ALUMNI PERSONALTIES

Back on September 23, 1911, Carroll County Circuit Court took an unusual, five-minute recess.

Word had reached the clerk of the court that a grandson had been born, H. H. Morris, and the Judge, taking judicial note of the event, recessed court so that the birth could be duly recorded by Henry Harrison Morris, clerk of the court.

Today that grandson and native of Carroll County is postmaster of the United States House of Representatives and, although only 46 years of age, is celebrating his 25th year of service on Washington's Capitol Hill.

In the national capital he is known as Hap Morris and he's got about as many friends as any two men under the great dome.

A few months ago, the entire Kentucky congressional delegation plus secretaries from about 20 offices walked in on Postmaster Morris and presented him with a silver plaque. On it was engraved, "To Hap Morris, a Great American and True Friend, January 4, 1932 to January 4, 1957."

Hap is the son of the late Congressman Joseph Watkins Morris, a native of Henry County, and Mrs. Morris. He is a graduate of Carrollton High School, a product of the University of Kentucky and he holds a law degree from National University in Washington.

Prior to his election as postmaster in 1955, he was secretary to the late Senator and Congressman Virgil Chapman. He held the same job with the late Senator Tom Underwood and then, he became top aide to Congressman John Watts.

Like executives everywhere, he has personnel problems. Under him are 55 employees but only seven of them were on the staff when he took over some two and a half years ago.

The hours, Postmaster Morris explains, are difficult and many of the young people employed attend college and universities during the day. Hence, when they graduate they leave for other positions.

Elton, Albright, Johnson And Street Advanced At U. Of K.

Several top administrative positions at the University of Kentucky have been filled by action of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Charles F. Elton, director of counseling at the University since 1956, was appointed dean of admissions and registrar, replacing Dr. Robert I. Mills, who resigned to accept the chairmanship of the Educational Administration Department, University of Texas.

Dr. A. D. Albright, acting dean of the College of Adult and Extension Education, was named to the newly created position of executive dean of extended programs.

A second administrative post in extended programs was filled by the appointment of Dr. R. D. Johnson, formerly an administrative assistant in the College of Adult and Extension Education, as associate dean.

Another major appointment of special interest to Kentucky school people was that of Dr. W. Paul Street as director of the Bureau of School Service. Dr. Street served as director of the N.E.A. centennial celebration for the past two years.

UK Will Establish Center At Henderson To Serve West Ky.

A group of Henderson county citizens last September presented the University of Kentucky with a deed to 50 acres of land and asked for the establishment of a UK extension center at Henderson.

The group's petition stated in part: "Henderson and its three bordering counties—Union, Webster and McLean—produce approximately 750 high school graduates each year. This figure does not include Daviess county, which would be expected to furnish a sizable student potential."

Approximately 75 per cent of high school graduates in that area do not receive further education, the delegates pointed out, and "the need would appear to be obvious."

In preparation for the proposed center, interested citizens have arranged for the purchase of 100 acres of well-located land three miles west of Henderson on U.S. 60. Money has been pledged to purchase 50 acres immediately. The petition also cited the availability of electricity, water and gas, and Henderson's easy access from any section of Western Kentucky.

Henderson county is situated at the junction of the Green and Ohio rivers,

and has been marked as a future industrial hub, the report points out. Two large aluminum companies have purchased surface and coal rights along the basin formed by the two streams, and additional acreage has been optioned in neighboring Union County.

Henderson is the home of approximately 50 industries including the Bear Brand Hosiery Plant, which employs about 600 people. This company now has a part-time employment program for high school students maintaining high scholastic ratings, and plans to put into effect a similar program for college-age students when the extension center is located there.

"The college would be a boon to this entire section of Kentucky—culturally and economically," the petition stated, and "the people are ready to accept it and to give it their full support."

Dr. Merl Baker, executive director of the Kentucky Research Foundation and part-time professor of mechanical engineering, has just been given the added title and responsibility of Director of Research and Industrial Relations by the UK Board of Trustees.

UK Grad Succeeds Dr. Jane Haselden

Miss Sharon Miller has been named assistant to the dean of women to replace Dr. Jane Haselden, who was granted a change of work status last year. Miss Miller will serve under Dr. Doris Seward, new dean of women here at UK.

