




Wildcat Coach



Joe B. Hall begins his 10th seatons as head coach of the Kentucky Wildcats with 11 returning lettermen, including five starters.

While leading the Wildcats to a 22-6 record last year, Hall upped his nine-year UK record to 205-66, an average of 22 wins per season, to keep ahead of the pace set by his former coach, Adolph Rupp, who averaged 21.5 victories a season over a 41-season span to become the winningest collegiate basketball coach of all time.

Perhaps the best appraisal of the job Hall has been doing at the University came from Rupp, who died in 1977.

"A good coach," Rupp said, "is a person who can take good material and win with it. Joe has done that."

Judging from Hall's coaching honors, Rupp was as usual, right on target with his evaluation.

Hall has won such honors as Kellogg's 1978 National "Coach of the Year," three Southeastern Conference "Coach of the Year" awards (1973, '75, and '78) in seven years, and nomination for Kodak's 1975, '76, and '78 (finalist) "Coach of the Year" awards.

In 1978 when Kentucky won its

fifth NCAA title, Hall was also presented the Rupp Cup (presented to the SEC Coach of the Year by the Birmingham Tipoff Club) and Hall's most coveted personal award, the Dr. James Naismith "Peachbasket" award, which previously had been awarded to UCLA's John Wooden, Oklahoma State's Hank Iba, Kentucky's Adolph Rupp, and the Boston Celtics' Red Auerbach.

The 1978 champions, which had a 30-2 record, became the sixth Wildcat team to win 30 or more games, joining such illustrious company as the 1947 NIT runner-up (34-3), the 1948 Olympic Champions (36-3), the 1949 NCAA champions (32-2), the 1951 NCAA champions (32-2), and the 1966 NCAA runner-up (32-2).

Entering this season, Hall's 15 year career coaching record stands at 281-122, (excluding a 17-2 record on a 1974 Australian tour, a 7-0 record on a 1978 Japan tour, and six pre-season exhibition wins against foreign and domestic teams) and that record was compiled against nationally ranked non-conference teams and teams in a conference that fast is becom-

ing recognized as among the toughest in the nation. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five-year mark at Regis, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 205-66 record at UK.

Hall began his tour as UK head coach in rather auspicious fashion, becoming in 1973 the first rookie coach in the SEC to be designated Coach of the Year by his fellow coaches and by Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Gathering such honors has been one of Hall's trademarks during a coaching career that began at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School in 1956 and continued through Regis College and Central Missouri State College before he returned to UK July 1, 1965, as an assistant to his former coach, Adolph Rupp.

During Hall's two years at Shepherdsville, the Rams won a Mid-Kentucky conference title and he was named "Coach of the Year" in 1958. He then served one year as freshman coach and five years as head basketball coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he was also athletic director and earned special recognition as



coach of the champion independent team in the area.

His next move was to Central Missouri, where he coached the Mules (19-6) to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and their first Christmas Tournament title in history. He was named MIAA "Coach of the Year" (1964-65).

A three-letter winner and team captain in both sports in high school at Cynthiana, Ky., he played freshman basketball and one year of varsity basketball in the "Fabulous Five" era at the University before transferring to the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., where he set a school single game scoring record and was team captain. Coach Lon Varnell, upon retirement, rated Hall as No. 1 of the three best players he ever coached.

After touring Europe with the Globetrotters in 1951, Hall returned to U.K. in 1955 to complete requirements for his B.A. and later (1964) received his M.A. at Colo-

rado State University.
Returning to U.K. again in 1965 an assistant coach and head recruiter, he was instrumental in adopting a running-conditioning program which obviously paid huge



dividends as the Wildcats capitalized on speed and endurance to offset a lack of size and advanced to the championship game of the NCAA Finals.

Hall became No. 1 varsity assistant and head freshman Coach to Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969.

International Flavor

Hall's basketball renown has attracted world-wide attention in international circles and has catapulted him into a much sought-after clinician and guest speaker. He has taken Wildcat teams on tours of Australia and Japan, where he conducted clinics and shared his basketball philosophy.

Hall considers one of his major coaching honors came when he was named guest lecturer for the World Basketball Coaches Congress in the Canary Islands, July 1977, before some 400 coaches from the international set.

