FOLKSTON, Ga. — A military shell brought to
class by a high school student exploded yesterday
when it was dropped while being passed around, injuring 12 students, three critically.

"These are very serious, devastating military-type
injuries. This is not the sort of thing you'd see on the
streets of America," said Dr. David Vukich, chief of
emergency medicine at University Medical Center in
Jacksonville, Fla., just south of Folkston.
Gregory Douglas, who brought the shell to school,
told students moments before it exploded that it was
harmless, said Jed Norton, an emergency worker from
Irwin County.
Twenty-five students were in a class in a musicappreciation class in a band room at Charlton County
High School when Shannon Chesser dropped the
60mm shell, Norton said. Residents a quarter-mile
from the school reported feeling the ground shake.

Scientists take big step in gene therapy

Scientists take hig step in gene therapy
MADISON, Wis. — Scientists working with monkeys have taken a crucial step toward a new kind of
gene therapy in which tissue such as bone and blood
could one day be grown in the laboratory and used to
cure diseases in humans.

The researchers isolated for the first time embryonic monkey cells known as stem cells.

In two to four years, the cells could lead to the creation of genetically altered monkeys with illnesses that
minic human diseases such as AIDS and multiple
sclerosis. That could advance the study of those discases.

Number of female smokers rising

ATLANTA — Young black women have virtually given up smoking while more young white women are lighting up, ending what has been a quarter-century decline in the number of female smokers, the government reported yesterday.

In 1965, one in three women smoked. Since then, there has been a steady drop in the number of female smokers.

Unwelcome visitors bugging UK students

Pests invading South Campus

South Campus residents are bugged — literally. In recent weeks, ladybugs have infested most of UK's South Cam-pus residence halls, crawling in through windows and vents and making their homes in students' rooms.

Lee Townsend, an entomologist with UK's Cooperative Extension Service, said it seems to be worst in South Campus halls because "the bugs are crawling in more easier into one set of buildings than others."

Townsend also said the bugs generally concentrate around heavily wooded areas. The bugs reproduce in the wooded areas, so "the closer you are to the source, the more (bugs) you will get in the buildings."

In their natural habitat, ladybugs live in cracks and crevices in limestone. When they invade a house, they usually are trying to find a place to hide, Townsend said, days and the services are the services of the servi

find a place to hide, Townsend said.

Ladybugs do not settle down for the winter like most insects, but stay active all season.

"No one knows where they are coming from," said frustrated Kirwan II resident Heidi Gregorini, an advertising junior. "They are everywhere in our dorm."

Accounting sophomore and Kirwan II resident Carrie Kirk said she's probably killed about 80 of the insects.

"It's been about two months,

three weeks," Finnell said.
Shirley Durbin, a staff assistant
at Kirwan Tower, said, however,
that there have no complaints at
Kirwan Tower related to ladybugs.

Townsend's advice to residents
with ladybugs is to sweep and discard the bugs.

Ladybugs have a defense mechanism called reflex bleeding.

The bugs emit a chemical,
which gives off an unusual odor
and may leave a yellow stain, if
they are injured. To prevent this,
Townsend's said, students should
gently brush the bugs into a bag.

A sign in Kirwan III advises
students to seal entrances where
bugs could enter and turn off all
lights when they are not in their
rooms.

LCC poll shows dissatisfaction with incumbents

Nearly a quarter of all central Kentuckians believe Gov. Brereton Jones is doing a poor job, according to a poll released yesterday by a Lexington Community College professor.

The poll, which was conducted by students of political science teacher Tim Cantrell, questioned more than 2,100 central Kentuckians about a variety of issues, ranging from the leadership of Jones to U.S. involvement in Hairi.

Only 2 percent of those surveyed said Jones was doing an outstanding job as governor, while 24 percent said he was doing a poor job; 44 percent gave the governor fair marks, while 23 percent rated Jones leadership good.

Kentuckians were more divided over the leadership of President Clinton. Fully 30 percent gave him outstanding marks. More than 60 percent asid Clinton was doing a fair tog oodj ob.


Trends for both Clinton and Jones show that satisfaction rates have dropped considerably since an LCC poll last spring, when 36 percent of respondents rated Clinton as "good" or" outstanding."

That reflects a national mood right now against incumbent politicians, "Cantrell said.

One of the questions in the survey asked about the impact death row executions could have on gubernatorial candidates.

About 33 percent of the voters said they would have at least moderate support for a candidate who sought to resume the executions.

"The person in the governor's race that takes the strongest stand in favor of the death penalty will get a lot of vores," Cantrell said. James B. Goode, director of the Appalachian Archives at Southeast Community College, who participated in the creating display, said the photos "dispell the stereotypes of Appalachian women."

"Typical images of Appalachian women having no teeth, smoking non-filtered cigarettes and being barely educated is not realistic," he said. "In fact, there are six women for every one man enrolled in Appalachian deducation. These women will affect culture.

Goode said the display shows "lots of native, Appalachian women that have taken professional jobs and have done well."

Also on display are large acrylic paintings by artist Larry May that depict Appalachian women and deal with topics like breast cancer and incest.


