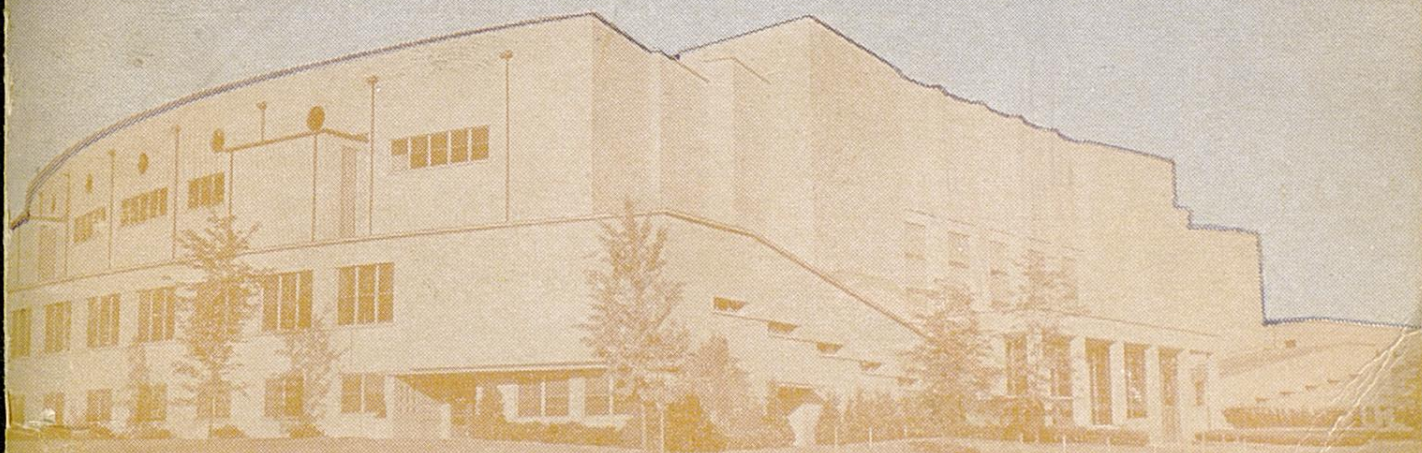

ADOLPH FREDERICK RUPP

Won 519, Lost 85 — 85.9%

When the sport of basketball is mentioned today, a direct chain of thought eventually will bring out two names which have become virtually synonymous with the game—University of Kentucky and Coach Adolph Rupp.

Such unprecedented recognition for the fabulous cage mentor is only natural since his deeds over the past 25 years as head man of the Wildcats have resulted in phenomenal success as witnessed by the record of 519 victories in 604 starts—a winning average of better than 85 percent.



To adequately describe the amazing success of the famed "Man In The Brown Suit," one must start with superlatives for Coach Rupp's record stands as the greatest of any coach in any sport. He is recognized as the nation's winningest basketball coach and his nationally-famous Kentucky cagers have picked up just about every team and individual honor that the basketball world has to bestow.

At the close of his Silver Anniversary season at Kentucky last March, Baron Rupp and proud supporters of the Wildcats (who evidenced their thanks for a job well done by presenting the coach with a shiny new Cadillac) could look back over an unparalleled honor roll of 16 Southeastern Conference titles, three NCAA Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title, a trio of successes in the Sugar Bowl Tournament and a pair of championships in their own recently-inaugurated Invitational Tournament as well as

Olympic Trials collegiate bracket laurels and a nominal world's championship through participation as one half of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games.

Tournament invitations in the pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of—Kentucky played in only three and lost each time. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have the distinction of not only playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team but also hold the record for most appearances (7), most games won (13) and most championships (3) in NCAA Tournament play. Coach Rupp is the first and only mentor to guide his teams to three NCAA and one NIT Tournament titles. All told, his Bluegrass five has achieved the unequalled feat of 103 victories against only 22 defeats covering action in 23 national classics (NCAA, NIT, UK Invitational and Sugar Bowl Tournaments) plus 21 conference meets and the '48 Olympics.

Rupp and his almost invincible Kentuckians also have finished as national champion in the Associated Press and other polls four times in the last seven years, were second last season, third another year and unranked one campaign (1952-53) when they were idle.

Possibly the greatest achievement was the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-record unit of all time. However, the Baron himself and many of his critics are inclined to look upon last season's amazing success in the face of major pre-season losses and serious adversity during the year as perhaps one of his best coaching jobs.

The colorful Rupp is credited in most quarters with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern which has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

Rupp has become, without a doubt, the best known and most widely quoted cage coach in America and his personal fame is equalled only by the success he has instilled in the highly-publicized Kentucky basketball powerhouses.

The Kentucky Colonel was named to the Commonwealth's Hall of Fame in 1945 and, in 1949, was honored as the outstanding citizen of the University city of Lexington. Active in civic affairs, he is a

Past Potentate of the Oleika Temple of the Shrine and currently is a member of the board of directors of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. He was selected as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation in 1950 and holds honorary memberships in various temples of the order throughout the country.