He was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee, and in 1972 served under Hank Iba in the Olympic Trials at the Air Force Academy.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County, Ky. They have three children-Mrs. Kathy (Mike) Summers, Mrs. Judy (Rick) Derrickson and Steve of Lexington.

Administration



OTIS A. SINGLETARY University President

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University. His tenure has been marked by rapid growth and a commitment to excellence.

"The University, with all its problems, is still the single most important institution in the state," Dr. Singletary has said. "Its network of influence is felt throughout the state, not just in the instruction of the state's young people but in the great pattern of research, the things we are doing to improve the quality of human life and the wide range of services we are providing throughout the state.

"Contrary to popular opinion, our institutions of higher education are not operated exclusively for students, or for faculty members, or for administrators, or for trustees — or, for that matter, for all of these. Historically speaking, universities have been created and supported by our society to perform important functions for the common good of society. This is the larger meaning of the term, 'the public interest,' as it applies to institutions of higher education."

Before being named UK president in 1969, Dr. Singletary served as executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and as director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The Gulfport, Miss., native holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. He is a nationally recognized history scholar and is the author of two books and several monographs.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 19,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges. UK has gained an international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture. The University also is noted for its research in the fields of energy, tobacco and cancer. The Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging is one of the first facilities of its kind.

The UK Alumni Association has

recognized Dr. Singletary's special service by presenting him its Alumni Service Award. It is an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is in the second year of his two-year term as president of the Southeastern Conference. As University President, he serves as chairman of the board of directors of the UK Athletic Association, the body which maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict, he is commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

Athletics Director



CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.


The University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of 1982 and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985. The UK Relays were renewed this past

spring.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level

He was named in 1972, assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975.

Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). He went on to star in the NBA with the St. Louis Hawks and in the ABA with the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

A former teacher and counselor, Feamster is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Feamster

RUSSELL RICE Sports Information Staff Director

Russell Rice was named sports information director at U.K. in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High, served with the U.S. Marines in World War II, attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951.

For the past 13 years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He authored "The Wildcats: A Story of Kentucky Football," and "The Big Blue Machine: A Story of Kentucky Basketball." 

Leonard Hamilton was named the University of Kentucky's first associate basketball coach on Oct. 15, 1980.

Hamilton has been a member of the Wildcat coaching staff for seven years. He came to Kentucky after serving three years as an assistant coach at Austin Peay.

He has always been noted as an outstanding recruiter and as a defensive specialist. Most remarkable in his coaching career is the fact that in nine of his 10 years as a coach on the collegiate level, the team he has been associated with has advanced to post-season play. Only in his first season at Austin Peay has Hamilton not been involved in a post-season tournament

A native of Gastonia, N. C., Hamilton lettered three years in football and two years in basketball in high school. He captained his basketball team for two years at Gastonia Community College, and also served as team captain at Tennessee-Martin, where he graduated in 1970.

The 33-year-old Hamilton is married to the former Claudette Hale of McLemoresville, Tenn. They have a son, Lenny, 11.

UK's McCombs Always in Training

It was late in the first half and Kentucky was hustling to protect an early lead against nationally-ranked Alabama. Charles Hurt soared into the air for a rebound, but made a less-than-graceful landing; a mid-air collision sent Hurt's solid masses of muscle thundering to the ground with a resounding boom. Hurt's mother covered her face while the crowd gasped. Hurt's face showed pain.

Calmly, Walt McCombs walked to the court from his seat on the Kentucky bench and took over. Kentucky basketball's associate trainer had come to Hurts rescue.

The fact that Hurt went on to fniish the game and even win the sixth man award is an indication of Hurt's physical training—and the training of Walt McCombs.

"Walt completely takes away the worry from the coaching staff concerning the health of our athletes," said UK Coach Joe B. Hall. "He has a reputation of being an excellent athletic trainer."

McCombs' responsibilities with the Kentucky basketball team range from the taping of ankles to injury treatments to arranging pre-game snacks. The small, strawberry blond McCombs is obviously a popular member of the UK team. A recent conversation, for instance, went something like this:

When Sam Bowie arrived a few minutes late for ankle taping before practice, he found McCombs attired in blue sweat pants

attired in blue sweat pants.
"You been working out," Bowie kidded.

