#### FOREWORD

The Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on Historical Records Survey projects of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Tippah County, is number 70 of the Mississippi series.

The Historical Records Survey program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by Historical Records Survey projects attempt to do more than give merely a list of records - they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of Historical Records Survey projects, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey program was organized by Luther H. Evans, who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child, who had been National Field Supervisor since the inauguration of the Survey. The Survey has operated as a Nation-wide series of locally spensored projects in the Service Division, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

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The Mississippi Historical Records Survey program was organized to inventory State, county, and municipal archives, early American imprints, church records, and manuscripts in collections. In Mississippi the Historical Records Survey has operated as a unit of the Statewide Records Project in the Service Division, and has been sponsored by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History and some seventy county boards of supervisors. The Survey is being discontinued in order that its personnel may be diverted to activities which have a direct and unqualified relation to the war effort. However, this volume is being published in a preliminary edition, since all data, except the subject and entry index, had been compiled preparatory to publication.

The inventory of the records of Tippah County is the eighth prepared for publication. It is arranged so that the records of the executive branch of county government come first, followed by those of the recording, judicial, law enforcement, fiscal, election, education, health, and miscellaneous agencies. Included also is a short essay on each agency of county government outlining the organization of the agency in Tippah County, its present status, the method of filling the office, and the term of office. Since these essays are limited, it is suggested that the reader consult the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi, No. 37, Lamar County, for more detailed essays than those found in the Tippah County inventory. The records are described by records series in entries whose style has been formalized to give information concerning the title of record, dates for which available, quantity, labeling of volumes or containers, variant titles, description of record contents, manner of arrangement, indexing, nature of recording, size of volumes or containers, and location.

This inventory will be useful to officials, to students of research, and to schools. It will serve as a guide or catalog to officials who, because of periodic turnover in office personnel and because of the division of duties, cannot be expected to have a comprehensive knowledge of all the records, familiarity with which is necessary to the efficient functioning of the office. Writers of local history will find that the inventory is a ready guide to all records reflecting political, social, and economic development of the county, and students of local government will value the inventory for locating the records and for tracing the trends of local government. The inventory can be used by the schools to familiarize the students with the various aspects of local government, with the types of records kept in connection with the administration of local government, and with the instruments filed and recorded to protect private property rights.

The survey of the records of Tippah County was made by Andrew Brown who also wrote the historical sketch, utilizing the original, unpublished records of the county as the principal source material.

The Survey has followed general regulations and procedures applicable to all WPA project units in the 48 states. Mississippi WPA officials have given the Survey their cordial support and assistance. The Survey also acknowledges the interest and cooperation of the Tippah County officials,

of Dr. William D. McCain, Director of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, and of the Ripley (Miss.) Southern Sentinel in printing the cover as a co-sponsor's contribution.

The State office of the Survey profited in all phases of its work by the constructive advice and criticism of the National office and its representatives. This inventory in manuscript form was given editorial review in the National office by Louise Boynton, assistant editor, and was further reviewed by Mabel S. Brodie, editor in charge of public records inventories.

The original plan of the Historical Records Survey was to publish the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi in 82 units, one for each county in the State, with the units numbered to correspond with the alphabetical sequence of the counties. Thus, the inventory of the records of Tippah County, herewith presented, is number 70. It is being issued in a preliminary edition in mimeographed form for free distribution to State and local public officials and libraries in Mississippi and to a limited number of libraries and governmental agencies outside the State. The inventory was prepared for publication in the State office of the Survey by an editorial staff headed by Andrew Brown, Assistant State Supervisor.

A list of the publications issued by the Mississippi Historical Records Survey appears on page 157. More than 1,850 publications have been issued by the Survey throughout the Nation.

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








TIPPAH COUNTY 1836-70

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#### 1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

## Location and Boundaries

Timpah County, 1 of the 10 original counties formed from the Chickasaw Cossion of 1832, touches the state of Tennessee on the north, lying about 80 to 100 miles east of the Mississippi river. As organized on February 9, 1836, its boundaries began at the point where the Chickasaw base meridian intersects the Mississippi-Tonnessee state line, running thence south with the base meridian to the line between townships 6 and 7 south, thence east with township lines to the line between ranges 5 and 6 east, thence north with range lines to the state line, thence west to beginning. The area of this original county was approximately 995 square miles. On April 7, 1870, Union County was formed in part from Tippah; on April 15 of the same year, Prontiss3 and Algorn Counties took more of its territory; and on July 15, 1870, Benton County took a large part of the western section. No changes in the boundaries have been made since 1870.

As now constituted Tippah County contains about 446 square miles, bounded as follows:

"Boginning at a point on the state boundary line with Tonnessoe one mile east of the line between ranges two and three east; thence east on said state boundary line to the line between ranges four and five east; thence south on said range line to the line between townships two and three south; thence east on said township line to the northwest corner of section two, township three south, range five east; thence south on section lines to the southwest corner of section two, township four, range five east; thence east on section lines to the line between ranges five and six east; thence south on said range lines to the line between townships five and six south; thence west on said township lines to the southeast corner of section thirty-three, township five, range two east; thence north on section lines to the southeast corner of section sixteen, township three, range two east; thence east on section lines to the line between ranges two and three cast; thence north on said range line to the line between townships two and three south; thence east on said township line to the southeast corner of section thirty-one, township 2, range three east; thence north on section lines to beginning."6

## Physical Sotting

The underlying geological formations of Tippah County are coastal plain deposits of Mesozoic and Conozoic agos, which dip toward the west at the rate of about 30 feet to the mile. Fow areas of comparable size afford such

a wide variety of outcrops as those found in the county, as is shown in the table here given;

The Ripley, one of the most widespread formations of the Upper cretaceous, is named for the county seat of Tippah County. 8 The Owl Crock takes its name from a bluff on Owl Creek, 3 miles northeast of Ripley, which has been since 1856 a classic collecting ground for Cretaceous fossils.

These underlying formations, widely different among themselves, are responsible for the varied topography and soils of the county. Topographically, the area is divided into 4 belts running approximately north and south: the Hatchie hills (generally considered a part of the Pontotoc Ridge) to the east, the Pontotoc Ridge proper, the Flatwoods, and, in the western edge, the North Central Hills. The Hatchie Hills are notably rugged, being dissected largely from the McNairy sand member of the Ripley formation. The Pontotoc Ridge is underlaid by the limestones and marls of the Clayton formation, and drops toward the west with the normal dip of the formation to approximately the line of the Gulf, Mobile, and Ohio railroad. There it gives way to the Flatwoods, a low, comparatively level region 4 to 6 miles wide, underlaid by the gray, sticky Portors Crock clay, known locally by the apt if unscientific name of "scapstone." West of the Flatwoods the sands of the Ackerman and Holly Springs formations from high red hills. 10

The best soils of the county are those of the Pontetee Ridge, which support splendid growths of timber and made good farming land. The Flatwoods soil is cold, stiff, and hard to cultivate; the Hatchie and North Central Hills, due to their sand composition, are comparatively infertile and particularly subject to crosion.

Tippah County lies in 2 drainage areas: that of the Hatchie to the north,

and that of the Tallahatchie to the south. The divide between the two follows roughly the Dumas- Ripley and Ripley-Saulsbury roads. The Hatchic and its tributaries flow north into Tennessee, where the main stream turns west and ompties into the Mississippi about 50 miles north of Momphis. The Tallahatchie and its tributaries flow south, joining the Yazoo at Greenwood. Tippah Crock, one of the tributaries of the Tallahatchie, flows west through Tippah and Benton Counties before joining the main stream, being separated from it by the long ridge running east and west through Blue Mountain.

The rainfall of the county averages 54 inches, distributed evenly throughout the year with some proponderance in the fall and winter months. The maximum summer temperature is about 100 degrees, while winter low temperatures vary considerably from year to year with an average of about 15 degrees.

No wild animals are at present found in the county, though the forests formerly supported great numbers of deer, bears, panthers, welves, and smaller beasts. Welves were formerly such a scourge that as late as 1876 the board of supervisors paid a bounty of \$2 50 to \$5 00 for their scalps. 12

Parts of the county, particularly the Blue Mountain ridge and the Hatchie Hills, afford some of the most beautiful scenery in Mississippi.

## Indian Poriod

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The region of which Tippah County is now a part belonged until 1832 to the Chickasaw Indians, who retained their control even after Mississippi had been admitted to the Union in 1817. They were a comparatively small tribe, related to the Chectaws, and belonging to the Muskhogean family. 13 Attempts to trace their origin to the Toltees appear to be based on the presence in their territory of a number of rectangular mounds; but there is no proof that the Chickasaws built those mounds, which probably antedate their coming to the state.

Despite much fiction masquerading as history to the contrary, the Chickasaws were in fact savages differing but little from other Indian tribes. They were, on the whole, smaller in stature and more meral in their habits than the northern tribes. Though they were magnificent fighters, as the French and Spaniards, learned to their sorrow, they were nevertheless indelent to an extreme degree. 14 They had no written language, no songs or poetry, and only rudimentary ideas of religion and of healing, both of which were left to witches. They lived in houses usually about 16' x 22' in size, made of poles and covered with clapboards. 15 They had several large towns along the route of the Natchez trace, and particularly in later times traded considerably with the English and Americans. Much European silver, and chinaware and beads made in England especially for the Indian trade, have been found in their graves. 16

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On festive occasions, such as national councils or ball plays, the appearanco of the Chickasaw braves was indeed striking:

"The head is, on a hot summer day, bound with a handkerchief; over it a thick binding of fulled cloth, covered with brooches. To the nose hang six bobs, and one in each ear, the cuter curl of which is slit and wrapped in silver. One bunch of hair is tied on the top of the head, to which is fastened in seven locks the hair of a deer's tail dyed rod, bound in silver; this hangs over the face and eyes. The face is painted with streaks and spots of rod and black; the board is pulled out; the nock adorned with a dozon strings of beads of various sorts and a silk handkorchief. There is a bunch of white feathers fastened to the back part of the neck; if a person of note, a black feather. The arms and wrists are adorned with silver bands, the body and arms with a calico shirt. The dress of the lower limbs is various. Lost the dress or coloring become discomposed an Indian always carries his glass in his pocket or hanging from his side. "17

None of the important events in Chickasaw history took place within the present limits of Tippah County, which was north of their main settlements and sparsely inhabited. A large number of artifacts, mostly arrow heads, of Indian manufacture, have been found in the county but nothing of mere than ordinary value. The most interesting aboriginal romains are the sories of rook mounds in the Hatchie Hills, the age of which is undetermined. These are conical in shape, made of rough uncut forruginous sandstone, and are from 10 to 40 feet in diameter and 2 to 10 feet high. They are always found on high ground, and in locations which command a wide view. They are probably sepulchral, 18 but owing to a former idea that they contained treasure, it has been impossible to find one that had not been entered, and scientific exploration is difficult. The presence of these mounds in the Hatchie Hills, and their absence elsewhere, is explained by the fact that the rock from which they are made is abundant in that region and unknown elsewhere in the county.

An old Indian trail from the Pontotoc settlements to Tonnessee is followed by the eld New Albany-Ripley and Ripley-Saulsbury reads, which follow the ridges in typical Indian fashion. 19 A few Indian names persist. The name of the county is Chickasaw, meaning "cut off," and was probably taken from the creek of the same name. The tale of the princess Tip-pah, bride of the chief Pon-te-te-ka, is romantically appealing but definitely unproved. The names of the 2 largest streams of the county, Hatchie and Tallahatchie, mean "river" and "rocky river" respectively. An unusual name is that of Lukesaspa Crock, which means "Reast Terrapin Crook." There are also a number of names ending in "-nubbee," such as Ashpanubboo Crock. These commomorate a family of Christian Indians who lived near Ripley about the time of the Chickasaw Cossien. The Nubbin Ridge read, familiar in Tippah history, is a corruption of "Nubboo".

## Early Settlement

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A few white men, mostly traders, moved into the Chickasaw cession in the early part of the mineteenth century. Among them were L. T. McKinza; later the first assessor and tax collector of Tippah County; Daniel Ragan, who kept a trading post about a mile east of Ripley; and M. G. L. McCarley, an Indian agent. Rev. T. C. Sturat, who had founded a mission near Pontotoe in 1821, preathed regularly to the Indians at an outdoor "stand" about 22 miles east of Ripley, at the present site of Moses Chapel.

