

WASHINGTON — The United States would continue to give Haiti money to fight markation and to Haiti in the wake of violence that forced the cancellation of elections, the State Department side yesterday.


UK center Mike Scott goes up for a rebound in the Cats game against Hawaii, Saturday at Rupp Arena.




