SCCR 1 Amendment of Code of Student Conduct

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, June 11, 1996.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1:00 p.m. (Lexington time) on Tuesday, June 11, 1996 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

A. Meeting Opened

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Professor Loys Mather.

B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Governor Edward T. Breathitt (Chairperson), Mr. Ted Bates, Mrs. Kay Shropshire Bell, Mr. Shea Chaney, Mr. Robert N. Clay, Mr. Merwin Grayson, Mr. James F. Hardymon, Professor Loys L. Mather, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Mr. Billy Joe Miles, Professor Jim Miller, Dr. Elissa Plattner, Professor Deborah Powell, Mr. C. Frank Shoop, Mrs. Marian Moore Sims, Mrs. Lois C. Weinberg, Mr. Martin Welenken, and Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson. Absent from the meeting were Mr. Paul Chellgren and Mr. Steven Reed. The University administration was represented by President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors Ben W. Carr, James W. Holsinger, and Elisabeth Zinser; Vice Presidents Joseph T. Burch, Fitzgerald Bramwell, Edward A. Carter, and Eugene Williams; John J. Piecoro, Assistant to the President for Administrative Affairs; George DeBin, Assistant to the President for Fiscal Affairs; Juanita Fleming, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; C. M. Newton, Director of Athletics, and Richard E. Plymale, General Counsel.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairperson declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:04 p.m.

C. Approval of Minutes

Governor Breathitt said that the Minutes of the Board meeting on April 30, 1996 had been distributed and asked for any additions or corrections. Dr. Meriwether moved that the Minutes be approved as distributed. Mr. Shoop seconded the motion, and it carried.

D. President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)

President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

- 1. UK has received approval of \$8 million in research funds from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for a nicotine addiction study headed by Richard Clayton, Director of UK's Center for Prevention Research.
- 2. The Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust has awarded \$1 million to the Lucille Parker Markey Cancer Center and \$1 million to the Maxwell H. Gluck Equine Research Center.
- 3. UK has awarded twenty high school seniors and two community college transfer students with Singletary Scholarships.
- 4. UK's daily student newspaper, the Kentucky Kernel, has again received national recognition by placing third in a recent web site competition sponsored by Tribune Media Services.
- 5. A team of Somerset Community College students recently received two international awards at the 21st annual Students in Free Enterprise Exposition.
- 6. A mobile program to train dental hygienists has been awarded to Henderson Community College and is scheduled to begin in June 1997.

President Wethington asked the members to read the other items in the report at their leisure.

He reported that Dr. Carr has appointed a committee to address issues relating to Prestonburg Community College.

President Wethington then presented his report on the Strategic Plan.

1. Maintain faculty salaries and benefits at a level competitive with comparable institutions: President Wethington reported that as of 1994-1995 the main Lexington campus had reached 97.9% of its target. This slipped to 96% in 1995-1996 despite a 4% salary increase because average salaries at the benchmark universities rose even faster. Community college salaries rose from 92.1% of its benchmark to 94.4% due to a 4% salary increase.

- 2. Maintain staff salaries and benefits competitive with comparable institutions or the local market: He reported that the University had successfully kept staff salaries above the target of 90% of the local market.
- 3. Raise the average enhanced ACT composite for incoming University System freshman to 25 (980 on the SAT): The University has enjoyed success in this, moving it up to 24.8-24.9. UK is getting a better academic freshman class each year.
- 4. Increase the amount of Merit Scholarship support to \$4 million: President Wethington reported that UK has exceeded this goal and currently invests \$4.6 million to support Merit Scholarships.
- 5. Increase the percentage of lower division courses and sections taught by full-time faculty in the University System to 50%: The University has met this goal and will continue to improve this statistic. The percentage of student credit hours taught by full-time faculty at the sophomore and freshman levels is about 63%.
- 6. Increase the first- to second-year retention rate of those who entered the University System as full-time, degree-seeking, first-year students to 82%: President Wethington stated that this is a tough problem and that progress remains uneven and slow.
- 7. Beginning with the 1993 first-year class, increase the undergraduate graduation rate for the University of Kentucky of those who entered the University System as full-time, degree seeking, first-year students to 55% within a six-year period: The President commented that this is a tough target, but that the University was making progress.
- 8. Increase graduate student enrollment to 5,500: Graduate enrollment has risen to 5,240 at a rate that may not reach the target. The President, however, stated that he questioned whether this is a feasible goal given recent financial constraints.
- 9. Increase doctoral enrollment to 1,850: This has also risen, but not fast enough to reach 1,850. The President likewise questioned whether this is a realistic or desirable goal given financial limitations.
- 10. Increase annual number of graduate degrees awarded to 1,200, with 230 at the doctoral level: The President reported that the University has achieved this goal as of 1996.

- 11. Increase the number of post-doctoral scholars to 130: The University reached this level in the second year and then dropped.
- 12. Increase enrollment in Community College System by 3-5% per year to 58,500: The President reported that this goal will not be met due to a lack of financial support, increases in tuition rates, and improvements in the economy.
- 13. Increase the number of students transferring to the University System from the Community College System to 750: The University has met this goal, having 781 transfers in 1995.
- 14. Increase transfers from the Community College System to other public universities in Kentucky by 10%: The President reported that the number of transfers has dropped, because of financial reasons and because of the decreasing enrollment in the community colleges.
- 15. Ensure that the graduation rate of Community College System transfers to the University System is at least equal to the graduation rate of first year, full-time students: President Wethington reported that the University has achieved this goal, with transfers graduating at a 56% rate.
- 16. Establish a central advising and transfer office in the University System which will serve all undeclared majors, transfers, and other students in need of assistance: This center has been established and has made over 7,000 contacts with students.
- 17. Improve our national ranking among U.S. research institutions in total research and development support to 60th from 72nd: The President reported that the University has moved from 72 to 67 through last year. He also stated that this is a very ambitious goal.
- 18. Increase external support obtained by faculty and staff to \$120 million per year: President Wethington reported that the University was on target but cautioned that competition at the federal level made continued progress difficult.
- 19. Increase federal research and development support to \$50 million per year: President Wethington stated that the University has achieved this goal.
- 20. Increase state and local research and development support to \$8 million per year: The President reported that the University had exceeded this goal with \$9.4 million in support.

- 21. Increase industry research and development support to \$12 million per year: President Wethington stated that the University had achieved that goal this year.
- 22. Achieve a level of state funding at least equal to the average of comparable institutions: The President stated that the University had been unable to reach this goal. He also declared that the University had no control over this objective and continued to suffer from declining state support.
- 23. Increase private donations to \$35 million per year: The President reported that the University exceeded this goal last year when it raised \$37 million in private donations.
- 24. *Increase endowment to \$130 million:* President Wethington said that the University had exceeded this goal as well, reaching \$141.6 million.
- 25. Meet the enrollment and persistence goals in the Kentucky Plan for Equal Opportunities in Higher Education:

Increase the percentage of resident African-American undergraduate students in the University System to 6.2%: The President reported that the University has not yet reached this objective, but that the percentage of in-state undergraduate Africa-American students in the University System has risen from 3.9% to 5.5%.

Increase the percentage of resident African-Americans awarded baccalaureate degrees to 5.3%: The President reported steady progress in this area as well, as the rate has increased from 2.6% to 3.7%.

Increase the percentage of resident African-American graduate students to the same level as the percentage of resident African-American students who receive baccalaureate degrees: The President stated that significant improvement had been made and the figure now stands at 3.6% as compared to the undergraduate rate of 3.7%.

26. Meet the employment goals of the University Affirmative Action Plan:

Increase the percentage of African-Americans in executive, administrative, and managerial positions to 5% in both the University System and the Community College System: President

Wethington reported that this has risen to 3.6% in the University System and currently exceeds 5% in the Community College System.

Increase the percentage of women in executive, administrative, and managerial positions to 41%: The University System is currently at 39%, while the Community College System stays around 41%.

