, and James H. Wells, assistant in mechanical engineering.

Their work has been traced to per-

haps as early as January 1896, which possibly could make them the first to experiment with X-rays in the United States.

Anderson was the first dean of the School of Mechanical Engineering at UK (which was then known as the State University of Kentucky) in the 1890s.

Among Anderson's many contributions to the University was the architectural design of a number of campus buildings, and his work with Wells related to the first X-ray in 1896.

Anyone interested in more information on the history of radiology and the pioneers of X-rays can contact Marcus McEllistrem, professor of physics and astronomy.

NATION Clinton presents new budget to Congress

WASHINGTON — Under Republican pressure, President Clinton reluctantly presented a seven-year balanced-budget plan yesterday that would shrink Social Security raises and offer Republicans less than they want in tax cuts or savings from Medicare and Medicaid.

Republicans quickly criticized Clinton's offer. House Budget Committee Chariman John Kasich, R-Ohio, said it was "a minimum \$400 billion in the hole" from a balanced budget. This is a tremedous disappointment and frankly they're going to have to come back to the table again, and they better do it quickly because we are running out of time," he said.

In a meeting with congressional leaders, Clinton

It was Clinton's third budget this year and marked another round of White House concessions in an increasingly bitter fight with the Republican Congress.

New drug marked as strong AIDS fighter

New drug marked as strong AIDS fighter
WASHINGTON — AIDS patients will be able
to buy by tomorrow the first of a long-anticipated
new generation of AIDS drugs, the most powerful
yet to stall but not cure the deadly virus.
The Food and Drug Administration approved
saquinarity resterday, the first protease inhibitor
approved anywhere in the world, to be used with
older medicines to slow the HIV virus and boost
patients' immune systems.
This new class of drugs cripples an enzyme vital
to the late stages of HIV's reproduction while older
AIDS medicines work at the front end — meaning
doctors finally can deal the virus a one-two punch.
"This is ... perhaps the most important class of
drugs in the fight against HIV so far," said FDA
Commissioner David Kessler, who approved
saquinavir in a record 97 days.

Galileo enters Jupiter's atmosphere

Ballieo enters Jupiter's atmosphere
PASADENA, Calif. — A 746-pound probe
released from the Galileo spacecraft entered the
harsh, whrling gases of Jupiter's atmosphere on a
suicide mission yesterday and began sending back
long-awaited data.
A cheer went up among NASA workers and
there were handshakes and back slaps all around
when it was confirmed at 3:15 p.m. that the probe
was transmitting information back to its trailing
Galileo mother ship.
After slamming into the atmosphere at 106,000
mph, the giant, squat cone was to drop more than
125 miles by parachute, sending data for 75 miles before being crushed by air pressure 20 times
greater than Earth's.
Previous pace missions have analyzed the atmo-

greater than Earth's.

Previous space missions have analyzed the atmospheres of Mars and Venus. But Jupiter is different, the giant planet is surrounded by powerful magnetic fields and intense radiation, and is made up mostly of hydrogen and helium, the elements in the primordial mix that once condensed into the solar system.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Somewhere, somebody hit it big — \$1 million big — in a McDonald's peel-off game. But the winners yesterday were \$1, udc Children's Research Hospital and its young cancer patients.

The winner of the McDonald's Monopoly contest took a game piece worth \$1 million, put it in a plain white envelope and mailed it anonymously to the Memphis hospital.

St. Jude executive Richard Shadyac called it "a holiday miracle."

Game railes bar the legal transfer of winning pieces from one person to another. But McDonald's agreed to make good on the payoff, which will be made in 20 annual payments of \$50,000 each.

The hospital, an international leader in the treatment of catastrophic childhood diseases, depends heavily on donations and takes in patients regardless of their ability to pay.

NEW YORK — Michael Jackson spent yester-day in intensive care with a series of ailments possibly affecting his heart, kidney and liver, and his much-hyped worldwide TV concert was indefinitely postponed.

Jackson, 37, was in serious but stable condition a day after collapsing during a rehearsal for the HBO special, which was to have been broadcast yesterday.

"Mr. Jackson will require several days of critical care monitoring and treatment," said his doctors, Allan Metzger and William Alleysen.

They said Jackson was being treated for an inflammation of the stomach, dehydration and an irregular heartbeat may have caused him to faint Wednesday on stage at the Beacon Theater. Emergency workers aid his blood pressure had dropped to 70 over 40, a typical healthy reading would be 120 over 80.

