Bet you didn't know...

Americans use 2.5 million plastic bottlee every hour. In 1900 aluminum cans are recycled every second. If the pligrims had six packs, the plastic irings would still be with us today. It takes 100 years for in to biodegrade. It takes 500 years for aluminum and 1 million years for glass. Five two-liter plastic bottles make one square foot of carpet or one extra large with the plastic bottles make one square foot of large to more extra large with the plastic bottles make one sleeping bag. The energy saved from recycling one aluminum can will power your television for three hours or light a 100-watt light but for 20 hours. Recycling aluminum requires 90 to 95 percent less energy than mining and processing basiste or extra large.

Deliberations last into early morning

Members of the Student Government Supreme Court deliberated early into this morning over a charge against the SGA elec-tion investigator. The court's verdict was not

tion investigator. The court's verdict was not available at press time. Brian Hopper, a second year law student and election investigator, is charged with not fully investigating a claim of campaign overspending filed against new SGA Presi-dent Tim Robinson and Vice President Caro-line Harralson.

overspending head against new ScA Pressident Caroline Harralson.

Matthew Johnson, the election chairman, filed the overspending claim and another claim with Hopper three days after the election. Hopper then had two days to investigate the claims before deciding whether to forward them to the Election Board of Claims. Johnson thinks the overspending claim should have also been filed with the board. The only way Robinson and Harralson can be removed from office is if the board decides the overspending affected the integrity of the election. Robinson and Harralson reported that they spent \$599.89 on campaign materials, which was 11 cents under the \$800 spending limit.

The board priced the items on Robinson's expenditure report by comparing them to the prices charged by local businesses such as Kinko's and Lynn Copies and reached a total of \$1.277.18.

The bulk of Robinson's campaign purches the spending properties of the price of the price of the company in Louisville. The materials, which included T-shirts, banners and posters, were discounted because they came from seconds left over from the past state and national election, Robinson said.

Two weeks ago, Robinson and Harralson were found guilty of underreporting the price of their campaign web site. They must necessary in the \$GA election, withdrew her appeal ruling against a claim second in the \$GA election, withdrew her against Robinson and Harralson scampaign.

promised a "straightforward approach," but
state media on Wednesday accused Washington
of turning hostile. China says it will press for an
end to American surveillance flights near its
coast. The Bush administration has rejected that
demand, saying the United States has the right to

Confederate banner will remain on flag

Confederate banner will remain on flag JACKSON, Miss. — The banner that led Confederate troops in the Civil War will remain on Mississippi's flag, as voters rejected warnings the symbol is racist and an obstacle to economic development. By nearly a 2-1 margin, Mississippi residents voted Tuesday to keep their current state flag, defeating a proposed alternative that would have replaced the Confederate emblem in the upper left corner with a cluster of 20 stars. With all precincts reporting, 488,630 voters, or 65 percent, favored keeping the 1894 flag, while 267,812 voters, or 35 percent, wanted to replace it. Last year, South Carolina lawmakers removed a Confederate flag from atop the Statehouse dome. In January, Georgia legislators shrank the Confederate symbol that had dominated that state's flag since 1936.

Mississippi spills over

The surging Mississippi River forced hundreds of shoreline residents to abandon homes, halted barge and rail traffic and left weary sand-baggers in four states hoping for one thing Wednesday — no more rain. Hundreds of Wisconsin and lowa residents were chased away from low-lying riverside areas Tuesday, unsure when they would return home. Sixteen counties in Minnesota declared a state of emergency as did nine in western Wisconsin. A disaster proclamation was in place for 10 lowa counties as the floodwaters began seeping southeast, toward homes in Hampton, Ill.

day earlier, but denied the about-face was a result of heavy U.S. pressure. Shortly after the Israelis left, Palestinians fired six mortar shells at
a Jewish settlement and an army post in Gaza,
causing no injuries. Israel's brief takeover of a
square mile of land in Gaza had been triggered
by mortar fire on an Israeli town. Since the violence erupted on Sept. 28, 475 people have been
killed, including 392 Palestinians, 64 Israeli Jews

Court rules against extraditing Gusinsky MADRID, Spain — A Spanish court ruled Wednesday against extraditing media magnate Vladimir Gusinsky to Russia to face fraud charges, his lawyer said. Domingo Plazas said he had received a copy of the decision from a court panel that vote 2·1 against Russia's extradition request. Plazas declined to give details, saying the court would release the ruling later Wednesday. Russia has charged Gusinsky with misrepresenting the assets of his Media-Most empire to obtain \$300 million in loan guarantees in 1986 from state-connected natural gas monopoly Gazprom. Gusinsky, 48, has repeatedly claimed he is a victim of political prosecution because of Media-Most's steadfisst criticism of Russian President Vladimir Putin and its hard-nosed reporting of the war in Chechnya, among other issues.

LOS ANGELES — If last year's census reflected a decade of Hispanic growth, expect the 2010 head count to show an Asian boom. One of the fastest growth rates in the 1990s belonged to those with Asian ancestry. With the population growing 74 percent to 11.5 million last year, demographers expect them to help give America a much different look a decade from now. In the 1990s, the growth rate of Asians surpassed even that of Hispanics. The number of Hispanics jumped 58 percent to 35 million, putting them almost even with non-Hispanic blacks as the largest minority group in the country.





Transylvania University officials have added \$1,000 to a reward it is offering to find out who is responsible for racist graffiti after another racial epithet was found written on the door of a student's room.

The original reward was \$500.


the best way to deal with the issue.



It is important to remember here that any action the government takes even to punish the airlines were warned repeatedly to improve service. In fact, the threat of the end of the control of the c