A recent UK graduate, Miss Miller will work with the campus sororities, student employment and counseling and as advisor to Panhellenic Council

Active in many campus organizations as an undergraduate, Miss Miller received a bachelor degree in elementary education here in 1956 and was awarded a masters degree in general education last year.

She was a member of the Leadership Cabinet, Student Government Association, League of Women Voters, predent of her graduating class in education, president of Panhellenic Council and one of the University's delegates in 1955 to the Student Conference on National Affairs.

In addition she has been advisor to the Junior Panhellenic Council, a member of Kappa Delta Pi, National Education honorary society, and Mortar Board.

The University of Kentucky, facing like other institutions an "unparalleled demand by Americans for more and better schooling," must undergo changes and revisions if it is to make "its maximum contributions to our society," Dr. Frank G. Dickey declared in his inaugural address on September 14

Dr. Dickey spoke after being inducted formally by Gov. A. B. Chandler, chairman of the board of trustees, as the seventh president of the University.

Approximately 1,500 persons, induding representatives of the nation's leading colleges and universities, trustees, government agencies and alumni, attended the inauguration, held in Memorial Coliseum.

Dr. Dickey, who became UK president last fall after serving as education dean, after accepting the great seal of the University from Gov. Chandler pledged faithful discharge of his duties, and declared:

"Having accepted the administrative responsibilities placed upon me in this inaugural ceremony, I must now in turn present to the people of our commonwealth the charge to bear effectively the responsibility of cherishing, protecting and supporting our schools

Need Is Cited

"Education is the lifeblood of democracy and only through constant devotion to educational endeavors can our way of life be guaranteed for luture generations."

Gov. Chandler told the inauguration audience that in terms of opportunity for services and leadership in development of better living, no position in kentucky excels the office of UK president.

"There must be a resurgence of Democratic spirit in the colleges throughout our land if we are able to retain the priceless heritage that is

ours," the governor said. "Too often our institutions of higher learning are following in the background of change rather than leading it and shaping it to the greatest needs of the great number of the people."

The governor charged the president to maintain "freedom of teaching and speech on the campus and promotion of scholarship and the discovery of truth through research."

Degrees Conferred

After his inauguration, Dr. Dickey conferred honorary doctor of laws degrees on Howard Hanson, director of the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music; Mrs. Agnes Ernst Meyer, co-owner of the Washington Post, and Turner Catledge, managing editor of the New York Times.

Greetings to President Dickey were brought by the following:

George D. Ravencraft, on behalf of the students; Robert Hillenmeyer, the alumni; Prof. Arthur Lewis Cooke, the faculty; Dr. Herman Lee Donovan, president emeritus, the past administration; John Davis Williams, chancellor of the University of Mississippi, the delegates, and Gov. Chandler, the commonwealth.

Dr. Leo M. Chamberlain, UK vice president presided, and the invocation was said by the Rev. Donald Anderson and the benediction by Rabbi Joseph Rosenbloom.

Enrollment To Soar

Dr. Dickey cited a special presidential committee report that forecast doubling of enrollment at colleges and universities by 1970. The report noted the need for expanded physical facilities and overcoming a teacher shortage to meet this increase.

"The University of Kentucky," Dr. Dickey said, "in these days ahead will not be an inexpensive operation, but relatively speaking, it will cost little, compared to the dividends which will accrue to the people of our state, our region, and our nation as a result of the education of the youth for these tasks ahead."

Dr. Dickey said that the University already was meeting growth problems by establishment of off-campus centers elsewhere in the state and by a campus building program, part underway and part in the planning state.

"All of these plans for students, faculty and educational facilities," he continued, "are predicated upon the belief that state-supported institutions are intended to serve the state.

"While selective factors are always at work in a good educational institution, a state university must never look upon itself as an exclusive institution.

Rapid Growth Ahead

"We must, therefore, prepare ourselves for a degree of bigness that we have not known before. In considering this problem of size, I think it wise that we look realistically at 12,000 to 15,000 as the enrollment of the University of Kentucky by about 1965, which year will mark the 100th anniversary of the founding of this institution."

Elsewhere in his address, Dr. Dickey declared that "a real environment for educational advancement is dependent upon the existence of a dynamic and evergrowing community of learning" and that this required "faculty members who are devoted to great teaching."

ing."