Recognized internationally in registered Hereford breeding circles, Rupp has several farms near Lexington on which he maintains one of the finest white-faced Hereford herds in the south and raises fine burley tobacco. He is now in a third term as president of the Kentucky Hereford Association and serves on the board of directors of the Kentucky Hereford Breeders Assn. and the Bourbon Beef Show. Rupp is called upon in the off season to go all over the country to speak on agricultural problems. The coach also is a director of the Central District Warehousing Corporation, world's largest tobacco marketing organization, and sits on the board directing activities of the Blue Grass Festival and Blue Grass Foundation.

In 1946, Coach Rupp was given the highest individual coaching honor in the cage world when he was elected to the Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame sponsored by the Helms Athletic Foundation of Los Angeles, Calif. The New York Basketball Writers' Association named him "Coach of the Year" for the re-building job he accomplished on the sophomore-studded 1949-50 Wildcats who succeeded the "Fabulous Five."

He was made an honorary citizen of New Orleans for the second time in 1951 and, at the same time, received the first plaque of appreciation ever awarded by the Sugar Bowl committee in recognition of his contributions to their annual tournament.

The Wildcat chief has written books on virtually every phase of the game of basketball, including a good seller entitled "Championship Basketball," and is in great demand during the off season to make speaking engagements and conduct clinics. Rupp made a third trip to Europe this past summer at the request of the Air Force to conduct a clinic for NATO Nations' Air Forces in Germany. His previous trips were in 1945 and 1951. He also has his own television and radio shows during the season and often is referred to in the press by such titles as "Mr. Basketball," "The Bluegrass Baron of Basketball," and "The Man In The Brown Suit," the latter stemming from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp attended the

University of Kansas where he played guard under the fiery Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, Iowa, and then at Freeport, Ill., for four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930.

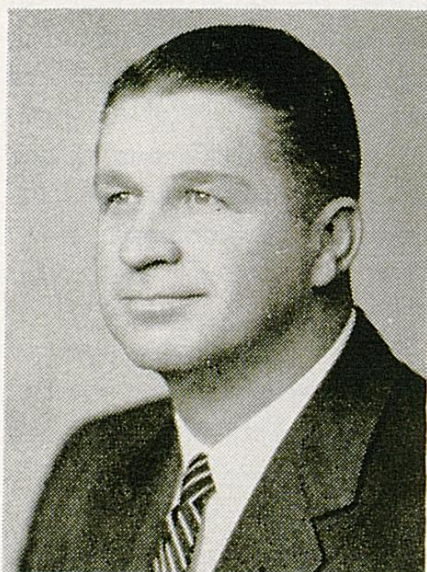
Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a respectable 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch was eight in 1940-41, but even that year was a winning campaign (17-8) and the remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is three.

Today, when one thinks of the sport of basketball, one thinks of Kentucky and Adolph Rupp—one of the greatest fundamental teachers the game has ever seen and truly a maker of champions.

HARRY LANCASTER

Assistant Coach

When Harry Lancaster finds a spare moment to reflect on his days as an all-around star athlete at Georgetown (Ky.) College back in the early thirties, he can recall with a degree of dismay how close



he came to never pursuing the "round ball" sport that in the days since has earned him a somewhat unique position in the basketball world.

An All-Conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons, Lancaster's football career almost overshadowed his play on the basketball court. In the cage sport, he was equally successful—with three All-Conference nominations and two team captaincies to his credit—but considered himself a better football player than cager. Experience, however, proved him a good student and teacher of the sport of basketball as he began his

coaching career and he now carries no regrets over the choice he made.

Lancaster bosses a promising group of yearling cagers and holds down the position of assistant varsity basketball coach and general right hand man to the fabulous Adolph Rupp. When he was made a full-time assistant by Coach Rupp in 1948, Lancaster joined a very select group due to the general scarcity of such positions at major colleges and universities. Even today, most teams rely on only part-time assistants.

Born in Paris, Ky., in 1911, Lancaster attended Paris High School where he played four years in all sports, being coached at one time by Kentucky's current Head Football Coach Blanton Collier. Following graduation in 1928, he continued his athletic career at Georgetown College and gained star recognition in football, basketball and baseball. After finishing at Georgetown in '32, Harry remained on for the next school year as an assistant coach in both the grid and cage sports before moving into the high school field. He coached several sports,

mostly basketball, for nine years and was a high school principal for six years before coming to the University of Kentucky in 1942 as an instructor in physical education.

Soon thereafter, the war intervened and Lancaster saw 26 months' Navy duty, rising from apprentice seaman to Lieutenant (Senior Grade). Returning to UK, he became a part-time assistant to the Wildcats' famous cage mentor, Adolph Rupp, in addition to carrying on his teaching duties and gaining his master's degree. He also served as Kentucky's baseball coach in 1946-47 and picked up the assignment again starting with the 1951 campaign.

He was promoted to full-time Assistant Varsity Basketball Coach in 1948 upon Coach Rupp's recommendation. In addition to his coaching duties, Lancaster manages to sandwich in a large slice of traveling. Besides checking on the nation's best high school cagers as potential material for future Wildcat national champion crews, his travel stems from a plan to extensively scout upcoming opponents. Coach Rupp was one of the first in the country to inaugurate this widespread scouting system in basketball and believes it has contributed materially to Kentucky's past success in carrying off championships with almost reckless abandon.