Increase the percentage of African-American faculty positions to 3% in the University System and maintain the percentage of African-Americans in faculty positions in the Community College System: The President stated that the University exceeded that goal in 1993-1994 and has consistently increased the totals.

Increase the percentage of women in faculty positions in the University System to 28%: President Wethington reported that the University has made substantial progress toward this goal.

- 27. Complete construction of the W.T. Young Library by 1996: The President stated that construction is on schedule to be completed for the Fall of 1997.
- 28. Increase graduate distance learning sites through interactive video to ten: President Wethington said that he believed the University will meet that goal by next year, with a total of thirteen sites.
- 29. Make the retirement contribution for staff equal to that for faculty: With the current budget the contribution for staff will move to 9.75%, which is near the faculty rate of 10%.
- 30. Establish three additional rural health sites, with at least one in Western Kentucky, to train primary care providers, including physicians, physician assistants, and nurse practitioners: The President said that the University has made substantial progress towards this goal.
- 31. Support state and national health care reform through health policy research initiatives, establishing health care delivery programs, and other activities: He reported that the University continues to support health care reform through the Commonwealth Health Care Alliance, the new Doctor of Pharmacy Ph.D. program, and the 13 active and 8 planned telemedicine sites.

- 32. Ensure that all colleges at the University of Kentucky develop programs in support of KERA: The President reported that the University has met its commitment to this goal.
- 33. Increase by at least 10% annually the amount of KERA grants and contracts received by the University: Support has increased over the last three years by an average of 12%, but that increase is starting to drop off.
- 34. Ensure that every educational unit is involved in programs of service to the Commonwealth and includes an enhanced service component in their strategic plan: The President stated that this goal has been met.
- 35. Ensure that the preparation of teachers reflects, where appropriate, the principles underlying KERA: The President stated that he believed that the University has met this goal.
- 36. Complete the infrastructure construction for fifty acres and lease at least five lots on the Coldstream Research Campus: President Wethington commented that the University had completed infrastructure for 35, and have four lots approved by the Board. He believed that this goal will be met by 1997.
- 37. Complete at least three continuous quality improvement projects in both the University System and the Community College System: The President stated that he believed that this indicator has been met.

President Wethington concluded by stating that the University had made significant progress toward meeting the objectives set out in its Strategic Plan, having achieved 15 objectives and having made substantial progress toward another 15 objectives. He then asked if any Board members had any questions. Mrs. Weinberg asked when the indicators will be re-evaluated; the President responded that there is no set time for changing the strategic objectives, but that they can be amended at any time. He also stated that at the end of 1996-1997 would be the time to conduct a comprehensive revision of the indicators.

Chairperson Breathitt thanked President Wethington for his report.

E. <u>Personnel Actions (PR 2)</u>

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or other staff changes which require Board action; and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already

approved by the administration be accepted. Mr. Bates moved approval. His motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

F. University of Kentucky Policy on Deadly Weapons (PR 3A)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve administrative regulation (AR II-1.2-7), which establishes a University Policy on Deadly Weapons. He asked that Vice President for University Relations Joe Burch comment on this policy.

Mr. Burch stated that House Bill 40 permits licensed individuals to carry concealed deadly weapons, but that it continues to allow colleges and universities to control the possession of deadly weapons. He asked if the Board had any questions.

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve PR 3A. Mr. Shoop moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Miles, carried. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Proposed Amendment to the Governing Regulations (PR 3B)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve an amendment to the Governing Regulations that designates the Vice President of University Relations as the person in charge in the president's absence. Mr. Wilcoxcon moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Grayson, carried. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Appointments to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation (PR 3C)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the appointment of Dr. Eugenia Toma and Mr. Henry Jackson to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation for a three-year term beginning on July 1, 1996. Mrs. Weinberg moved approval. Her motion, seconded by Mr. Welenken, carried. (See PR 3C at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Revision of the Bylaws of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation (PR 3D)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve revisions of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation's Bylaws. The revision includes the Secretary as an additional officer who shall not be a member of the Board of Directors. Mr. Grayson moved approval. His motion, seconded by Ms. Weinberg, carried. (See PR 3D at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Change in Division Structure of Hazard Community College (PR 4A)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the addition of three new divisions to the organizational structure of Hazard Community College: the Division of Humanities and Related Technologies, Division of Science, Allied Health and Related Technologies, and the Division of Social and Behavioral Science, Business, Math and Related Technologies. On motion made by Mrs. Weinberg, seconded by Mr. Shoop and passed, PR 4A was approved. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Appointment to Advisory Board of the Lexington Community College (PR 4B)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the appointment of Ms. Laura Babbage to the Lexington Community College Board for a two-year term beginning on July 1, 1996. Dr. Meriwether moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mrs. Weinberg, carried. (See PR 4B at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Appointments to the University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation (PR-5A)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the appointment of William "Bill" S. Farish, Jr. and John A. "Eck" Rose to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation for four-year terms ending December 14, 2000. Mr. Clay moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, carried. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

M. College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan (PR 6A)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan. He asked Assistant to the President for Administrative Affairs Dr. John Piecoro to discuss the plan.

Dr. Piecoro stated that the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan is consistent with plans for the colleges of Allied Health and Nursing faculty practice plans. The plan establishes policies and procedures relating to the management of professionally generated income and to compensation for services rendered by faculty participating in the plan. The plan also sets forth "Underlying Principles" which guide the operation of the plan. Dr. Piecoro asked if the Board had any questions. Mr. Wilcoxson asked why it took six years to develop this plan; Dr. Piecoro answered that some faculty were not

pleased with the program initially and that the College had been working to amend the plan.

President Wethington asked that the Board approve this plan. Mrs. Sims moved approval. Her motion, seconded by Mr. Welenken, carried. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Acceptance of Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for the Ten Months Ended April 30, 1996 (FCR 1)

Mr. Hardymon, Chairperson of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee met and reviewed 15 items on the agenda. He said that FCR 1 is the monthly financial report for the ten months that ended April 30. He noted that the University has expended 81% of the approved budget and has received 91% of expected income. He also commented that the University continues to be in good financial condition. He moved approval of FCR 1. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. <u>Disposal of Surplus Property (FCR 2)</u>

Mr. Hardymon reviewed the items in Attachment I and moved that the Board approve an advance plan for the disposition of livestock, recyclable materials and surplus, damaged, deteriorated, or obsolete equipment as described in the attachment. His motion, seconded by Mr. Bates, passed. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. <u>Designation of Depository Bank (FCR 3)</u>

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve Citizens Bank and Trust, Jackson, Kentucky, to serve as a depository bank for the University of Kentucky and its affiliated corporations. His motion, seconded by Professor Powell, passed. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Report of Leases (FCR 4)

Mr. Hardymon reviewed the lease agreements in FCR 4 and moved that the Board accept the President's report of the lease agreements not exceeding \$30,000 in value. Mr. Welenken seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Approval of Leases (FCR 5)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board authorize the Assistant to the President for Fiscal Affairs to negotiate and execute the lease agreements in

excess of \$30,000 listed in FCR 5. Mrs. Weinberg seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Sale of Property Owned by University of Kentucky Research Foundation in Woodford County, Kentucky (FCR 6)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve FCR 6 which called for the sale of property owned by the University of Kentucky Research Foundation in Woodford County, Kentucky originally donated by the late John H. Clark. The proceeds would be used to enhance programs in equine research at the University. Mr. Clay seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

T. Purchase of Property (FCR 7)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve FCR 7 which called for the purchase of property at 429 Linden Walk, Lexington Kentucky from Fred and Ruby Collins at 439 Boone Trace Road in Danville, Kentucky at an appraised price of \$122,000. Mr. Miles seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Patent Assignment - Research and Graduate Studies (FCR 9)

Mr. Hardymon reported that Robert C. Dickson and Robert L. Lester have invented certain improvements in Method for Obtaining Antifungal and Herbicidal Compounds that Target the First Committed Step in Sphingolipid Long-chain Base Biosynthesis. He moved approval of FCR 9. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Patent Assignment - Research and Graduate Studies (FCR 10)

Mr. Hardymon reported that Vincent S. Gallicchio has invented certain improvements in Compositions Containing Lithium Inorganic Salts and Anti-viral Drugs and Methods of Treating Viral Infections such as Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome. His invention is a drug containing lithium, inorganic salts, and anti-viral drugs designed to treat Aids. He moved approval of FCR 10. Dr. Powell seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 10 at the end of the Minutes.)