"It is my firm belief," he said, "that we have this type of faculty and now our task is that of holding this faculty and enlarging it with others of similar qualities."

Additionally, he said:

"No university can be much better than the preparation and the ambition of the students whom it enrolls. Therefore, we are interested in having the best possible students and then increasing an atmosphere in which they can work most effectively.

Must Maintain Aim

"We shall always desire to make this campus a comfortable and healthy place for young people, and consequently, we must provide for varied

UK, U. Of L. Medical Schools Issue Cooperative Statement

A statement of cooperation was issued early last September by the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville pertaining to medical center development.

The statement, signed by President Frank G. Dickey and Dean William R. Willard of the UK Medical School and President Phillip Davidson and Dean Murray Kinsman of the Louisville Med School is as follows:

"The University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville are both aware of the needs of Kentucky and the United States for adequate and high quality health services."

"Their role in meeting these needs can be fulfilled by educating and training physicians and other health personnel and by conducting research in the basic and applied medical sciences. In the course of discharging these responsibilities, both will provide important medical services for patients and give assistance to physicians, hospitals, and health and welfare agencies throughout the state."

"The two universities are convinced that their role can be discharged most effectively and economically by cooperative rather than competitive efforts. Therefore, as responsible university officials, we wish to state publicly our intent to explore jointly all phases of medical education so that through cooperative efforts we may provide the maximum in services to the state of Kentucky."

Each University must have adequate resources if it to fulfill its mission of teaching, research, and service. The two universities believe that the people of Kentucky, through voluntary giving and tax funds, can and will provide adequate support for the development of both centers. We urge them to do so."

HOW MANY PREXY'S?

How many presidents has the University of Kentucky had since it was founded in the 1860s? You'd think there would be no question, but there is. Some say five, some seven; the Kernel, UK student newspaper, says eight. Dr. Frank G. Dickey, installed this past week, considers himself No. 7. His immediate predecessor, Dr. Herman L. Donovan, called himself the sixth. Why, then, the confusion?

Here's Why

The inauguration program listed seven "past presiding officers of the University," starting with John B. Bowman (1866-1878), who held the title of regent. If you count him a president, Dr. Dickey would be No. 8.

John A. Williams (1866-1868) and Joseph D. Pickett (1868-1869) were called presiding officers. If you call them presidents, Dr. Dickey would be No. 7.

Patterson First 'President'

James K. Patterson, who served from 1869 to 1910, was the first to hold the title of president, so if you start with him, the new president would be No. 5. Between Patterson and Dickey were Henry S. Barker (1910-1917), Dr. Frank L. McVey (1917-1940) and Dr. Donovan (1941-1956).

"This is a success story which is of particular interest to Kentuckians because the entire personnel and the locale involved are centered on the campus of the University of Kentucky. It is a story very likely without parallel on any campus in this country-or else-

Those words were spoken by University of Kentucky President Emeritus Herman L. Donovan in 1949, when he recommended to the UK Board of Trustees the erection of the school's journalism-publications building.

A project that was begun in 1924 was a step closer to realization. Through the efforts of Prof. Enoch Grehan, first head of the UK Department of Journalism, the Kernel Press was begun in 1924. Profits realized from the operations of the Kernel Press made the present six-year-old building possible.

42nd Year

The Enoch Grehan Journalism Building now houses the School of Journalism and the Kentucky Kernel, student publication of the University. ast September the Kernel began its 42nd year of continuous publication. It was started in 1915 as a successor to the Idea, then published on the UK

The first student newspaper on the campus was the Cadet, in 1894. Its short life ended in 1897, probably due the strict faculty censorship of the publication. Next came the KSC (Kentucky State College) Record in 1900. The Idea began publication in 1908 and it was made the official student publication in 1910.

The Kernel, unlike the Cadet, has been fortunate in the lack of censorship exercised over it.

Mutual Trust

In an annual report on student publications, made to the UK comtroller July, 1950, Dr. Niel Plummer, a inkfort among former Lexington newsman and curtently director of the School of Jour-

censorship, either from the Department of Journalism or from any University authority?"

His answer: "Each year the answer is no! Guidance is offered and it often is accepted, but over the years a state of mutual trust and respect has been fostered between successive editors and the personnel of the Department of Journalism."

