



Easter Month Keeps KY. Fairness Association Hopping

KFA celebrated Easter with a series of trials and triumphs. First, let's accentuate the positive: the legislative season ended April 12th without HB 236 getting signed into law. KFA rested easier at the defeat of the bill that would have effectively eliminated all existing local fairness policies. In fact, no bill detrimental to LGBTQ persons made it out of committee. No one even bothered to submit a bill banning the ability of GLQTB persons to adopt. Furthermore, the statewide fairness bill enjoyed a record number of sponsors.

To celebrate these victories, KFAers earned a little relaxation and some hard-earned visibility at the governor's Easter egg-roll. Christina Gilgor, executive director of KFA, accompanied by her partner and children, participated in the event. She reports that three gay families came to the event wearing Hawaiian leis, and two heterosexual families asked to wear leis to show solidarity and support.

Of course, the legislative season's ending does not mean that KFA gets an extended vacation. The QTBLG community suffered some major setbacks in April. Governor Ernie Fletcher signed an executive order that stripped BTQLG people of protection in state employment. As he signed the order that reversed former Governor Paul Patton's inclusionary clause, Fletcher proudly proclaimed the day Diversity Day.

The irony sucker-punched many Kentuckians across the entire state. To add a clichéd insult to injury, Fletcher contended that his administration was not discriminating but merely following federal guidelines, as if his administration were the textbook example of following federal guidelines. Fletcher's handiwork has reinforced a second-class citizenship of LGBTQ Kentuckians and turned Diversity Day into something more akin to Day of the WASP. Assuredly, KFA will not sit back

and applaud Fletcher's actions but will develop strong campaigns in the coming months to battle such bitter and blatant discrimination, ignorance, hatred, and fear.

Also in April, KFA focused on another issue: Jason Johnson's expulsion from the University of the Cumberlands for being an out-and-proud homosexual. The school's administration intercepted Johnson on his way to class about three weeks before the end of the semester and informed him that he would be expelled that day and would receive F's for all of his classes despite his status as a dean's-list student.

Unfortunately, the University of the Cumberlands is a private institution that can implement such egregious policies. In mid April, Johnson's lawyer and the University reached an agreement that will allow Johnson to submit his final assignments and earn the grades he merits.

While KFA certainly rejoices that Johnson's academic standing will not be jeopardized, it is still creating responses to this reprehensible discrimination because the issue at hand delves much deeper than Jason Johnson.

The proposed state budget allots \$11 million to the University of the Cumberlands to develop a pharmacy school. KFA does not approve of the allocation of tax dollars to religious institutions. Such allocations represent a clear violation of the separation of church and state. Representative Kathy Stein and Senator Ernesto Scorsone have asked the governor to use his power of lineitem veto to revoke the funds allocated to the University of the Cumberlands.

KFA director Christina Gilgor personally delivered more than 400 letters to the governor's office demanding that he veto that part of the budget. In addition, KFA, in conjunction with the Kentucky Collegiate Coalition, hosted a rally April 19th in Williamsburg, KY.

Kelli Persons, chairperson of the Kentucky Collegiate Coalition, approached KFA about helping with the rally. She says that "KCC members support Jason and all gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender students in Kentucky. continued on page 12

No student should be denied access to an education based on sexual orientation or any other difference. Fair-minded Kentuckians are outraged that any discrimination is allowed to happen in our state. We are deeply concerned that other students in Kentucky and elsewhere will have to face the fear that their right to an education and to be themselves is in jeopardy."

Hailed as a success, the rally featured speeches by Senator Scorsone, the Reverend Al Pennybacker, Christina Gilgor, Jason Johnson's boyfriend Zac Dreyer, and students from at least six different universities.

As of press time, the budget issue rested solely in the hands of Governor Fletcher. Rep. David Williams of Burkesville held his own rally to encourage the governor not to veto the University of the Cumberlands allotment, yet, despite Williams' pressure, KFA looks to Fletcher to uphold constitutional law and veto that money. Sadly enough, Fletcher may once again pander to his demographic, allowing that money to go through to the University even though he daily bemoans the fact that the budget is stretched too thin.

Gilgor and KFA are preparing to confront this allocation of public funds.. KFA will do all that it can to make sure that the road to the University getting that money is chock full of speed bumps and potholes. Gilgor is developing a legal team and strategy to present a legal challenge based on constitutional law. Several lawyers have expressed interest in participating in this legal challenge.

So, what is on the horizon for KFA? Besides the struggles in the political arena, the Bluegrass Chapter will celebrate the Kentucky Derby with a party at Windy Knoll Farms. (see pge 3)

Research Participants Sought

Researchers at the University of Kentucky and University of Memphis are looking for participants for a new online survey about experiences related to the debate over the recognition of civil marriage rights for same-sex couples.

This is a study of the attitudes and experiences of gay, lesbian, bisexual, same-gender loving, and same-sex partnered persons regarding the debate over recognition of civil marriage for same-sex couples. The study is being conducted by Ellen Riggle, PhD., & Sharon Rostosky, Ph.D., at U.K., and Sharon Horne, Ph.D., at the Univ. of Memphis.