Birds causing problems on and off campus

If you have seen an unusual amount of birds around campus and downtown Lex-ington, you haven't been having flash-backs of an Alfred Hitchcock movie. They

backs of an Alfred HIRCHOCK HOUNG. They are here.

"Once the cold weather sets in, thousands upon thousands of starlings, crows and pigeons nightly come and roost in and around downtown Lexington, including the UK campus," said Carl Nathe, UK public relations spokesman.

He said the birds come in from the countryside because they are attracted to the heat generated by the tall buildings and trees.

"I'm visiting from Ohio Northern University and I can't believe how many birds you have here," said Jeremy Ruley, a performing arts junior. "In Ohio I don't notice any birds in the winter."

Besides creating an annoyance, the birds propose other problems.

"They congregate in trees and shrubs

and deposit large amounts of acidic drop-pings on streets, parking lots, sidewalks, vehicles, buildings and lawns," Nathe

These droppings cause inconvenience and can pose a potential health hazard, he

These droppings cause inconvenience and can pose a potential health hazard, he said.

"T've heard that bird droppings can cause histoplasmosis, a disease that can give you symptoms similar to bronchitis, and can even cause blindness," said Jenny Rietze, pre-physician assistant senior.

Because of these potential hazards to students and citizens, Lexington is working to curtail the problem.

"The University is working cooperatively with the Urban County Government with the Help of the United States Department of Agriculture's animal damage control office in Louisville in an effort to solve this problem." Nathe said.

The city has used noisemakers in an attempt to get the birds out. They also have trimmed the trees and shrubs and have placed netting on top of towers and structures.

Some students may be won-dering why they had to fill out evaluations for one professor and not another.

That's because some full and

That's because some full and associate professors have the choice to be evaluated in either the fall or spring senseters.
"All administration agree that evaluations are a beneficial component of evaluation of what is going on in the classroom," said Lee Edgerton, the academic ombud.

But three university depart-

mbud.
But three university depart-ents still do not participate in ac university-wide evaluation with the standard university

questionnaire.
The three departments include English, physics and

include English, physics and statistics.

Professional colleges like Pharmacy and Nursing do not use the evaluations either.

According to Imogene Foster, staff assistant in the English Department Advising Office, the English department has handed out 2,450 teacher and course evaluation sheets for levels 206 and above.

About 65 professors receive the evaluations.

About 65 professors receive the evaluations.
This includes instructors, teaching assistants and faculty.
These 65 faculty members have no say in which semester they prefer to be evaluated. They get it both semesters.
About 26 full and associate professors in the English depart-

ment can choose the semester in which they are evaluated. As of Wednesday, three of these professors have chosen not to have an evaluation done until

to have an evaluation done until spring.

The 73 professors teaching levels 205 and lower in the writing program have had evaluations done simply because they had no other option.

"The greater concern is that evaluations are not too helpful to the professor," Edgerton said. "Although for the faculty members who chose not to be evaluated this fall would probably suffer when evaluation for the faculty members who chose not to be evaluated this fall would probably suffer when evaluation of."

Students don't feel the same as the faculty do about evaluations, however.

"I feel hesitant to think eval-

as the factury do about evalua-tions, however.

"I feel hesitant to think eval-uations make any difference because of my past experiences," said Neal Amos, a communica-tion senior. "I have given bad-evaluations before and the teach-er was exactly the same the next semester."

Business senior Crystal Fong, an international student from Maylasia, said,
"It is only fair that every professor be evaluated every semester.

fessor be evaluated every semester.
"Even though students give the lecturer a bad evaluation, they still come back and do the same thing over again the next semester."

She also thinks that it is difficult to define what is good and what is bad because every student has a different point of view.

Simulated company teaches business methods

A dark-haired woman in a green dress runs frantically up and down an aisle, pretending she is a delivery truck. A man at a desk in the same room screams, "Green." Others sit at their tables busily working with springs, wires and other gadgets yelling, "Parts! I need parts."

No, it's not the hird floor of a psychiatric ward, it is General Illumination, a simulated manufacturing company.

psychiatric ward, it is General Illumination, a simulated manu-facturing company.

On Tuesday, the UK Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems in the College of Engi-neering held a demonstration at the French Quarter Suites Hotel of "Lean Manufacturing," a con-

cept designed to shorten the time of production and delivery by eliminating waste.

