



the honorable JOHN Y. BROWN, JR. Governor of Kentucky



JOHN Y. BROWN, JR., became Kentucky's 55th governor on December 11, 1979, succeeding Julian M. Carroll.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law in 1960.

The Governor served in the U. S. Army from 1959-1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the Outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International named him to a recipient of the Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

He has three children, John Y. Brown, III (16), Eleanore (14) and Sandra (13). He is married to the former Phyllis George. They attend the Walnut Street Church, Louisville.

JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

Athletics Department

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

FRANK HAM **Assistant Director of Athletics**

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to footpall coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



SUE FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger



of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

LARRY IVY Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment three years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12 losses.

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

record at Central Missouri, and 154-54 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

Looking back at the years with Coach Rupp, she describes the Baron as an exceptionally keen wit, and a considerate and congenial employer.


Working under Coach Hall is different only in that the program has undergone considerable expansion. The traditions are the same but modern basketball programs are faster paced and therefore more demanding.

Origin of Universe Lies in Ions

Amid a flurry of public programs on energy and radiation at the University of Kentucky this fall, two longtime UK nuclear hands, Marc McEllistrem and Fletcher Gabbard, quietly pursue on UK's nuclear accelerator their basic research into the atom.

Their work has practical—if somewhat distant—applications.

Inside the accelerator—a stubby, 60-foot concrete silo behind the UK Chemistry-Physics Building—these UK physicists produce ions that move so incredibly fast they are capable of penetrating to the atomic nucleus, or core, of the atoms.

In underground laboratories connected to the accelerator, the same fast particles are guided against various target materials—iron, oxygen, fission fragments—and cause them to explode.

"From the way target atoms disintegrate," says McEllistrem, "we infer their formation."

These UK physicists and their students probe nuclei formation processes that occurred near the beginning of the uni-

It is a primal work of the imagination: the collision and scattering of ions and atoms too small for the eye to see; in fact, the accelerated ion is 50,000 times smaller than an atom, explains McEllistrem.

Gabbard adds that work at the UK accelerator also provides an understanding

of stellar evolution, especially of how the elements in stars were produced.

"We can calculate certain reaction rates that determine why the stars shine," he continues.

At the same time, what is learned at UK contributes to the "design work of fission and fusion reactors" in the generation of energy. Basic research here, says Gabbard, helps in understanding the problems associated with the use of nuclear energy; for example, nuclear waste disposal.

And everything learned about the nucleus of the atom provides "information for the development and testing of theories of nuclear structure," Gabbard adds.

Kentucky presented the nuclear accelerator to UK in 1963; it cost \$500,000 then. McEllistrem is principal investigator and Gabbard co-investigator on a current National Science Foundation (NSF) research grant of \$100,000.

(NSF) research grant of \$100,000. Fusion and fission release nuclear energy; that is, by combining or dividing pieces in the nucleus of the atom.

Fusion is thought to be the sun's power source; fusion powered the "H" bomb.

Fission, the simpler process, was the source of U. S. atomic tests in Nevada in the 1960s. And fission of heavy particles—uranium or plutonium—creates energy in today's nuclear power plants.

Nuclear energy is the most carefullythought-out power source in history, Gabbard explains, and "there is consensus among nuclear scientists that it can be developed safely and economically.

"A lot of people made a lot of noise about the Three Mile Island nuclear accident," he says, "and it's important to have people concerned." Afterward, however, when attention is focused, rational approaches to nuclear power should then prevail, he points out further.

What is the danger to the citizens near Three Mile Island? People living near the Three Mile Island power plant, according to the scientists, get about 130 mr's (millirads) of radiation a year from natural sources. This is the same amount that people living in Lexington, Ky., or anywhere else in the U. S. are exposed to. The accident at Three Mile Island raised the radiation level to about 131 mr's for one year, McEllistrem says, based on the inquiry of a federally-sponsored consortium of health scientists.

Radiation's health effects—that between 130 and 131 mr's for a year—are so small they cannot be measured. But they are not negligible either, McEllistrem adds. The best estimate is that this

increase in radiation may (a 50-50 chance) cost some one or two individuals 10 to 15 years of life.

Gabbard thinks the public outcry over the Three Mile Island incident results partly from the newness and unfamiliarity of nuclear power and its presumed connection with disease, notably cancer, as well as a certain "lack of trust of people with power" (utility companies).

While Gabbard believes a strong antiintellectural reaction exists in "No Nukes" protests, McEllistrem spots "something reminiscent of the Vietnam protests" as the driving motive behind that outcry. He sees this as an expression of no confidence in the country's power structure.

To UK's nuclear researchers, nuclear energy remains neither mysterious nor threatening. They believe it is one more option for a future in which the world needs many more options on energy sources.





Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency tele-phone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple con-course between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all foods and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

SIGNS


Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.
