September 24th The Faculty met at 9 o'clock A.M. and continued the examination of witnesses in the "Denton Case."

Messrs. Williams, Mc Ghee, Morrison, Ryan, Booth A. F. Snow and J. R. Snow were examined.

After listening to their testimony the Faculty were unable to decide the case. The Pres. suggested that if the witnesses could be examined upon their oaths, some facts could be obtained which would decide the case. Maj. Tibbitts was requested to correspond with the proper authorities at Washington to see if he, as an officer of the U. S. Army, was empowered to swear a man "to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth." Mr. Denton was then released from arrest, and told that the further trial of case was postponed until the Faculty should see proper to resume it.

Mr. J. Mefford applied for permission not to attend Chapel service on Sunday afternoons. His application was refused and a regulation was made to the effect that no student should be excused from Chapel on Sunday afternoons.

On motion the Faculty adjourned.
