Inspection, Certification, and Transportation of Nursery Stock in Kentucky, with a Brief Report for the Year Ended June 30, 1938.

For several years, it has been the practice of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, thru its Entomologist, to publish an informal bulletin for nurserymen and others interested in the sale of plants. It states the procedure necessary to obtain licenses for nurserymen, dealers, and agents. It contains information regarding the interstate shipment of nursery stock. Activities in connection with a few recently introduced insect pests and diseases are discussed briefly. A list of licensed nurserymen, dealers, and agents is supplied.

REQUIREMENTS

A Resident Nurseryman must pay the required fee of \$5.00 and his nursery must pass inspection before a certificate of inspection is issued.

A Non-resident Nurseryman must file with the office of the State Entomologist a copy of his inspection certificate and pay the required fee of \$5.00 before a non-resident nurseryman's permit is issued.

A Nursery Dealer is required to file with the office of the State Entomologist a blank, furnished on request, properly filled and notarized, giving names and addresses of nurseries from whom he obtains stock, and to pay the required fee of

\$5.00. If the nurseries supplying the stock are properly certified, a dealer's permit is issued.

A Nursery Agent is required to file with the office of the State Entomologist a blank, furnished on request, properly filled and notarized, giving the name of the nursery to be represented, and to pay the required fee of \$5.00. If the nursery represented is properly certified, an agent's permit is issued. A resident nurseryman is required to give a list of all agents soliciting business in Kentucky. Agents representing resident nurseries are issued permits without charge.

All certificates and permits automatically expire June 30th of each year. Renewals should be made promptly upon

expiration if maximum benefit is to be derived.

DEFINITIONS

Nurseryman. A person or corporation growing and offering for sale plants classed as nursery stock.

Nursery Dealer. A person or corporation who does not grow nursery stock but who buys nursery stock and offers it for resale.

Nursery Agent. A person or corporation who neither grows nor buys nursery stock but who takes orders for nursery stock grown by someone else or who sells nursery stock on consignment.

Nursery Stock. All fruit and shade trees, whether cultivated or collected, roses, ornamental shrubbery, vines, strawberry plants, raspberry and blackberry plants, sweetpotato plants, herbaceous perennial plants and roots, ornamental bulbs, tubers and corms, and any other plants which may serve as a medium for disseminating injurious insect pests and plant diseases. Because of the comparatively little pest risk, herbaceous annuals, greenhouse and house plants, and garden vegetable plants are not classed as nursery stock.

INFORMATION FOR SHIPPING NURSERY STOCK

All states in the United States, as well as foreign countries, have laws and regulations governing the movement of erly

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nursery stock into and within their boundaries. These laws and regulations differ in the several states and countries but their principal objective is to avoid the introduction of plant pests and to prevent the spread of those already established. Not only are the laws different in the various states and countries but they are constantly undergoing change. This emphasizes the desirability of having at hand the latest requirements of the states into which shipment is contemplated.

To ship nursery stock into the following states, it is necessary to file duplicate inspection certificates with their respective officials.

There are many State and Federal Quarantines which regulate the movement of nursery stock, as well as other products. Some of the more important Federal Quarantines regulating the movement of nursery stock are as follows: White Pine Blister Rust, Quarantine No. 63; Black Stem Rust of Grains, Quarantine No. 38; Gypsy Moth and Browntail Moth, Quarantine No. 45; Japanese Beetle, Quarantine

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No. 48; Satin Moth, Quarantine No. 53; and Dutch Elm Disease, Quarantine No. 71 as amended.

It is important to know the provisions for shipment and the infested area under regulation in order to lessen the risk of importing infested or infected stock as well as to avoid delay or destruction of shipments made in violation of any of the above quarantines. Copies of Federal Quarantines may be obtained by addressing the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, U. S. D. A., Washington, D. C.

State quarantines regulate the movements of stock likely to carry pests not included in Federal quarantines. To avoid difficulties in delivery of nursery stock shipments going to other states, the shipper should consult the proper official of the state in question. For convenience, a list of officers in charge of inspection and regulation of nursery stock in the various states is given below.

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JAPANESE BEETLE

Trapping for Japanese beetle by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the U.S.D. A. was continued during the summer of 1937. Traps were operated in Louisville, Lexington, Newport, and Frankfort. Eleven beetles were taken, ten in Louisville and one in Lexington. Of the ten beetles trapped in Louisville, nine were caught within a small area in the southern section of the city in three adjoining blocks. Following recommendations of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, treatment of approximately five acres of ground, including the properties on which beetles were trapped, was undertaken. Lead arsenate was used at the rate of 1,000 pounds per acre. This was applied in liquid form followed by clear water to wash the material off the foliage and force it into the ground where it was available to the grubs of the Japanese beetle feeding on the grass roots. The treatment was completed May 28, 1938, after using 5,000 pounds of lead arsenate at a total cost of \$700.00 to the State. So small an expenditure of state funds, which were secured from the Governor's emergency fund, was possible because the equipment together with an operator and supervisor were furnished by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the U.S.D. A. and the labor and water were furnished by cooperating organizations in Louisville.

PHONY PEACH DISEASE

Phony peach inspection was continued during the summer of 1937. This work was done by the Federal Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine and the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station cooperating. One infected tree was found near Sebree, in Webster County. This made a total of nine trees which have been identified as infected with phony peach disease since the beginning of this work in 1935. The fact that seven of the nine infected trees were found during the first inspection season in 1935 and no infected trees have been found north or east of Webster and Henderson Counties lends encouragement to the belief that the disease can be checked in Kentucky before it has become widespread and has caused much damage. All infected trees that were discovered have been removed and destroyed.