From 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., 30 representatives from nine companies participated in a simulation of a manufacturing company. Participated in a simulation of a manufacturing company. Participants took on every role from the assembly line worker to the delivery truck in order to gain a better understanding of the "Lean Manufacturing" concept.

Using standard methods of producton, participants spent the morning making mock products.

Throughout the day, they incorporated the strategies of the expanding philosophy to witness the significant decrease in cost, production time and waste. They also witnessed the dramatic increase in customer satisfaction

that Lean Manufacturing is responsible for, supporters said. Rob Marshall of the UK Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems, Toyota Motor Manufacturing U.S.A. has been using the system for a while. Pioneered by Tailchi Ohno in the 40s, Lean Manufacturing came into prominence in 1973 after the oil crisis. While all other U.S. companies were losing vast quantities of money, Toyota's success continued. Lean Manufacturing is now being successfully used by many large U.S. companies. "We want to charter it to smaller companies," Marshall said.

UK was approached by Toyota's U.S. was approached by Toyota's under the companies, was approached by Toyota's under the companies of th

uK was approached by Toyota and has been in collaboration with

them to perfect the manufacturing philosophy. Its techniques are being taught various companies, as well as to engineering students in a Lean Manufacturing class at UK. Representatives from Ryder, Square D Company, Geo Audio and the Donaldson Company were at the simulation along with instructors from Georgia Tech, Madisonville and Lexington community colleges.

The key objectives of Lean Manufacturing are maximizing quality and minimizing cost and production time. According to Marshall and the supporters of the technique, by increasing the efficiency of the work method, wastes such as overproduction, correcting defects and unnecessary processing can be eliminated.

UK defense hoping to contain Yellow Jackets

Forgive Stephon Marbury if his eyes are lighting up right now. Don't hold it against Drew Barry f his stride is a bit more confident

The two Georgia Tech players can't help it. After all, they're the main men for the 16th-ranked

Yellowjackets, and that spells a big game when they face No. 5 UK tomorrow night.

At least that's the trend.
"In our first four games, we've let the other team's top scorer get his average," UK coach Rick Ptitono said. "Now we're going against Barry and Marbury, and if we let them get their average, that's the way to get beat."

The Wildcats (3-1) haven't contained anyone's big scorer yet: Maryland's Johnny Rhodes scored 24 in the season opener; Massachusetts' Marcus Camby torched then-No. 1 UK for 32 in UMass' upset win, Brian Evans, Indiana's top therat, netted 28 in a loss; and Wisconsin Green-Bay's 19th North State of the Phoenix's 74-62 loss to UK on Wednesday.

That's an average of just over 28 points per game for the opponent's key offensive player against UK. And the Cats aren't rising to the defensive occasion — especially the more experienced ones. Pitino singled out Tony, Delk, Walter McCarty and Mark Pope for coming up short on defense.
"None of the older guys have set the defensive attitude," Pitino said, "Tony Delk can't even spell defense right now."

Pitino Dalmed the poor defensive efforts on a "lack of pride."

His players know where he's coming from. The UK coach said his players are too interested in looking for the crowd-pleasing offensive plays.

His players think he's half risht.

sive plays. His players think he's half

right.
"We definitely don't have the mental attitude to play great defense yet," point guard Anthony

Epps said. "But if you want to get the crowd excited, you can start that on the defensive end by get-ting a great steal to start the break."

Epps in particular will play a
key role in tomorrow's game. For
the first time this season, the Cats
match up with a team that looks
sprimarily to its guards to get the
ball in the bucket. Though Matt
Harpring leads Tech in scoring,
the key to stopping the Jackets is
slowing Marbury, quite possibly
the most explosive freshman in the
nation, and Barry.

The 6-foot-1 Marbury averages
18 points and 5.7 assists for the
Yellowjackets (5-1). Backcourt
mate Barry, though he's listed as
the shooting guard, is even better
at running the show, averaging 8.2
assists along with his 14.3 points.

"They're a good team with
some great players," Ron Mercer
said of Georgia Tech "We're
going to have to step it up and
play a whole better (than against
UWGB) if we expect to beat a
team like that."

Pitino will try to make sure that
happens. The UK coach promised
to "kill" his players this week in
practice in hopes of having them
come to play against Tech.

"We can't look at (extra-hard
practices) as a punishment," said
forward Antonie Walker, averaging 18.5 points the past two
games. "We have to look at it as a
way to get better. Coach is doing
what he's supposed to do, but
we're not coming out and executing like we should, especially on
delense."







