Health plan heard, calls for more money

Recommendation: Insurance task force says UK should provide \$5 million more

The Health Benefits Committee presented its preliminary recommendations to the University Senate Monday. Thomas samule, the committee during their 50-plus hours of meeting time from July to October. The committee of meeting time from July to October. The committee put together its report during a retreat.

Samuel said the presentation was important because the UK community will be the beneficiaries of this reform.

'It is important that the University Senate have an opportunity to agree or help modify the report before it goes before the president.' he said.

The core recommendations included an increase in the support for health benefits in fiscal year 2002-03. To achieve this, UK would need to give an additional Smillion in general fund dolars. This amount, plus a proportionate amount for employees who receive health benefits from other sources, would total about \$86 million.

Another recommendation of the report is to reach a goal of funding \$90 percent of individual, couple, children and family coverage for UKHMO or other plans given by the university in Kive years. Richard King of the LCC Computer Information System. This goal ... would be very important for the university as a whole." he said.

One way of arriving at the \$90 percent funding is to use one percentage point of salary raises until the goal is achieved. Krishnamurty Muralidhar of the College of Business and Economics did not mind the stipulation.

"We have to put in the money one way or another, whether in premiums or out of the raises," he said.

Other recommendations included lowering the employe contribution rate to 20 percent lower than the UKHMO rate. This would come at the cost of excluding some benefits now covered like transplants. The recommendations. Colleges used as benchmarks have influenced this idea.

LEXINGTON — A task force assembled by University of Kentucky President Lee Todd to review health care costs for faculty and staff members will hold the first of four public meetings Tuesday. Todd appointed the 12-member task force as one of his first official acts upon taking over the job in July. The task force, which is chaired by health management professor Thomas Samuel, has been holding hearings to review the cost of health care benefits for the school's faculty and staff. Two forums will be Tuesday — one at 11 a.m. at the UK Student Center's Worsham Theater and one at 6:30 p.m. at E.S. Goodbarn.

Medical Center gets grant for HIV/AIDS

Medical Center gets grant for HIV/AIDS

LEXINGTON — The University of Kentucky's Chandler Medical Center has received a three-year, \$1.5 million grant to expand health care services for patients with HIV and AIDS. The federal grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, announced at a news conference Monday, will allow the university's Division of Infectious Diseases to increase the number of HIV patients who receive treatment and access to the hospital's AIDS clinic. The grant will allow the hospital to offer a broader array of services, including nutrition, mental health and substance abuse counseling, oral health care and translation services for Hispanic patients. The medical center's HIV/AIDS clinic currently treats about 490 patients. The medical center's HIV/AIDS clinic currently treats about 490 patients. More than 1.200 people in central and eastern Kentucky are living with HIV and, of that number, about 480 are living with AIDS.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — A media-sponsored review of disputed ballots from the 2000 presidential election in Florida was "fascinating" but doesn't change anything. Sen. Joseph Lieberman said Monday as he reaffirmed his support President Bush server and the presidency—to Bush and Dick Chemeny by a scant 537 totes last year. Anthrax not a death sentence, study says

Anthrax not a death sentence, study says WASHINGTON — Inhaled anthrax is a treatable infection and not a sure death sentence if doctors recognize the disease early and treat it aggressively, experts say in the Journal of the American Medical Association. An analysis in JAMA of the 10 recent cases shows that if doctors speedily give patients a constellation of antibiotics, along with aggressively treating symptoms such as the accumulation of fluid in the chest, there is a high rate of survival. The rate of survival— 60 percent for the recent inhalational cases — could well improve for future infections because doctors across the country now are so aware of anthrax and its symptoms.

Bishops reviewing war on terrorism

WASHINGTON — The nation's Roman Catholic bishops began reviewing their position on the war on terrorism Monday, acknowledging a moral right to a military defense but warning hat force alone is not the answer. The authors of a draft proclamation took pains to say that noting justifies terrorism. Still, they argued that poverty, violence and human rights abuses, if not addressed, generate resentment that terrorists can exploit. The draft proposal urges U.S. leaders to redefine foreign policy to make alleviating global suffering a priority, and recommends lifting economic sanctions against Iraq and helping to end the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

First black Miss Colombia elected

BOGOTA, Colombia — Vanessa Alexandra Mendoza has broken a color barrier in Colombia, becoming the first black woman to win the Miss Colombia title during one of the country's most watched spectacles. Four in 10 Colombians are either black or of mixed race. Yet they are underrepresented in politics and discriminated against socially and economically. The only black member of the national congress said Mendoza's selection suggests attitudes may be changing.

Victories in Afghanistan 'stunning'

Victories in Afghanistan 'stunning'
KABUL, Afghanistan — Opposition forces broke through Tailban front lines Monday and pushed into the hills above the capital, Kabul, rushing south on a string of stunning victories in northern Afghanistan. The ruling Islamic militacircled the mile-high city with tanks to defend against an all-out assault. Shouting "God is great," anti-Tailban troops rolled within 12 miles of Kabul on trucks carrying the green, white and black Afghan flag and displaying pictures of their slain commander, Ahmed Shah Massood. The anti-Tailban forces, a coalition of factions and ethnic groups, capped their four-day dash across the north by overrunning western Afghanistan's biggest city, Herat. Commanders said they were pushing toward Kunduz, the last Tailban-held city in the north.

Airplane crash ruled as accident

Catastrophic mechanical failure the cause, all 260 people aboard killed, others missing

NEW YORK — A jetliner en route to the Dominican Republic broke apart minutes after takeoff and crashed in a waterfront neighborhood Monday, engulfing homes in flames and sowing intila fears of a new terrorist atrocity. All 269 people aboard were killed, and at least six others were reported missing on the ground.

