A Tutorial System For The University

A tutorial system barring grades, examinations, and compulsor; class attendance was recently adopted by the University of Rochester.

The purpose of the plan is to give students more
treedom in planning their courses of study.

This plan, copied after the English tutorial

allowed to study independently under the department head in whose field they are majoring.

They do not receive grades from term to term'
or carn a given number of credits. Degrees
are awarded on the results of exams during the
senior year. Tests are given by authorities on


