

Prof. Miller presented to the faculty a suggestion for a summer school to be held in this college. He believed that such a summer school might profitably be undertaken here, with the aid of our instructors and assistants, and that many teachers of the state might be glad of an opportunity to avail themselves of such a ^{school} opportunity; he thought that such a summer school would increase the popularity of the college throughout the state, and also be the means of making it much better known; it would furthermore give our assistants helpful experience in teaching, would increase their incomes, and thereby ultimately raise the standard of ability among them.

Prof. Miller referred also to the fact that the State Teachers association would meet in Lexington next June, and expressed the hope that as many as possible of the members of this faculty would be present and attend the meetings.

Upon motion of Prof. Pence seconded by Prof. Kastle it was ordered

Further remarks generally favoring the idea were made by Profs. Pence, Brooks, Kastle & Miller.