Lancaster also traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U. S. State Department. The mission called for the Kentucky aide to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials on Olympic procedure and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics, coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport as played in the U.S.A.

Lancaster's coaching success with his freshman teams has been commendable. The yearlings have lost only five contests under his tutelage the past six seasons against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and top-notch service quintets.

THE OUTLOOK FOR 1956

For more than a quarter century of the Adolph Rupp Era, sports fans of the nation have witnessed an amazing success story being written into the annals of college basketball with such regularity that the name of Kentucky has become symbolic of top-flight basketball and almost a foregone conclusion of winning ways.

Every year that the famed Wildcats "pick up the marbles" lends more credence to their reputation as the greatest name in the history of the sport and, despite the acknowledged calibre of past Kentucky fives, many observers are pointing to this year's edition of Ruppmen as potentially one of the greatest.

Baron Rupp himself hesitates to wax quite that enthusiastic over the immediate future of his sophomore-studded, 1956 team, but admits that he expects "a slightly stronger unit than last season, particularly from the standpoint of better bench strength." The main reason for restraint in forecasting the future of last season's national champion runner-up stems, according to Rupp, from the expectation that most of the teams dotting the Kentucky schedule also will be improved.

"I can foresee that we may be a little better, but we can have a better team and still not post as good a record," he explains. "Our success is keyed to what others have. You don't just write off good ball clubs like Dayton, Utah, Minnesota, Alabama, St. Louis, DePaul, Temple, Idaho, Maryland, Ga. Tech, Vanderbilt, Duke and others just because we expect some improvement."

The Wildcats' probable increased potential is based on the fact that only two lettermen, starting guards Bill Evans and Gayle Rose, departed from the rebuilt '55 quintet that took adversity in stride as it swept to a final, 23-3 record, 16th Southeastern Conference championship and all-time record seventh appearance in the NCAA tournament. Although Kentucky tasted defeat on its home floor for the first time in 12 years and was beaten by the same team twice in the same season for the first time since 1927, their amazing recovery in the face of pre-season expectations and the loss of no less than three starters at various stages during 1954-55 is considered reason enough to not underestimate the strength of this year's aggregation.

Rupp will be molding the 1956 Wildcat aggregation around a

trio of tall and talented seniors, a similar number of juniors who played well in both reserve and starting roles last season, plus a group of 10 promising sophomores.

The Kentucky senior starters, all 6-6 or better and each one worthy of All-America mention, are expected to form the nucleus of one of the tallest squads in Wildcat history. Although outranked in the height department by teammate Phil Grawemeyer (6-8 to 6-7), Bob Burrow stands out as the big man in the U.K. lineup. The tall Texan, a second or third team choice on most All-America picks last season and one of the nation's leading rebounders, is the Junior College transfer center who showed up more impressively with each game last year and led the Wildcats in every offensive department at season's end. So effective was his work that DePaul Coach Ray Meyer summed up the feeling of many frustrated mentors when he declared, "The only way to beat Kentucky is to break Burrow's control of the backboards." Rupp says of his star: "Bob stepped into the pressure-filled shoes of Cliff Hagan in excellent fashion last season and showed great promise of developing in the tradition of our outstanding centers of the past. He has the stuff to make All-America this year and should rate high consideration if he continues the pace he was setting at the close of last season."

The tall front line also includes forwards Grawemeyer, 6-8 captain who shows no signs of trouble from the leg broken last February, and Jerry Bird, 6-6 "midget" who finished third in scoring for the Wildcats in '55. Either man would be the standout star of many another ball club and will be fighting for honors in their own right as the campaign progresses.

Although many opposing coaches make a good pep talk out of the height that the 'Cats boast, Coach Rupp hastens to point out that he had the same boys in the same positions last year. For himself, the Baron makes much of the team's serious inexperience at guard. Kentucky's championship outfits of the past always had outstanding men in these positions who were adaptable to the controlled fast break style of offense and could break a tight defense open with their outside shooting.

The outlook for such men this year is doubtful. The two regulars lost were guards and the man who took the ineligible Evans' place in the NCAA Tournament, 5-11, Gerry Calvert has by no means won a starting nod for '56. Another late-season fill-in, 6-3, John Brewer, has been converted from a forward and could be one of the starting

guards. Several other promising men dot the roster, including some potentially good sophs, but the probability is that the guards won't be set until mid-season and may even be the "Achilles heel" of the championship-minded Bluegrass five.

In the realm of sophomores, Kentucky has reserve power unequalled in recent years. Among the better looking prospects are 6-7 center Ed Beck, captain of last season's freshman team; Vernon Hatton, 6-3 guard from Lexington who could get a starting nod; 6-6 center Phil Johnson; 6-3 guard-forward John Crigler; and 6-3 guard Billy Cassady.

Facing a December schedule of some of the nation's toughest teams, Kentucky cannot afford to be a late starter and must settle its internal problems quickly—a time factor that may offset the improvement expected from better bench strength.