The Journalism Department at UK was recommended in 1908 by James K. Patterson, then president of the University. Mr. Patterson stressed the need and importance of a journalism department in his report to the board

The 'Dean'

The department was established in 1914, and Grehan was named its head. Grehan, often called the "dean of Kentucky newspapermen," had previously served as news editor of The Leader, and as an editorial writer on Lexington newspapers.

The first journalism classes at UK were taught under the English Department. Elementary ideas of newswriting and scattered lectures by local newsmen were the extent of the classes.

With the beginning of the Kernel, students were given the opportunity to put into practical use the lessons learned in expanded journalism studies. The students now are responsible for the reporting, writing and editing of news, and for the writing of editorials; they also compose the paper and do advertising layouts.

New Building

The Kentucky Kernel was published in Miller Hall, a science building, until 1929, when its presses were moved to McVey Hall. McVey was the Kernel's home until it moved to the new \$425,-000 journalism-publications building in 1951.

The Kernel is beginning its 42nd year of continuous publication with the creation of a new post, that of public relations manager, to be filled by John Egerton. Frank S. Strunk will serve as editor during the current



Under provisions of the contract, the University has sent a total of ly specialists to the Agricultural and Veterinary College at Bogor, Indonesia. The project, totaling \$1,250,000, resulted from an exploratory visit to Indonesia late in 1956 by Dr. Frank J. Welch, dean of UK's College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

About one year ago the University of Kentucky received a similar contract for \$1,234,000 from the ICA for services in engineering and the supporting sciences at a University of Indonesia division in Bandung. Ten UK professors and technicians now are engaged in teaching and other activities under this contract. Both contract call for three years of educational assistance.

Dr. Olaf S. Aamodt, former consultant for ICA projects in several countries, will serve as chief of part for the new Indonesian contrad. Designated as a geneticist, he was selected for the assignment upon the recommendation of Dean Welch.



UK's Katherine Kemper Is Placement Service Director

Employment horizons for college graduates are becoming wider each year, according to a report just released by the University of Kentucky Placement Service.

More than 660 students and alumni registered with the office during the period from February, 1956, to January, 1957, and about 77 per cent now are employed. The remaining 23 per cent represents those with the same positions held at the time of registration, students still in school or in military service, and women who have withdrawn because of marriage or motherhood.

The Placement Service grew from a small, one-room affair when it was established by order of the UK Board of Trustees in 1953, to a large department complete with private interview rooms. The director, Mrs. Katherine Kemper, formerly served as executive secretary of the College of Education placement bureau.

Last year, representatives of 471 organizations interviewed graduating seniors and graduate students. Records for 1956 show an increasing trend in employment needs. A number of industrial and scientific firms which formerly employed only engineers and other technically trained persons, now are employing liberal arts graduates.

The Placement Service is divided into three divisions: general division—devoted to business, industry and government; teacher division—devoted to the field of education; and clerical division—which principally finds campus jobs for students' wives.

According to Mrs. Kemper, "the demand for graduates in all fields remains high, while the need for persons with training in accounting, engineering, mathematics and the physical sciences continues to show a definite increase."

A total of 1,106 organizations in the general division sought help last year in securing personnel. Broken into categories, manufacturing firms led the list with 95 requesting assistance.

These firms wanted persons trained in all of the general fields: agriculture, arts and sciences, commerce, education, engineering, home economics, law, science, and mathematics.

Next largest category was 90 governmental agencies, which also asked for persons trained in all fields. The third largest category included 59 social work and recreation agencies, which requested graduates from all fields except engineering.

In the teacher division, 335 registrants accepted teaching positions, choosing them from 16,540 teaching vacancies reported to the office. Although a number of these positions were in other states, Mrs. Kemper pointed out that some of the teachers were merely returning to their homes, while others were married to servicemen and businessmen there.

The greatest number of requests was for teachers on the elementary level. However, for the first time in several years, vacancies in this area dropped somewhat. A definite increase was noted in requests for junior high teachers and for senior high school teachers of mathematics, music, girls physical education, sciences, social sciences, and for school librarians. "Requests for college instructors increased by 411," the report stated.

