


Happy Fifth Anniversay **GLSO Gay Straight Alliance**

In March 2001 Sarah Martin, Emily Scarr, (seniors in High School), Mary Crone and Ann Detjen met in the Pride Center to start a GSA. The internal walls were being built, there were hammers, saws and step ladders everywhere, but we were excited to have a place to get started.

By the third meeting there were 14 young people and four advisors. We were thrilled at the turn out. We soon were meeting every week and now also meet once a month or so on Saturdays to make it easier for the out of town teens.

At first, gay boys were in the majority, with some straight and lesbian girls. Last year we had our first regular attending straight boys and now our lesbian, bi-sexual, and straight girls outnumber the boys. Over 150 young people have attended more than one meeting. Gay and straight teens together are changing the atmosphere in our public schools (see page 18) and in our country. They are awesome!

KY FAIRNESS ALLIANCE

KFA continues its lobbying efforts in Frankfort to insure equality for all GLBTQ persons. KFA recently enjoyed a win with the passage of HB 270, the school harassment bill. Anti-gay conservative Mark Harmon of Danville introduced two amendments to the bill that would allow teachers or school administrators to not enforce the bullying policy if it conflicted with their personal religious beliefs. These amendments gave teachers a defense for condoning discrimination against GLBTQ students. KFA rallied for the bill without the amendments, and HB 270 passed without their inclusion.

One victory does not win the war. The struggle is far from over. KFA is lworking to defeat the Anti-Fairness Bill (SB 178) and the "Civil Wrongs" Amendment (HB 226). The latter is a proposed constitutional amendment that would prohibit the state from ever enacting "any statute, ordinance, administrative regulation, rule, or policy to create a legal basis for a person to claim

minority or protected status other than on the basis of race, color, religion, disability, familial status or national origin, birth sex, or age." In laymen's terms, if this was voted into the Ky State Constitution, the state would not be allowed to enact legislation that would protect GLBTQ persons.

On a positive note, KFA fully supports SB 99, the Statewide Fairness Bill. This bill will help insure that GLBTQ Kentuckians outside of Louisville, Lexington, and Covington can enjoy equal rights. 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STAGE TWO

This is about "being out" and at the same time not "being out". I have been out since I was a 15 year-old girl. I came out in anger to my family and society as a whole. I was a ward of the state the last 3 years of my juvenile years. When the state turned me loose I went wild and did whatever I could to have fun. I was never big on relationships. Sure I wanted someone to love me and make me feel that special way that only that special someone can make us feel. You know what I'm talking about, and it's not about sex. Although that does come later if all goes well.

I am 43 now although I feel as though I am still in my early 30's. I have been in a few relationships, serious and not so serious. I don't think I have as much experience as a lot of my friends when it comes to relationships. Only one of my relationships lasted a year and we stayed pretty much to ourselves. My other relationships were either intentionally kept a secret or were so short we never had time to socialize.

Sometimes I wondered what was wrong with me? Why did they leave me? I now believe that I was just a person that crossed over their paths on my way to where I am today. I don't regret having known them. They have helped me to get to where I am now. My first gay experiences weren't bad, just maybe lonely. We were affectionate mainly in the bedroom. In my longest lasting relationship, we hardly ever touched affectionately.

Several years have gone by where I have chosen to stay single out of fear of being hurt again. I have had no problem being an open and very proud lesbian these past few years. I have now allowed someone to get close to me (in that special sort of way. I must admit I am terrified, but in the most amazing wonderful way. But I

have became aware that I can't touch my girlfriend among other gay people without getting butterflies in my stomach.

I was working on my computer one night and it hit me like a ton of brick. In past relationships, there was always a part of me that wanted to hold hands or caress her face and enjoy being at gay functions. I did go to a music festival and boy was that a culture shock. I came home with a thirst for the love and affection that those women gave to each other there so freely. Even to strangers who showed they needed someone to say, "Hey I care because your Family."

Now I have a girlfriend yet I am finding it hard to be affectionate around other gay people. The other night I wanted to hold her hand and I couldn't get myself to reach out and take her hand in mine and just hold it. So finally I called her up and just told her what I realized and asked her to help me on this. She said no problem dear, I'll help in any way I can.

This woman is willing to help me find that part of myself that so badly wants to be free to show her affection. I am so excited about this journey I am about to go on with this beautiful woman. I feel like I have been given a second chance to finally express all the love I have kept pent up for so many years. I'm not saying I am ready to go out and start kissing and holding hands in front of the 'straight' community, but I'm willing to start trying to in my community.

Love truly is a gift. We shouldn't wait in the dark fearing what others might say or do. Don't destroy love with harsh words or, on the flip side of the coin, no words. If you love someone say it now, you might be gone in the next moment and they may never hear you say it again. Hug and kiss them when you feel like it, you don't know when you may have another opportunity.