"Well," cracked McCombs, "in the time it took you to get here, I could have been in shape."

McCombs is not a physician; he

never took the hippocratic oath. "I had dreams of becoming a doctor," he said, "but I didn't have the brains or the time. I always enjoyed sports, so I thought I'd combine

both and be an athletic trainer."

McCombs grew up in Belton, S. C., a town of blue-collar textile workers. Although he played basketball in junior high school, but



never was a sports star. His professional dream, of becoming a doctor, was discouraged in a ninthgrade Latin class.

"My sister was a nurse," said McCombs, "and she said a lot of the prescriptions were written in Latin. I thought, 'I'd better take that Latin.' That's when I found out that the medical profession wasn't

my calling.

After high school graduation, Mc-Combs chose The Citadel. "I had an older brother at Clemson," he said, "so I didn't want to go there. I thought the atmosphere at The Citadel would be good for me."

McCombs graduated from The Citadel and joined the UK staff part-time in 1972 during the last

coaching year of Adolph Rupp. He then accepted a full-time position at Clemson, where he stayed for

three years. "At that time," said McCombs, "Clemson was trying to be competitive and build their programs. Kentucky already had the tradition and fan support.

After the stint at Clemson, it was back to Kentucky. He's stayed ever

In the training room at Memorial Coliseum, McCombs lines players on a long, white bench for ankle taping prior to practice. He tapes Sam Bowie's size 131/2 feet in approximately four minutes. "Everybody gets taped," said McCombs. "This provides ankle support.

After taping, the players suit up for practice. McCombs sits quietly at a desk situated in a carpeted area in the training room.

"I don't see how anyone could have it any better than here at Kentucky," said McCombs. "I haven't seen all that many other schools, but the ones I have seen just can't compare as far as facilities and liv-

ing quarters.'

McCombs is, however, rather well-traveled, as he journeys with the team on the road, making sure meals are served and securing night-before-game snacks of Quarter-pounders with cheese and Baskin-Robbins milkshakes.

"My biggest hassle on the road,"

he said, "is when a flight is delayed and I have about 30 minutes to tape 22 ankles."

A typical home game day would find McCombs at the UK Student Center early enough to check on 10:30 a.m. brunch. After eating, McCombs administers any required treatments to the players, then it's off to spend time with his wife, Shelby, and daughters, Crystal and Emily.

Pre-game activities begin for Mc-Combs at around 2:30 p.m., and the work moves to Rupp Arena around 5 p.m. McCombs doesn't leave after the game until every player's health is satisfactory.


McCombs' low-key personality has made him a popular member of the athletic staff

"Walt's a great guy, one of a kind," said Melvin Turpin. "Better yet, he's a good friend."

Walt McCombs has accomplished his goal of combining a love for sports and a yearning to be a doctor into a career in sports training. But he still dreams.

"When I die," said McCombs, "I'm going to be reincarnated as a white Melvin Turpin with the speed of Dicky Beal and the eye of Jim Master."



A Perfect Four

Education Graduate Enjoying Perfection

Connie Doyle is definitely the kind of person you would want to "write home to momma about."

As a matter of fact, people who know her—particularly those in the University of Kentucky's College of Education—would like to write to just about everyone they know about her.

In December, the 21-year-old Wallins, Ky., native (a community of about 400 in Harlan County), became the first education major since 1976 to graduate from the UK education college with a perfect academic standing.

"In the past 10 years, we have had 5,080 students graduate from the College of Education and Miss Doyle is only the second student to attain a 4.0 standing," said Dr. Harry Barnard, associate dean of teacher education and certification at UK.

Obviously pleased with her academic record, but not necessarily overwhelmed by it all, Miss Doyle believes similar academic records can be achieved with good study habits—like the two to three hours of study she put in every night.

of study she put in every night.
"I had to study for my grades,"
she said. "I didn't just go in there
and have them given to me."

Already in her first teaching job with a class of sixth graders at her native Wallins Elementary School, Miss Doyle is so engrossed with her new career that she hasn't had much time to dwell on past successes.