Average salary for all registrants accepting new positions last year was \$375 per month, the report pointed out. The low salary reported was \$200, as compared to the high of \$800 per month. Salaries for men averaged \$440 per month.

The employment outlook is excellent, but "positions are not available in all fields in every location," Mrs. Kemper pointed out.

After a UK student or alumnus registers at the Placement Service, members of the office staff compile credentials on the applicant which are made available to perspective employers.

Recruiters reserve interview rooms and obtain credentials of the registrants months in advance. The interview schedule for the 1957-58 academic

UK Lab To Develop Jet Firing Unit

An automatic firing mechanism for jet fighter planes will be developed at the University of Kentucky's Wenner-Gren Aeronautical Research Laboratory.

A research contract for the device has been awarded to the laboratory by the H. P. White Laboratory, located near the Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland.

The Kentucky Research Foundation, headed by Dr. Merl Baker, will administer the project, Dr. K. O, Lange is director of activities at the laboratory.

Dr. Lange said that the weapon, now in the blueprint stage, will be a "machine cannon or automatic rocket launcher," with the rate of fire greater than the conventional rifle caliber machine gun, employing artillery-type ammunition.

"An unusual feature," he said "is the employment of liquid springs instead of bulkier metal compression springs." This, he said, will result in a lighter weapon.

A chief requirement for the mechanism is that it be capable of discharging "constant velocity" projectiles at a high rate of fire, Dr. Lange said, pointing out that previously, the firing of a missile with a sustained velocity and carrying a large bursting charge has been accomplished only by rockets, fired singly or in salvos.

"To be able to fire repeated bursts from a battery of such guns would give the fighter type of aircraft sufficient fire power to cope with the largest attack bombers," he stated.

Prof. Fred C. Curtis of the UK laboratory is the project engineer. Lt. Col. George M. Chinn, USMCR, is chief consultant, and B. B. Waters is serving as engineering draftsman,



Chemist Shortage Hurting U. of K.

The chemistry department at the University of Kentucky is facing an extreme shortage of personnel, according to Dr. Lyle R. Dawson, department head.

Dawson said his department entered the current school year with a 20 per cent deficiency in the full-time chemistry faculty. He said this year two professors have gone to industry, two to other universities and one is now employed by the Atomic Energy Commission.

Two main causes were listed by Dawson for the loss of many well-qualified men:

1. Universities can't compete with industrial wages.

2. There is a shortage of trained personnel in the entire chemistry field.

He said there its a current shortage of about 5,000 chemists, and the American Chemical Society estimates that by 1965 the shortage will have risen to 10,000.

Due to the teacher shortage, Dawson said, advanced courses have had to be dropped from the curriculum, the teaching load of professors has been increased, and more graduate assistants are used as laboratory instructors. Dawson emphasized, however, that experienced faculty members are being used in "key positions."

Dawson noted that for the past 13 years all full-time professors have held doctor of philosophy degrees.

In addition to the shortage of teachers, Dawson said the chemistry building itself is "bursting at the seams." He said expanded facilities are especially needed in research branches of the department.

This year about 200 students who qualified on entrance examinations to take chemistry could not be enrolled in the department, due to lack of space and teachers, Dawson said. He added about 15 per cent of all students at the University take freshman chemistry each year.

Mistakes Beat Kentucky Early In Season; Tough Early Games Add To Troubles

"What's wrong with the Wildcats?" After six straight losses in their first half dozen outings opening the hectic 1957 football season, that question invariably was being asked by loyal Kentucky alumni, thousands of football fans and friend and foe alike.

Surprisingly, perhaps, the query was generally asked in a sympathetic vein rather than with overtones or criticism. Few but the uninformed or biased had expected the sophomore-studded crew of highly-respected Coach Blanton Collier to be a "world beater." But, likewise, hardly anybody dreamed that the season could develop into the nightmare it did.

The answer, in the thinking of most observers, was shockingly simple: "MIS-TAKES!

It became almost trite to repeat that answer every time the Wildcats failed to come out on the long end of the assistant to the score in the first six attempts. But that was the basic explanation each time.

While it was entirely obvious to even the uneducated that the Wildcats were victims, too, of the nation's toughest schedule (they faced three of the nation's top 10 teams in their first five games) and were plagued constantly by injuries to top men, the underlying problem was a matter of mistakes offsetting generally fine play. In virtually every game against their highly-rated foes, the underdog Kentuckians won the battle of the statistics while losing on the scoreboard for lack of touchdown production.