Last season was the year that the incomparable cage dynasty built by one Adolph Rupp at the University of Kentucky was supposed to come tumbling down around the ears of the fabulous "Man In The Brown Suit."

Gone from the sensational, perfect-record machine of 1954 were its top stars—All-Americans Cliff Hagan and Frank Ramsey plus another great, Lou Tsioropoulos. The shattered remains added up to only one man, Bill Evans, who had been a consistent starter and, before the season opened, he was shifted from his regular forward post to a guard position.

The time appeared ripe for picking on the inimitable Mr. Rupp and his all-conquering Wildcats, who through the 25 years of the Rupp Era had developed into the most consistent winner in the history of the game and could boast of being the only cage outfit ever to win three NCAA titles.

However, the script that Kentucky was supposed to follow in 1954-55 got lost somewhere along the way. The "Desire Kids" from the Bluegrass, despite having to contend with adversity that cost the services of three starters, forged through a schedule of consistently high-ranked opposition with only three setbacks to mar a repeat performance of their perfect record of 1954. The final mark of 23 victories and only three defeats gave Kentucky its 16th Southeastern Conference title in 22 years and record seventh bid to the National Collegiate Championships, in which they have fared better than any other team in both number of victories and championships.

The road to success was not easy—in fact most observers opined that it was the most difficult ever encountered by a Wildcat squad and classed the results as the best coaching job ever accomplished by the "Maker of Champions," Coach Rupp, in the quarter century he has been at the Kentucky helm.

The rebuilding Wildcats were figured so lightly by the experts that it shocked the cage world when they rolled to three straight wins against good opposition opening the season and then pushed impressively past Utah, the nation's number two team at the time, and defending NCAA champion La Salle on successive nights in the U.K. Invitational Tournament.

Just when the top-ranked Wildcats seemed set to roll unchecked to another perfect season despite glaring shortcomings in comparison

to other great Kentucky teams of the past, adversity reared its ugly head for the first time. Lowly Georgia Tech, a Southeastern Conference rival who hadn't won a single league tilt the year before and weren't considered much more potent in 1955, up and surprised the cage world by upsetting the 'Cats, 59-58—and had the audacity to accomplish the minor miracle on the Lexington hardwood where no Kentucky team had tasted defeat in 12 long years and 129 consecutive games.

That shock soon wore off and the Wildcats rolled on, posting victory after victory despite being in an obvious slump. Their mid-season record was a very respectable 12-1 when they moved into Atlanta, Ga., for a return match with Ga. Tech. Everyone expected it would be the Yellow Jackets who would get stung this time, but they engineered another rude shock to topple the cold 'Cats, 65-59. Adversity had struck a second time and those who wondered, "what next?", did not have long to wait.

A couple of days later a starting guard was lost due to a dispute over training rules. Senior reserve Gayle Rose moved into the lineup and took up the slack with surprising effectiveness. Without missing a stride, Kentucky notched five more important wins. Then more trouble. In a tight tussle with DePaul at Chicago, six-eight forward Phil Grawemeyer broke his leg and this fourth stroke of misfortune cost the services of a second starter off a club that was not considered strong to start with and definitely lacking in experienced depth. Stepping in to close the breach was sophomore John Brewer, long on desire but short on height.

Seemingly weakened beyond survival at a crucial stage of the campaign when they were fighting to edge out three contenders for the Southeastern title they were defending, the "Desire Kids" seemed to thrive on trouble as they turned back 20th-ranked Vanderbilt, dangerous Auburn, 12th-ranked Alabama, and finally arch-rival Tennessee.

Even though the regular season closed in a blaze of glory, the Wildcats had to endure additional misfortune. In the NCAA tournament, they were forced to operate without the services of a third starter—Capt. Bill Evans. Although eligible to play his third varsity season as a graduate student during the regular schedule, NCAA rules barred post graduates from tourney play. Another reserve, 5-11 Gerry Calvert, took over for Evans but things were so rough at this stage that Coach Rupp had to call for help from the football squad

to bolster his depleted squad. A pair of gridders with outstanding schoolboy cage records, halfback Billy Mitchell and tackle Bill Wheeler, were added to bring team strength up to 12 players.

Big Bob Burrow, six-seven junior college transfer imported to fill the pressure-laden shoes of graduated All-America Cliff Hagan, blossomed almost overnight in the midst of Kentucky's late-season troubles from the category of "good" to "sensational" and virtually carried the Wildcats to victory on the broad shoulders of his rugged, 220-pound frame. But even Burrow's tremendous rebounding and clutch scoring was not enough to power the team to a fourth NCAA title and they were eliminated in the Eastern Regional.

However, no matter what happens in the future, the 1954-55 season of the troubled Kentucky Wildcats seems sure to go down in history as one of the most amazing displays of sheer desire on the part of an outmanned group of cagers ever seen.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY INVITATIONAL BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

December 20-21, 1955 — Memorial Coliseum

Nationally-ranked basketball teams representing Utah, Dayton, and Minnesota along with Kentucky's highly successful Wildcats, will be the participants in the third annual University of Kentucky Invitational Basketball Tournament carded for Memorial Coliseum on December 20 and 21.