Indian dominion in Mississippi ended on October 20, 1832, when Gen. John Coffee negotiated with a general council of the Chickasaws the Treaty of Pontotoc Creck. Under its terms the Chickasaws coded 6,283,908 acres to the United States, it being agreed that the tribe would be paid the amount recoived from the sale of the lands, less actual expenses, and that the Indians would be removed to Indian Territory. In number of the tribe was estimated at 5,000 by the War Department, at 10,000 by the Chickesaws themselves. After the signing of a supplementary treaty at Washington on May 24, 1934, the cossion was surveyed, a land office opened at Pontotoc, and the sale of lands to settlers begun. The Indians were removed before 1840.

The government patents do not show the prices paid for land, the only record in Tippah County being copies of 2 receipts giving prices of \$1 25 and \$4 26 an acre respectively. 22 Deeds made by Indians selling the lands which they had obtained under Article 5 of the Treaty of Washington, show considerations ranging from 95% to \$4 00 an acro, the average being about \$1 25.23 As Benjamin Roynolds, the agent for the Chickasaws, looked out for his wards! interests, these prices may be considered as fair. All deeds from Indians contain a statement signed by 2 or more chiefs to the effect that the soller is competent to handle his own affairs, and the certificate of the agent that the price is fair and has been paid. Most of the Tippah County Indian doods are attested by George Colbert, Isaac Alberson, Benjamin Love, James Colbert, Honry Love, or Ish-te-ha-to-pa as chiofs, by Bonjamin Roynolds as agent, and by William Carroll as examining agent. 25

The county's first settlers came mostly from Tennessee, though some immigrated from the Carolinas, Georgia, and Alabama. Scotch-Irish and German strains predominated, with the Presbyterian, Cumberland Presbyterian, Methe odist, and Baptist faiths accounting for most of the church membership.2

The rate of settlement is indicated by a census taken in 1837, which shows a population of 3,823 whites and 1,257 slaves.27

For several years after the county was organized, there was much speculation in land, particularly in tracts acquired by speculators from the Indians. Among the larger speculators were the New York and Memphis Land Company; the New York, Boston, and Chickasaw Land Company; Anderson and Orne; the North Carolina Chickasaw Land Company; and a large number of individuals. 28

## County Organization

The first election of officers was held April 25 and 26, 1836, 29 at which the following officers were elected: W. M. Wofford, Sheriff; Hardy W. Stricklin, circuit clerk; Edmund J. Bailey, probate clerk; E. A. Ferguson, probate jduge; L. T. McKinza, assessor and tax collector; Alexander McKinza, ranger; Hardin Joyce, coroner; and Floming Teary, treasurer. The first State senator was Samuel Matthews; the first representative, Robert Warren. 30

In 1836 and 1838 the board of police bought 3 adjoining tracts of land near the geographical center of the county for a county site. 31 On May 9, 1837, the town of Ripley was incorporated. 32 While the derivation of its name cannot be stated with certainty, it is probable that it was named for Gen. Eleazar Wheelock Ripley, a prominent Jackson Democrat who had died in Louisiana in 1836.33 The board of police located the courthouse near the eneter of its holdings, donated building sites to the various churches of the community, 34 and sold the remaining lots.

The governing body of the county was the board of police of 5 members, 1 from each police beat or district. 35 Its duties were much the same as those of the present board of supervisors created in 1870.36 The foundation of the court system was the justice of the peace courts, which have remained substantially unchanged to the present; a probate court, 37 handling estate matters, whose jurisdiction was turned over to the chancery court by the Constitution of 1869; 38 and a circuit court which until 1856 had jurisdiction over certain matters now handled in chancery. In 1856 the chancery court was organized with the judge of the circuit court as chancellor, this arrangement continuing in effect until the Constitution of 1869 was adopted. 40

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The records of the Tippah County chancery court are complete from 1856 to date. The record books of the circuit court go back to 1844, the files to 1865. Probate court records, not complete, cover the years 1851-70. Of the county court which functioned from 1865 to 1870, 41 few records have been

The extant records of the board of police and its successor, the board of supervisors, begin with January, 1859. At that time most of the records related to roads, to poor relief, and to the Patrol law designed to keep close watch on slaves and prevent their escape. For this purpose the county was, in 1859, divided into 17 districts, with a Patrol Leader in each, charged with "patrolling his district at least once a week, oftener if necessary."42 Other items of business were the fixing of tolls on bridges and turnpikes, of which there were 2 in the county; authorizing the building of water mills on streams and specifying the head of water allowed; 44 granting of licenses to sell liquor; 45 supervising the lending of school fund money, 46 and other routine duties. Taxes were levied on the State tax as a base. The tax rate in 1859 was 90 percent of the State tax for county purposes; 16 percent for pauper expenses, and 9 percent for payment of the probate judge's salary.

In 1860 the population of the county was 22,550.48 The personal assessment roll of that year shows, among other items, \$205,456 leaned at interest; merchandise stocks totalling 3176,703; 348 pleasure carriages valued at \$38,-920; 438 watches assessed at \$14,669; 35 pianes, at \$7,590; and 5,468 slaves under 60 years of age. The largest number of these owned by one person was the 90 assessed to F. T. Leak of Salem. The tax on slaves was 75% each, and the only free negro who lived in the county paid \$1 00. A total of 2,370 polls were assessed at 40¢ each. The total taxes on personal property due for that year, as shown by the recapitulation, were: State tax, 36,589,98; county tax, \$4,612.99; pauper tax, \$1,581.60; and tax for the probate judge's salary, \$395,39.49

## Civil War

After the outbreak of the Civil War, Tippah County furnished a large number of troops to the Confederate armies. Early in 1861 several companies were sent to Virginia, where they were formed into the Second Mississippi Regiment, commanded first by Col. W. C. Falkner of Ripley, later by Col. John M. Stone. This regiment distinguished itself at First Manassas and remained in Virginia throughout the war. Later in 1861, the Third Mississippi Regiment, composed

entirely of Tippah County troops except for 1 company, was organized under Col. T. J. Davidson of Ripley. This force fought at Fort Donelson. Another Tippah unit was the First Partisan Rangers, commanded first by Col. Lawson B. Hovis. In 1864 this regiment was incorporated into the 7th Mississippi, under Col W. C. Falkner, and formed part of Forrest's army. Another company, commanded by Capt. Sol Street, waged a guerilla warfare with the Federals during the last 2 years of the war. 50

The board of police first tock official notice of the state of war at its meeting in May, 1861, when it appropriated \$3,000 for the relief of families 51 of soldiers in the Confederate service and appointed committees to administer the fund. In August of the same year 52 a tax of 100 percent of the State tax was levied for this military relief, and loan warrants not to exceed \$8,000 in amount and bearing 8 percent interest were issued in anticipation of the collection of the tax. In the following January 50 percent of this tax was revoked. 53 The fund was maintained after a fashion throughout the war, though the difficulty of obtaining supplies and provisions at reasonable rates led, in March, 1864, to an order authorizing the sheriff to make impressment of such supplies and provisions as were absolutely necessary. 54

In July, 1861, the board requisitioned all arms in the gounty, which were acted at Ripley and Salem, valued, and sent to Jackson. Two months later collected at Ripley and Salem, valued, and sent to Jackson. a requisition for one-fourth of the negro slaves in the county, 56 who were to be sent to Fort Pillow to build fortifications, reached Ripley. In 1862 the war reached the county in earnest. Between June 27 of that year and March 25, 1865, the town of Ripley was raided by Federal troops 61 times, the forces ranging from a squad to an army of 10,000,<sup>57</sup> Ripley's experience being typical of that of the county. On July 9, 1864, an army under Gen. A. J. Smith burned a large part of the town, including the courthouse. 58 Many county records were lost at this time; but W. W. Robinson, clerk of the probate court, had previously taken all the land doed records and the more recent court and marriago records to a point near Dumas, where they remained hidden until the war was over.

Though the board attempted to earry on the county business, war conditions made this increasingly difficult. No meetings were held between May, 1862, and February, 1863, nor between March and December, 1863. The January and February 1864 meetings were held in private residences in the county; the March to July meetings in the courthouse. No meeting was held in August, the courthouse having been burned July 9. From September, 1864, until July, 1867, Hist

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the Baptist and Presbyterian churches were used as courthouses. <sup>59</sup> A 2-story building on the south side of the square was then rented from W. W. Robinson at \$425.00 a year <sup>60</sup> until the courthouse was rebuilt in 1869. <sup>61</sup> For several years the beard deviced a tax of 100 percent of the State tax for that purpose. The specifications were spread on the minutes of the board, and called for a building erected on the foundations of, and built exactly like, the original building erected in 1838, <sup>62</sup> except for the addition of portices on the east and west rides. This structure, which cost \$19,500, stood until 1928, when it was enlarged and rebuilt at a cost of approximately \$55,000. <sup>65</sup>

#### Reconstruction

Though its population dropped from 20,175 in 1870 to 12,867 in 1880, 64 because of the loss of more than half its area, Tippah County suffered loss during the reconstruction period than many of its neighbors. This was in part due to the comparatively small negro population. Nevertheless, times were hard. The instability of the currency is indicated by an order fixing turnpike tells in 1866, wherein one price is set for payment in gold and another, about 50 percent higher, for greenbacks. 65 The county used "scrip" or State of Mississippi certificates of indebtedness to pay its own debts. 66 The widespread use of scrip and the low repute in which it was held are further shown by orders of the school directors that teachers should be paid in United States currency, and that holdings of Mississippi certificates of indebtedness be disposed of and turned into currency. 7 In 1870 persons holding warrants against the county were asked to present them to the treasurer for registration, "that the indebtedness of the county might be accurately determined."

Widwspread poverty is indicated by the high levies for pauper relief during this period. In 1866, for example, the tax levy was 40 percent of the State tax for common county purposes, 12½ percent for the salary of the probate judge, 15 percent for rent of courthosus and office space, 12½ percent for building bridges, and 70 percent for pauper relief. There was also a per capita tax of \$1 00 on all freedmen and mulattoes from 18 to 60 years of age, to be used as a "Freedman's Relief Fund." Despite some help from the collection of funds due Tippah from the newly-formed counties of Union and Benton, tax rates rose each year until 1874, when the rate, including State and county levies, reached 30½ Miles, the high mark for that period. The salary of the state and county levies,

Historical Sketch

In 1878 the board of supervisors adopted an act of the Legislature regulating the leasing of convicts 2 and leased the county convicts to certain individuals at \$2 00 per convict per month. The contractor was to feed, clothe, and guard the convicts, and the county was to pay any doctor's bills incurred by the prisoners. To Convict leasing remained the custom until it was abolished by the Constitution of 1890, The after which the county adopted the practice of working convicts on the public roads. To After being under consideration for working convicts on the public roads. 75 After being under consideration for 6 years 76 a new jail was built in 1896, 77 and proved continuously unsatisfactory until it was replaced by a modern concrete structure in 1938.

## Agriculture

Tippah County has been from the beginning almost entirely agricultural, the only industry of any size being the sawmill business which followed the cutting of the forests which formerly covered the entire area. The land has been cleared gradually; and since the topography makes the plantation system impracticable except in small areas, the land has always been cultivated to a large extent by its owners. In late years, however, the precentage of tenants has increased. At present one-third of the land is classed as cultivable, 79 and the county contains about 2,000 farms, mostly of small size.

Despite a large increase in cattle-raising curing the past few years, cotton romains the only important money crop. The growth of this staple, beginning with 413 bales in 1837, 0 increased rapidly until the Civil War, then fell to 7,474 bales in 1870. 81 This figure included all the original county. The building of the Ripley Railroad, which made shipping easign, is largely Not all of responsible for the 10,842 bales shipped from Ripley in 1883. this, however, was grown inside the county. In recent years the 1938 crop of 14,575 bales represents a fair average of the production. The bumper 1931 crop was more than 19,000 bales.

Until 1884 stock was allowed to run at large, entailing a large expense for the fencing of fields. In that year 85 a stock-law district was organized covering part of the county, and other districts were formed at intervals until 1892, when a stock-law election covering the entire county carried by a vote of 604 to 459.86 The next year all land embraced in the various stock-law territories, with some additions, was fromed into a no-fence district 87 which Hist

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o of rieventually grew to cover the entire county. An exasperating corollary of the stock law and its numerous fences was the great number of gates across the public roads, some of which were maintained until after 1903.88

About 1900 the periodic flooding of bottom lands after heavy rains, due to the rapid cutting of timber on the hills, became a serious problem. In 1910 the Muddy Bottom Swamp Land Drainage District was orgainzed to dig a channel for Muddy Creek in the northern part of the county and thereby improve the drainage of the bottom. 89 Later, other drainage districts were organized, until by 1929 every important stream in the county had been artificially channeled. This brought a great deal of the best land in the county into cultivation and has been on the whole beneficial, though the silting of the channels in recent years has again become a scrious problem.

