Dear Bro: Inclosed, please find receipt for
104.57 as per check of Dec. 1st on salary acct.

When I first came to Mumfordsville I said to Bro. Hagmaker that I was out of the direct line of action indicated by the speeches in Presbytery; and the more privately expressed sentiments of members of the Committee - that I was expected to hold meetings in the more destitute places.

But these weak churches, for the first time in their history were looking up hopefully with such a good man as Mr. Hagmaker - that I felt for the time, it was better to "strengthen the things that remained" than to break more territory. I know that Dickson & Robinson both became discouraged and left the fields because they had so little help and growth. Mr. Tate practically so; also. Now Glasgow is the key to this whole section. For the first time in its history over 35 years - the other denominations have shown a brotherly feeling and line of conduct. They all have been attending

the meetings; all the pastors have taken a part in the services; We have already received 5 into the church and 4 more to be received already. The only way in the world for these churches to become self-supporting is for them to be increased numerically.

The Campbellites and Baptists have simply over-run this whole territory. Our church is taking hold of all the people as never before. Surely it is the part of wisdom to strengthen and make it self-supporting.

So the Committees mean for me to leave in the midst of the meeting? If so please write me; for I would like to come to the meeting of Presbytery. I have not taken up the collection yet. I will make no appointments at either Caumer or Cave City. Mr. Preston was over from latter place last night to confer with me about church building. He has had the School Trustees to whom he rented it put on about 40⁰⁰ worth of repairs - viz - a new sill; plastering; glass &c and are using it as a School house. Can rent be thought for another term at 5⁰⁰ per month, or further repairs. I authorized him so to do; - and Mr. Slaymaker agrees to it - inasmuch as he can preach in the Union Church. Baptists just closed a meeting 40 ad- ditious; & Campbellites now holding one there. Today I had additional Trustees appointed with the only surviving one, Mr. M. Payne, to hold lot worth \$150⁰⁰ at Douppkinsville, Monroe Co.

Dear Bro. Bedinger:

I met a gentleman on business after leaving you, and I barely made the next train: - hoping you would wait for the Shelbyville train - but did not see you. Am sorry: - for I wished to consult with you about getting Taylor or some good man right in that field permanently - and that would leave me free to go on opening other points as I would greatly prefer.

It is all important to open fields and thus gain a foot-hold: - for the Campbellites - Methodists & Baptists are awake, and alive: and they keep headquarters posted (David Norton S. D. Methodist, Nat. Baptist & Deacons); - and the Campbellite

headquarters - either Louisville or Lexington
But they are all at work. Mr. Donald
is preaching at 5 or 6 points at
school houses all around Hen-
derson and Presbyterianism is being
felt & known & loved. Davis &
Hancock - Beckwith & Meade Counties
are opening most excellent territories
barring what I have mentioned with
other denominations. At Suther-
land's Station ^{5 miles from Molloy's ch.} Methodists are building
a church. Dr. Davis told me of "Stur-
gis" - where he was anxious for the Evan-
gelists to go - but feared the opportunity
was no longer ours. If I can I
will go there too as well as to Livermore
I feel better than I have for two months
4 days of rest at home is the best rest
I can get. Elsewhere there is constant
demand for exertion I thought. Those chs
must go up right away - and I will have

I did not know of the change from monthly to quarterly payments, nor of the reports required.