The Kentucky tournament, in its previous two years of existence, has become nationally famous for the calibre of participating teams and the liberal dividend paid to each school.

Played before capacity audiences in UK's modern and spacious Coliseum and resulting in national-record size tourney shares of approximately \$9,900 to each of the participating schools last year, the tournament has been captured both times by a triumph of host Kentucky over La Salle.

This winter's meet will pit a strong Utah team against NIT runner-up Dayton and pairs formidable Minnesota against defending champion Kentucky. All four participating clubs ranked among the elite of the nation in 1954-55—Kentucky second, Utah seventh, Dayton ninth and Minnesota eleventh.

Selection of teams to take part in the Kentucky tournament is based on consideration of national reputation in cage circles, potential calibre of play expected this season and the desire to give the holiday meet an intersectional flavor with a top outfit representing various parts of the country. The tournament originated as the result of an increasingly-popular trend toward the scheduling of "Christmas" festivals and round-robin meets in college controlled arenas. It is the first tournament of a national scope ever presented in Lexington and UK's Athletic Director Bernie A. Shively serves as the tourney manager.

Utah's powerful Redskins will be the only guest repeater in the 1955 meet. Losers to the eventual champion San Francisco in last year's NCAA Tournament, the Utes return their top scorers from the team that managed an impressive 23-4 mark and was voted by Kentucky's squad members as the "toughest team" faced last year.

Runner-up in the National Invitation Tournament, authors of a respectable 25-4 record, and a ninth place ranking in the final AP poll are among the many laurels chalked up by Tommy Blackburn's Dayton Flyers. Seven-foot pivotman Bill Uhl anchors the Flyers main hopes for honors this winter.

Minnesota barely lost to Iowa in the torrid Big Ten race last year but holdover Bill Simonovich, 6-11, 275-pound pivot giant, is expected to carry the Gophers to the loop championship and an improvement on the 15-7 record while essaying a man-sized schedule.

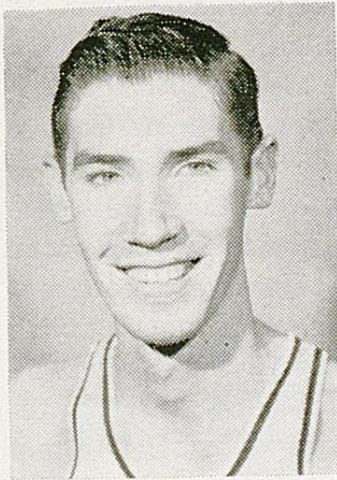

PHIL (COOKIE) GRAWEMEYER—Senior—Forward—Louisville, Ky.—
 Captain-elect of the 1955-56 edition of the Wildcats, Grawemeyer was on the road to stardom last year before he suffered a broken leg

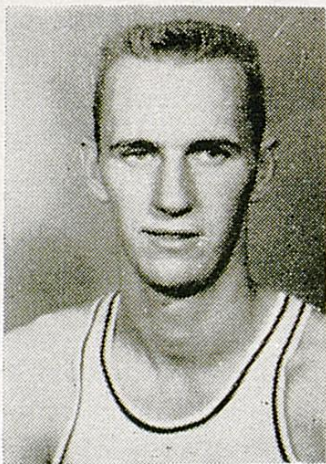


in the DePaul game, sidelining him for the remainder of the season. Was second only to Bob Burrow in rebounding and scoring last season before the injury. Grawemeyer is extremely valuable to the Cats when they run up against a zone defense, since he is gifted with a graceful portside one-hander to go along with a variety of shots that includes a good jump and hook. Had a 13-point scoring average and rebounded at a 13.5 rate last season. "Cookie" also leads the returning starters in free throw percentage. Despite his lanky 6-7½ frame, the former two-time All-State product from Louisville Manual is regarded as a demon on the boards and possesses exceptional speed for a cager his size. Was particularly impressive during the early stages of last season, his 28-point output in the opening game against L.S.U. being his top effort. He hit 20 or better on other occasions. Can play either forward or center, being equally adept at either position, as proven in last year's play. Regarded as an excellent southpaw baseball hurler, considering turning pro after graduation.

BOB BURROW—Senior—Center—Wells, Texas. — A transplanted Texan whose successful conversion from junior college ranks to the "big time" aided greatly in Kentucky's amazing rebuilding job last



season. Already the first junior college graduate ever to gain a starting berth on the Kentucky five, the genial Burrow is aiming at another record—that of becoming the first junior college alumnus to gain a spot on the first team All-America selections. A second (Helms Foundation) and third team (AP) mention last year, after a brilliant two-season record at Lon Morris Junior College in Texas, Bob is rated a prime prospect to be elevated to the top spot if he takes up where he left off last March. The tall Texan paced the Wildcats in every offensive department a year ago, scoring an average of 19 points per game and rebounding at a nationally-