## Railroads

On Jan. 5, 1870, the board of police ordered an election on the question of the county's subscribing \$2000,000 to the capital stock of the Ripley Railroad and issuing bonds for that amount. The order provided that the election should be held on Jan. 18; that \$120,000 was to be used to build track from Middleton to Ripley, and \$80,000 for track from Ripley to New Albany. It was further provided that the last named section should not deviate more than half a mile from an air line between the points named and must have two intermediate stations, one of which must be at Orizaba. This proposition was defeated 879 to 566.91 However, within 2 years a railroad was built from Middleton to Ripley by a local company, of which W. C. Falkner was prosident and R. J. Thurmond secretary and Treasurer. The first train over this line, which was built on a 3-foot gauge and laid with 36 pound rail, reached Ripley on August 27, 1872. In 1872 the road issued \$250,000 worth of bonds, the majority of which were acquired before 1887 by Falknor. His possession of and forcelosure on these bonds gave rise to the widespread legend that he had built the railroad. Hd did, in cooperation with the Gulf and Ship Island, build the line from Ripley south to New Albany and Pontotoe, and in 1889 acquired both lines, joining them into the Gulf and Chicago. This road in turn became a part of the Mobile, Jackson, and Kansas City which was completed and standardized from Mobile to Middleton about 1905. It is now a part of the Gulf, Mobile, and Ohio system.

Until the standardization of the read, the offices and shops were located at Ripley, and did more than any one thing to restore to the town the prosperity that the war had blasted.

#### Roads

The road problem in Tippah County has always been difficult. Most of the terrain is rugged, and the only reasonably level areas are underlaid by notoriously treachrous soil. Until comparatively recent years the roads were uniformly bad. For 80 years they were worked under the overseer system, each road being divided into links, and overseers and hands for each link appointed by the board of supervisors or, before 1870, by the board of police. On January 1, 1914, the first, second, and third supervisors districts changed to the contract system. 94 The fourth district followed on May 6, 1916, 95 and the fifth on May 1, 1918. 96 A commutation road tax was levied in each district as it left the overseer system. The roads romained dirt until 1925, when the first, second, and third districts were formed into separate road districts. 97 Within the next three years bonds totalling 400,000 were floated, and with Federal aid, 3 through gravel roads were built to Mississippi highway Department specifications.98 Those reads were later taken over by the highway department. Since 1935 the secondary reads have been steadily improved, many of them graveled, and the State highway largely relocated and rebuilt. At present the county is served by 3 main highways; U. S. 72 running east and west through Walnut; Mississippi 15 running north and south through Walnut, Ripley, and Blue Mountain; and Mississippi 4 running east and west through Ripley. The Gulf Transport Company operates buses on Mississippi 15, the Missouri-Arkansas Bus Company on U. S. 72.

### Education

From 1836 to 1870 education was almost entirely in private hands. As early as 1836 private acadomies were being organized at Salem and Ripley, and later citizens in other communities organized their own schools. Probably the best known of those early schools was the Ripley Female Academy, founded in 1850.1 It was managed by a board of trustees and taught by Ers. M. J. Buchanan until 1866. The building having been burned during the war, Mrs. Buchanan then purchased the property2 operated it personally, under the name of Stenovall College, until its building was again burned in 1883.

Other prominent early schools were the Ripley Institute, a boy's school, and Maple Springs Academy, located near Chalybeate. Few records of those early private schools have been preserved, though it is known that some of thom issued annual catalogs and were in other respects at loast equal to schools in the cities of the time. Stonewall College, for example, always had a large number of boarding students and competed on almost equal terms with schools in Memphis.

Tippah County has shared in the proceeds of the Chickasaw School Fund since it was set up in 1848, 3 the interest new amounting to \$2,975.32 annually.4 The few extant records indicate that until 1870 this fund was used to pay the tution, in private or somi-private schools, of children unable to pay the regular charges. This is evidenced by an order of the board of police in 1863, b making payments to teachers of private schools "for teaching beneficiaries." In 1870 another order provided that in the distribution of school funds the orphans and children of Confederate soldiers should have preference. 6 The fund appears to have been more than ample to meet the demands upon it, and the practice of lending the money on land security grow up. War conditions caused a heavy loss from this source, loans being charged off as late as 1886.

The school system set up by the Constitution of 1869 began to function in 1870. A common school tax of 5 mills levied that year, and additional lovios in cortain districts, 9 were the first school taxes in the county's history. The earliest school records, except for scattered entries in the Police Records, are the Minutes of the Board of School Directors, beginning in Docember 1872. This board set up 3 grades of schools, the salaries being set at \$25.00, and \$50.00, and \$75.00 monthly, payable in United States currency. The following rules were drawn up and ordered printed.

- The public schools of the county shall be taught five (5) days in the week and not loss than six (6) hours per day, three of which shall be in the foreneon and the other three in the afternoon.
- II. No teacher of any public school shall be paid full salary unless his average monthly attendance shall exceed fifteen; when it falls below this he shall be paid 10 cents,  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents or 15 cents for the a verage daily attendance of 3rd, 2nd, or 1st grade pupils.
- III. Toachers shall be responsible for the proper management and control of their schools and may adopt such rules therefore as they may doem necessary provided that they shall not have power to expel but may suspend a pupil for any miscenduct and report the matter immodiately to the Board of Directors.
- IV. All charges against teachers of public schools in this county shall be in writing and shall be signed by at least two patrons of the school, and shall be presented to the Board of Directors by the complainants in person. "10

At this time there were 49 public shoods in the county, 11 The amount spent for teachers was about \$12,000 annually; for buildings, most of which-White and colored schools were kept separate. were reated, about \$3,000. In 1875 the number of educable children in the county was given as 3,533, and the amount spent for teachers was about \$17,000.15

In 1877 the board of supervisors grouped the schools into 2 classes, with salaries of \$25.00 and \$35.00 a month respectively. 16 This scale romained in force for many years, except for occasional reductions of 10 percent. 17 The school term romained at 4 months 18 until increased to 5 months in 1892 and 6 months in 1893.20 Ninety-two schools were in operation in 1883, including Blue Mountain Female College, Blue Mountain Academy, Stonewall College, Ripley Institute, and Camp Ground Academy, which were taught 4 months as public schools, and the remainder of a 40-week term as private schools. 21 This shows both the connection between the private and public schools, and the gradual swallowing up of the former by the latter. By 1890 the private schools had become almost extinct.

Schools were mostly small affairs until about 1905, 22 when the formation of the Ripley and Blue Mountain Separate School Districts started a trend, which still continues, toward consolidation of districts, the construction of better buildings, and the general raising of standards. At the present time, in addition to 20 unconsolidated colored schools, there are 20 consolidated and 28 unconsolidated white schools in the county. 23 The number of educable children is 5,335 white and 1,225 colored, 24 and the budget for school purposes is \$128,335,85.25 The school term is now 8 menths.

In 1914 an agricultural High school was established at Chalybeate, 26 which was in operation until 1933, when it was discontinued and its proporty turned over to the Chalyboate Consolidated School. The county has no school of this type at present.

The only institution of higher learning in the county is Blue Mountain College for Women at Blue Mountain. This school was founded in 1873 by

M. P. Lowrey 27 and has experienced a steady growth until it is now an accredited college of high standing. Owned by the Lowrey family until 1920, 28 it is now owned and operated by the Baptist Church.

### Newspapers

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The first newspaper in Tippah County was the Ripley Transcript, edited by James B. Walker, which began problication in 1837. It was succeeded about 1842 by the Ripley Advertiser, 30 which was published until about 1895, though its appearance after 1890 was irregular. The only newspaper new published in the county is the Southern Sentinel, founded in 1879 by Capt. Thomas Spight and new owned and edited by W. H. Anderson. A number of other papers, including the Broadaxe, predecessor of the present Sentinel; the Ripley Standard, the Argus, the New Era, the Enterprise, and the Tippah County Times, have been published in the county for short periods. For about two years in the 1880's the Sentinel office also published a monthly farm magazine called the Southern Yooman.

"The White Rose of Momphis", a well-known nevel written by Col. W. C. Falkner of Ripley, was first published serially in the Advertisor in 1880 and 1881.

#### Towns

In 1838 there were 4 postoffices in Tippah County: Ripley, Salem, Spring Hill, and Alberson. Of these only Ripley remains, the other 3 being extinct and located outside the present limits of the county. About 1840 a considerable settlement grow up at Orizaba, on the Pentotee read, 7 miles south of Ripley and another at Jonesberough, in the northern part of the county. Orizaba became extinct about the time the railroad was built through Blue Mountain in 1886, and Jonesberough has been swallowed up by the present town of Chalybeate, about a mile from the old settlement. At present the incorporated towns are Walnut, Chalybeate, Ripley, and Blue Mountain; the larger unincorporated places are Brownfield, Tiplersville, Falkner, Cotten Plant, and Dumas. All of these except Chalybeate and Dumas are located on the line of the Gulf, Mobile, and Ohio Railroad.





#### LEGEND

All officers elected by popular vote serve four-year terms.

- (1) Two regular sessions of six days each held annually. Chancellor is elected for a four-year term.
- (2) Two regular sessions of 12 days each held annually. Judge of circuit court is elected for a four-year term.
- (3) Five members, one elected from each supervisor's district.
- (4) Three or five members from each school district, elected by electors of the school district. Three or five year terms, one member elected annually.
- (5) Five members, one from each supervisor's district; one member elected annually by trustees of all schools in county. Five-year term. County superintendent of education is ex officio president.
- (6) Not more than 20 nor less than 15 designated at each criminal session of circuit court from the first 20 names drawn from a list of 62 names, which 62 are drawn from a list of not more than 800 nor less than 200 persons eligible to serve as jurers selected annually by the board of supervisors.
- (7) Seven members; a qualified elector from each of the 5 supervisor's districts, a world war veteran, and the county attorney. Indefinite term.
- (8) In charge of one county agent and one home demonstration agent appointed by the board of supervisors on recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and approved by the United States Department of Agriculture. Indefinite term.
- (9) Five members, one from each supervisor's district, appointed for one-year terms by the board of supervisors as prescribed by the State Department of Public Welfare.
- (10) Appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners which designates the clerk of the circuit court unless it considers him an improper person.
- (11) Three members, appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners. Two-year term.
- (12) Appointed at direction of State Board of Hoalth. Two-year term.
- (13) Appointed by Division of Vital Statistics of State Board of Health. Indefinite term.



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### 2. GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION

## Logal Status of the County E THE ABILE STREET STREET WAS ASSETTED TO BE A STREET OF THE BEAUTY OF THE STREET OF TH

The county in Mississippi, as in other commenwealths, is a territorial area established by the State government for convenience of administration. 1 The State Supreme Court has ruled that a "county is a governmental agency, ereated for local purposes" by the State. 2 According to the court, "the countics of this State are in certain respects municipal corporations, charged with the duty of making previsions for the building of bridges and the making of roads, and this duty is committed to the board of supervisors of the respective couunties, and their duties in this respect are defined by statute." The county is mentioned many times in the Constitution of 1890 and its existence is clearly taken for granted, yet counties are not created by the Constitution nor given any powers by it. This fact has led the Supreme Court to say that the "powers of . . . the county are statutory . . . But the county is not a municipal corporation in all respects; it is really a quasi-municipal corporation, for in regard to its liability to be sued it partakes of the immunity of the State itself. A county, with us, has certain prorogatives and judicial powers, and with respect to the exercise of such powers it may not ordinarily be sued. But a county is also, for many purposes, a corporation. Our laws provide that a county may hold property, may sue and be sued, etc.; and in these respects it is a corporation, or at least is clothed with corporate functions in relation to such subjects. "3 wolver has not desilved to brand to Tax Commissioner in equalistic

The county may"sue and be sued, but the Supreme Court has ruled that a county is immune from liability to the same extent that the State is, and unless statute authorizes a suit the county cannot be held liable. The Legislature has authorized suits against the county by previding that when a person having a just claim against the county has presented it to the Board of supervisors and the board has refused to allow it, the claimant may appeal from the judgment of the board to the circuit court, or may bring suit against the county.

With respect to the creation of counties, the Constitution of 1890 provides that "No new county shall be formed unless a majority of the qualified electors voting in each part of the county or counties proposed to be dismembered and embraced in the new county, shall separately vote therefor. . . The elections shall

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not be held in any county oftener than once in four years. No new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles, nor shall any existing county be reduced below that size." The Constitution also permits the Legislature to provide for the consolidation of existing counties if a majority of the qualified electors of the counties to be consolidated vote in favor of the consolidation. Apparently the Legislature cannot abolish a county without the consent of a majority of the qualified voters in the area concerned, but it may, however, change the boundaries of any county without the consent of the local electorate.

