The pre-entry week program that was offered by the Medical Center Minority Affairs helped Sherrie Davis know who's helping her continue to pave the way for other minority health care professionals — and to know who paved the way for her.

SGA pushes for earlier school year

It is every student's biggest fear; just a week before finals, an assignment to finish, a paper to write and a semseters worth of biology to absorb before next week.

If the Student Government Association's recent proposal is approved, this nightmare could no longer be a reality.

SGA is proposing changes in the academic calendar, said Edwin Orange, a political science senior and SGA senate chairperson.

SGA is requesting that fall and spring semester classes begin two days earlier so that students can have two extra days at semester's end to study for finals.

The proposal will have to be passed by the University Senate. The Senate is comprised of faculty members and one student from every college on campus. The Senate in policy at University Senate. designated as a time for students to break from assignments and study for finals. Orange said he hopes this will change so students get the time off to study for tests.

"Students have requested more study the tests. "Students have requested more study the before finals," said Jason Johnson, psycholgy senior and an arts and sciences senator. "This proposal will give students and faculty a real dead week."

The proposal would not only give students extra time to study, but would also provide professors and other faculty members more time to grade assignments, Orange said.

"We had to have the support of the faculty and administration, because they like to have control of their classes," Orange said. "This proposal was the only practical one to meet both students' and professors' overall needs."

In order for the proposal to be approved, it must be presented to the University Senate Council. The executive committee must vote on it; if the majority votes in favor, it is then passed on to the full body of the Senate where it must again receive a majority vote to be approved.

SGA is also forwarding copies of the

proposal to campus departments, such as Residence Life and Greek Affairs, that may be affected by the potential change. Not all students agree with the proposal. "Having a short first week is good. Students shouldn't need extra time to study for finals," argues Adam Russell, a UK sophomore. "If you'r re really prepared, you should be able to jump right into the final without any extra days."

Many students, such as Jessica Lennon, a UK sophomore, agree with the proposal and hope that the University Senate will pass it.

"I can understand some students not liking the shortened time to adjust to school, but really finals are more important in the end," Lennon said.

Some students may be concerned about not having the two days before classes begin to get prepared if the proposal is passed. Orange said having the extra days to study for finals would be a fair exchange.

"Students can still pick up anything they need the weekend before school starts, and this way they'll have more time to study, If's a beneficial trade-off."

Cheney: Gore misses military issues

WASHINGTON — The U.S. military has serious problems that Vice President Al Gore either doesn't understand or has "chosen not to tell the truth about," Republican vice presidential candidate Dick Cheney said today. And, in response to an irate letter from a Democratic senator, Cheney refused to back down from a campaign statement depicting the Army veteran Gore as being "AWOL" on Veterans' Issues." In response, Gore campaign spokesman Douglas Hattaway said the Republicans have lost all credibility on defense. "Cheney already admitted that military downsizing began under the Bush-Quayle-Cheney administration," Hattaway said.

Survey: violent crime down 10 percent

WASHINGTON — The violent crime rate declined by 10.4 percent last year, the largest one-year drop in the 26-year history of the government's largest crime survey, the Justice Department reported yesterday. The property crime rate fell 8.9 percent from 1988 to 1989, according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics' national crime victimization survey. President Clinton called the figures "further proof that the Clinton Gore administration's anti-crime strategy of more police on our streets and fewer guns in the wrong hands has helped to create the safest America in a generation."

Philippines rebels free 5 hostages

JOLO, Philippines — Five foreign hostages released by Muslim rebels walked into freedom yesterday looking stumed, some in tears and leaving family members still captive in the jungle on a remote Philippine Island. The Abu Sayyaf separatist guerrillas released the four women and one man after Libya agreed to pay 81 million for each, negotiators said. The rebels were still holding seven other Westerners and 12 Filipinos. Libyan Ambassador Saleem Adam dismissed allegations that his country was trying to improve its international image by bankrolling the ransom.

Israelis die in botched Islamic raid

ASSIRA ASHMALIA, West Bank — A botched raid on an Islamic militant hide-out in this West Bank village ended yesterday with three Israeli soldiers dead -all possibly by friendly fire - and Palestinian officials angry at how Israel handles threats to peace between the two peoples. The target of the nighttime raid was Mahmoud Abu Hanoud, who is blamed for two 1997 bombings that killed at least 21 Israelis. Abu Hanoud, known as the leader of the militant Hamas group's military wing, was wounded and led the shoot-out before giving himself up to Palestinian forces to receive medical attention.

Winds threaten Western fires

HELENA, Mont. — Firefighters were on their guard yesterday as more windy weather threatened to worsen wildfires that already had turned hundreds of thousands of acres of forest to ash. Wind already was blamed for creating a firestorm in South Dakota's mountainous Black Hills. Montana fires burned an additional 13,000 acres Saturday as blustery weather swept through the region.

Cubs' White out for rest of season

CHICAGO — Chicago Cubs outfielder Rondell White is out for the rest of the season after dislocating his left shoulder sliding headfirst on a steal attempt. "That was my worst fear," Cubs manager Don Baylor said yesterday of losing White, acquired from Montreal at the trading deadline. The injury-prone White jammed the shoulder in the bottom of the sixth inning in Saturday's 64 victory over the Dodgers. He was thrown out, and he got up holding his left arm.

AIDS, which is primarily transmitted sexually in Africa, is entirely preventable, Clinton reminded his audience. About 2.6 million Nigerians, 5.4 percent of the population, are afflicted with AIDS. COVINGTON, Ky. (AP)—
Child-advocacy groups are lending their support to an Ohio couple involved in a two-state custody battle over a 3-year-old boy.

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

Euclid bike lanes are a healthy step in the right direction

As a cyclist, transportation engineer, and member of Lexing-ton's Bicycle and Pedestrian Advi-sory Committee, I was disappoint-ed by the one-sided negative arti-cle on Euclid Avenue on August

I agree education is needed re-garding Euclid and the bike lanes are too wide. But let's not give up because of a few problems. First, the Euclid bicycle lanes start and end abruptly. It would be great if they connected to more by cycle lanes or a bike trail. But we

can only build a city-wide network

can only build a city-wide network one piece at a time.

Second, drivers fail to understand both the bicycle lanes and the center left turn lane. The center lane is for transition to and from Euclid but not for travel along Euclid. To make a right turn, drivers should ensure no bicycles are coming and then merge into the bike lane only one or two car lengths before the corner.

Finally, bicyclists MUST ride on the right. Riding against trafficeven in a bicycle lane, is very dangerous. Transportation safety depends on users following rules ensuring predictability. When cars enter from driveways or pedestrians cross a street they look left, the direction traffic should be coming from. When bicycles travel the other way they are not expected and are often not seen.

Bicycles are space efficient,

non-polluting and healthy. Every bicycle is one less car thereby re-ducing traffic delays for everyone else. Every year there are more students and more employees but there is no space for more roads— let's look for better transportation solutions— Euclid was one great (not perfect) first step.

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