Often they would move the ball better than 90 yards in the direction of their opponent's goal only to STOP THEMSELVES by mistakes in the form of fumbles, pass interceptions, penalties, missed assignments or poor blocking.

It seemed also that almost every break was against them. Rarely in the initial half dozen games did the Cats get a break by gaining possession of the ball to start a drive from points inside enemy territory. Depth-poor

and unable to match most opponents' platoon substitutions, Kentucky's sophomoric Wildcats would be worn out and punchless by the time they drove virtually the length of the field.

It was a tribute to the efforts of an outstanding coaching staff that, discounting mistakes, the team played good enough ball to win just about every time and weren't humiliated by the obviously superior clubs despite the disadvantages of being forced to play at a psychological peak each week. UK was a key game in everybody's plans apparently-too capable to be taken lightly and yet not capable enough to avoid mistakes at critical points after creating scoring opportuni-

The 0-6 record that blotted the record books in late October was not exactly forecast in advance by Coach Collier and he, more than anyone, was greatly depressed by it. However, while not alibing, he did point out that he had fears even before the season opened about the inexperience of this club and the back-breaking schedule it faced.

He was on record early as being frankly dubious over the prospect of whole-victories being forged by an outfit forced to rely on inexperienced sophmores to plug gaps created by the graduation loss of eight starters and seven other experienced lettermen.

Collier, unlike many mentors, didn't sing the blues-he told the facts and let them speak for themselves. He said prophetically before the season: "Sophomores generally have to learn the hard way and their mistakes in the process of learning sometimes are costly . . . I hope our sophomores can begin to give us some help after the first few games, but by that time we may be out of the running due to our difficult schedule and the necessity of relying heavily on sophs."

Almost everyone was oblivious to the dangers that Collier foresaw and secretly expecting UK to come up with a great team as the Wildcats sank their teeth into the man-sized schedule by

taking on Georgia Tech in Atlanta in mid-September.

Bowl-wise Bobby Dodd had murmured something about the Engineers not being up to their usual fine temper, but it took an expert to recognize much difference as Ga. Tech punched out a 13-0 victory. The margin failed to tell the story on Kentucky's showing-as was to be the case all season. Most neutral scouts were in agreement that UK was a hardhitting, solid team in spite of its inexperience (10 sophs saw action) and one that could have made things difficult if they had not been bottled up in their own territory much of the sweltering afternoon.

No rest in sight, the Kentuckians next found another high ranking foe-Mississippi-"looking down their throats." The Johnny Rebs capitalized on tremendous team speed to hand the Wildcats their second straight shutout loss, but not without being thoroughly scared before the decision was put into the books. Twice the Colliermen sustained drives that carried them almost the length of the field (91 yards in the opening quarter and 88 in the final period) before bogging down less than five yards from pay dirt each time. The injury bugaboo, which was to plague the Wildcats throughout their first six games, popped up in this contest as end Doug Shively, son of UK's Athletic Director Bernie Shively and a pre-season All-Conference nominee, was sidelined with a sprained ankle. He did

not see action again until the Georgia game a month later and then was reinjured.

If comparative respite was to be had before mid-season, the next opponent-Florida-seemed to come near falling into that category. Not highly rated, as was the case in 1956 when they surprised to finish third, the Gators were considered no more than an even money bet to topple Kentucky to its third straight defeat. No Wildcat outfit since 1896 had opened the season with three straight setbacks. Kentucky's touchdown drought finally ended in the fourth quarter of this game, but came too late to prevent the relentless Gators from living up to their "darkhorse" reputation with a hard-fought, 14-7 win.

The key to Florida's offensive plans, it seemed, was to run where Lou Michaels wasn't. Frustrating the Wildcats' All-America tackle, Gator backs ran away from Michaels all night despite the fact he switched back and forth between two and three positions on defense. Big Lou had a sensational night nevertheless, topping it off with an amazing, 71-yard punt which started UK on the road to its first score.

Rounding out the first hectic month of their back-breaking schedule with three losses on their record but with no foe willing to class them as a pushover, Kentucky next went up against undefeated league-leader Auburn—the nation's number nine team—on the Tigers' home ground.