## General Administration ogga to be and out to be the sense of

From the creation of Tippah County to the present time the general executive supervision and control have been vested first in the board of police, and, later, in the board of supervisors. These bodies have had complete authority in all matters of county police and full jurisdiction over roads, ferries, and bridges. If Certain duties concerning the registration of titles to property have been assigned to the board of police and the board of supervisors. It These bodies have participated in law enforcement, and the members of the board of supervisors are conservators of the peace.

With respect to taxation, the board of supervisors fixes the tax levy and the clerk of the board certifies the proper officials. The board of supervisors is the board of equalization and review, and since 1916 has cooperated with the State Tax Commissioner in equalizing the assessments as between counties. 12 The clerk of the board prepares the rells and distributes copies to the proper officials. After the sheriff as tax collector has collected the county taxes, he reports his collections and deposits to the board of supervisors and to the clerk of the board as auditor.

In the expenditure of county funds the board of supervisors and the clork of the board as auditor have important functions. All claims, accounts, and demands against the county must be presented to the board for its approval or disapproval. The board and the clork of the board as auditor audits all claims. The clork of the board as auditor audits the accounts of all county officers, but his own accounts and those of the other officers are subject to audit annually by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. The board of supervisors has power and sutherity to issue county and county-district bonds and must issue bonds when such issuance is authorized by popular vote.

The board of supervisors has important duties in conducting elections for county officers. The board, together with the county education officials, is charged with administering the county educational program.

The board of supervisors and the county health officer, under the suporvision of the State Board of Health, have administered the public health program. 16 The administration of public welfare comes within the powers and duties of the board of supervisors. The members of the board also have individual powers and dutics in this connection.

The construction and maintenance of roads, bridges, public buildings, and all public works is the duty of the board of supervisors.

The board of supervisors appoints agents of the agricultural extension and domenstration work on the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College, and subject to the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture, and furnishes quarters for them. 18

The board co supervisors is also required to furnish all officers and offices with record books and supplies and is responsible for the upkeep of the records of the county, although each officer is charged with keeping his records in order. 19

## Registration of Title to Proporty

Every conveyance of real or personal property, to be valid and to serve as constructive notice to subsequent purchasers, must be lodged for recording with the clork of the chancery court as recorder and must be acknowledged as his voluntary act by the person who executed it, or proved by 1 or more of the subscribing witnesses to the instument. The acknowledgement or proof must be in writing on the instrument and must be signed by the officer before whom made.

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, 227. 4, 340 2-3169 Codo soc. 25 The circuit court and the chancery court have concurrent jurisdiction in cases of juvenile delinquency. 37 In Tippah County this function is exerciscd by the circuit court.

Appeals from the judgments and decrees rendered in justice of the peace courts may be taken to the circuit court, 38 and appeals from the judgments and decrees of the circuit and chancery courts may be made to the Supreme Court. 39

## Law Enforcement .

The sheriff is the principal officer charged with the preservation of the peace. 40 However, constables have the same duty, 41 and if there is a vacancy. in the office of sheriff, for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, the coroner performs all the duties of the sheriff except that of collecting taxes. 42 In the event the office of sheriff is vacant for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, and there is no coroner, the circuit judge or the chancellor may appoint some qualified elector of the county to perform the duty of coroner in this regard. 43 All members of the board of supervisors, 44 the circuit judge, the chancellor, and all justices of the peace of the county are conservators of the peace.

The coroner is required to hold inquests of all violent and sudden deaths accounty, 46 but if there is no coroner or the coroner is unable to act, in the county,

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any justice of the peace may hold an inquest and perform all the duties of the coroner.

The power and duty of returning indictments and presentments is given to the grand jury.

Arrests for crimes and offenses may be made by the sheriff, his deputies, or by any constable or conservator of the peace within his county, or by the marshall or policeman of any city, town, or village within the county. Private persons may also make arrests under certain conditions. All persons, when commanded to do so by an officer seeking to arrest an offender, must aid and assist in making the arrest and must obey the commands of the arresting officer. Arrests for criminal offenses and to prevent a breach of the peace may be made at any time and at any place. An officer or private person may make arrests without warrant for an indictable offense committed, a breach of the peace threatened or attempted in his presence, and for a felony committed. An arresting officer or private person, may after giving notice of his object, and admittance is refused, break into any dwelling or house in which he has reason to believe the offender may be found. Escaped offenders may be retaken by the person from whose custody they escaped, at any time and in any county wothout warrant. All offenders apprehended must be taken before the proper officer without unnecessary delay by the person making the arrest. All officers and others who make arrests legally as authorized and required by law are not liable to a civil or criminal action although it may appear that the person arrested was innocent or any offense. Warrants issued by justices of the peace extend to other counties, and justices of the peace may issue warrants for the arrest and return of any escaped offender to the county in which his offense is cognizable. The sheriff and constables may pursue offenders into other counties and in returning prisoners, may place them in any jail for safe-

The sheriff is the county jailer and has custody of all prisoners. 50 He is required to receive and keep any prisoner committed by any justice of the peace, 51 and he must receive and keep prisoners committed under legal process from officers of the courts of the United States, if the subsistance of such

prisoners is secured by the officers delivering the prisoners to him. 52 The sheriff must see that prisoners have medical attention and he must protect them from mob violence.

The district attorney must appear in circuit court, and in the name of the State prosecute all criminal prosecutions, and all persons or corporations for any violation of the Constitution or State laws, and he must attend grand jury deliberations when required to do so by the jury, to give necessary information as to the law. 54 The county prosecuting attorney represents the State in the justices of the peace courts, assists the district attorney in all criminal cases, and represents the State before the grand jury. 55

The sheriff as the executive officer of the court, is required to execute all sentences imposed by the court.  $^{56}$ 

#### Finance

It was not until 1922, according to the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor, 57 that the first real effort at budgetary control was made in Tippah County. The law of 1922 made it mandatory on the board of supervisors at its September meeting, to prepare and adopt a budget of county expenses estimated for the next year, and to prepare a statement showing the aggregate revenue by sources collected during the current year. In 1924 the State Auditor of Public Accounts was directed to prescribe a uniform system of accounts for State and county offices and he was required to inspect their accounts regularly. Further, the law made it mandatory that all counties adopt the prescribed system of accounting. Accordingly, in 1928, a uniform system of accounting for counties, including a detailed outline for the county budget, was prescribed by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. The expenditure of all county offices and departments are subject to budgetary control. Since 1936 the superintendent of education has been required to prepare and

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file with the State Superintendent of Education, a budget of the expenditures for the support, maintenance, and operation of the public schools of the county for each fiscal year, and a statement of all available revenues. Likewise, the trustees of the consolidated school districts, special consolidated school districts, and all other school districts maintaining a special tax lovy must prepare and file with the county superintendent of education, a budget of estimated expenditures and a statement of estimated revenues for each county school budget which he submits to the State Superintendent of Public Education. 62 fiscal year. The superintendent must attach copies of these budgets to the

The revenue of the county is derived mainly from ad valorem taxes levied on all real and personal property and from license taxes. All classes of property are liable to taxation unless specifically exempt. The following classes are exempt: Public property, privately ewned property devoted to educational pruposes, privately owned property devoted to religious and charitable purposes, household equipment and personal effects, agricultural property, intangible personal property, lands and other property situated between the Mississippi River and the levees, and land classified for reforestation. 63

The board of supervisors may exempt, for 5 years, subject to popular roferendum, hotels and many specified new factories and industries of public utility from county ad valorom taxes. 4 In 1934 Legislature exempted homesteads and 40 acres of land from state ad valorem taxes to the extent of \$1,000 and the law of 1935 increased the exemption from state ad valorem taxes to  $\hat{\phi}2,5000$  and 160 acres of land. The Home Exemption Act of 1938 exempted to the extent of \$5,000 and 160 acres of land, all bona fide homes owned and actually lived in, from all State ad valorem taxes and from all county, road district, and school district maintenance taxes. 66 Each of the acts directed that all claims for exemption be made to the board of supervisors through the tax assessor, and the board is empowered and required to adjudicate all claims.

The board of supervisors fixes the general tax levy annually. 68 In addition, it imposes a number of separate property taxes, some mandatory, others

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optional. It may lovy a special tax for creeting, enlarging, repairing, or remodeling county buildings, and it has power to impose a special tax for maintaining the county public schools outside separate school districts. The board must lovy taxes in the various school and districts of the county for supplementing the county funds, and for other purposes, if potitioned to do so by the qualified electors of any districts. The board must also lovy special taxes to pay the interest on county or county-district bonds and provide sinking funds for their redemption. It must also lovy a special tax to meet loans made in anticipation of taxes. 69

After the tax levy has been made, the clerk of the beard of supervisors cortifies it to the sheriff as tax collector, to the State Auditor of Public Accounts, to the State Land Commissioner, and also to the State Tax Commission. 70

The tax assessor is required to make an annual assessment of the polls and of all personal property in the county subject to taxation, and a biennial assessment of all real property in the county subject to taxation. The real and personal rolls must be completed and delivered to the board of supervisors on or before the first Monday in July. The board of supervisors is required to equalize and review the tax assessments at its July meeting and within 10 days of its August meeting, and on completing the equalization, must approve the assessments subject to the rights of persons in interest to be heard on objections. The August meeting of the board must be devoted to hearings and determining all objections and exceptions filed by persons dissatisfied with the assessments. It is the duty of the board to send the rolls to the State Tax Commission for final correction and equalization. The Commission equalizes the assessments as between counties with regard to the

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different classes of property and returns the rolls to the board subject to the hearing of objections from that body.

After the assessment rolls have been accepted and corrected by the board, the clark of the board must make 2 copies, delvier 1 copy to the sheriff as tax collector, another to the State Tax Commission, and keep the original in his office as a permanent record. The real and personal property of public service corporations in the county is assessed by the State Tax Commission and after the assessments are equalized and reviewed, the commission forwards a copy of the rolls to the clerk of the board of supervisors who makes a copy and delivers it to the sheriff as tax collector, retaining the original as a permanent record of his office.

The sheriff as tax collector, after receiving the tax rolls from the clork of the board of supervisors, collects both State and county taxes. He is required to make monthly reports of collections to the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor and to the State Auditor of Public Accounts and at the same time he must pay over State taxes collected to the State Treasurer and county taxes collected to the county depository.

It is the duty of the sheriff as tax collecter to soll both real and personal property on which taxes are delinquent. Redemption of lands sold for taxes must be made through the clork of the chancery court as recorder who remits redemption monies to the proper officials.

Liconso taxes are imposed by the State and county on practically every occupation and proffession, and are collected for the State by the sheriff as

tax collector. 80 The county is authorized and required to collect through the sheriff as tax collector and for its own use, an annual lienese fee from all owners of motor vehicles in the county. The sheriff as tax collector remits occupational license fees collected to the State Treasurer, and the 82 motor vehicle or road and bridge privilege taxes to the county depository.

The county has several sources of miscellaneous revenue. The board of supervisors has control of the money paid the county from the Chickasaw school . fund. 83 Another source of revenue is the money derived from fines, ponalties, and forfeitures imposed in the courts of the county. The clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor debits the sheriff with all jury taxes, fines, ponalitics, and forfeitures reported to him by the clorks of the courts, and the sheriff is required to collect and pay the amount charged him into the county treasury.84 The county highway fund is supplemented by a substantial share of the State tax levied on gasoline sold in the county.85 The poll taxes collected in the county are returned to it by the State Auditor of Public Accounts for the benefit of the common school fund, 86 and the county receives a portion of the State equalization fund for the use of the county schools. 87 Federal aid is received to carry on a program of agricultural and home domonstration

All claims, accounts, and domands against the county must be presented to the board of supervisors. The board, together with the clerk of the board as auditor, audits the claims and the clark, on the order of the board, issues warrants on the county depository in payment of all claims which are approved by the beard. 89 It is the duty of the county depository to make quarterly

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reports of all receipts and disbursements and to return with the reports, all cancelled warrants which the clork of the board as auditor must file and preserve as a public record. SO

The clerk of the board as auditor must audit county officers' accounts regularly. In addition the State Auditor of Public Accounts is empowered to audit and examine the accounts of all county officers at least once a year. He is particularly charged with auditing the allowances and expenditures made by the board of supervisors.