"All information we have currently is that this is an accident," said Marion Blakey, chairwoman of the National Transportation Safety Board.

If there was an explosion on the plane — and many witnesses heard one — it was probably caused by a catastrophic mechanical failure, investigators said.

American Airlines Flight 587, a European-made Airbus A300, left Kennedy Airport at 9:14 a.m., 74 minutes late because of security checks put in place after the World Trade Center at took off into a clear blue sky.

"I just thought, 'Oh, no, not again,'" said Milena Owens, who was putting up Thanksgiving decorations when she heard an explosion.

Authorities found the flight data recorder, one of the two black boxes' from the twin-engine jet, and said it would be examined for clues.

Witnesses reported hearing an explosion and seeing an engine, a large chunk of a wing and other debris falling off the plane as it came down.

An engine was found intact in a parking lot at a Texaco station, where it had missed the gas pumps by no more than 6 feet, neighbors ran to the scene with garden hoses to put out the fire. American Airlines said there were 251 passengers — including five infants sitting on their parents' laps — and nine crew members.

UK students' lack of voting leads to lessened influence

The reasoning: Few ties to local community discourage voting but UK still has influence

Because few students vote, they have little influence on the majority of lawmakers. This is clited as a reason when Urban County Council members such as 3rd District Councilman Dick DeCamp say they don't represent students. "It is not at all surprising a representative would turn a deaf ear to students," said Ernest Yanarella, a political science professor. "The general attitude is they have very little influence."

To legislators, student populations are an ever changing

body. Because many students are not going to reside in Lex-ington their entire lives, most do not vote at all or only vote in their hometowns.

"(Students) are not rooted

"(Students) are not rooted in the community where they go to school," said Mark Peffley, a political science professor.
"Younger people very often don't vote, and when they don't use it, they lose it," he said about students influence on wollticians.

politicians.
Even though students may not take part in politics, the UK area still carries influence.
"All you have to do is look at the economy in summer and

then in fall," said George Brown Jr., 1st District councilman and a UK employee.

But professors say UK students can become influential by registering to vote.

"Students are not mobilized." said Richard Fording, a political science professor.

"They have to demonstrate they are a force to be reckoned with."

sends a message we aren't welcome," he said. "We're not here to support those who break the law."

LAPP was based on the College Area Party Plan, a plan in San Diego, Callf. to limit disturbances. The name was changed in May at an Urban County Council meeting to include other parts of the city, rather than the areas close to UK.

For residents that have at

For residents that have at least two complaints requiring police enforcement, a cap could be placed on the property. This would deem the property a "no-

party" zone for one year.

If a tenant can prove the source of the disturbance is no longer a factor, before the year is passed, they could petition the chief of police and possibly have the cap removed. Dave Cooper, the vice president of the Elizabeth Street Neighborhood Association, said he's in favor of LAPP because it could be a solution to late night disturbances. "Noises from parties is the biggest complaint I hear," he said, "We need a good night sleep."

The plan says tenants who violate their cap could be arrested and face increased fines. Some students said they are concerned these restrictions could be problematic.

Learning a lesson from the engineers

The decision to require a passing grade in civil engineering should be imitated by other departments across campus

So, now civil engineering students must receive a C or higher in their core classes to earn their degree. It seems reasonable to require that all civil engineers be at least average. Besides, the notion that a C grade is equivalent to an average grade has lost much of its validity in this period of grade inflation.

More likely, a C grade in the current academic environment is closer to a D in the days of old.

The Department of Engineering is thus saying that students should receive at

least a passing grade in the classes that are necessary to graduate, presumably to ensure that bridges do not collapse when faced with a strong breeze.

The question then should be asked why other departments do not require a C

or higher in their core classes.

It is understandable that an economics major might not care much for biology,

but should that same student not be required to pass those classes deemed necessary to his or her chosen line of study?

Most students perform better in their upper level courses anyway. After all, you choose your major for a reason, and having an interest in the material always

makes for an easier course load.

Most departments already require a 2.0 (a C average) in core classes, and that is fine. But let's face it, a C average ain't what it used to be.

When referring to one's overall GPA, it doesn't matter as much. But when you get down to core classes and upper division requirements, each department

should ensure its graduates have earned the degree they hang on the wall.

UK is the centerpiece of Kentucky's post-secondary educational system, and it should be treated as such. The community college system is a wonderful institution that allows everyone who desires a college education to have one. It accomplishes its mission well.

UK has higher standards, though, and they must incrementally be raised even higher if it really seeks to earn a reputation as a top tier university.

Experts warn of cyber-terrorism

Imminent threat: Studies show weaknesses in communication networks

WASHINGTON - There is growing concern among some officials that the next potentially deadly attack on the United States may be an act of cyber terrorism.

On Nov. 2: the National Infrastructure Protection Center, a branch of the FBI responsible for guarding against disruptions in critical facilities, sent out the second of two advisories warning of increased potential for computer penetrations since the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon Sept. 11.

"NIPC has reason to believe that the potential for future (computer) attacks is high," it said.

Though no one was injured or killed by these attacks, the disrupted communications and resulted in economic damage. But experts say the potential for even more serious problems including property damage, injuries or death is clear. In Houston, for example, a hacker named Franklin Wayne Adanfs was arrested by FB agents last year for plotting to plant a "worm" in computer systems over the Internet that would have effectively shut down 911 telephone service to a wide area by forcing the computers to dial the emergency number. Court documents say that the "worm" program could have infected a quarter-million computers in just three days.

"If only a fraction of these computers were infected with the version of Adams' program which later calls the local 911 service, the number of calls computed easily either over-tax a city's ability to send response personnel to each location or cause the local 911 service to overload and shut down." one document said.