W. Mrs. Alton E. Blakely, Sr., Pledge (FCR 11)

Mr. Hardymon reported that FCR 11 and FCR 12 go together. FCR 11 is a pledge of \$375,000 from Mrs. Alton E. Blakely of Somerset, Kentucky for the proposed Classroom Student Center Project of Somerset Community College's Partners in Progress Campaign. Mrs. Blakely and her son have

leadership roles in Somerset Community Colleges' Partner's in Progress Campaign. The pledge will be paid in five annual installments of \$75,000 beginning in December, 1996. Mr. Hardymon moved approval of FCR 11. Professor Mather seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 11 at the end of the Minutes.)

X. First and Farmers Bank Pledge (FCR 12)

Mr. Hardymon stated that Mrs. Blakely and her family secured a pledge of \$375,000 from the First and Farmers Bank of Somerset, Kentucky, of which they are the principal owners, to the proposed Classroom Student Center project. In consideration of the total gift of \$750,000, the Somerset Community College will propose that the Classroom Student Center be named in memory of Mr. Alton E. Blakely, Sr. Mr. Hardymon moved approval of FCR 12. Mr. Shoop seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 12 at the end of the Minutes.)

Y. Philip Morris Companies, Inc. Gift and Pledge (FCR 13)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$50,000 and a pledge of \$100,000 from Philip Morris Companies, Inc., of Louisville, Kentucky, to Jefferson Community College. This gift will support a three-year continuation of the Jefferson Community College's Strengthening the Bridge Mentor Program, which mentors students into jobs in the Louisville area by matching them with professionals and alumni in the Louisville area workforce. Mrs. Weinberg seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 13 at the end of the Minutes.)

Z. The Preston Group Pledge (FCR 14)

Mr. Hardymon reported that the Preston Group, which consists of the business interests of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond B. Preston of Henderson, has pledged an unrestricted gift of \$130,000 to be paid over a six-year period. Mr. Hardymon moved approval of FCR 14. Professor Miller seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 14 at the end of the Minutes.)

AA. Ashland Independent School District Gift of Property (FCR 15)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve the donation of 2.57 acres of property (appraised at \$175,000) from the Ashland Independent School District Board of Education for student parking at Ashland Community College. Professor Miller seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 15 at the end of the Minutes.)

BB. Operating Budget for 1996-1997 (FCR 8)

President Wethington asked the Board to focus its attention on the 1996-1997 Operating Budget for the University. He stated that the budget is a sound and progressive one, it shows a state appropriations increase and capital appropriations from the state, and the tuition increases in the budget are at or near inflation. He also stated that the budget reflects the goals of the Strategic Plan.

State and Tuition Increases

President Wethington reported that state support totals \$9.4 million for the University System which includes the Lexington Campus and Medical Center, and \$6.2 million for the Community College System. This represents a 3.2% increase for the University System, and a 9.5% increase for the Community College System. He explained that the budget comes in three categories: current services, equity, and performance. The University System has no equity funds, while the Community College System has a large equity amount. That is a part of the effort to bring the community colleges' level of state support up to a level more similar to that of the other institutions in the state.

President Wethington then discussed the tuition breakdown. Enrollment adjustments total \$1.1 million in the University System and \$200,000 in the Community College System, a \$200,000 decrease because enrollment in the Community College System declined last year, thereby reducing revenue and because revenue next year will be less than that which was budgeted for this year. There is an increase of roughly \$500,000 that represents the tuition coming from Lees College. The \$1.1 million in the University System is primarily the result of additional students and the arrangement with Metropolitan College, which brings in students from Malaysia who pay out-of-state tuition. The rate increase for tuition is 3.5% for the University System or \$2.9 million and 2% for the Community College System or \$500,000.

Thus, there is \$13.4 million to work with in the University System and \$6.5 million in the Community College System from state appropriations and from tuition increases.

Special State Appropriations

President Wethington stated that the University has a \$500,000 debt service adjustment which does not fund any new facilities but is money received to pay debt service based on the amount needed for that year. The Maintenance and Operations of new facilities for the Lexington Campus totals \$500,000 and represents money for the Kentucky Clinic addition, for a hazardous waste facility, and for new parking facilities. He reported that the University has \$300,000 for engineering enhancement. The University has been receiving that amount the last few years, but the money had been put in the Council on Higher Education's budget. Now, that money will come to the College of Engineering on a recurring basis. The University has \$200,000 to help deliver programs from the Chandler Medical Center to Eastern Kentucky with Morehead State University and St. Claire Medical Center and \$200,000 to assist the Small Business Development Center, part of the Gatton College of Business and Economics, a Center which has satellites across the state and which assists small businesses in their development. He noted that the University also has \$100,000 for the Licking Valley Extended Campus Center at Cynthiana, part of Maysville Community College, which represents special appropriations for next year.

Uses of State Support and Tuition

President Wethington reported that state support and tuition includes \$400,000 in reallocation and \$1.3 million in community college reallocation dollars. Salary and benefits will take \$8.1 and \$2.2 million. Faculty salary adjustment for the community colleges totals \$2.4 million. The operating expenses and library acquisitions are \$1.3 million for the University System and \$300,000 for the Community College System; the tuition adjustments on scholarships are \$400,000 for the University System and \$100,000 for the Community College System, which is equivalent to the number of merit scholarships and represents the additional cost necessary to take care of the tuition increases. The implementation of the Pharm.D., the continuing move to fund the change in the College of Pharmacy from a baccalaureate to a Pharm.D. degree program, totals \$300,000. Metropolitan College, which was previously mentioned, totals \$800,000. The implementation of the Lees program at Lees College totals \$500,000 in tuition for the Community College System. There is also another \$1.5 million to support Lees College coming from the Robinson Forest mining money in the budget. Retirement equalization accounts for the money necessary to take each staff person's contribution to 9.75%. The College of Law enhancement is designed to enhance that college in the amount of \$100,000. He said that other program improvements in the Community College System total \$1.7 million.

Fixed Costs

President Wethington reported that staff benefits increased by \$500,000 for the University System and \$300,000 for the Community College System, which represents for the most part a 5.5% increase in health care cost. This is lower than otherwise largely because the University has been exempted from the Health Care Alliance. Utilities are increased \$300,000 for the University System and \$100,000 for the Community College System and represent an increase of approximately 3%.

Salaries/Benefits and Operating Expenses

President Wethington stated that a 3.2% salary pool had been set for both the University System and the Community College System, which includes the fringe benefits necessary to fund that additional salary increase. This 3.2% salary pool is not allocated across the board but on the basis of merit and will, therefore, vary from employee to employee based on evaluations. Teaching assistants and retirees, meanwhile, will enjoy an increase of \$300,000 or 2.6%, and that total is now approximately \$5.1 million. He reiterated that Retirement Equalization of \$200,000 for the University System and \$100,000 for the Community College System brings staff retirement contributions to 9.75%. Operating Expenses increase at 3%, and Library Acquisitions increase at 10%. While large, the increase in library acquisitions merely keeps pace with inflation and does not necessarily imply a qualitative increase in the library system.

Faculty Salaries

President Wethington reported that in the University System, faculty salaries stood at 96% of its benchmarks, a drop from last year when salaries were at 97.9% of the benchmarks. The University has lost ground despite giving a better than inflationary increase to faculty last year. The Community College System did the opposite. With the same percentage increase, it improved from 92.1% of the benchmarks to 94.4%.