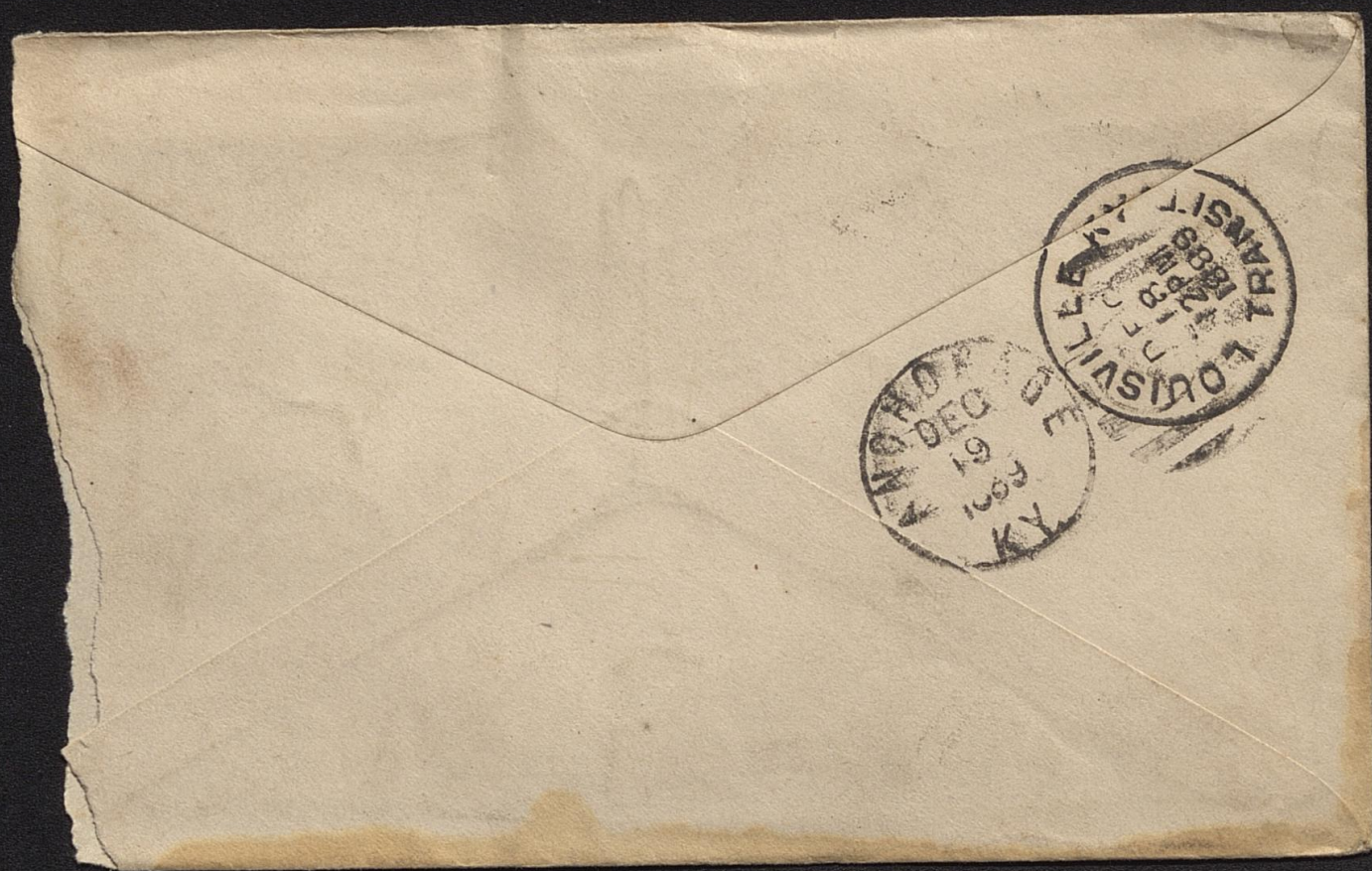
I want always to be ready to give an account of my Stewardship; and shall be ready when I receive the Circular, in order that I may not omit any point the Committee may wish mentioned.

I feel grateful to God for His merciful blessing upon the work here. We have organized a church, which I tried to have called Eben-Ezer but they over-ruled me and named it Morrison Church. 31 members have been received.

Ruling Elders - James Calvin Robt (bro. of Mrs. Joseph Robinson of Frankfort) John Quincy Adams (whose wife is Mrs. Robinson's niece) Alex. Dent. Beauchamp (whose daughter went to Stuart's school at Shelbyville) and Richard Warwick Mason (whose wife is sister to Mrs. Adams.