The purpose of this study is to document attitudes and experiences at several points in time in all states. Our hope is that the findings from this research project will contribute to an understanding of the experiences of GLB and same-sex partnered individuals in the United States during these times.

If you are 18 or older and a U.S. citizen, please consider participation. The survey will take you approximately 15 minutes to complete. The deadline to complete the survey in order to enter a drawing for gift certificates is June 15.

Telling Our Stories

We are beginning a series, of personal stories: coming out stories and other accounts of how being in some way outside of societies norms has been experienced by you in this particular place and time. History is not just what historians write about the past, it is the letters, documents, works of art, a variety of images and artifacts, and stories left behind by the people who lived their lives often without a thought as to how their lives will influence people in the future. Our stories are the original sources out of which "history" will be written.

GLBTQ people look for and find evidence that people like us have been present in every time and place. We are often particularly drawn to the personal stories of people who came before us.

Here is our first story:

Jackie's Story

When we are born, most of us are immediately labeled as either male or female. Babies that are intersexed, whose sex is not easily determined, are assigned a label because our society is "sure" that you have to be one or the other. But, no one knows at that time what gender we will identify as later in life. Each of us as individuals through our personal life experiences decide if we identify as male, female or perhaps as neither or both.

We are also all assumed from birth to be heterosexual. Fortunately today there is

more help for young people as they realize they do not fit into societies expectations for them. But, it is still a struggle for many of us. I hope my story may help other people who are trying to figure out who they are.

I came from a broken family and I did the traditional chores done by the male members of the family. Such as mowing grass, and washing the car. I was dressed as a boy and encouraged to play sports and "boyish" games. I became a full fledged tomboy.

My best friends were boys. I didn't like playing with girls unless it was to beat them up. We built clubhouses, played army, ball, and worked on our bikes. My grandmother joked sometimes and called me her grandson in front of her friends.

I was one of the first girls on an all boys baseball team. When the other mothers stood up and screamed for me to get off the field my grandmother stood up and told them to shut up. There was only one other girl in the league. I believe she enjoyed playing against me as much as I enjoyed playing against her. We were proud of making this small step in our little town.

One time a girl thought I was a boy and I went along with it to the point of going into the boys bathroom with my friend, who was a boy. We were seeing how far we could carry the joke. I ended up giving her my phone number and talking to her several times on the phone, but I never saw her again. I thought it was pretty funny.

I didn't know at that time that I was gay. I didn't even know the category existed. I did have three boyfriends in school, none really did anything for me though. However, I was in love with different female teachers. I got my heart broken several times when their boyfriends or husbands would show up.

When I was 15 my family got spilt up even further. I was sent to an emergency shelter in Louisville, KY called Brooklawn. I met two counselors there named Carla and Donna who turned out to be partners. I was real troubled by what was happening in my family and I had problems dealing with it all. Of course at 15, I was also coming to terms with my sexual desires.

I ran away from the shelter after breaking my hand. Carla and Donna came out looking for me and I remember thinking "Wow, nobody has shown they cared that much for me before. Here are two strangers and they care enough to go looking for me on their own time."

So I came back and the three of us talked. I told them I had been upset and confused about how I felt about a girl there. They asked me if I thought I might be gay. I said I didn't know what that meant. They told me, with honesty that does not happen very often even today.

I thought to myself "Yeah, that is what I feel." I actually had a crush on Carla at that time, but I could never tell her. I stayed in contact with Carla and Donna for a while and they introduced me to my first lover.

My first relationship was a long distant love relationship. She was a few years older than I was, but she was well experienced. I'll never forget her. Who forgets their first loves? They show you a world that you thought you had dreamed about. Once you are into the relationship it goes way beyond any of your expectations. When the relationship ends you think to yourself there will never be another love in my life. You're half way right. There will never be another one of them, but you will love again.

What's In a Name?

A federally funded conference on LGBT suicide was held earlier this year in Portland, Oregon. It was organized by the Suicide Prevention Resource Center of Newton, Mass with funding from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) part of the Department of Health and Human Services. It was originally titled "Suicide Prevention Among Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual/Transgender Individuals.

Brenda Bruun, a Bush appointee and project manager within SAMHSA, requested that the words "gay," "lesbian," "bisexual" "transgender" and "gender identity" be removed from the conference material. Ms. Bruun suggested the organizers use "sexual orientation."

Ron Bloodworth, a conferance organizers reponded: "Sexual orientation is inadequate. Everyone has a sexual orientation. But this is about GLBT people. In addition, trans people differ from others in terms of sexual identity, not sexual orientation. Unless you use an accurate term, the people you are trying to reach don't recognize themselves and don't attend."

The name change was not the only thing the Administration called for. It also wanted a session on faith-based suicide prevention. "We find this behavior on the part of our government intolerable," Bloodworth wrote in an e-mail to colleagues that called for the government to "end this shameful marginalization of an already marginalized at-risk population."

Steven Fisher of the Human Rights Campaign also commented: "It is unconscionable for politics to get into the way of life and death health care for LGBT young people."

SAMHSA was flooded with complaints about the name change. Spokesperson Mark Weber said the name change was "only a suggestion". But, when pressed about how "strong" the suggestion was made, Weber replied: "Well, they do need to consider their funding source."

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