Program Improvements in the Community College System

President Wethington said that the budget includes four new faculty positions at \$300,000, and part-time instruction at \$400,000. Dr. Carr has proposed increasing the amount of money going into information technology and computing by \$200,000. This is just a small part of the total for information technology and computing, as mandatory student fees totaling \$2.5 million will also go to support this function. Another \$400,000 goes to mid-management positions and \$200,000 for classified positions, again establishing some selected staff positions to give the community colleges a better ability to carry out their programs. He noted that \$200,000 goes to current expense catch-up for institutions that are deemed most needy. In

addition, through reallocation, Chancellors and Vice Presidents have redirected funds for high priority funding needs.

Other Income Changes

President Wethington stated that this, unfortunately, is the biggest part of the new money that has to be dealt with rather than state appropriations. There is student fee income, notably the mandatory registration fee which represents \$2.5 million from the community colleges which will have such fees for the first time and a decrease in the non-credit programs including the College of Pharmacy program. This makes the total \$1.6 million rather than \$2.5 million.

He stated that gifts and grants include funds that come to the University for specific purposes. Sales and services are self supporting operations, so additional revenue is required to support increased levels of activity. Most of the increase in gifts and grants and in sales and services comes from \$62.5 million in Kentucky Medical Services Funds (KMSF) which are being budgeted in a different way than in the past. This money supports clinical departmental faculty salaries, clinical and research title faculty series, clinic operations, and other departmental support. He explained that this money is being budgeted in the clinical departments when in the past it was going to the faculty and staff as recharge items in the University budget or being shown in the budget as an agency account rather than as a part of the budget. This change has been made because it will provide a better picture of the university's budget because we believe the federal accounting standards will change to require the University to use this budgeting method, and because by moving this salary money into the University the University will be more competitive when applying for federal grants.

President Wethington noted that the Fund Balances and Investment Income part of the Other Income Changes has fallen by \$1.2 million, largely because of a spend down in fund balances. Restricted, Auxiliary, Affiliates, and Hospital revenue has risen by \$39.8 million. The \$2.5 million from the implementation of the student fee in the community colleges will allow the Community College System to make significant progress in attaining a more competitive level of technology as well as providing enhanced access and support for computer use by students, for instructional technology, and for academic student support services. Except for the Lexington Community College, this is the first time that the community colleges have had a mandatory fee of any kind. He noted that \$6.1 million is budgeted from the E.O. Robinson Trust for some thirty projects in Eastern Kentucky including the Lees College program. This is an excellent start on the uses of the Robinson Forest funds.

Capital Budget - Summary

President Wethington reported that the capital budget has increased from \$97.9 million last year to \$154.7 million because the University has money (\$64.0 million) for new facilities which it has not had since 1990. Programmatic renovations stands at \$20.2 million, scheduled maintenance at \$3.8 million, life safety programs at \$6.9 million, utility projects at \$2.7 million, land improvement/acquisitions at \$3.4 million, other capital projects at \$500,000, and equipment at \$53.2 million. The equipment budget breaks down as follows: computing will go up \$13.8 million, other instructional equipment increases by \$5.0 million, research goes up by \$11.1 million, auxiliary, communications, office, and physical plant rises by \$3.6 million, hospital rises by \$16.2 million, and the general account increases by \$3.5 million.

Capital Appropriations From the State

President Wethington pointed out that capital appropriations from the state are \$19.6 million for the University System, and \$29.1 million for the Community College System, which totals \$48.7 million. In recent years, the University has had almost nothing for capital appropriations from the state. The current budget includes \$500,000 for phase II of an Allied Health/Aging building for planning and design. \$6.6 million has been appropriated for Life Safety Projects, which represent needs that are more likely than not related to fume hoods in labs which OSHA has required the University to replace. The University has \$300,000, for which matching funds must be raised to renovate Falkenstine Hall at Southeast Community College. There is \$11.5 million for the Hopkinsville Regional Technical Training Center, and that facility should be ready to bid this summer or fall. The \$5.5 million Ashland Classroom Building, approved in 1992, has been bid and will be under construction shortly. \$12.5 million has been authorized for the Animal Research Center at Woodford County Farm, and that money will be available in 1996-1997. The Prestonsburg Health Education Facility, a joint facility with Morehead State University, has \$5.5 million for 1996-1997. Madisonville Student/Auditorium Parking has \$800,000 allocated, and the Hazard Classroom and Faculty Office Building has funding for only \$5.5 million because the auditorium portion has not been funded. This project should be redesigned and rebid in 1996-1997 assuming the money is available. He noted that these projects are listed in order of priority as determined by the state's budget document.

Operating Budget by Sources of Support

President Wethington said that the State appropriation is \$345.9 million for both the University System and the Community College System or 30.5% of the budget. Student fees represent 11.5%, or \$130.7 million

dollars. Federal and county appropriations are at \$21.5 million, remaining about the same. Endowment and investment income is going up 0.9% with gifts and grants at \$66.1 million, sales and services at \$45.4 million, and fund balances at \$15.8 million, or 1.4%. The General Fund is thus \$634.8 which represents 56% of the budget.

The restricted accounts are at \$89.5 million or 7.9%, auxiliary services at \$42.6 million or 3.7%, affiliated corporations \$140.7 million or 12.4%, and the hospital at \$226.4 million or 20% for a total budget of \$1,134 billion.

He noted that State support has dropped every year from 1991-1992 through 1996-1997. The new budget is the first that has a state appropriation that meets or exceeds the 1991-1992 appropriation. In addition, these are actual figures and do not reflect the impact of inflation. President Wethington pointed out that funding for new projects and initiatives has come not from the State but from private funds, athletics funds, and federal grants that the faculty and staff have generated. He noted that student fees went up as state support dropped, but in the last two years the percentage of costs covered by student fees has begun to drop.

Operating Budget by Category

President Wethington reported that personal services amounts to \$647.6 million or 57.1%, an increase largely due to KMSF funds. Operating expenses dropped slightly as a percentage, falling to 34.7%, mandatory transfers, which includes debt service, dropped to 3.7%, and capital outlay dropped to 4.5%.

1994-1995 State and Local Appropriation per FTE University System

President Wethington stated that per full-time equivalent student, the University System of the University of Kentucky ranks third worst among fifteen southeastern universities, receiving \$4,517 per student versus the average of \$6,054. Kentucky also fell from fourth worst to third worst.

1994-1995 State and Local Appropriation per FTE Community College System

He reported that in the Community College System the comparison is even worse. The Kentucky Community College System receives \$2,284 per student versus an average of \$3,545 and remains the poorest funded system in the southeast.

Community College Faculty Salaries

President Wethington said that in addition to the 3.2% increase that went to all faculty and staff, money was applied to bring faculty salaries up to

the median of their benchmark institutions. Thus, the \$2.4 million brought these salaries up 5.82%, which, when added to the 3.2% increase, brings these salaries up a total of 9.02%

President Wethington concluded by saying that while state support is not what we requested, it is significant. Governor Paul Patton's commitment to higher education is a positive in our climate today. The Community College System will be more equitably funded due to stable enrollment and increased funding. The tuition increases are modest, several capital projects are funded, and salary remains competitive overall. He praised the vice presidents and chancellors for their work reallocating money to fund priority needs.

The chairperson asked if there were any questions. Mr. Wilcoxson asked what exactly was being compared in the Southeastern Regional Education Board studies. The President responded that the comparison was made between similar institutions. For example, the University of Kentucky was compared with the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

Mrs. Weinberg asked if the percentage of our tuition versus the total cost about the same as other SREB states. President Wethington replied that it is usually near the middle or slightly lower.

Mr. Grayson thanked President Wethington for his fine presentation. The Chairperson agreed, stating that everyone should have a good understanding of the budget. He also stated that the members of the Board need to speak with their state representatives and senators to influence them to provide additional state funding. He said that the Board cannot just depend on the President to generate funds; the Board consists of influential people who need to apply that influence to benefit the University. Mr. Wilcoxson commended the President and other staff at the University for maintaining the quality of the University despite the recent budget cuts.