Deacons - James Crockett (nephew to Mr. Robt) Samuel E. Ayres who was educated by Rev. Mr. M. Howen at Richwood and Peter Best, to represent the element who may come of German

Collection - will be at least \$50⁰⁰ and more I hope. These Ruling Elders are each worth \$25, or 30,000 - and all the officers represent 1500 or 2000 - of the best land in Hancock County. 19 of the members were

received on baptism: 5 children baptized, the last yesterday was Harrison Morton Petri.

Only the result of the Election prevented it from being named Cleveland Thurman.

I intended closing last night but as there seemed to be increasing interest - 4 received yesterday - I hold on today & tomorrow at least.

I have felt a great sense of the sustaining prayers of those at home. Pray for us. Bro. Cooke has been with me all the time; but left on Sat. for Midway Ind. Will likely come back & help me at Stawesville, where I begin Thursday night. Now it is all important

for a good, active, visiting pastor to come right in - go ahead with the 30 odd members at Lewisport; build with the \$82.50 already subscribed; by Spring they will want to build here.

They all say - "we must have a good preacher & we will support him." I have never been in a better community: their large farms & develop large plans & large hearts; but of course need educating financially.

Dear Bro. Belinger:

While passing through the City back to my field I write that I hope to be present next week at the Lexington Convention, and will try to present a few facts that have come to my knowledge.

I am glad you have called the Convention; & I believe, that under the blessing of God, will be productive of great good both to the "men in the field" & the "boys in the benches."

I hope it will be largely attended. My few days of rest with my family Wed. Thurs & Friday - have done me good - tho' I still have symptoms of a repetition of stomach trouble. The various tables and constant talking and not much chewing, with the hot weather, tasks nature pretty severely. I am going to try to be more watchful.

After leaving you at Presbytery I went

1. To Owensboro Ky. - Preached two weeks & three days at Malloy's Chapel; during meeting 12 were rec'd. Collection for Ev. Fund \$55⁰⁰ - Collections for Hawesville Ch. \$182.⁰⁰
2. To Henderson Ky. 2nd Ch. - preached one week - 6 received. 2nd Ch. collection for Hawesville Ch. \$48⁰⁰ + 77⁰⁰ on Street = \$125.⁰⁰

(Filling 3 appts - each Sunday - Morrison ch., Hawesville & Cloverport.
medals)

3. Back again to Henderson - to help Dr. Davies at Zion - 6 miles from Henderson. 22 Presbyterians of 1st & 2nd Henderson chhs. there; Received only one old lady 82 years of age into Dr. Davies' ch. - and 4 into Baptist Church. Also bought "Holloway Chapel" 26 x 46 ft. of Methodists for 100⁰⁰ (worth 800⁰⁰) and paid mechanics 50⁰⁰ to move it a mile up pike to Zion Village. Dr. Robt. Stuart secured corner lot (more suitable than the one his son-in-law, John Baskett donated) on which to build. Borrowed 185⁰⁰ of James D. Barrett of 1st ch. to pay this expense until I could collect in future. Raised 38⁷⁵ additional for Hawesville Ch.

4. Fill, each Sunday, ^{appts.} visit - 3 churches. June 2nd one added on prop. & baptism to Morrison church. June 2nd Preached funeral of Mrs. Cravens. June 2nd Recd. into Cloverport ch. one young man by letter. June 4th One young man on profession. Baptism. Recd. of Cloverport church 10⁰⁰ sent check of same to Geo. Crawford Treas^r. Louisville Pres. Home Mission.

5. June 10th raised 13⁰⁰ of Concord Pres^{ch} for Hawesville church - Rest! Rest. for three days!

Am now on way back to Hawesville.