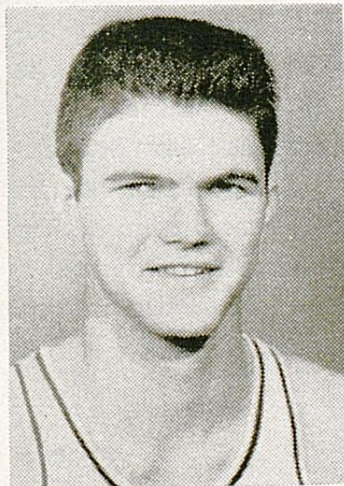
rated pace of 17.7 a game, but was handicapped in the early stages of the season by unfamiliarity with the Kentucky style of play and calibre of competition. He can be expected to put in a serious bid for Southeastern scoring honors from the very opening tipoff this season and should improve on his defensive skill and rebounding. The 6-7 ace set a school record by dragging down 34 rebounds against Temple last season and received many tributes on his ability in this department, such as the quote from LSU Coach Harry Rabenhorst: "That Burrow killed us on the boards." DePaul Coach Ray Meyer declared "The only way to beat Kentucky is to break Burrow's control of the backboards." Bob reached possibly his greatest heights when he out-scored the fabulous Tom Gola from the field, seven goals to six, and ended up only two points behind his man (18 to Gola's 20) in total points as Kentucky defeated LaSalle in the U.K. Invitational Tournament. Against the SEC's leading scorer, Denver Brackeen of Ole Miss, he scored 26 while holding Brackeen to 20. Burrow, already an All-Southeastern and All-NCAA Tournament pick, has all the necessary attributes of an All-American—size, speed, defensive ability, superior rebounding skill, great scoring potential, intelligence and a hatful of shots.

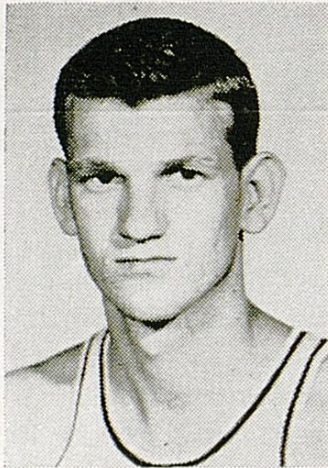
ED BECK—Sophomore—Center—Fort Valley, Ga.—Captain of last year's highly-regarded freshman team, the rangy 6-7 Beck displayed great potentiality and was acclaimed by Coach Rupp as one of the finest center prospects to enroll at Kentucky in



several seasons. Only the presence of All-America pivotman Bob Burrow is expected to limit Beck's playing time and prevent him from reaching stardom in his initial varsity season. As the veteran Burrow is firmly established as the Wildcat center, the likeable Beck isn't expected to land an immediate starting berth but his presence on the squad certainly will be felt in a reserve capacity at either forward or center, which reflects to some extent his "all-around" ability. The possessor of an exceptional hook shot, via either hand, Beck turned in good defensive performances in his play as a yearling and

lived up to his pre-college billing as being "extremely agile" for his 6-7 frame. Author of nearly a 10-point average last year, the Fort Valley native was a Class B All-State Tournament choice for three successive seasons during his brilliant high school days. A licensed Methodist minister, he preaches at local churches on occasions. Beck married the former Billie Justine Ray shortly before the fall semester began.

JERRY BIRD—Senior—Forward—Corbin, Ky.—A prominent proven campaigner of last year's highly successful team, Bird evidenced his indispensability by the fact that he was the only netman outside of



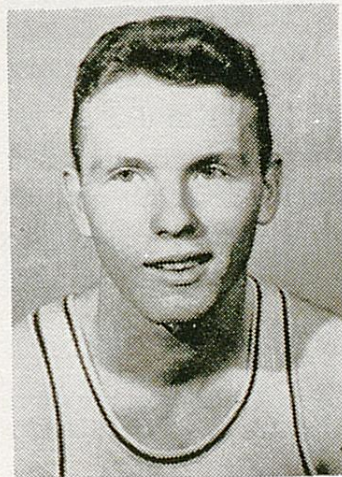
Burrow to start every game. And despite the torrid pace set in many of the tilts, the 6-6 Corbin native turned in nine "iron-man" performances with his route going exhibitions. Armed with an excellent set shot in addition to the fine accuracy he shows on his graceful hooks, Bird parlays deadly marksmanship with rugged rebounding, a figure he ranked second on the final tabulations. Operated as a pivotman his first two years at Kentucky but made the difficult switch to forward last winter with surprising ease. Turned in an exceptional effort against Vandy last year with a 20 point outburst, his season high, and combined with his

defensive work, he helped UK break a late deadlock to finally subdue the pesky Commodores. Hails from the same hometown of the famed Frank Selvy, and was considered an even better prospect than the ex-Furman flash. Expected to cop All-Southeastern Conference honors this year if he can surpass or even duplicate last year's glimmering effort. An All-State selection for two seasons at Corbin High and a star of the North-South cage classic at Murray in 1952. Also named to a first team All-America prep berth the same year.