"I'm enjoying it more than I ever thought I would," she says of her new career. "I enjoy how the students can make me feel at times; I just enjoy kids."

But teaching isn't exactly what the gifted student started out to do.

After graduating in 1978 from Cawood High School—where she also made all A's and was named valedictorian—Miss Doyle thought she was on her way to becoming an accountant.

After her second semester at

Southeast Community College in Cumberland, and some tutoring work with her fellow students, she began to realize how rewarding a teaching career might be.

A stint as a substitute teacher when she was just a 19-year-old sophomore at Southeast also provided some on-the-job positive reenforcement to her new thoughts of becoming a teacher.

She also was receiving some encouragement from her friends and family in Harlan County because there were several openings in the school. "A lot of people asked me to go into elementary education because there were a lot of openings," she recalls.

Particular encouragement came from her aunt who is a teacher in Evarts, another Harlan County community. "She motivated me to get the good grades and go on to

college," Miss Doyle says of her new teaching colleague.

Did she ever think her perfect academic standing was in jeopardy? "My freshman year (at Southeast), I was really worried about English 102," she said. "I really didn't know I had gotten an A until I received my grades."

Miss Doyle's academic record had a substantial payoff when she transferred to UK in Lexington—a scholarship. "The first year at Southeast, I made all A's and then I wanted to make all A's in order to get the scholarship," she said.

She attended summer school one semester at both Southeast and UK in order to complete her college studies in 3½ years.

Another obvious motivation in Miss Doye's life is her desire to help others, an attitude which was obvious from the title of her valedictorian speech—"Helping Others for the Future."

That attitude manifested itself in Southeast where she served for awhile as treasurer of the school's student association; through her years at UK; and her current activities in the Wallin's Church of

God where she is a choir member and a youth group leader.

She also practices her own brand of "positivism" toward discipline in her classroom. "I find that a more positive attitude—positive reenforcement for the students; rewards—works better than punishment," she says.

Some punishment is required, obviously, but she prefers that the punishment be meted out on an individual basis. "I try to set it up on an individual basis, like missing a recess or break."

And, what does she advise young people from her community about their college careers? "I guess I'd tell them not to try to choose a career in the first year; look for

what you want to do, and do a little research to find out if there is a need for the career you want."

Miss Doyle has no intention of closing the academic door on her career—graduate school has already entered her mind. "I want to teach in high school, and then in college—either education or mathematics."

A family-oriented individual, Miss Doyle said her parents, Delilah and Rondal, couldn't have been more pleased. "Oh, they were really proud," she said. "They bought me a steak dinner." Where? Why, at the only place around—Western Sizzlin.

Scouting Report: Georgia

Coach Hugh Durham is right on schedule in his efforts to build the Bulldogs into an SEC contender. The entire 1980-81 team is back. That squad played in the NIT marking the first time a Georgia team had ever received a post-season tourney invitation.

Leading the Bulldogs, of course, is All-America Dominque Wilkins, a 6-7 junior forward who led the conference in scoring last season with a 23.6 average. Wilkins also earned MVP honors in the SEC Tournament last season. A super leaper, Wilkins blocked 73 of Georgia's 105 blocked shots last year. He also shot 53 percent from the field. It was good news indeed for Durham when Wilkins announced he woud not participate in the NBA hardship draft.

The real workhorse of the Bulldog team will once again be center-forward Terry Fair. Kentucky's Sam Bowie has said that Fair does all the dirty work for Georgia and he said meant it as a compliment. Fair is the one who has led the Bulldogs in rebounding the past two seasons and is ninth on the Georgia career rebounding list. He picks up the "junk" baskets and is tenacious on defense. He has to be because he is only 6-7.

Sophomore James Banks returns to the Bulldog front line. The 6-6 Atlanta product started 31 consecutive games at forward last year and finished as the team's third leading rebounder (5 rpg) and fifth leading scorer (8.7 ppg).

Lamar Heard, a 6-5 junior, was the Bulldogs' relief man on the front line. The 1980-81 Georgia Bulldog Leadership Award winner is expected to see more action this season, as is Sid Truesdale (6-4), according to Durham.