We are fighting for our right to love one another, so lets do that. Hate and anger only beget more hate and anger. Telling or showing our friends and partners we love them brings so much more joy into our lives.

Betty Friedan and The Lavender Menace

It is Women's History Month. I became a feminist, or realized I already was one, in 1970 or so and have been a member of NOW (National Organization for Women) for most of the last 35 years. Betty Friedan, one of the founders of NOW, just passed away last month. She helped change the lives of American women.

Friedan wrote and published The Feminie Mystique in 1963, describing the American housewife as frustrated and isolated by the post war American culture. As women took to the streets to demand equal rights, Friedan was frequently at the head of the march and often shouting from the podium about the many form of discrimination women were only beginning to name for themselves. In the early 70's she was even called "more of a threat to the United States than the Russians"

Friedan was a strong-willed agitator,

not one to win converts through well mannered debate. She was known for her public disagreement with other feminists and as one of the leaders who initially believed that lesbians were a danger to the feminist movement.

According to Rita Mae Brown, the term "Lavender Menace" was "coined in 1969 by members of NOW who believed that lesbians were becoming a public relations threat to the women's movement. This term is often attributed to Friedan. It was certainly true that by 1969 lesbian feminists were beginning to make their concerns known within the feminist movement. Friedan and other NOW leaders told lesbians that their radicalism was hurting the movement and that they should to step back or even out.

At the Second Congress to Unite Women held in New York City in 1970, lesbians decided to use the term as a source of pride rather than a badge of shame. They wore lavender T-shirts emblazoned with "Lavender Menace" across the chest and argued that their concerns were interwoven with those of straight women. continued on next page

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Lesbians used the term "compulsory heterosexuality" to draw attention to the assumption that all women were straight and that their issues were "women's issues". They argued that the tendency of the press, politicians, and quite a few men to label the more outspoken feminists as lesbians was a divisive technique that NOW should stand in opposition to. And "standing in opposition" should include welcoming lesbians and taking their issues seriously.

During and after that Second Congress, straight and lesbian feminists talked with each other at greater depth and lesbian were fully welcomed into NOW. The chapter I joined in 1971 had a discussion group for straight and lesbian women to get to know one another. Perhaps if I had joined I would have come out years earlier.)

In spite Friedan's initial distrust of lesbians, and her irascible, difficult personality, she helped forge the woman's movement of the last forty years. Perhaps we could use a few more like her as we continue to strive for equal rights.

Many issues remain. Poverty is increasing and a lot more women than men are poor. Our right to control our bodies is in danger; in addition to abortion, emergency birth control and the right to alternative insemination may be targeted by the right wing. Violence against women and children including rape and spouse abuse are still prevalent. Lesbians still do not have the rights we need to protect our families. Perhaps it is time for you to join NOW. Go to www.now.org and see all the issues they are working on.

You're the One for Me, Morrissey By Lori O'Connor

He has been praised as "the greatestever lyricist of desire" by one biographer. The British music magazine New Musical Express named him "most influential artist ever." His former band, The Smiths, was even dubbed "the greatest rock band of all time."

Extravagant praise but most fans of Morrissey would not disagree. He has inspired writers, musicians, intellectuals, filmmakers, working-class adults and sensitive teenagers alike. The adoration expressed during a Morrissey concert is intoxicating, and inspiring. Men rush the stage. Tearful women sing along to his lyrics with hearts in their throats.

Although a gay icon, Morrissey has set himself apart by refusing to label himself as gay or straight thus surrounding himself with an aura of mystery and fueling passion in the hearts of both men and women.

Steven Patrick Morrissey was born May 22, 1959, in Manchester, England, to Irish immigrant parents. He was a shy, sensitive boy, "a good kid", as he has sung about himself. Intelligent and imaginative, he was a

lover of literature, music, and films. Oscar Wilde and James Dean were among his idols. He worshipped and identified with outsiders, the marginalized. In 1982, he met guitarist Johnny Marr, formed The Smiths, and began composing highly literate songs influenced by his favorite sources, such as the Shelagh Delaney play and movie, A Taste of Honey, a story about isolation and the power of imagination.

With wit, anger, and compassion, Morrissey has written about social problems, political issues, unrequited love, and alienation. The Smiths with Morrissey as their centerpiece were a refreshing alternative to the over-commercialized, slick and often soulless mainstream pop music of the 80s.

Although his music was melancholic, Morrissey was a comforting even hopeful voice duri ng the oppressive and repressive years under the influence of Margaret Thatcher and Ronald Reagan.

From the beginning of The Smiths to the present, Morrissey has been the focus of controversy for his nonconformity. He publicly announced his hatred for the British royal family and Margaret Thatcher and spoke out for animal rights.

His most intriguing statement, however, appears to have been the announcement early in his music career that he was celibate. This confession was perhaps the ultimate declaration of his independence from the expectations of society.