GERRY CALVERT—Junior—Guard—Maysville, Ky.—The smallest but the speediest member of the Wildcat squad, Calvert blossomed into a real standout during the latter stages of the season last year,



turning in a pair of top-notch performances in the NCAA Tournament, including a 19-point outburst in Kentucky's final game. Got off to a slow start last winter in practice sessions because of a broken finger but it took only the second game of the season to prove his value to the club. Still nursing the finger injury, which at the time was enclosed in a protective covering, Calvert helped the Cats protect a narrow one-point lead over Xavier by dropping in a last second field goal that insured Kentucky of the win. Possesses a sheer desire to play and is exceptionally aggressive on defense—a couple of reasons why he is rated as the No. 1 prospect for a guard

berth. Connects most accurately on his one-handed jump shot, although he uses his canny driving ability and two-handed set shot effectively. Tallied 59 points last year and is regarded as an excellent baseball prospect, being the regular center-fielder on the Wildcat nine his Frosh year.

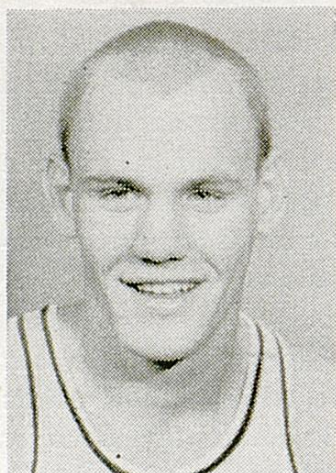

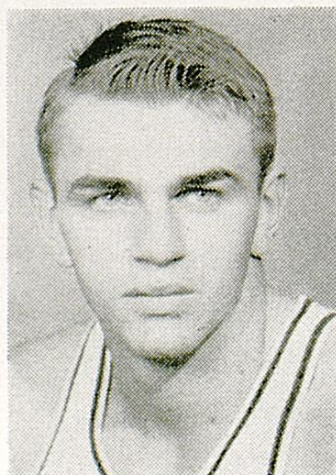
named to Chuck Taylor's All-America team following an outstanding performance in the annual North-South cage classic at Murray, Ky., after his high school graduation.

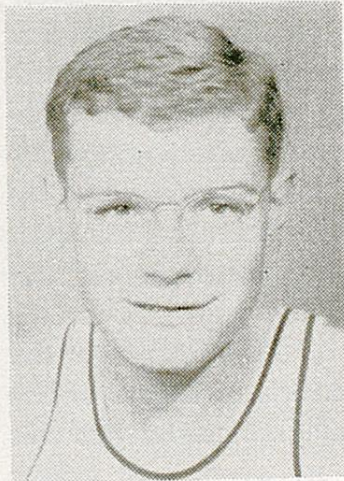

Converted from a schoolboy pivotman to a collegiate forward, where he sparkled in his play last winter with the Kittens, Johnson tallied 111 points in frosh play to rank high among the leaders. He has a good jump shot and operates exceptionally well on the Wildcat fast-break. Phil, the son of former Wildcat All-SEC half-back, Bert Johnson, was an All-State honorable mention choice for three successive

years. He scored 527 points in his final campaign at U-High—good for a 25.1 average. Johnson also looked good in fall baseball practice and is expected to provide some assistance to the Cat mound corps.

BILLY SMITH—Sophomore—Forward—Walton, Ky.—One of the top surprises on the promising yearling squad last year, the aggressive 6-5

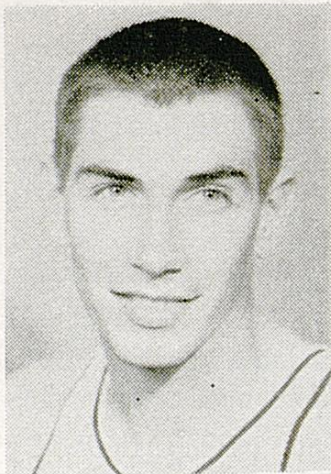


Smith may provide dependable relief help to the regular forwards this season. He looked good as a frosh at times, especially at rebounding and on defense, although his top offensive performances were intermittent. Used his jump shot as his favorite offensive weapon while making the difficult switch from a schoolboy pivotman to a college forward. An All-State honorable mention choice for three successive seasons, he tallied 1,805 points over a four-year span, averaging 22 points a game in his final campaign. Scored 76 points in 12 frosh games last year. Initially caught the eye of Coach Harry Lancaster in the High School All-Star

cage classic at Pikeville two years ago when his play labeled him as a future college star.

LINCOLN COLLINSWORTH—Sophomore—Guard—Salyersville, Ky.—

A steady defensive ace but a cager lacking in offensive maneuvers—that's the opinion many basketball experts have of Collinsworth. A hard-driving type player, "Abe" gained acclaim for his defensive exhibition against the Air Force All-Star five that included numerous collegiate stand-outs. His most difficult task was in developing a good outside set shot after being converted from a center to a guard. Collinsworth was one of the Commonwealth's most colorful schoolboy performers during his senior year at Salyersville, averaging 28 points and a record total of 2,652 points over the four-year span. Born on the birthdate of the late President Abraham Lincoln, thus his given name. Scored an even 100 points with the Kittens in 12 games for a 8.3 average.