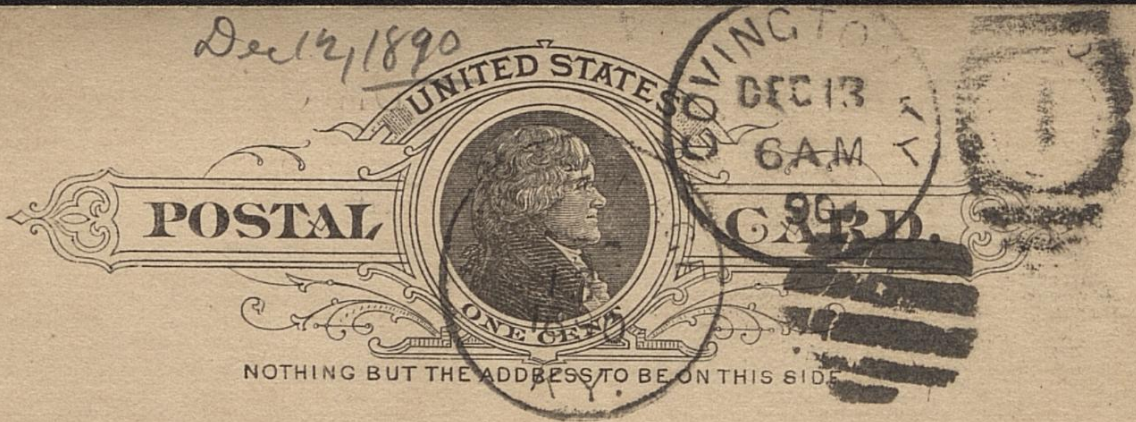

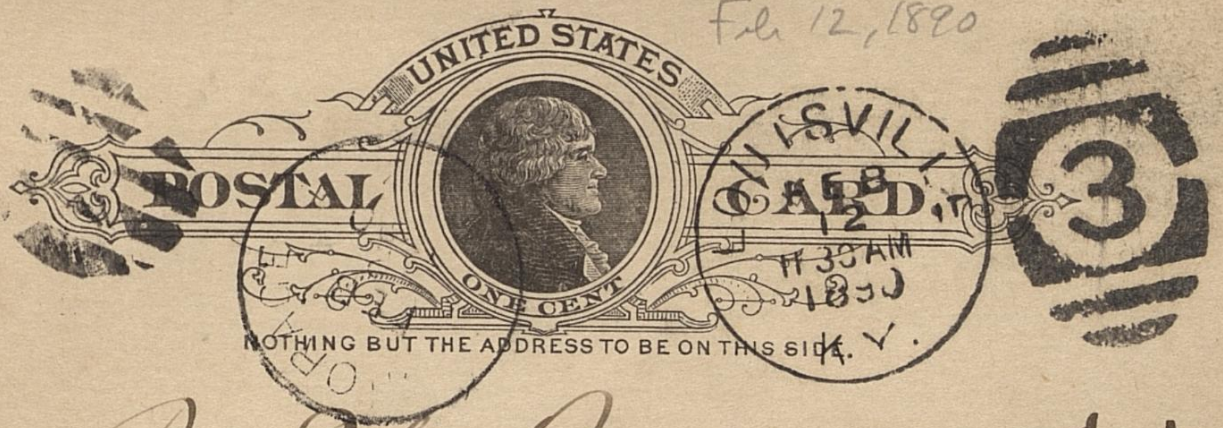

If I were in Louisville I could raise it: but I am pinned to my work here.

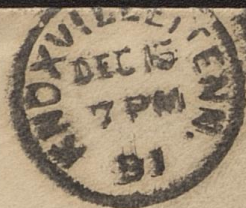

Please let me know ~~if you~~ you to Cleveland
Ohio. if any thing should prevent your coming.
Dr. Guerrant helped us greatly at Columbia two
years ago. Chester is not an efficient Chairman
of such a work as this: and it keeps me constantly

to the Synod?