The President recommended that the Board approve the 1996-1997 Operating Budget. Mr. Wilcoxson moved that the budget as recommended be adopted and that the Chairperson of the Board be authorized to execute the contracts with the administrative officers providing for the terms and conditions of their employment. Professor Mather asked how long will the formula that allowed the Community College System to catch up stay in place. The President replied that the formula is scheduled to be formally reviewed in 1996-1997 and will likely remain in place through 1997-1998. Mr. Wilcoxson's motion was seconded by Mr. Shoop and carried. (See FCR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

President Wethington commended Ed Carter, Joan McCauley and their staff for their fine work on the budget.

CC. Amendment of Code of Student Conduct (SCCR 1)

Mr. Robert Clay, Chairperson of the Student Code Committee, reported that the Student Code Committee had met twice since the last Board meeting. He reviewed SCCR 1 and recommended that the Board revise the definition of hazing in the Code of Student Conduct because the current definition has proven to be confusing and incomplete. He said that the new language is taken from the fraternities' executive association, and the proposed changes have been approved by the presidents of the Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Council. Mr. Clay moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Miles, carried. (See SCCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

DD. Marian Moore Sims and Shea Chaney Recognized

The Chairperson asked that the Board recognize the contributions of Marian Moore Sims, alumni trustee, and of the student trustee, Shea Chaney, who are leaving the Board and wished them well.

Mrs. Sims asked to read the following statement:

Dr. Wethington, our beloved president, chancellors, faculty and staff and my hardworking friends of this Board:

Words will never be adequate to allow any of you to understand my thoughts or feelings concerning my service on the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees. This opportunity, without question, has been one of the most wonderful things that has ever happended to me in my life. It is because of the education that I have received from this university that the quality of my life was advanced forever. It is because of my education here, that my life took direction of purpose and service to my community and God.

As I have grown older, I have realized exactly what was gained by attending the University of Kentucky. I grew intellectually, of course, but it was here, that I gained a career and an orientation of service to mankind. It was here that I learned that I must take a place in society as a problem solver, not a problem. And it was here, I acquired the awesome responsibility, through my career choice, to entreat others to seek a quality education for themselves. It was also here that I learned that we must give something back. Through alumni work with the University of Kentucky National Alumni Association, I know how to give something back to the institution that builds people and is still building me.

The very phrase "University of Kentucky" elicits in me a sense of joy and well-being. That is because of the continuing work done by the students, staff, administration, faculty and this Board. UK is successful in its mission. It is triumphant in an era of extreme apathy over the careless, the non-committal and the sometimes cruel posture of this world. The every day work of individuals on this campus is majestic, like an orchestra pulled together for harmony to add to the world's riches, not detract.

The service to 3.5 million people in Kentucky that is accomplished is beautiful and worthy. The University of Kentucky reaches every corner of this state and strives to work cooperatively with other institutions and resources to better all education. Today, I'm proud to be a teacher of the very young; I truly see a continuum. When I sat just last month to witness the graduation of thousands, many of whom were my own 6th graders, I found myself overwhelmed with joy, watching them leave UK better equipped to help themselves, their families and, yes, our state. With new promised emphasis and support for higher education from this governor and legislature, this continuum is strengthened. It will allow this university to do more, to serve more, to discover more, to invent more and to help more students realize their dreams. What inescapable fulfillment for all of us on the Board!

In the nearly five years that I have served on this Board, I have never once been embarrassed or let down by the progress and work by this marvelous president, faculty, administrators, staff, or students. My favorite thing about serving on this Board has not been the tickets, although that has been great fun. It truly has been the parking permit which allows me access to this place and the wonderful people involved here. As Alumni Trustee, I have been honored to help families and students as an extension of the fabulous other services provided to alumni by the National Alumni Association.

After my experiences here with you, learning about UK, I know that the respect and awe I always have had for the University and its workings, has been replaced by absolute, heart-bursting pride for all UK means to the welfare of Kentucky, its citizens, its corporate structure, its health care, its economy and any future successes we, in Kentucky, ever hope to have.

Thank you for allowing me to love UK with you. Thank you for giving me the freedom to express my love in the only ways I know how. Please know I'm going to continue to work and pray for UK and everything UK does in its gallant efforts to serve Kentucky.

My tenure here has been a blessing of immeasurable joy, from God. Peace be with you and I love you.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. \$8 Million Nicotine Addiction Study Approved

An eight-year nicotine addiction study headed by Richard Clayton, director of UK's Center for Prevention Research, will receive \$8 million in research funds from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Clayton will organize a team of distinguished scientists from throughout the United States to serve as a research network of scholars. The grant is among the largest ever approved for research through UK.

2. Markey Trust Donates \$2 Million to Cancer Center and Gluck Center

The Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust has awarded a \$2 million grant to the Lucille Parker Markey Cancer Center and the Maxwell H. Gluck Equine Research Center. The \$1 million grant to the UK Markey Cancer Center will be used to establish the Lucille P. Markey Chair in Oncology Research. The \$1 million grant to the Gluck Equine Research Center will be used to enhance two existing endowments previously awarded by the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust to the center.

3. UK Research Clarifies How Cancer Develops

UK research, published in the April 26 issue of Science, someday may lead to a more complete understanding of how cancer develops in humans. A team led by Isabel Mellon, pathology and laboratory medicine, found that a breakdown in one of the body's genetic repair systems, coupled with exposure to environmental agents, may trigger various kinds of cancer. It's the first time that the system, called transcription-coupled repaired, has been linked to cancer.

4. UK Honors 22 with Singletary Scholarships

Twenty high school seniors and two community college transfer students have received UK's Otis A. Singletary Scholarships. The Singletary Scholarship, valued at about \$27,200, is the most prestigious four-year scholarship offered at UK. The award covers tuition, fees, room, board and a \$500 stipend for each of the incoming freshman students' four years at the University and the community college transfer students' remaining two years. All but one of this year's recipients are from Kentucky.

5. On-Line Kentucky Kernel Receives National Recognition Again

The Internet version of the Kentucky Kernel, UK's daily student newspaper, has received national recognition for the second consecutive semester. The Kernel's Internet edition placed third in a recent Best College Press web site competition sponsored by Tribune Media Services in Chicago. The contest drew 50 entries from across the nation.

6. Pharmacology Research Featured in Science Journal

Research by Philip Landfield and Olivier Thibault, pharmacology, which appeared in the May 17 issue of the journal Science, may be instrumental in explaining why older people are more vulnerable to Alzheimer's disease. Thibault developed a modified patch-clamp technique to attach tiny electrodes to individual cells from aged rats. Using this mechanism, he was able to record individual calcium channels within the cells. The two researchers think that nerve cells develop more calcium channels as they age, allowing more calcium to enter the cell. The resulting higher levels of calcium could explain why learning ability fades with aging.

7. Three Community Colleges Join to Offer Distance Learning Courses

Henderson, Owensboro, and Elizabethtown Community Colleges are joining to offer courses through an interactive television classroom provided by UK. Interactive television provides voice-activated two-way audio and video, which enables communication between the instructor and the students. Because of the technology, students will be able to enroll in both undergraduate and graduate courses not currently offered by the colleges.

8. <u>UK Children's Hospital Benefits From Annual TV Fund-raiser</u>

The 1996 Children's Miracle Network television special, broadcast by WKYT-TV and WYMT-TV June 1 and 2, raised a record-breaking \$555,135 for the UK Children's Hospital. This is the ninth year of participation by UK, the only hospital in Kentucky involved in the annual event. Unique among national fund-raisers, all money raised in Kentucky stays in the state. To date, more than \$3.6 million has been raised. Bernadette and Vince Mattox were honorary chairs.