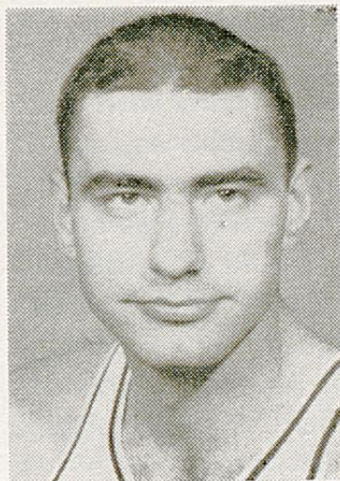


HAROLD ROSS—Sophomore—Forward—Hickman, Ky.—Expected to see only reserve action this winter because of the heavy and formidable

competition at forward, the scrappy Ross made the difficult switch from a high school guard to a collegiate forward last season with surprising ease. Tallied 60 points as a first-year performer on the highly promising yearling squad. The former All-State performer has a good shot from about any place on the court but is best with his one-handed jump shot. The shifty cager was the state's leading high school scorer two seasons ago in averaging 31.5 points per game and was the initial prepster signed to a Kentucky grant-in-aid that year.



JAY BAYLESS—Sophomore—Forward—Knoxville, Tenn.—A rugged 6-4 forward, Bayless was ineligible for freshman competition last season, so his actual game potential is still unknown and untested. The former Knoxville schoolboy standout rebounded and displayed capable defensive possibilities last season in practice sessions which could make him a darkhorse candidate for extensive reserve duty. The 205-pound cager still holds, among his many high school honors, the Tennessee discus throw record, plus earning All-State mention in both basketball and football. Bayless worked out every day last spring with the Wildcat track squad and is expected to bolster the Cat thinlies next season. His best shot has been either a one or two-handed outside set, on which he connects regularly.



FRESHMEN

JOHNNY COX—Freshman—Forward—Hazard, Ky.—Not since Wah Wah Jones came down from Harlan to help his high school and Kentucky's Wildcats toward their greatest eras in basketball has a mountain lad gained as much acclaim as the sensational Cox. A unanimous All-State and All-Tourney choice, the 6-4 cager brought his Hazard High club into the state tourney as an outfit that wasn't even figured to triumph in its initial game. But when the versatile Cox finished his personal assault on the record books, his team had captured the much-sought-after title. Although putting on an exhibition of defensive work that rivalled his rebounding job, he captured the fancy of the Kentucky coaches with his offensive maneuvers. Cox amassed 127 points during his four-game stint to eclipse the old mark of 102. In addition to his other record-breaking performances, he established a championship game scoring mark of 32 points. Tallied 1,026 points during the regular campaign—good for a respectable 29.3 average. Earned "Most Valuable Player" awards in numerous All-Star tilts this past summer and almost personally led the Commonwealth's prepsters to a victory over Indiana's finest stars and end an 11-year Blue Grass drought.

LEWIS McMANUS—Freshman—Center—Buffalo, N. Y.—The biggest man on either the freshman or varsity squad, at 6-8, McManus comes to the Wildcats with a good reputation and lived up to every word of it in pre-season practice drills. A two-time All-Catholic choice while prepping at Bishop Timon High School, the rugged, 220-pound Buffalo, N. Y., native posted a respectable 22-point average during his junior year. Can hook with either hand with equal effectiveness and uses his massive frame to give a good account of himself in under the basket, especially when battling for a rebound or defensive position. Regarded by the Kentucky mentors as an excellent pivot prospect, McManus is being groomed to help fill that post that will be vacated by Bob Burrow at the end of the present season. Called "Lew" by his teammates, he was ineligible for high school athletics during his final year because of a ruling that prohibits play after the 19th birthday but he kept in excellent shape by playing with a group of former collegians in a local YMCA league.

BILLY HILL—Freshman—Forward—East Lynn, Ill.—A former school-boy three-sport star at East Lynn (Ill.) High, the popular Hill is regarded as one of the more promising yearlings on the Kittens' roster. An honorable mention all-state choice as a high school pivotman, the 6-4 Hill also starred in both baseball and track. Uses a jump shot as his top offensive weapon and displays exceptional maneuverability at either a forward or a pivot post. He capitalizes on an elusive fake to go along with his many offensive assets and has turned in good rebounding and defensive exhibitions in pre-season practice drills. Hill amassed a total of 2,193 points during his brilliant four-year high school career, 793 during his final year in which he averaged 31.9 points per game, good enough to lead all Illinois prepsters.

CHARLES (SPIDER) WEBB—Freshman—Guard—LaFollette, Tenn.—

A speedy and elusive guard who comes to Kentucky with a fine record as a valuable playmaker, the 6-2 Webb was a vital cog in his high school club's success. His team advanced to the finals of the state tournament chiefly on the LaFollette ace's 37-point outburst. Webb, called "Spider" by his teammates, was a two-time All-State selection in Tennessee in addition to gaining All-State Tournament laurels for three consecutive seasons. Author of a 19-point average during his senior prep campaign, Webb possesses a good outside shot and relies a lot on his speed to make him a dangerous threat on the fast break. Although touted as a fine playmaker, it was his outside shooting that captured the fancy of the Tennessee cage fans who regard Webb as one of the finest collegiate prospects to come out of that state in several years. Calls his two-handed set shot his favorite offensive weapon. Webb is the second Tennessee boy to join the lair of the Kentuckians in the past two years, Bayless being the other.
