Wesleyan College, Oct. 9, 1890

Maj. Hellett resigned
the Secretaryship of
Faculty.
J. M. Newman
was elected.

Cadet Patrick

Faculty met in call session at 12 M. in
President's room. Those present at this
the first meeting of the session Vice-President
Shackelford (in the chair), Prof. White,
Halpleth, Roark, Clay, Burr, Pines, Kastle,
Stark, Patterson, Logan, Blanton, Curvet and
Newman. Major Hellett tendered his
resignation as Secretary of the Faculty.
J. M. Newman was elected Secretary.

Faculty called to consider the case of
Cadet Patrick charged with using paper
knives upon Cadet Norman. Prof. White
moved to dismiss Patrick. Prof. Patterson moved
to suspend until close of present session.
Carried.

The case of Cadet Norman charged
with carrying razor for the purpose
of using it upon the person said Norman
was dismissed.

A system of demerits was submitted
by Col. Clay, and ordered to be submit-
ted in writing to the Executive Committee
with the recommendation of the Faculty.

Each professor was ordered to sign
expenses from his own classes.

There being no further business the
Faculty adjourned.

Wesleyan College, Oct. 10, 1890

Cadet Patrick's
sentence modi-
fied.

Faculty met at 12 M. in call session. All
members present. The case against Cadet Patrick
was reopened. His sentence of suspension until
Jan 16, 1891 was changed to confinement until
December 20, 1890.

Prof. Patterson moved that hereafter no sentence
should be passed upon any cadet by the Faculty.

Moved that the Faculty adjourn one day for the consideration of cases.

until adjournment for at least one day. Prof. Stone moved that the Faculty postpone the consideration of the motion until the next meeting, carried. There being no further business the Faculty adjourned.

O. and M. College, Oct. 23, 1890.

Faculty met in call session at 12 M. in President's room. Prof. Pattison submitted in writing the resolution offered by him at the last meeting. "Except in cases of breach of arrest, whenever the Faculty is convened to act on any offense charged against a student, requiring suspension from the privileges of the college, or public or private dismissal, after the evidence has been taken and the case argued, they shall adjourn for at least one day before taking final action. This rule shall not be suspended if as many as three members of the Faculty object." Resolution adopted.

Resolution of Prof. Pattison adopted.

The case against Cadet Lucas, charged with breach of arrest, was called. He was found guilty and dismissed from the college.

Cadet Lucas dismissed.

Faculty declines to grant Cadet Benton permission to establish a paper.

Cadet Benton, through Prof. Clark, asked the consent of the Faculty to the establishment of a college paper. Refused. Faculty adjourned.