Bhe board of supervisors has power and authority to issue bonds for general county purposes, for creeting and maintaining schools, for refunding outstanding bond issues, for constructing and maintaining roads and bridges, for moeting outstanding warrants and other logal obligations, for establishing and maintaining a county convict farm, and for creeting and maintaining a courthouse and a jail.

#### Elections

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A person to qualify as an elector must be a citizen of the United States; at least 21 years of age; a resident of the State for 2 years, and of the district in which he is offering to vote for 1 year; must be able to read any section of the Constitution of the United States, or if he cannot read, understand and give a reasonable interpertation of it; must never have been convicted of bribery, burglary, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods underfalse pretenses, perjury, forgery, embezzlement, or bigamy; must have paid all taxes legally required of him, and be able to produce satisfactory evidence of such payment to the officers holding an election; and must be registered as prescribed by law.

Prospective electors must register with the eleck of the circuit court as registrar who examines them as to their qualifications and requires them to

swear they possess the necessary qualifications to vote, and that they are not disqualified because of conviction for any crime.

The county board of election commissioners is required, before every election, to revise or purge the registration books and poll books kept by the clerk of the circuit court as registrar. 96

A candidate for public office must be a qualified elector, and in addition, must not deny the existence of a Supreme Being, although he is not required to meet any religious test as a qualification for office; must not have boen convicted of bribery, prejury, or any other infamous crime, or of giving or offering directly or indirectly any bribe to procure the election or appointment of a person to office; and must not have participated in a duel or served as a second to a duelist.

The Corrupt Practice Act of 1935 requires that candidates for State, district, county, and county-district offices make affidavit that they have read the Corrupt Practice Act and that they will not violate it. The act also requires candidates for county and county-district offices to file with the clerk of the circuit court itemized statements of their campaign expenses, and it prohibits candidates from promising appointments to office or their influence in other ways, and sets up rigid restrictions against verbal or printed attacks on opponents during the campaign. 98

All officers elected or appointed to office in the State, except judges and members of the Legislature must take the following eath before entering upon the duties of their offices; "I do solomly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Mississippi and obey the laws thereof; that I am not disqualified from holding office; and I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office upon which I am about to enter. So help me God. "99

The county board of election commissioners is charged with the preparation of ballots for elections. 1

Conoral elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers are held every fourth year on the first Tuesday after the first Monday Gove

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in November. Primary elections for party nominations of officers are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August preceding the general elections, and are governed and regulated by the election laws in ferce at the time the elections are held, with the county executive committee discharging the duties of the county board of election commissioners, except revising the registration and pell books. As only one major party functions in Mississippi, the Democratic, nomination at primary elections is tantameunt to election. When no candidate receives a majority of the votes east, second primaries or run-off elections are held three weeks after the first primary, between the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes. Special elections for unexpired terms are called by the county board of election commissioners on order of the board of supervisors, if the unexpired term is for more than 6 months.

It is the duty of the sheriff to provide equipment for pelling places and he must furnish a sufficient number of voting compartments, shelves, and tables, so that there shall be not less than one of each for each 100 electors in the district.

The county board of election commissioners, appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners, is required to appoint the managers of elections. It is also the duty of the county commissioners to appoint bailiffs to preserve order at the polls.

The votes east in primary elections are counted and tallied at each pelling place by the election managers who cortify thr results and soal all ballots and a certified copy of the result in the boxes. The boxes are delivered to the county executive committees. This committee canvases and reviews all boxes and deposits the boxes with the clerk of the circuit court as registrar.

The votes cast in general elections are delivered in the same manner by the election commissioners to the county board of election managers which canvasses and reviews the boxes and delivers them to the clerk of the circuit court as registrar. 10

With respect to party nominations of presidential electors, each political partyll in Tippah County is entitled to 2 delegates to its State convention held every 4 years to select the electors. These delegates are chosen by county delegate conventions held every 4 years. Delegates to the county convention are elected at precinct elections called by the county executive committee, and are apportioned equally along the supervisor's districts or among the precincts of the county in proportion to the number of votes cast by the party at the preceding presidential election.12

#### Education

County agencies which participate in the administration of the school program are the superintendent of education, the county school board, and the board of supervisors. The county is divided into school districts of three different types; common school districts, consolidated school districts, and municipal separate school districts, with boards of trustees for each.13

Separate schools are maintained for children of the white and colored races. 14 All colored schools in the county are common schools.

The schools in the county are supported by county taxes, by poll taxes collected and retained in the county, by the State per capita fund, by the State equalizing fund, by local district taxes which the people impose on themselves, and by the interest on the Chickasaw school fund.

The superintendent, whose duties are administrative rather than supervisory, controls the county school fund composed of State money, county school taxes, and poll taxes; fixes the salaries of teachers; appoints teachers when the local trustees do not select and recommend them by June 15th; and enters into the only contracts made for teachers services. 15

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The main functions of the county school board are to organize and fix the boundaries of the school districts; to designate the location of the school house in any district when it has not already been located; to set the date for the opening of the county schools or give assent to the date proposed by the superintendent of education; 16 and, together with the superintendent, lay out all routes for the transportation of school children and let all contracts for such transportation.

The board of supervisors, as a direct function in the conduct of the county schools, may lety an annual tax of not more t'an one mill on property in the county outside of separate school districts for a fund to be used for building school houses. All other taxes are levied after action of some other agency. County taxes outside of separate districts are imposed only after the levy has been approved by a majority of the qualified electors voting in an election, 19 and districts taxes are levied on the petition of a majority of the qualified electors of the district. The board may issue county and district bonds on the approval of three-fifths of the qualified electors of the county voting in an election, or on the approval of a majority of the qualified electors residing in the district. 21

District school trustees have general local supervision of the school or schools in their respective sistricts, 22 may borrow money in anticipation of taxes, 23 and must prepare and file with the superintendent of education, a budget of estimated expenses and a statement of estimated revenues for each fiscal year. 24 The trustees of all county district schools elect the members to the county school board.

### Public Health

The public health program in the county is conducted by the board of supervisors and a county health officer whom the board is required to appoint on the recommendation of the State Board of Health. 26

The board must fix and pay the salary of the health officer, 27 it may establish local quarantine and enforce it by reasonable rules and regulations, 26 and provide for complusory small pox vaccinations. 29 It may instruct the health officer to make sanitary inspections of schools, prisons, markets, and other public places, and receive reports of the officer's investigations. 30 The board is authorized to appropriate money to be used in the control and eradication of infectious diseases and in the promotion of public health. 31

Under the direct supervision of the State Board of Health, the county health officer must enforce the rules and regulations of this board in regard to the health interests of the county; examine as far as practicable into all cases of malarial, infectious, and epidemic diseases and their causes; investigate the sanitary conditions of schools, prisons, markets, and other public places; recommend to the governing authorities of the county and of any city in the county, regulations considered necessary to promote the health of the county; report his actions, all information, and the results of investigations to the State Board of Health.  $^{32}$ 

Births and doaths in the county are reported to the Division of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health by the county registrar of births and deaths, 33 marriage statistics are reported by the clerk of the circuit court, 34 and divorce statistics are reported by the clerk of the chancery court. 35

A full-time health unit has operated in Tippah and Benton counties since January 1, 1941, the headquarters of the unit being at Ripley.

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Governmental Organization

(First entry, p. 57)

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The board of supervisors has jurisdiction over the relief and support of the poor in the county. The board also has jurisdiction over poor orphan children, 37 and must advance money for the investigation and removal of insane persons. The board must also provide for the care and maintenance of paupers alleged to be insane, pending investigation, and provide permanent care for such persons if, after they have been legally adjudged insane, there is no place for them in one of the State insane hospitals. The board also appoints the members of the county board of public welfare, 40 and has power and authority to cooperate with the Federal relief program.

The pension board of inquiry, appointed by the board of supervisors, adjudicates all claims for State-paid pensions made by Confederate veterans, their widows, and their servants. 42

## Public Works

Full jurisdiction over roads, ferries, and bridges is exercised by the board of supervisors in accordance with such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. 43 The board must provide and maintain a courthouse and jail, and if the courthouse is undergoing repairs, or if there is no courthouse in the county, must provide a building in which the courts may be held. 44

This body is given the exclusive power to make and authorize all contracts in the name of the county.

## Miscellaneous Functions

Activities in agricultural demonstration and home economics are carried on in the county with the aid of Federal Funds, by the county extension department in agriculture and home economics, 46 The county agents and home demonstration agents in charge of this program are appointed by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture, 47

Provisions are made for the recording with the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, of charters of incorporation, 48 marks and brands of livestock, 49 declarations of homesteads to obtain exemption from seizure or sale under execution or attachment for debt, 50 discharges and all military records and documents of veterans of the Spanish-American War, 51 and all surveys of land made by the county surveyors or other surveyors. 52

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# 3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

The Tippah County courthouse is situated on a square approximately in the center of the City of Ripley, bounded by Spring Street on the north, Jofferson Street on the south, Main Street on the west, and Commerce Street on the east, This , the third county-owned building occupied by courts and county officers, was erceted in 1928 at a cost of \$55,000.1 In its construction use was made of the walls and foundations of the second courthous, erected in 1869, but the present building is for all practical purposes a new structure.

The first courthouse in Tippah Courty was erected in 1838 on land bought by the Beard of Police in 1836. This building was burned by Federal troops on July 9, 1864. The Baptist and Presbyterian churches were then used by the courts and county officials until 1867, 4 whom a 2-story building on the south side of the square was renized by the Board of Police and used until the courthouse was rebuilt in 1869.

The 1869 courthouse, built exactly like the original building except for the addition of portices on the east and west sides, cost \$19,500. This was raised by a special tax levy for the years 1869 and 1870.

The 2-story building now in use is built of red brick trimmed with artificial stone, with a tile and asphalt roof. Its outside measurements are 101' x 70' x 38' (maximum height 40'), and it contains 212,100 cubic feet of space. It is considered about 50 percent fireprecf. The effice of the chancory clerk and the vault of the circuit clerk have fireproof floors, walls, and coilings, but windows prevent their being completely fireproof.

The effices of the Clerk of the chancery court, the sheriff and tax colloctor, the tax assessor, the board of supervisors and the stamp issuing office, and the office and vault of the circuit clerk, are located on the first floor. On the second floor are the offices of the county superintendent of education, the county agent, the county attorney, and the draft board. The courtroom, witness reems, and grand jury reem are also on the second floor.

Beard of Supervisors: The beard of supervisors holds its meetings in a private office on the west side of the first floor of the courthcuse, across the hall from the chancery clark's office. Of the records of the board of supervisors, 10 percent are stored in the grand jury room, and 90 percent are kept in the effice of the chancery clerk. For housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the board, see Grand Jury, p. 45, and Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 44.

Clork of the Chancery Court as Recorder: Of the records of the recorder, 75 percent are kept in the chancery clork's office and 25 percent in the grand jury room. For the housing, care, and accessibility of these records, soo Clork of the Chancery Court, p. 44, and Grand Jury, p. 45

Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records

Chancery Court: Five percent of the chancery court records are stored in the grand jury room and 95 percent are kept by the chancery clerk in his office. For housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the chancery court, see Grand Jury, p. 45, and Clerk of the Chancery Court, below.

Clork of the Chancery Court: The clerk of the chancery court keeps the records of the board of supervisors, of the recorder, of the chancery court, of the treasurer, of the auditor, of the pension board of inquiry, and of the surveyor.

The office of the clerk of the chancery court, situated on the first floor, occupies the southwest corner of the building. The room has a concrete floor, plaster walls and ceiling. It is 26' x 23' x 12'. Along the north and east walls are 12 steel relier cabinets 6' x 20" x 12". In the center of the room is a steel counter 15' x 30' x 40" with relier shelving and file drawers underneath. Along the north and west walls are 16 linear feet of wooden shelving. Along the west wall are 5 steel filing cabinets 6' x 30" x 15", 1 steel filing cabinet 3' x 2' x 2', 1 wooden filing cabinet 5' x 2' x 6', and 50 cardboard file boxes 5" x 10" x 15". There are 110 cubic feet of filing space for unbound materials. There are 115 linear feet of bound volumes, 4 linear feet of newspapers, and a number of blank office forms stored in the room. The office is congested; however, the records are arranged so that they are readily accessible. Equipment for public users include: 1 table 3'6" x 8' and 3 chairs. The ventilation and lighting are good.

The clork's office contains 90 percent of the records of the board of supervisors, 75 percent of the records of the records of the records of the chancery court, 100 percent of the records of the pension board, 100 percent of the records of the surveyor, 75 percent of the records of the auditor, 75 percent of the probate court records, and 50 percent of the records of the treasurer.