What was supposed to be a walk-away for Auburn, in the opinion of the experts, almost turned into one of the biggest upsets of the year before the Tigers could claim a 6-0 squeaker victory. The Wildcats, determined to prove themselves the best winless football team in the country, carried the fight to their hosts right up to the last second and could take heart in the fact that, at worst, the outcome should have been a scoreless tie.

Auburn got its lone score as the result of two big breaks that went against UK. First, there was a very questionable roughness penalty called against Michaels as he viciously (but legally) blocked the Tigers' star scatback Tommy Lorino to save a possible touch-

down. The resulting 15-yard penalty set Auburn up on the Wildcats' six yard line. On the very next play, full-back Billy Atkins got into the end zone with the aid (movies of the game showed) of a three-pronged break. Atkins' forward progress seemed to stop when he was met at the two by a host of UK tacklers; squirming partially loose, his knee seemed to touch ground at about the one yard line; and no 15 yard penalty nullifying the TD was called when a teammate helped him across the goal line.

Kentucky again won the battle of the statistics, gaining 241 yards against the nation's best defense, but found themselves floundering hopelessly deep in their own territory too much of the time.

Before the season, there were a few rumblings that Louisiana State, tutored by ex-Kentucky aide Paul Dietzel, might be surprisingly tough and that rumor proved all too true when the Wildcats faced sensational Billy Cannon and Co. in the Bayou Bengals' arena at Baton Rouge.

As had been the case in virtually every game previously, the Cats were plagued by bad breaks and their own mistakes which offset even better than usual offensive play. The fact that LSU handed Kentucky a fourth shutout in inflicting defeat number five by a 21-0 score was belied by the figures which showed the Wildcats ahead 276 to 235 in total offense. The celebrated Cannon was held pretty much in check while UK's Bobby Cravens annexed leading ground gained honors of the night. Of the 11 times Kentucky had the ball, only twice were they able to start a drive from closer than their own 30 yard line and each time were stopped by fumbles, penalties or pass

interceptions rather than by the LNJ defense.

Georgia, a club that had been have ing troubles similar to Kentucky's initiated the second half of the season in unexpected fashion by capitalizing on the Wildcats' mistakes for a 33.1 decision. Pre-game forecasts had i stalled UK as a slim favorite for the first time this year, but failed to take into account their proneness to funbles. Obviously over-eager to make good showing and pick up their first win, Kentucky's backs fumbled five times in their own territory with Georgia's alert defenders recovering each time and turning two of the miscus into eventual scores. UK also was the victim of two pass interceptions, one of which set up a Georgia touchdown.

As usual, the Colliermen won in the statistics column, only to see their advantage cancelled by mistakes. After the game, a disconsolate Coach Collier was at a loss to explain the teams troubles. "Every back is taught how to hold onto the football and I am sure they don't fumble purposely... Per haps it was a case of trying too had. Strange as it may seem, I thought we played good ball exclusive of the mistakes, especially in the line which showed improvement."

The feeling in the Wildcat camp after six straight losses—the schools worst first half football record in 6 seasons—was one of regret but not defeatism. Nobody felt worse over the situation than the coaches and plays. They intend to work harder to correct the costly mistakes and hoped for the big win over arch-rival Tennessee a season's end that would salvage a line glory out of an otherwise dismal campaign.

Time may be running out for the nation's top cage powers in their longstanding efforts to ease the perenniallystrong Kentucky Wildcats of wily Adolp Rupp out of the throne room of the collegiate basketball world.

At least that is the impression to be gained from a review of the 1956-57 campaign, which saw a Wildcat team not rated among the top 50 in preseason estimates scratch its way to third place in the final national ratings on a remarkable record of 23 victories in 28 starts, and a preview of the same in the team's prospects for the 1957-58.

Although the experts supported Coach Rupp's expressed fears that last season's outfit "could possibly be the weakest Kentucky team in 15 years." , I thought we the Wildcats looked anything but weak as they notched the championship in their own Invitational Tournament for the third time in four years, upsetting previously undefeated powers Illinois and Southern Methodist; and won a fourth Sugar Bowl title a week ret but not de later.