9. Somerset CC Students Win International Free Enterprise Award

Somerset Community College students received two international awards at the 21st annual Students in Free Enterprise Exposition held May 19-21 in Kansas City, Missouri. The SCC team was second-place runners-up internationally for overall competition and won the "Rookie of the Year Award" for being the only rookie team to make it to the final competition. This was the first year the Somerset students competed in the competition, and the SCC team was the only one from a Kentucky college or university. SIFE is dedicated to promoting free market principles.

10. Breast Cancer Program Funded for Second Year

The Sister to Sister program received a \$37,500 grant from the Avon Breast Health Access Fund to extend for another year its breast cancer awareness work among low-income women in Lexington. Sister to Sister is sponsored by the Kentucky Cancer Program and the Kentucky African Americans Against Cancer. Since it began last October with an initial \$20,000 grant from Avon and additional funds from the Kentucky Department of Health Services, Sister to Sister has educated almost 1,000 women about the importance of early detection of breast cancer and has referred 25 women for mammograms.

11. Health Associates of Kentucky Inc. Acquires Urgent Treatment Centers

Health Associates of Kentucky Inc. recently acquired the Urgent Treatment Centers in Lexington. In 1995, UTC provided care for more than 60,000 patients for both urgent and primary care. UTC's management and clinical services will continue to be provided by the organization's staff. The corporation links the Chandler Medical Center to the private sector in an effort to improve clinical care, create delivery system efficiencies, and develop primary care capacity.

12. Henderson Community College to Train Hygienists

A mobile program to train dental hygienists has been awarded to Henderson Community College and is scheduled to begin in June 1997. The program is designed to train students in areas with shortages of dental hygienists. While centered at HCC, the program will graduate two classes of approximately 14 students each.

13. Art Museum Receives Gift From American Academy of Arts and Letters

The UK Art Museum has received a gift of an acrylic on paper by artist Robert Colescott from the American Academy of Arts and Letters in New York City. The piece is titled "Sepic River Stay Away From My Door II." The Academy has funds for providing art gifts to university art museums. The Colescott painting is the second gift to UK from the Academy.

14. Workshop on Teaching Economics Attracts 40 Professors

Forty economics professors from Kentucky and surrounding states attended a recent Gatton College of Business and Economics Teaching Economics Workshop. The workshops focus on new techniques in teaching that get students actively involved in the learning process. UK community college faculty were among the workshop participants.

15. Area Senior Citizens Participate in Challenges of Aging Program

The Thirteenth Annual Challenges of Aging Program was held on May 9 at the UK Student Center. More than 300 Fayette County senior citizens participated. David Dick, journalist and former CBS foreign correspondent, was the keynote speaker. Thirteen workshops on topics such as finances, humor, caregiving and travel were offered to participants.

16. Student Awards and Honors

<u>John Benamati</u>, a doctoral student in the Gatton College of Business and Economics, is one of 10 students in the nation chosen to receive a doctoral dissertation support fellowship from the Richard D. Irwin Foundation.

<u>Claudia L. Carroll</u> and <u>Daniel Ray Hughes</u> were named the 1996 Outstanding Lexington Community College Graduates.

<u>Braxton Crenshaw</u>, who entered UK's College of Law at age 43, was awarded the college's 1996 Faculty Cup, chosen by the college's faculty.

Hopkinsville Community College's speech team took top honors over all other community college teams in the State Community College Speech Tournament held April 27 at Jefferson Community College. Four HCC students had first place finishes in individual competitions: <u>Dannette Daniel</u>, informative speaking; <u>Jason Miller</u>, prose reading; <u>Josh Lassiter</u>, in both dramatic interpretation and poetry reading; and Lassiter teamed with <u>Lori Wilkey</u>, duo interpretation.

<u>Linda Daniel</u>, a non-traditional student from Danville, has received the Henry Adams Medal presented by the American Institute of Architects to the top-ranked graduating student in the College of Architecture.

<u>Gary J. Danzer, Melissa L. Heater, Steven B. Sampson, Clyde E. Blair</u> and <u>Charles Scott Schmitt</u> were inducted into Omicron Kappa Upsilon, the national dental honorary.

Scottie Day, Hazard Community College, received the Distinguished Scholar Award for the Associate of Arts and the President's Award, the highest award presented to a graduating student.

UK's student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers won first place for the second consecutive year in the Ohio Valley Regional Steel Bridge-Building Competition. Students from eight universities in Kentucky, Ohio and Pennsylvania competed. The UK team consisted of <u>Pratyoosh Gupta</u>, <u>Jon Marcum</u>, <u>Pete Szak</u>, <u>Bob Peterson</u>, <u>Chris Mischel</u> and <u>Kevin Quan</u>.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY POLICY ON DEADLY WEAPONS

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the attached Administrative Regulation (AR II-1.2-7) which establishes a University Policy on Deadly Weapons.

<u>Background</u>: The University has had policies which prohibit the possession of deadly weapons on University property for many years. These policies are written in the Student Code and the Staff Personnel Policy and Procedures Manual.

The General Assembly enacted HB40 in the 1996 Regular Session, which permits persons properly licensed to carry concealed deadly weapons. HB40 also provides that "Nothing contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be construed to limit, restrict, or prohibit in any manner the right of a college, university, or any post-secondary education facility, including technical schools and community colleges, to control the possession of deadly weapons on any property owned or controlled by them"

The attached Administrative Regulation reaffirms existing policies and clarifies the prohibition of deadly weapons on University property, even for those who are licensed under HB40.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY POLICY ON DEADLY WEAPONS

I. PURPOSE

The Kentucky General Assembly has explicitly recognized the authority of the University to regulate the possession of deadly weapons on any property owned or controlled by the University, including the right to prohibit possession of such weapons by any person or entity using or enjoying University property or premises. This policy applies to all property and premises owned or controlled by the University, including off-campus facilities used for athletic or other events controlled, sponsored, or managed by the University.

II. PROHIBITION

- A. Except as provided in Subsection III of this policy, deadly weapons are not permitted on any property owned or controlled by the University, including but not limited to the following -- classrooms, laboratories, residence halls, hospitals and clinics, office buildings, performance halls, museums, athletics and recreation facilities, farms and forests, parking lots and structures, and all outdoor areas of the campus of any unit of the University. This prohibition is applicable to persons who possess and persons who do not possess lawfully issued licenses (or permits) to carry deadly weapons.
- B. Students who possess deadly weapons in violation of this prohibition are guilty of violations of the Code of Student Conduct and are subject to disciplinary action under that Code, including expulsion from the University. Employees (faculty or staff) who possess deadly weapons in violation of this prohibition are guilty of misconduct and subject to disciplinary action under Governing and Administrative Regulations, including termination of employment. Others who possess deadly weapons in violation of this prohibition will be directed to remove their weapons or themselves from the University's property or premises, with all appropriate legal actions (including arrest) being taken upon failure to comply.
- C. For purposes of this policy, "deadly weapon" means (1) any weapons from which a shot, readily capable of producing death or other serious physical injury, may be discharged, (2) any knife other than an ordinary pocket knife or hunting knife, (3) billy, nightstick, or club, (4) blackjack or slapjack, (5) nunchaku karate sticks, (6) shuriken or

death star, or (7) artificial knuckles made from metal, plastic, or other similar hard material.

III. EXCEPTIONS

The following actions or activities do not violate this policy:

- A. Possession of deadly weapons by peace officers acting in the course of official duties.
- B. Possession of deadly weapons as a part of legitimate academic or work-related activities (e.g., historical preservation, law enforcement training, ROTC activities, 4-H marksmanship training, etc.).
- C. Possession of deadly weapons by persons holding valid permits issued by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources for use of the Robinson Forest Wildlife Management Area.
- D. Possession of deadly weapons by a person authorized to have such possession by the President or his/her designee, but only if such person fully complies with any and all restrictions imposed upon such possession by the President or his/her designee.

The funds collected pursuant to the provisions of the plan will be transmitted and deposited in THE FUND in the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center for inclusion in the College of Pharmacy Practice Plan Account. Modifications or amendments to the plan require the approval of the Board of Trustees.