In the backcourt, Georgia counts on Vern Fleming and Eric Marbury. The 6-5 Fleming earned first team All-SEC Freshman honors last year. He averaged only 2.3 turnovers per game and that's not bad for a freshman point guard. Fleming was fourth in scoring (10 ppg) and led the 'Dogs in steals with 43 and in assists with 86 (ninth in the SEC).

The Bulldogs are counting on Eric Marbury to provide senior

leadership. The 6-2 guard averaged 11.3 ppg last season and now ranks 18th on Georgia's all-time scoring chart. Wilmore Fowler (6-1 senior) and Derrick Floyd (6-3 junior) back up at guard with Floyd on the way back from a knee injury suffered last year in the Kentucky game at Lexington. Phil Wallace (6-4 sophomore) had to make the adjustment from high school center to college point guard last season and the staff is pleased with his progress.


The freshmen include three point guards and a forward. Gerald Crosby (6-1), Darryl Lenard (5-6) and Jeff Putman (5-11) are the backcourt men while Richard Corhen (6-6) will see spot action at forward.

"We intend to play fast-paced basketball again this year," said Durham at the beginning of the season, adding Georgia again would be mainly a man-to-man defensive team

Durham enters his fourth season at Georgia with a record of 47-39. His 15-year coaching record is an outstanding 277-134, good for a winning percentage of .674. In terms of winning seasons at Georgia, there have only been seven in the past 30 years, and Durham has directed Georgia to back-to-back winning seasons.

The most memorable season in quite some time was Durham's third team—the 1980-81 Bulldogs. Posting 19 wins, it marked the first time in 41 years a Bulldog basketball unit had won as many games. The only Georgia team to win more games was the 1930-31 Bulldogs, who finished with a 23-2 record.

Durham's impact grew to greater heights in '80-81 as another attendance record was snapped. An average of 7,878 fans turned out for Georgia's 12 home games, breaking the record set last year.

Durham was one of the finest athletes to exit Louisville, Ky. He earned 14 letters in four years, and was All-State in football, All-Region in basketball.

Durham enrolled at Florida State University in 1956 and went on to become one of the finest guards in FSU history. In three years as a varsity regular, Durham scored 1,387 points, good for seventh on FSU's all-time scoring list.

He was a member of the Gold Key Honorary Society, and was named to Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities. In May of 1980, he was installed into the FSU Athletic Hall of Fame. He is only one of five players to score



more than 500 points for FSU in two seasons.

Durham graduated from FSU in 1959 with a B.A. in Business Administration. He then earned his Masters in the same field at State. Durham served as a graduate assistant for six seasons before being named head coach for the Seminoles in 1966.

After taking over the Seminole head job, he compiled a 230-95

record for a .708 winning percentage, the 12th best record among collegiate coaches at that time.

Durham's 1972 FSU team advanced to the finals of the NCAA Tournament, losing to UCLA, 81-76. That squad finished with a 27-6 record. His 1977-78 squad won the Metro Conference's regular season title, and Durham was named Metro Coach of the Year for his accomplishments.





FRED C. DAVISON University President

Dr. Fred C. Davison is the seventeenth president of the University of Georgia, the nation's oldest chartered state university.

Dr. Davison was born in Atlanta and grew up in Marietta. He holds the D.V.M. degree from the University of Georgia (1952) and the Ph.D. degree from Iowa State University as Research Associate. At ISU he was appointed assistant professor on the department teaching staff and an Associate of the Institute for Atomic Research.

Dr. Davison left Iowa State in 1963 to become Assistant Director of the Department of Scientific Activities of the American Veterinary Medical Association in Chicago, a position he held until he became Dean of the University of Georgia School of Veterinary Medicine in 1964.

After two years, he was appointed Vice Chancellor of the University System of Georgia.

Founded in 1785, the University of Georgia offers majors in seven different fields of study. Under graduate degrees may be obtained from 13 different colleges on the Georgia campus. This is supported by a faculty of nearly 2,000.


Athletics Director

He has become one of the most successful head football coaches in the country during his long tenure at Georgia, and his Bulldogs won the 1980 National Championship.