Circuit Court: Of the records of the circuit court, 85 percent are kept in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court, 5 percent in his effice, and 10 percent are stored in the grand jury room. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, below, and Grand Jury, p. 45.

Clork of the Circuit Court: The office and vault of the clork of the circuit court are situated in the northeast pertion of the courthouse on the first floor. The effice has a concrete floor, plaster walls and ceiling, and measures 16' x 17' x 12'. Along the north wall of the room is a homemade wooden cabinet 5' x 2' x 6' containing 18 linear fact of shelving on which are kept 8 linear feet of bound volumes and 10 linear feet of unbound materials. One desk 4' x 6' and 3 chairs furnish ample accommodations for users and there is adequate space for expansion. The room contains 5 percent of the circuit court records, 25 percent of the records of the registrar of elections, 25 percent of the records of the grand jury. Both the artificial and natural lighting are good and the room is well ventilated.

The clerk's vault is situated directly north of and adjacent to his office. It measures 23' x 14' x 10' and has a concrete floor and walls and a plaster coiling. Along the north and south walls are 5 steel relicr cabinets 20" x 15" x 6'. On the east wall are 19 linear feet of homomade wooden shelving. Along

the east wall there is I steel filing cabinet 40" x 15" x 16". Against the north and south walls are 2 wooden homemade filing cabinets 30" x 12" x 36". Along the north wall are stacked ll cardboard file boxes with metal fronts 6" x 10" x 25" and 40 cardboard file boxes  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x 10". The vault houses 65 linear feet of bound volumes and 20 cubic feet of file boxes, comprising 75 percent of the records of the circuit court, 75 percent of the records of the clerk of the circuit court in his licensing capacity. 75 percent of the records of the cords of the registrar of elections, 100 percent (docket only) of the records of the district attorney, 100 percent of the county attorney's records, 100 percent of the records of the coroner, and 60 percent of the records of each of the justices of the peace in Beat 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5. The ventilation and natural lighting are poor, but the artificial lighting is good. Space and equipment are adequate for office workers and for public users.

Courtroom: The courtroom, which covers approximately one-half of the second floor of the courthous, 1s 48'3" x 48'2" and situated in the contral portion of the building. No records are kept permanently in the courtroom.

Grand Jury: The grand jury holds its sessions in a room situated in the northwest corner on the second floor of the courthouse, but its records are preserved in the office of the circuit clerk. For the housing, care and accessibility of the grand jury records, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, p. 44.

The grand jury room has a vocaden floor, plaster walls and coiling, and measures 23' x 25' x 10'. 96 linear foot of bound volumes and 20 linear foot of unbound materials are stored in this room, which is without shelving or other storage facilities. Non-current records kept here include 50 percent of the records of the sheriff, 25 percent of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, 10 percent of the records of the circuit court, 1 percent of the records of the clerk of the circuit court in his licensing capacity, 75 percent of the records of the tax assessor, 10 percent of the records of the board of supervisors, 5 percent of the records of the clerk of the chancery court, 50 percent of the records of the treasurer, 25 percent of the records of the auditor, 25 percent of the records of the probate court, 50 percent of the records of the sheriff as tax collector and 50% of the records of the sheriff. There are 2 tables  $3\frac{1}{2}$ ' x 8' and 6 chairs for users. Space and equipment are adequate. The ventilation and natural and artificial lighting are satisfactory.

Justice of the Peace: District or Beat One, (J. P. Jones and Charlie Rogers). The justices of the peace of this district hold court in their respective homes in Walnut. Of the records of this district 60 percent are kept in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court and 40 percent of the records are kept in the homes of the 2 justices. District or Beat Two, (W. C. Buchanan and W. W. Wright). The justices in this district hold court in their homes in Falkner. 60 percent of the records of the district are stored in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court, and each of the justices keeps 20 percent of the records in his home. District or Beat Three, (Ctis Reed and V. L. Bennett). The justice of this district hold court in their homes in Blue Heuntain. 40 percent of the records of the district are kept in their homes, and 60 percent in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court. District or Beat Four, (W. N. Morgan and R. L. Hurt). Mr. Morgan holds court in his home, Route 2, Boeneville, and Mr. Hurt in his home at Dumas. Each justice keeps 20 percent of his records. 60 percent of the records are stored in the vault of the clerk of the

circuit court. District or Beat Five. (Luther Crum and Mallie Jeanes). Esch justice of this district holds court in his home near Ripley and keeps 20 percent of his records. The other 80 percent of the justice records of the district are stored in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court.

District Attorney: The district attorney of the third circuit court district, to which Tippah County is attached, maintains his office in the city of Okolona, the county scat of the second judicial district of Chickasaw County. The dockets prepared for use by the district attorney are kept in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the district attorney's records, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 44-45.

County Prosecuting Attorney: The office of the county prosecuting attorney is situated in the northwest corner on the second floor of the courthouse, but the dockets prepared for his use are stored in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the county attorney's records, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 44-45.

Shoriff: The office of the shoriff is situated in the northeast corner of the first floor of the courthouse. The office has a space 13' x 17' x 12' for the use of the public, and the sheriff's private office is 23' x 25' x 12". The room has a concrete floor, plaster walls, and ceiling. In the center of the room is a steel counter 8' x 30" x 40", with relier cabinets and file drawers underneath, and a weeden cabinet 8' x 30" x 40" with weeden shelves and file drawers. In the southeast corner of the room is a homemade weeden cabinet 4' x 7' x 2' centaining 12 linear feet of shelving. Along the south wall are a steel filing cabinet 4½' x 1' x 1' and 5 cardboard boxes 5" x 10" x 15". There are 24 linear feet of bound velumes stored in the room. The office houses 50 percent of the records of the sheriff and 50 percent of the records of the sheriff as tax collector; 50 percent of the records of the sheriff as tax collector are kept in the grand jury re m. There is a table 3½' x 6' and 3 chairs for public users. The room is well ventilated and has good artificial and natural lighting.

Coronor: The coronor's records are kept in the circuit clork's vault. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this office, see Clork of the Circuit Court, p. 45.

Constables: Constables have no of icos but are attached to the office of the justice of the peace from whose district or beat they are elected.

Tax Assesser: The tax assesser occupies effice space 18' x 25' x 12' in the central pertian of the south side of the first floor of the courthouse. The ream has plaster walls and coiling and a weeden floor. Along the east wall are 2 steel filing cabinets 15' x 25' x 4½' and 13' x 25" x 8'. The office contains 22 cubic feet of filing space and 2 linear feet of bound volumes, which comprise 25 percent of the records of the assesser, the other records being kept in the grand jury re m. Both the natural and the artificial lighting are satisfactory, and the ream is well ventilated. There is adequate space and equipment for office werkers and for public users.

Sheriff as Tax Collector: Of the records of the sheriff as tax collector, 50 percent are stored in the office of the sheriff and 50 percent are kept in the grand jury room. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the sheriff as tax collector, see Sheriff, p. 46 and Grand Jury, p. 45.

Clerk of the Chancery Court as Treasurer: Of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as treasurer, 50 percent are kept in the grand jury room and 50 percent are kept in the office of the clerk of the chancery court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as treasurer, see Grand Jury, p. 45 and Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 44.

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors as Auditor: Of the auditor's records, 25 percent are stored in the jury room and 75 percent are kept in the office of the clerk of the chancery court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor, see Grand Jury, p. 45 and Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 44.

Registrar of Elections: The records of the registrar are kept in the office and vault of the circuit clerk. For the housing, care, and accessibility of these records, so Clerk of the Circuit Court, p. 45.

County Board of Election Commissioners: The county board of election commissioners holds its meetings in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. It does not keep any permanent records. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the county board of election commissioners, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, p. 45.

Superintendent of Education: The office of the county superintendent of education is situated in the southeast corner of the second floor of the courthouse. The rorm is 23' x 25' x 10', and has wood floor and plaster walls and ceiling. In the center of the room is a steel counter 15' x 26" x 40" with relier cabinets underneath it. Along the east wall are 3 filing cabinets  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x 15" x 25" and 3 wooden file cabinets  $11\frac{1}{2}$ " x 13" x 25". Twelve linear feet of bound volumes and 6 linear feet of unbound materials comprising 80 percent of the superintendent's records are stored in this room. Weeden shelving 18' long x 3' deep x 10' high on the west wall is used for textbooks. All records for the county school board and the school trustees are kept in this office. It is well ventilated and has good natural and artificial lighting. There are 1 table 2'8" x 1'6", 1 desk 3' x 2', 1 desk 5' x 2'7" and 5 chairs for the use of the public. Space is adequate but additional filing cabinets are needed.

School Trustees: The school trustees meet in their homes, in the school buildings in the various districts, and in the office of the superintendent, and their records are kept by the superintendent in his office. For the housing, card, and accessibility of the records, see Superintendent of Education, above.

County School Board: The county school board mosts in the office of the superintendent of education, and its records are kept by the superintendent in his office. For housing, care, and accessibility of the board records, see Superintendent of Education, above.

Health Officer: The county health office in Tippah County maintains a private office in Ripley. He does not keep any records of his activities.

Register of Births and Deaths: The registrar of births and deaths does not have an office, and his records are kept in his home in Ripley.

Ponsion Board of Inquiry: The pension board of inquiry holds its meetings in the office of the clerk of the chancery court who is its clerk and keeps its records. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this board, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 44.

Coroner as Ranger: No records for coroner as rmager were found in Tippah County.

Surveyor: The records of the surveyor are kept as permanent records by the clork of the chancery court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of those records, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 44.

County Extension Department in Agriculture and Home Economics: The county extension department in agriculture and home economics maintains the offices of its units in separate buildings.

The office of the county agent is situated in the northeast corner of the second story of the courthouse in a room 23' x 25' x 10'. In the center of the room are 20 linear feet of wooden shelving. Along the south and west walls are 120 cubic feet of file bexes, each 12" x 15" x 30", which centain 10 linear feet of unbound materials. Eighty percent of the agent's records are stored in this room. Space and equipment are inadequate. The agent uses a witness room 19' x 10' x 10' situated in the north center of the second floor of the courthouse as his private office. Papers constituting 20 percent of his records are kept in 2 steel filing cabinets 12" x 15" x 30".

The office of the county home demonstration agent is located in the Anderso building on Commerce Street in the city of Ripley. Her private office measures  $8' \times 10' \times 16'$ . It centains 2 filing drawers in which 20 percent of the records of the office are kept. A cabinet adjoining the file drawers holds 80 percent of the records. Space and equipment are adequate.

Department of Public Wolfaro: The office of the department of public welfare is located on the first floor in the public welfare building on Walnut Street. It is 24' x 20' x 8' and is divided into a waiting room, a file office, and a private office for the welfare agent. All the records of the department are kept in the file room. Space and equipment are inadequate. While the artificial lighting is good, the natural lighting and ventilation are poor.

Cotton Weigher: This official maintains no office and keeps no records.

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
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
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

First Floor Plan




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TIPPAH COUNTY COURTHOUSE

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## 4. ABBREVIATIONS, SYMBOLS, AND EXPLANATORY NOTES

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The descriptions of the records, referred to in this inventory as entries, are numbered consecutively from 1 to 209, and are composed of 2 parts, the title line paragraph and the body of entry paragraph. However, a third paragraph is sometimes added for the purpose of making cross-references. Although a condensed form of entry is used, information is given as to the limiting dates of all extant records, the contents of the individual series, and the location of the records.

Titles of Records. Exact titles of records are written in solid capitals without parentheses. In the absence of titles, decriptive titles have been assigned, which are written in solid capitals and enclosed in brackets. If a record title is not descriptive of the contents of the records, an assigned explanatory title (or explanatory words), written with initial capitals and enclosed in brackets, has been added. The current or most recent title of a record is used as the entry title and title variation is indicated.

Dates. All dates used are inclusive. Missing records are indicated by broken dates.

Quanitiy. Then two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order, insofar as possible.

Labeling. Figures or letters in parentheses, following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other types of container, indicate the labeling. If no labeling is indicated, it may be assumed that there is none.

Discontinuance. Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shwen in the entry, it could not be definitely established that such was the case. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, subsequent, or intermediate records, no definite information could be obtained.

Description of Records. The description of the contents of a record applies only to the current or most recent record unless change of contents is actually shown in a record entry.

Indoxing. All indoxes to records, unless otherwise stated, are self-contained.

Condition of Records. Records are in good condition unless otherwise indicated.

Dimensions. Dimensions are always given in inches, unless otherwise indicated.

Location of Records. When all or the majority of the records of an office have a common location, the location is indicated in the last sentence of the office essay instead of in each individual entry.