The Ruppmen went on to cop nes and players Southeastern Conference top honors for a record 17th time despite the hoped for the toughest fight ever with league foes, two of whom managed upsets. Hope I salvage a little was high as the Wildcats made a recvise dismal and ord ninth appearance in the NCAA eliminations at season's end, but luck deserted them on their own home tourt-site of the Midwest Regionaland they lost a chance to try for an unprecedented fourth NCAA title as Michigan State decisioned them.

Despite disappointment at the end, Rupp and his Kentucky riflemen took heart in the fact that they could expect improvement in 1957-58 if their enthusiasm remained high. The Baron said it this way: "With our experience gained in the 1956-57 campaign and relatively light losses, I believe we can be a stronger team in 1957-58. Our success, however, will depend on what the other fellow has. We can be better and still show only a mediocre

record against the toughest slate of opponents in the country.'

With the highly-successful Wildcat chief, who was accorded runner-up honors in national voting for "Coach of the Year" last year for his job with a sub-par team, giving out such a frank warning, the experts and opposing coaches feel that time may be getting short for doing anything about keeping Kentucky "down".

Analyzing the Wildcats' personnel for the coming season, the strength lies in the fact that only one regular, speedy playmaking guard Gerry Calvert, and two reserves, forwards John Brewer and Ray Mills, will be missing from the lineup. Adding both height and scoring potential are a hot-shot graduate of last season's frosh five, 6-7 Don Mills and the return of 6-6 Phil Johnson from the ranks of ineligibles.

Upcoming sophomore (Don) Mills may be the most immediate help to Coach Rupp. He led the Kentucky yearling squad with a 27.2 scoring average and a 19.2 rebounding average to lend hope that he will be ready early to take over regular forward duty along with sensational All-Conference Johnny Cox. Johnson, teammate who was being tabbed for possible starting assignments at forward last season before school deficiencies sidelined him, should help immeasurably at forward or center.

Besides All-America hope Cox, one of the nation's top sophs last season, the Wildcat starters returning include 6-3 senior John Crigler at the other forward, 6-7 senior Ed Beck at center and alternating guard regulars, Vernon Hatton and Adrian Smith. After Hatton, pre-season All-America pick last year, was sidelined by an emergency appendectomy after the Sugar Bowl tourney, junior college transfer Smith took over and performed more than adequately until Hatton got in shape

Rupp foresees a relief for Kentucky's opponent this year in one respect. The racehorse-style fast break of last season, led by the departed Calvert and

classed by many experts as the speediest fast break in cage history, will have to give way to a return to the controlled fast break offensive pattern of old. This crowd-pleasing Rupp-coached teams differs from last season's offense only in feet per second and slightly more deliberate actions in bringing the ball down and starting

The famed Baron of Basketball isn't moaning over the slight loss in speed, however, as he gains much needed height. About the only thing that isn't rosy in the Wildcat camp is the realization that the calibre of opposition to be faced is tougher than ever. The 25game card includes tests against no less than five powers rated among the top 10 in the country at season's end, including national champion North Carolina who will join No. 8 West Virginia and Minnesota against host Kentucky in the UK Invitational Tourna-

Ky. Cage Cats To Play Notre Dame

Notre Dame, one of the few schools to hold an all-time advantage in the win column over the University of Kentucky basketeers will return to the Wildcat schedule after a five year absence in 1958-59.

The Irish have downed the Cats 11 times and lost seven contests. In the last meeting of the two cage giants, Kentucky beat Notre Dame 71-66 in Chicago during the 1952 season.

Kentucky and Notre Dame will play only one contest per season in renewing their series. Johnny Jordan, Notre Dame hoop mentor was a guest lecturer last August at the University of Kentucky Coaching Clinic.

UK ENTOMOLOGIST GETS \$15,250 GRANT

Dr. J. G. Rodriguez, associate entomologist at the UK Experiment Station, has been awarded grants by both the National Science Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation to expand his research on the effects of insecticides and fertilizers upon certain plantfeeding mites.

The National Science Foundation contract, totaling \$10,250, provides for two years study on the nutrition of mites. In terms of the \$5,000 Rockefeller contract, Dr. Rodriguez will continue mite studies for one year. In past research sponsored by this agency, his group has discovered that sugars in plants are affected by the use of soil insecticides.
