Court reforms seek to alleviate overcrowding inside Kentucky's prisons

The conditions in Kentucky's state
prisons have deteriorated to such degree that a lawsuit won by immates
from the Kentucky State Penitentiary
and the Kentucky State Peritentiary
will force a major overhaul of the state
prison system.

The lawsuit was begun by Jerald Kendrick, now out of prison, who filed the document a few years ago while

serving time at the Kentucky State Penitentiary near Eddyville. Kendrick spent much of his sentence studying Law hooks and writing legal cocuments.

Although several lawyers later finished Kendrick's work, his efforts resulted in a consent decree signed April 4by U.S. District Judge Edward Johnstone of Princeton, Ky, that sull force the state to spend nearly \$50 mills lion in the next four or five years to show the holog list of problems Kensowich and La Grange (reformation). inmate has access to any other inmate." Anderson said. "If he wants to stab him, pipe him or rape him, it's almost impossible to stop him." At La Grange the guard is not in the dormitory wing after it is locked down, Anderson explained. "Just imagine yourself when the lights go out and you're in your bunk bed," he said. "Anyone can come in and rape you or stab you, and no one cand oanything about it. The guard is not there. In fact, he's under instruc-

Anderson also said that the only real protection an inmate has is to have another inmate, known in prison lingo as "the daddy." Rescue failed, but Carter, advisors shouldn't be nation's scapegoats

On Friday morning the nation was informed of the failure of a rescue mission designed to free the hostages in Iran. An attempt to end the six-month-long hostage situation collapsed when three of the eight rescue helicopters broke down.

Presidant Carter cancelled the mission as a result of the helicopter failure which would have kept the mission from successful conclusion, three hours after the task force of helicopters and C-130 transport planes, carrying a 90-man strike team, landed under cover of darkness in the desert about 250 miles courbest of darkness in the desert about 250 miles southeast of Tehran. Shortly after Carter ordered the task force to terminate the mission, one of the five remaining operational helicopters crashed on takeoff into one of the six C-130 Hercules transports and both craft burst

six C-130 Hercules transports and both craft burst into flames. Eight crewmen were killed and four suffered burns. The injured were evacuated with the rest of the team but the bodies of the dead reterwenn were left behind along with the helicopters and the burnt-out C-130. The mission had been a well-kept secret. Defense Secretary Harold Brown claimed in a press conference that same day that informing the nation's allies would have compromised the sucess of the mission and further that only those who had "an absolutele essential part" in the mission, even within the Defense Department, were informed on a need-to-know basis. As a result, the nation was shocked. The Student

Center on Friday afternoon found a capacity crowd Center on Friday afternoon found a capacity crowd on hand in the TV room for broadcast of the nationally-televised Brown press conference and the related coverage throughout the afternoon. It also found many commenting on the stupidity of President Jimmy Carter. "That asshole," they were saying, and in rather less mild language. But on the other side of the ledger, there were those who praised the president's actions, saying that the rescue needed to be attempted, even if perhase the settion quelties have attempted, even if perhaps the action ought to have been taken much earlier in the captivity of the 53

Reaction nationwide and worldwide has varied as well. In Tehran, Iranian President Abol Hassan Bani-(Sadr declared that the rescue attempt was only part of the larger plot by the United States to overthrow the revolutionary government.

"Carter's declaration that Iran's central power was segetting weak and that he believed that they cannot protect the hostages lives any more and that's why he accepted a military operation with humanitarian air intentions is all a lie," he said Saturday from Tehran. U.S. allies seem to feel that the decidedly military rescue attempt will only serve to escalate the crisis. The allies also questioned the timing of the rescue so close on the heels of a European commitment to impose economic and diplomatic sanctions againstal Iran in an effort to forestall any military resolution of the hostage situation by the United States.

Defense Secretary Brown defended the timing of the operation on various grounds, among these, the fact that "all diplomatic efforts so far have failed," "Hat there was no reason to believe that the hostages

During Carter's press conference Friday morning, (when he informed the nation of the mission's failure) that "We will not give up in our efforts. Throughout this extraordinarily difficult period, we have pursued and will senting to autrem earty pressible assume to this extraordinarily difficult period, we have pursued and will continue to pursue every possible avenue to secure the release of the hostages. "He further states that the United States and its allies would seek "a prompt resolution of the crisis without any loss of life and through peaceful and diplomatic means." The mission then will have little impact on the diplomatic approach which the United States would seem bent upon. Sanctions will be leveled against Iran, but while direct military action is still an option, a successful rescue mission would now seem out of the question. As one White House aide said, "It's a choice between sanctions and nothing, and nothing is not a policy."

In Russia, the official Soviet news agency, Tass, termed the mission an "agressive act" — part of a developing campaign of "provocation" against Iran that has brought the United States to the "brink of insanity" and created a "serious danger" to peace. The

The official Soviet position does not necessarily reflect that of the the Russian people, and many have displayed their opposition to their government's support of groups holding diplomats hostage. In a Tass commentary the mission has been labeled "a bandit attack on a sovereign state" that 'grossly violates all the norms of international law." Fine, but what about Iran's violation of international law." The reaction of the relatives of the hostages has been generally one of shock mixed with a feeling that the operation should never have been launched. Most vocal in her condemnation of the aborted rescue mission was Barbara Timm, who took part in the press conference in Tehran Saturday. The mother of the

youngest of the hostages, 20-year-old Marine Sgt. Kevin Hermening, Mrs. Timm said, "We deeply regret the actions of our president."

"We would like to apologize for that action, she said, adding that she also spoke for the family of another hostage, John E. Graves.

Perhaps though the best estimation of the feeling surrounding the aborted rescue mission came from across the ocean. British Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington put it this way. "If it had been a success, we would all have been applauding. I'm extremely sorry that it didn't succeed."

And that's probably the way most Americans are feeling about the situation as well. Carter could have been the hero, but he also risked being the goat. You can condemn him for waiting so long to make the

can condemn him for waiting so long to make the move, but it's hard to fault him for his courage and

move, but it's hard to fault him for his courage and determination, especially in an election year.

There comes a time when the hard decisions must be made. Carter and his advisors felt that the time had come and that their plan had as Carter put it, "an excellent chance of success." Brown agreed that the mission was "operationally lessible" and that the timing had been reasonable. No on could foresee the institute of the plant o ing had been reasonable. No on could foresee the inor-inately high failure rate of the helicopters. In normal service the giant RH-53 Sea Stallion has a failure rate of less than 5 percent. In this mission that rate reached almost 40 percent and caused the mission to be scrubbed. No one could anticipate that the withdra-wal from the area would claim eight lives.