Cross References. Title-line cross references are used to show the continuity of a record series which has been kept separately for a period of time and with other records for different periods of time. An example is that in entry 4: "1870-1932 in Matters of the Board of Supervisors, entry 3"; which is balanced by these words in the description of entry 3: "Also contains retitions, 1870-1932, entry 4".

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Abbreviations, Symbols, and Explanatory Notes

Separate third-paragraph cross references from entry to entry, and See also references with subject headings or subheadings, are used to show prior, subsequent, or closely related records which are not parts of the same series..

Citations. References to the acts of the Legislature of Mississippi cite the year of the acts and the page or peges of the published volume in which the acts appear.

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## I. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The administrative and governmental affairs of Tippah County; established February 9, 1836, have been conducted by 2 bodies, the board of police from 1836 to 1870, and the board of supervisors since 1870.

The board of police was established as the local administrative authority of the county by the creating act of February 9, 1836, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832.2 The act directed that the county be divided into 5 districts and that the qualified electors of each district name a member to the board for a 2-year term.

The members of the board of police were elected in 1836, and held their first meeting the same year. 4 The board functioned continuously in the county until 1870.5

The clork of the probate court was clerk of the board of police, 6 and the sheriff was the executive officer.

For the general structural and functional development of the board of police and of the clerk of the probate court as clerk of the board of police from 1836-70, see Forrest County Inventory, p. 23.

The board of supervisors was established as the general local authority of Tippah County by the law enacted by the Legislature in June 1870, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1869. The first supervisors were appointed by the Governor to serve until members were regularly elected at the general elections of 1871 for State, county, district and county-district officers, and sworn into office in January 1872.9 The board held its first meeting July 11, 1870, and has functioned continouusly in the county since that date.

The board is composed of 5 members, 1 from each of the 5 supervisors

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beats or districts into which the county is divided. Until 1890, by constitutional provision, the members of the board were elected for a term of 2 years, in and from their respective beats or districts, by the qualified electors of each beat. The Constitution of 1890 provides that a member of the board shall be elected from each of the 5 districts into which the county is divided, but gives the Legislature power to determine the mented of selection and term of office. The Legislature has provided that the qualified electors of each beat or district elect in and from their district at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers, 1 member to the board to serve for a 4-year term. L\$\frac{1}{2}\$

The clerk of the chancery court is the ex officio clerk of the board of supervisors, 15 and the sheriff is its executive officer and must attend all its meetings in person or by deputy.

For the general structural and functional development of the board of supervisors and of the effice of clerk of the chancery court as clerk of the board from 1890 to 1938, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 41-70.

Unless otherwise specified, the records of the board of police and of the board of supervisors are kept in the office of the clerk of the chancery court, who as clerk of the board is ex efficie auditor. In this Inventory the financial records of the board have been placed arbitararily under "Glerk of the Board of Supervisors as Auditor", pp. 113-117.

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# II. CLERK OF THE CHANCERY COURT AS RECORDER

The clerk of the chancery court is the principal recording officer of Tippah County. The office of recorder does not exist as such in Mississippi county government, but constitutional and statute law provide that a wide variety of instruments must be recorded and preserved by the clerk and that certain records must be preserved in his office.

From 1832 to 1869, the clerk of the probate court preformed the duties of recorder. Since 1869 recording duties have been attached to and incumbent upon the clerk of the chancery couet, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1869.

For a general discussion of the recording duties of the clerk of the probate court, see Forrest County Inventory, pp. 27-29; and for the general functional and structural development of the office of clerk of the chancery court as recorder, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 76-80.

The records kept by the clerk as recorder, unless otherwise specified, are to be found in the office of the clerk of the chancery court.

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#### CHANCERY COURT III.

When Tippah County was created in 1836, under provisions of the Constitution of 1832, jurisdiction in matters testamentary, of administration, in orphans! business, allotment of dower, in cases of idiocy, lunacy, and persons non composementis was vested in the probate court, and jurisdiction in matters of equity was vested in the chancery courts. Both courts functioned until 1870, when probate matters were transferred to the chancery court.2

The Constitution of 1832 gave the Legislature power to establish chancery courts and provided for a separate superior court of chancery consisting of l judge or chancellor. The Legislature of 1833 stipulated that court should be held at Jackson on the first Mondays of July and January each year. 3

In 1839 the Legislature divided the State into 3 districts, placing Tippah County in the third. $^4$  The county was assigned in 1842 to the northern inferior chancery district, for which court was held in Holly Springs, the county seat of Marshall County, twice each year.5

The court continued as such until 1854, when an amendment approved by popular vote, presented to the Legislature in 1856, and made a part of the Constitution in 1856, required that chancery court be held by the judge of the circuit court, at least 1 week of every term being given to chancery court mattors.6

The Constitution of 1869 directed the Legislature to divide the State into convenient chancery court districts, and stipulated that court should be held in each county at least 4 times a year. Tippah County was assigned to the eighth chancery district by the act of February 9, 1870, which also provided that court should be held beginning the second Monday of March and Septombor of each year for 6 days. 8 The first session was held in March 1870, and this court has functioned in the county since that time. In 1880 the county was attached to the second district, and in 1892 to the third, in which it has since remained. 10

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The Constitution of 1832 provided for the establishemnt of a court of probate and this prevision was carried into effect in 1833 by legislative enactment. 11 The probate court functioned continuously as a separate court in the county until its jurisdiction was transferred to the chancery court by the Constitution of 1869. 12

The presiding efficer of the probate court was the judge.  $^{13}$  County officers attached to the court were the clerk,  $^{14}$  and the sheriff as the executive officer.  $^{15}$ 

The Constitution of 1832 provided that the judge of the probate court be cleeted for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the genoral elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers, 16

The Constitution of 1890, in providing for the establishment of chancery courts, requires that sessions be held at least twice in each year. 17 At 18 present court convenes the third Londays of March and September for 6 days. 18

The presiding efficer of the chancery court is the chanceller of the district. 19 County efficers attached to the court are the clerk, 20 and the sheriff who is the executive efficer. 21 The chanceller may appeint masters in

chancery, 22 special commissioners, 23 receivers, 24 and since 1916, a court stenographer in the district, 25 and a county probation officer who may be the super-intendent of education. 26

The Constitution of 1832 provided for the election of the chancellor for a 6-year term by the qualified electors of the State. 27 The vice-chancellor who presided over the district chancery court was elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors of the district. 28 Under constitutional provision from 1869 to 1912, the chancellor was appointed by the Governor by and with the consent of the Senate for a 4-year term. 29 By an amendment to the Constitution, proposed by the Legislature in 1912, approved by popular vote in 1913, and made a part of the Constitution in 1914, provision was made for the election of chancellor by the qualified voters of the district, the term of office remaining the same. 30

The office of the clerk of the chancery court for the northern chancery district functioned in Tippah County upon the creation of the county in 1836.31 The office was filled by appointment by the chancellor until 1843, 32 and by clection for a 2-year term by the qualified electors until 1856. 33 By Constitutional amendment in 1856, the clerk of the circuit court was assigned the duties of the clerk of the chancery court and he was elected every 2 years by the qualified electors of the county. 34

#### IV. CIRCUIT COUPT

The Constitution of 1832 directed the Legislature to divide the State into convenient circuit districts and stipulated that circuit court should be held in each county at least twice each year. Tippah County was assigned to the eighth district by the creating act of 1836, which provided that court be held on the second Monday of March and September for 6 days. The first session was held in March 1836, and the court has functioned in the county since that time. In 1844 the county was assigned to the seventh district; in 1871 to the tenth; in 1880 to the second; and in 1892 to the third, in which it has since remained. Terms of court are held on the second Monday of January and July for 12 days.

The presiding officer of the court is the judge of the circuit court dis-county officers attached to the court are the clerk, 10 the sheriff who is the executive officer of the court, 11 and the county prosecuting attorney who assists the district attorney.

A court reporter or stenographer in the district may be appointed by the judge. 13 Indictments and presentments are returned to the court by the grand jury, 14 and cases in issue are tried before the petit jury. 15 The district attorney represents the State in all criminal proceedings in the circuit court

of Tippah County, and the State and the county in all civil cases in which they may be interested.16

The Constitution of 1832 made the office of judge of the circuit court elective for a term of 4 years. 17 Under provisions of the Constitution of 1869, the judge was appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate for a term of 6 years. 18 The appointive manner of selection was continued under the Constitution of 1890, but the term of office was for 4 years. Is an amendment to the Constitution, proposed by the Legislature in 1912, approved by popular vote in 1913, and made a part of the Constitution in 1914, the office was made elective by the qualified voters of the district for a term of 4 years.20

The constitutional office of clerk of the circuit court was established in Tippah County upon its creation in 1836, and has functioned continuously in the county since that time. 21 The Constitution of 1832 prescribed that the elerk be elected by the qualified electors of the county for a term of 2 years. Since 1869 the clerk has been elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers.23

The office of court reporter or stonographer, filled by appointment by the judge, has functioned in the district and in the circuit court of Tippah County since 1890, the stenographer serving a 4-year term unless removed from office by the judge. 24

The guarantee of the Constitution of the United States of trial by an imal jury, 25 is provided for Mississippi insofar as Tippah County is affected partial jury,

# V. CLERK OF THE CIRCUIT COURT

The clerk of the circuit court, in addition to his clerical and clerical-judicial functions in connection with the court has been assigned a number of licensing and recording powers and duties. 1

The office of the clerk of the circuit court was established in Tippah County at the time the county was created in 1836, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832, 2 and has functioned continuously since that time.

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#### VI. JUSTICES OF THE PEACE

The offices and courts of justices of the peace were established in Tippah County by the creating act of February 9, 1836, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832. The effices were filled by election of a joint vote of the General Assembly and commissioned by the Governor.

The Constitution of 1832 provided for the appointment of a competent number of justices of the peace in the county. The Constitutions of 1832. of 1869, and of 1890 provide that a competent number of justices of the peace be chosen in each county by districts.4 In 1833 statute law required that not less than 1 nor more than 2 justices be selected from each of 5 districts. 5 From 1856 to 1932 the law required that 2 be elected from each of 5 districts, the boundaries of the districts being the same as the boundaries of the supervisor's beats or districts.6 Since 1932, only 1 justice of the peace is to be elected in and from each district, except that the board of supervisors is given authority to provide for the election of an additional justice in any district. At the present time there are 10 justices of the peace in Tippah County, 2 from each beat or district.

The Constitution of 1852 and 1869 provided for the election of justices of the peace for a term of 2 years, in and from their respective districts by the qualified electors of each district. The Constitution of 1890 provides that justices of the peace shall be chosen by districts for a term of 4 years, but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. The Legislature has prescribed that justices of the peace shall be elected by the qualified electors at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-distinct officers. 11.

Justices of the peace must hold not less than 1 term of court each month, nor more than 2.12 Other county officers attached to the court are constables

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## VII. GRAND JURY

The guarnatee of the Constitution of the United States that no person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, except on a presentment of indictment of a grand jury, 1 is provided for in Mississippi insofar as Tippah County is concorned, by the Constitutions of 1832, 1869, and

The grand jury was first convened in Tippah County in March 1836, 3 and has functioned since that time at each term of court devoted to criminal matters.

Until 1857 it was composed of not less than 13 nor more than 18 jurors. Since 1857 it has been composed of not less than 15 nor more than 20 jurers, the number being designated by the court, 1 of whom is appointed foreman by the court.6

From 1836 to 1857 grand jurors were selected from a special grand jury panel composed of 36 jurors drawn by the clerk of the circuit court and the sheriff. From 1857 to 1892 grand jurors were selected from a special grand jury panel composed of 20 jurors, designated by the beard of police until 1870, and by the board of supervisors since that time, summened by the sheriff, and in attendance at court. Since 1892 grand jurers have been selected from the first 50 jurers drawn from the general jury panel. Members of the grand jury serve for the duration of court, unless dismissed sooner by the judge. 10

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## VIII. DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Tippah County, on its establishment Feburary 9, 1836, was assigned to the eighth circuit court district, and the district atterney of the district assumed his duties in the county and in the circuit court of the county. The office has functioned continuously since that time in the court and in the circuit court district to which Tippah County has been attached.

The office is constitutional. 4 Since 1833 the district county attorney has been elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors of the district at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.

The district attorney is not required to keep any permanant records. However a calendar of criminal cases at issue is prepared for his use, (see entry 74). For other records related to the effice of district attorney, see entries 63, 69, 76, 84.