Morrissey was bored with male and female gender roles and desired liberation from them while proposing the idea of what he called the "fourth gender" where people could just be human and not merely defined by a sexual orientation. He stated in an interview that "sexual terms just segregate people, it's all monotonous and an insult to their individuality."

Morrissey's propensity for all things nontraditional extend of course to his lyric writing. Reviewers have often found his lyrics just as obscure as his personal life. Morrissey explains that this is because he doesn't subscribe to any kind of songwriting rulebook. He has rejected rigidity and narrow-mindedness in his music career as he has done in his personal life.

The subtle and changeable meanings of his lyrics, however, have often led to misinterpretations and controversy. A major scandal arose 1992, when Morrissey appeared at Madstock, the reunion concert for the 1980s band Madness. Journalist Chloe Veltman wrote: "draped in the Union Jack flag, a symbol of arch nationalism, and singing songs with such perturbing titles as "Bengali in Platforms" and "National Front Disco", Morrissey's acerbic references to "England for the English!" at Madstock failed to appeal to the media's underdeveloped sense of irony." Morrissey was ostracized in England and eventually exiled himself to Los Angeles in 1998 where he connected with the Hispanic community in which he has a huge fanbase.

While embracing the world of the outsider, Morrissey has actually sought to bring the outsider in from the cold. He has in fact stated that his favorite writers were

ones who spoke for everyone and that was his own goal. He despises "separatism, that certain groups can be put into absolutely defined categories."

This has been Morrissey's lifelong theme and main appeal to his fans. As one writer commented, "more devoutly than any other pop icon, Morrissey embodies the outsider." Devotees, especially his Latino fans, relate to his deep experience of alienation in our modern world. "It is his obsession and affiliation with the margins of culture and society - all that is unpopular, ugly and damned- that fuels this uncommonly extreme devotion of his fans."

"Morrissey sings to the disaffected, and God knows alienation is part of the assimilation tradition, the equal and opposite reaction of the immigrants drive to blend in," said one Latino fan. "We ache; Morrissey soothes."

Morrissey's forthcoming album is titled <u>Ringleader of the Tormentors</u>. Recorded in Rome, it is scheduled to be released internationally in April 2006.

Sex Ed. in Public Schools One of the Frontlines in our Struggle by Jodi Peters

Parents with strongly conservative views are using disputes over sex education curricula to push an intolerant agenda. Much of the following has been gleaned from the Christian Science Monitor and National Public Radio and is presented by a parent concerned for teens facing anti-gay bullying.

In the past three years 20 new bills in 16 states have surfaced attacking sex education, with increasing scrutiny of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender issues, according to the Sexuality Information and Education Council of the US (SIECUS). While sex education has been accepted in American public schools for generations, same-sex issues have become a new lightning rod for conservative groups.

Although it includes lessons on nutrition and violence prevention, among other topics, some parents in Massachusetts are upset by a proposed health-education bill because it recommends teaching children about homosexuality. The state's public schools would not be mandated to teach the courses and parents could remove their children from sex-education classes, as they can now, under state law.

The "opt out" right is at the center of the debate in Lexington, Mass. When parents inquired about pulling children out of any discussion of homosexuality at the school they were told it was not an option because such talks would not be related to

sexuality but to diversity.

Similar skirmishes are happening across the country. In Spokane, Washington the school board rejected a revised curriculum that included materials on gay and lesbian subjects because it felt the material was not objective enough.

The board of education in Montgomery County voted in 2004 to permit discussions about homosexuality. A group of parents called the Citizens for a

Responsible Curriculum responded by suing the school district. The district is writing another curriculum.

Groups that support sex education, including information on homosexuality, say the goal is awareness and safety, not indoctrination. "There is this whole myth of the homosexual agenda," says Ms. Fox of SIECUS. "But really it's about keeping young people safe" from situations such as antigay bullying.

The clash in Massachusetts culminated last April in the arrest of one father, after he refused to leave a meeting at the school until his demands were met. Some, including educators, feel he is purposely confusing diversity with sex education to push his agenda, and that his request is unfeasible. The father who was arrested, David Parker, was objecting to his son having access to the book "Who's in a Family?" which portrays all types of families including same-sex parents.

"Kindergartners talk about their families every five minutes in class," says Laura Tully, spokeswoman of Lexington C.A.R.E.S, a group formed in response to the arrest so that all students, it says, feel welcome in the school district. "These are real families that are in our classrooms. This is not some abstract

culture-war issue."

According to a 2004 poll by the Kaiser Family Foundation, Harvard University, and National Public Radio, the majority of Americans favors not just sex education, but also discussions of homosexuality if it's presented in a "neutral manner".

GSA'S IN KY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

There are very positive changes in our public schools, most brought about by teens themselves. Henry Clay, Tates Creek and Brian Station all have started GSAs this year. Dunbar and Lafayette have supportive groups where GLBTQ youth can be out. Shelby Co. has asked for assistance in starting a gay supportive group. The times they are a'changing.