COLLEGE OF PHARMACY FACULTY PRACTICE PLAN

ARTICLE I. NAME OF THE PLAN

The plan shall be known as the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan.

ARTICLE II. POLICY AND PURPOSE

- A. Income generating activities that relate to the professional expertise, scientific acumen, and/or credentials of the faculty and professional staff of the College of Pharmacy are facilitated by their employment at the University of Kentucky. The Plan is established to provide a system for collection and disbursal of funds generated by such activities and to insure accountability of these activities by the University.
- B. The plan is designed to further the mission of the College of Pharmacy by more effectively integrating its teaching, research, practice, and service programs. Its specific objectives are to: (1) enhance College programs; (2) integrate practice, research, and teaching roles; (3) foster academic excellence and balance in teaching, research, University and public service, and patient care; (4) provide a mechanism for incentives, recognition, and directions; (5) provide resources for initiating new programmatic directions; and (6) provide a clear and workable mechanism to promote technology transfer and economic development.

ARTICLE III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "PROFESSIONALLY GENERATED INCOME," as herein used, means the following income attributable to members of the Plan:
- 1. All compensation, income and payments (direct or in kind, and whether characterized as fees, retainers, or otherwise) for professional services rendered or to be rendered, including, but no limited to, those relating to (a) the diagnosis, treatment, and evaluation of patients, (b) the provision of therapeutic products for patients or others, and (c) consultation;
- 2. All direct and in-kind payments (excluding actual out-of pocket costs) for providing (a) advice, (b) consultation, (c) service on boards, committees, commissions, or the like, and (d) oversight, supervision, or other participation with any entity or person involved with health or medical care;

- 3. All witness fees and payments relating to depositions, testimony, or other evaluations in the capacity of a witness;
- 4. Professional fees and compensation for educational consulting in medical and pharmacy focused programs in conjunction with the pharmaceutical industry and/or other external agencies;
- 5. All other income which relates to or would not exist but for the professional education, experience, or training of members of the Plan.
- B. "EXCLUSIONS TO PROFESSIONALLY GENERATED INCOME," as herein used, means income from the following sources:
 - 1. Royalties, as allowed under the University's copyright and patent policies;
 - 2. Prizes for personal past achievements and not for services rendered;
- 3. Special administrative stipends paid by the University for the performance of administrative assignments beyond those normal to academic appointments;
- 4. Income for a profession or activity unrelated to the professional education, experience, or training that qualifies members of the Plan for a University appointment;
- 5. Payments for service to NIH or other governmental peer review research project site visits or review activities;
- 6. Any reimbursement and fees associated with regular continuing education programs funded by the College of Pharmacy.
- C. THE FUND, as herein used, means THE FUND for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center, a non-profit corporation organized in 1959 under the laws of Kentucky to promote, advance, and support the educational, research, and other purposes of the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center.
- D. "COLLEGE OF PHARMACY FACULTY PRACTICE PLAN ACCOUNT," as herein used, means that separate depository account to be established as provided in Article IV of this Plan.
- E. "FACULTY PRACTICE PLAN COMMITTEE," as herein used, means the Committee that is selected in accordance with the provisions of Article VI of this Plan.

F. NOTE: Income generated from the above-mentioned non-plan activities remain subject to all University policies and regulations, including but not limited to University internal and external overload policies.

ARTICLE IV. GENERAL TERMS OF THE PLAN

- A. Membership in the plan shall be limited to individuals who hold full-time (9, 10, 11, or 12 months) or less than full-but greater-than-half-time faculty appointments in the College of Pharmacy at the rank of <u>Instructor</u> or higher in the following academic series -- regular title, special title, research title, clinical title series, or other University-approved title series appointments. Membership is mandatory for all new faculty and is a condition of their employment. Faculty should provide written notification to the Dean of their decision not to participate in the Plan. However, individuals holding joint appointments in two or more Colleges of the Medical Center shall be members of the practice plan in the College where they hold primary appointments. Membership shall not extend beyond the termination of faculty appointment nor beyond the reduction of an appointment to one that is half-time or less.
- B. Unless exemption is granted under Article V of the Plan, members of the Plan are obligated to conduct all activities that produce "professionally generated income" under the Plan, except for activities identified in Article III as "Exclusions To Professionally Generated Income." Members are also obligated to facilitate the collection of income from such activities by THE FUND, and to transmit any payments directly received for such activities to the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center for inclusion in the "College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan Account." Members shall submit to the Dean of the College, upon request, a written acceptance of the terms of the Plan and an agreement to adhere to the terms thereof.
- C. "Professionally Generated Income" produced by members of the Plan shall be collected under billing procedures negotiated by THE FUND administrator and shall be promptly transmitted to and received by THE FUND. Such income shall be segregated upon receipt by depositing the same in an account designated for the College of Pharmacy. Such separate account shall be designated and known as the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan Account of THE FUND. Unexpended balances from year to year will remain in the account designated for the College of Pharmacy.
- D. As a standing policy, THE FUND will use and expend all monies deposited in the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan Account to the extent available for the following purposes:
- 1. Such purposes which are proposed by the Dean to be included in the annual budget as outlined in Article VII of the Plan;

- 2. Compensation to members of the faculty of the College of Pharmacy in such amounts as may be necessary to provide the difference between other University compensation and the total compensation as established by the Board of Trustees, in the operation budget of the U.K. Chandler Medical Center. The operating budget will show the amounts to be paid from the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Account, which amounts are dependent upon the availability of funds.
- 3. Such other purposes in the College of Pharmacy as from time to time may be recommended to the Board of Directors of THE FUND by the "Faculty Practice Plan Committee," provided that such funds may not at any time be used for payment to members of the faculty of the College of Pharmacy of income in excess of the total compensation level established for the individual members thereof by the Board of Trustees in the operation budget of the U.K. Chandler Medical Center.

ARTICLE V. EXEMPTIONS FROM PLAN

- A. A member may request exemption from the operation of the Plan for specific activities. Such request must be made in writing to the member's Division Director and must state specific grounds for the granting of such an exemption. The Division Director will make a recommendation on the request and forward it to the Dean of the College for action.
- B. The Dean of the College has authority to grant exemptions from the operation of the Plan. For any exemption granted, the Dean must document the precise nature of the exemption and the grounds for granting it.
- C. A decision denying a request for exemption may be appealed to the Chancellor of the Medical Center. Such appeal must be made in writing and submitted to the Chancellor within one (1) month of the Dean's decision. The decision of the Chancellor will be final.

ARTICLE VI. THE FACULTY PRACTICE PLAN COMMITTEE

- A. The "Faculty Practice Plan Committee" shall consist of five (5) members of the plan and the Dean of the College of Pharmacy, who will be an 'ex-officio' member of the committee (without voting privileges). Each of the three divisions of the College will elect from its members (in the plan) one person to serve on the committee; two members from the faculty of the College of Pharmacy (who are in the plan) will be elected to serve on the Committee by the faculty practice plan members.
- B. Elections for initial membership on the Committee shall be held promptly after adoption of the Plan by the University Board of Trustees, with the initial terms of service ending on June 30, 1997. During academic year 1996-97, by use of ballots prepared by the Committee, elections will be held for successor members under the following conditions: one member from the

Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics (PET) Division shall be elected for a three (3) year term, one member of the Pharmacy Practice and Science (PPS) Division shall be elected for a two (2) year term, one member of the Medicinal Chemistry and Pharmaceutics (MCP) Division shall be elected for a one (1) year term, and two members of the faculty at large shall be elected for two (2) year terms. All succeeding elections for membership on the Committee shall be for three (3) year terms, except that individuals who fail to complete their terms shall be replaced by election for only the remainder of their terms.