#### IX. COUNTY PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

The office of county prosecuting attorney was created and made mandatory in all counties in 1910, the office being filled by appointment. The first closted county prosecuting attorney took office in January, 1912, 2 but in whon the office was made discretionary with the board of supervisors, it was abolished insofar as Tippah County was concerned. It was roostablished in 19254 and has functioned continuously since that time.

The county prosecuting attorney is elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. 5 For a general discussion of the office, soc Forrest County Inventory, pp. 62-63.

## X. SHERIFF

The office of sheriff was established in Tippah County by the creating act of 1836, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832. It was filled by election in 1836, and the sheriff was sworn into office in 1837. The office, has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1890, by constitutional provisions, the sheriff was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. The Constitution of 1890 provides that he be elected for a 4-year term, prohibits him from immediately succeeding himself in office, but gives the Legislature authority to determine the manner of election. The Legislature has prescribed that the sheriff be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.5

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#### XL. CORONER

The office of coroner was established in Tippah County by the creating act of 1836 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832. The office was first filled by appointment by the Governor and has functioned continuously in the county except for the periods 1912-16, 1924-28, and 1936-40, when no one offered his candidacy for the office. 2

Until 1890, by constitutional provision, the coroner was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. The Constitution of 1890 provides that he be elected for a term of 4 years and gives the Legislature authority to determine the method of election. 4 The Legislature has prescribed that the coroner be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.

#### XII. CONSTABLES

The office of constable was established in each "captain's district" of Tippah County after the organization of the county in 1836 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832. These offices have functioned continuously since that time.

The Constitution of 1832 and 1869 provided that constables be elected for a 2-year term in and from each district by the qualified electors of the district. The Constitution of 1890 provides that centables shall be chosen by districts for a 4-year term but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. The Legislature has prescribed that constables shall be elected by the districts at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers.

The Constitutions of 1832, of 1869, and of 1890 provide that a competent number of constables be chosen in each county by districts. No definite number was prescribed by the Code of 1871, but since 1880 statute law has required that one constable be chosen in each district for the election of justices of the peace, and since 1900 the board of supervisors has had power to provide for the election of additional constables in any district not to exceed the number of justices of the peace provided for in the district. 6

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#### XIII. TAX ASSESSOR

The office of tax assessor was established in Tippah County at the time the county was created in 1836, under statutory authority of 1821, I and has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

From 1833 to 1890 the tax assessor was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers. The Constitution of 1890 provides that the assessor be elected for a 4-year term and gives the Legislature authority to determine the manner of election. The Legislature has prescribed that the tax assessor be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers.

For the general structural and functional development of the effice of tax assessor from 1890 to 1938, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 182-188.

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### XIV. SHERIFF AS TAX COLLECTOR

The office of tax collector was established, in Tippah County on its creation in 1836, as provided by statute law of 1830, 1 and has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

From 1833 to 1843 the tax collector was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections held for State, district, county, and county-district officers. Since 1843, the sheriff has been by law the ex officio tax collector.

For the general structural and functional development of the office of sheriff as tax collector, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 189-198.

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#### XV. TREASURER

The office of treasurer was established in Tippah County at the time it was created in 1836, as prescribed by an act of the Legislature of 1830. The office functioned continuously in the county until it was abolished by a constitutional amendment approved by popular vote in 1922, and made a part of the Constitution in 1924.

From 1832 to 1890, by constitutional provision, the treasurer was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. The Constitution of 1890 increased the term of office to 4 years, prohibited the treasurer from immediately succeeding himself or the sheriff in office, and gave the Legislature authority to determine the method of selection. The Legislature prescribed that the treasurer be elected by the qualified voters of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.

The amendment in abolishing the the office specified that the duties formerly imposed upon the treasurer shall be discharged by some persons elected as required by law. In 1932 the Legislature enacted a law requiring the clerk of the chancery court in his capacity as clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor in counties having depositories, to perform the former duties of the treasurer. Since Tippah County has a regularly designated depository, the clerk of the chancery court has assumed the duties of the treasurer.

For the general structural and functional development of the office of treasurer and the office of clork of the chancery court as treasurer from 1890 to 1938, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 202-206.

The records of treasurer are kept in the office of the clerk of the chancery court. The law of 1932 which gave the clerk the former duties of the treasurer also requires that the clerk be custodian of the books, records, and papers of the treasurer.

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### XVL. CLERK OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AS AUDITOR

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The office of clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor was established in Tippah County in 1892 when the clerk of the board was designated by law as the auditor. 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### XVII. REGISTRAR OF ELECTIONS

The Constitution of 1869 directed the Legislature to provide for the registration of persons entitled to vote, and until 1880 this function was discharged in Tippah County by a 3-member board appointed annually by a commission composed of the sheriff, the chancery clerk, and the president of the beard of supervisors.2

In 1880 the clerk of the circuit court was made the ex officio registrar.3

The Constitution of 1890 likewise directed the Legislature to provide for the registration of persons eligible to vote, 4 and since 1892 legislation enacted has made it the duty of the State Board of Election Commissions to appoint a registrar in each county who shall be the clerk of the circuit court unless it is shown that he is a person improper for the office. 5 The circuit clarks of Tippah County have been appointed regularly to this office since its establishment.

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### XVLLL. COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTION COMMISSIONERS

Elections in Tippah County were conducted by a 3-member board of inspectors appointed by the board of police until 1871. From 1871 to 1880 a 3-member board of registration was established to register persons entitled to vote. In 1880 this function was given to the circuit clerk as ex-officio registrar. At the same time it was provided that three commissioners of election should be appointed before each general election by the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, and the Secretary of State, to revise the registration books and have charge of the election.

Since 1892 elections have been conducted by the county board of election commissioners composed of 3 members appointed for a 2-year term by the State Board of Election Commissioners.

### XIX. SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION

The authority of administering the first public school funds in Tippah County was vested in a 5-member board of trustees empowered with the authority to conduct the school system of their respective townships, as provided for by legislative enactment of 1824. These members were elected by the heads of families of each township.<sup>2</sup>

The Legislature of 1846 established a system of common schools with supervision vested in a board of 5 school commissioners appointed by the board of applied.

The constitutional office of superintendent of education was established in the county in 1870, and it has functioned continuously since that time. 4

Until 1888 by constitutional prevision, the superintendent was appointed by the State Beard of Education, by and with the advice of the Senate, but in 1888 the Legislature made the office elective in Tippah County. Since that time the superintendent has been elected by the qualified electers of the county at the general elections for State, county, district, and county-district officers.

The term of office was set at 2 years by the Constitution of 1869, but was increased to 4 years by the Constitution of 1890.

### XX. BOARD OF SCHOOL DIRECTORS

The board of school directors, created by the law of July 4, 1870, was established in Tippah County October 18, 1870. It functioned until 1873 when it was abolished by law and its powers and duties were given to the board of supervisors and to the boards of school trustees.

This board was composed of 6 members appointed by the board of supervisors and selected as far as was practicable from the 5 supervisors' districts or beats. 4 Two of the members were appointed for a 1-year term, 2 for a 2-year term, 3 for a 3-year term, their terms beginning October 1, 1870. The superintendent of education served as president of the board and the clerk of the circuit court was its secretary. 6

The records of the board are preserved by the superintendent of education in his office.

#### XXI. SCHOOL TRUSTEES

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Boards of trustees of each school district situated outside of towns were ostablished in Tippah County by the law of 1873, 1 and have functioned centinuously in the county since that time. At present there are 3 types of these school districts in the county: common school districts, consolidated school districts, and special consolidated school districts.2

The beards of trustees of common school districts are composed of 3 members, 3 while the boards of consolidated school distriers may have either 3 or Special consolidated school districts have 5 trustees. 5 All are selected in their districts by the school patrons of the district who are qualified electors.6

Until 1894 trustees were elected for a 1-year term, 7 but since 1894 they have been chosen for a 3-year term with 1 member being elected annually in the case of 3-member boards of trustees, 8 for a 5-year term with 1 member being chosen annually in the case of 5-member boards.9

#### XXII. COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

The county school board was established by the law of 1886, and has functioned continuously in Tippah County since that time. Until the passage of the law creating the board, management of school affairs had been in the hands of the Board of Supervisors since 1873, when the Board of School Directors was abolished.

The board consists of 5 members, 1 from each supervisors beat or district, and the superintendent of education, 3 who is the president and secretary.

Until 1930 the members of the board were appointed by the superintendent of education, subject of ratification by the board of supervisors, to serve a 4-year term. 5 Since 1930 they have been elected by the trustees of the county public schools, other than the trustees of municipal school districts, for a term of 5 years, 1 member being chosen annually.

For the general structural and functional development of the county school board, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 242-243.

# XXIII. COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER

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The office of county health officer was established in Tippah County in 1880 as provided for in the act of March 4 of that year. It has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1892 this official, called the chief health officer, was appointed by the Governor on the nomination of the State Board of Health for a term of 2 years beginning on the date of appointment.

Since 1892, a county health officer has been appointed by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the State Board of Health, to serve for a 2-year term.  $^4$ 

For the general structural and functional development of the effice of the county health officer, see Lamar County Inventory, p. 258.

The health officer of Tippah County does not keep any permanent records.

#### XXVI. REGISTRAR OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS

The office of registrar of births and deaths was established in Tippah county in 1912 as provided by the Legislative act of that year, and it has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

The registrar is appointed for an indefinite term by the Division of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health. 2

The records of the registrar of births and deaths are kept by Howell Alvis, registrar, in his home at Ripley, Mississippi.

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### XXV. PENSION BOARD OF INQUIRY

The payment of pensions by the State to Confederate veterans was instituted by the law of 1888 which also provided for the establishment of boards of inquiry in the counties to adjudicate claims for pensions. 1 The pension board of inquiry was organized in Tippah County in 1888 and has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1902 this board was composed of the 5 members of the board of supervisors, the sheriff, and the clerk of the chancery court.<sup>2</sup>

In 1902 the camp of Confederate veterans in the county was authorized to select and recommend to the board of supervisors for appointment to the pension board, 5 of their number, one from each supervisors district, if possible. 1910 pensioners were excluded from serving as members of the board. 4 Since 1924 the board of supervisors has been required to appoint a World War veteran to the board, and recommendations for membership have been extended to include not only Confederate veterans, but other citizens who are qualified electors. Since 1928 the county prosecuting attorney has been a member of the board. The clerk of the chancery court is clerk of the board, 7 and the sheriff is its executive officer.8

### XXVI. CORONER AS RANGER

The office of ranger was established in Tippah County on its creation in 1836, as provided by the statutory authority of 1823, and the office has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

From 1833 to 1871 the ranger was elected for a 2-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. 2 Since the abolishment of the office of ranger as a spearate office in 1871, the coroner is by law the ex officio county ranger.3

For the general structural and functional development of the office of coroner as ranger from 1890 to 1938, see Lamar County Inventory, p. 271.

No records of the coroner as ranger were found in Tippah County.

The office of surveyor was established in Tippah County by the creating act of February 9, 1836, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1832. The first surveyor was appointed by the Governor and the office has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1890 by constitutional provision, the surveyor was elected for a term of 2 years by the qualified electors of the county. The Constitution of 1890 provides that the surveyor shall be elected for a 4-year term but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. The Legislature has provided that the surveyor be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. 5

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The law of March 5, 1908, authorized counties to establish a county department of agriculture to promote agricultural extension work. A department was organized in Tippah County on August 5, 1913, and has functioned continuously since that time. The law of March 28, 1914, authorized counties to establish a county department of home economies. On December 4, 1917 a department was created in Tippah County, and has functioned continuously since that time.

In 1932 counties were empowered to carry on agricultural demonstration and home economics programs through a single department to be known as the county extension department in agriculture and home economics.

Until 1932 the officials directing the activities of the department of agriculture and the department of home economics (required by law to be a woman), were appointed by the board of supervisors, <sup>6</sup> but since 1932 have been appointed by the board upon the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi. State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture. <sup>7</sup>

No specific term of office is prescribed.

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#### XXIX. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The county board of public welfare was created in Tippah County in 1936, 1 in compliance with an act of the Legislature of the same year, 2 and has functioned continuously since that time. This board is composed of 3 to 5 members, representing 3 to 5 supervisor's districts, and is appointed by the board of supervisors for a 1-year term. 4 It must meet at least once a month on call pf the county welfare agent.

The county welfare agent and assistant county welfare agent are appointed by the State Commissioner of Public Welfare for an indefinite term. 5 Clerical assistance for administering the welfare program may be employed. 6

In 1904, however, the first cetten weigher in the county was clocked, 3 and the office has functioned continuously since that time.