C. The Committee shall meet periodically to review the operation of the Plan, including matters related to the applicability of the Plan to sources of income, standard schedules of charges for health and other professional services, promotion of services of members of the Plan, and any other aspect of the operation of the plan. The Committee shall make such recommendations as it may deem appropriate to the Dean of the College with respect to the modification of the policies and procedures provided by the Plan or utilized in its operation. The Committee shall set the level of reimbursement/fees for professional services under the Plan. The Committee can recommend termination of the practice plan.

ARTICLE VII. FUND ADMINISTRATOR AND BUDGET

- A. The Dean of the College, in consultation with the faculty, shall appoint a FUND administrator. THE FUND administrator will be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Plan and its funds and for the preparation of quarterly reports to the Dean and the Faculty Practice Plan Committee on the financial status of the Plan (including projections of Plan income generation and disbursements for the year). THE FUND administrator will also be responsible for preparing the annual budget of the Faculty Practice Plan for the Dean.
- B. The annual budget for the Plan will include the following:
 - 1. Funding for an account (or accounts) to enhance College programs;
- 2. Funding for estimated administrative expenses to manage the Faculty Practice Plan:
 - 3. Funding for expenses associated with program implementation;
- 4. Funding for operating expenses to support faculty efforts to secure and manage contracts;
- 5. Funding for a grant to the University to provide for the payment of: (a) salary funding of all faculty lines to the extent supported by income generated by the Faculty Practice

Plan: and (b) salary support for staff involved in assisting faculty in generation of professional income;

- 6. Funding for a contingency FUND reserve, which will be established to meet potential shortfalls.
- C. The proposed annual budget for the Plan shall be submitted by the Dean to division directors and to the Faculty Practice Plan Committee for review and comment.

ARTICLE VIII. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- A. The Dean of the College of Pharmacy or the Faculty Practice Plan FUND administrator will provide a quarterly summary report to the faculty and the Chancellor of the Medical Center detailing the types of activities included in the Plan, exemptions granted and denied, and the amounts of funds received and disbursed.
- B. The effective date of the Faculty Practice Plan is July 1, 1996. On or before the effective date of the plan, each faculty member participating in the Plan shall sign a "Faculty Practice Plan Agreement" statement indicating his/her understanding and agreement with the terms and conditions of the Plan.
- C. Amendments to the Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan must be made in accordance with the University's Governing and Administrative Regulations.
- D. All conditions of participation in the Plan shall be approved by the Dean upon recommendation of the Faculty Practice Plan Committee and the Division Directors.

PROVISIONS FOR FACULTY SALARY SUPPLEMENTAL COMPENSATION UNDER THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY FACULTY PRACTICE PLAN

ARTICLE I. OBJECTIVES

The specific objectives of salary supplementation under the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan are the following:

- 1. To use professional practice by faculty members as a vehicle for education and training of pharmacy students and graduate students.
- 2. To enhance practice opportunities to strengthen the primary emphasis on the teaching and research programs of the College of Pharmacy.
- 3. To increase faculty incentive to participate in income producing activities that are beneficial to the missions of the College of Pharmacy, the U.K. Chandler Medical Center, the University of Kentucky, and the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- 4. To increase faculty compensation over and beyond that available through state support to the College of Pharmacy in an effort to remain competitive with other nationally ranked pharmacy programs and to continue to retain quality faculty who may otherwise be attracted to the private industry or other institutions.

ARTICLE II. BASIS

Salary supplementation under the Plan is based on a direct relationship to the participant's contribution to the Plan. Participants will receive not less than 70% of the amount they contribute to the Plan. The remaining 30% of the participant's contribution will be provided to the College to operate the Plan and to enhance the Division and College Programs.

ARTICLE III. APPLICABLE PROVISIONS

A. Supplemental compensation (salary, fringe benefits, etc.) will be estimated for the ensuing fiscal year during the annual operating budget process; the amount budgeted will be included as a separate nonrecurring, supplemental budget item. This supplemental budget will be submitted to the Faculty Practice Plan FUND Board and Board of Trustees for approval as part of the annual operating budget. The appropriation of funds for expenditures will be equal in amount to additional income to the University provided by a grant by the Board of Directors of THE FUND to the University specifically for the purpose of financing the supplementary operating

budget. Such a grant will be in addition to that made by THE FUND in support of salaries provided in the basic operating budget of the College of Pharmacy.

- B. The amount of the grant to the University by THE FUND for the purpose of supplemental compensation or increases to individual discretionary accounts will be calculated quarterly and will be the amount by which payments received in the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan Account since the prior quarterly date are in excess of the sum of (1) prorata requirements for coverage of THE FUND grant in support of salaries provided in the basic operating budget; and (2) requirements for coverage of other expenditures which have been budgeted or are reserved in the College of Pharmacy Faculty Practice Plan Account pursuant to recommendations by the Faculty Practice Plan Committee of the College. Disbursements for the first quarter of a fiscal year will be based on the prorata revenues collected from July 1 September 30th. Disbursements for the second quarter of a fiscal year will be based on prorata revenues collected from October 1 December 31st. Disbursements for the third quarter of a fiscal year will be based on prorata revenues collected from January 1 March 31st. Disbursements for the fourth quarter of a fiscal year will be based on prorata revenues collected from April 1 June 30th.
- C. If the actual amounts generated and required for the supplementary expenses are greater than the approved annual supplementary operating budget, a revised budget should be prepared and submitted in accordance with University budgetary procedures before the established budgetary authority is reached.
- D. In preparation of the supplementary operating budget, the Dean of the College of Pharmacy will allocate not less than 70 percent of the total amount of THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation among College faculty who participate in the Plan. In order to receive supplemental compensation, faculty participating in the Plan must receive approval from their Division Director. This approval is contingent upon satisfactory performance of the individual in their regular DOE responsibilities as a College faculty member.
- E. The budget for the remaining 30% of the amount of the grant for the supplemental operating budget will be prepared by the Dean of the College of Pharmacy with funds available being devoted to (1) covering the operating costs of the Plan; (2) enhancement of College programs; and (3) enhancement of Division programs.
- F. Data on the factors to be utilized in determining division allocations will be submitted by the Dean of the College of Pharmacy for review by the Faculty Practice Plan Committee prior to preparation of the supplementary operating budget. Upon recommendation of the Committee, adjustments in the factors used may be made by the Dean if deemed necessary to avoid inequities

due to limitations of available data. Computations of the amount of allocations for individual divisions will be provided to the directors of the divisions.

G. Following adoption of the provisions herein, recommendations may be made from time to time by the Faculty Practice Plan Committee through the Dean to the Chancellor for modifications deemed to be appropriate and desirable.

<u>Background</u>: The consolidated financial report includes the financial activities of the University of Kentucky and its affiliated corporations, consisting of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, University of Kentucky Athletic Association, University of Kentucky Mining Engineering Foundation, University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation, University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation, University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, University of Kentucky Center on Aging Foundation, and Health Care Collection Service.

CURRENT READING OF STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Part I, Articles II and III, Pages 2 and 21,

Sections 1.21K and 3.31, read as follows:

Hazing by subjecting University students to unnecessary and excessive abuse, humiliation, or physical danger, or by committing any actions or causing any situation which recklessly or intentionally endangers mental or physical health or involves the forced consumption of liquor or drugs for the purpose of initiation into or affiliation with any organization;

Proposed revision to the STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT, Part I, Articles I and III, Sections

1.21K and 3.31, pages 2 and 21, respectively: (The following material will replace the current reading of the two sections.)

Hazing by any action taken or situation created, intentionally or recklessly, whether on or off University premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, or ridicule. Such abusive activities and situations may include but are not limited to the following: illegal or harmful use and/or forced consumption of food, alcohol, or drugs; paddling in any form; creation of fatigue; personal servitude; physical and/or psychological shocks; wearing apparel which is conspicuous and not normally in good taste; engaging in public stunts and buffoonery; degrading or humiliating games and activities; sleep or food deprivation; any meetings which unreasonably interfere with scholastic activities; and/or any other activities which are not consistent with the regulations and policies of the University of Kentucky.
