Memory remains: Students, faculty remember friend

#### Researchers find protein linked to Alzheimer's

A team of UK researchers has discovered that a protein may be a cause of Alzheimer's disease and related brain disorders.

Alzheimer's disease and related brain disorders.

A multi-disciplinary team of UK researchers, under the leadership of Dr. Mark Mattson, has recently discovered that Par-4, a protein, might lead to nerve cell death in Alzheimer's disease and related brain disorders.

Published in the August issue of Nature's Medicine, the research shows an increased level of Par-4 in nerve cells in the brains of Alzheimer's disease patients, suggesting a link to the disease.

Suppressing Par-4 might be useful as

Suppressing Par-4 might be useful as a future treatment for the disease, said Mark Mattson, professor of anatomy and neurobiology who led the team.

"The study's findings identify a new molecular target upon which to aim the emerging arsenal of weapons in the battle against Alzheimer's disease," Mattson said. Cell death, he said, is a fundamental problem in age-related neurodegenerative disorders.

In Alzheimer's disease, for example, nerve cells critical for learning and remembering die. Earlier studies have shown that nerve cells in the brains of

Each gene DNA carries the information required to produce one specific protein. When the gene is turned

"on," the protein is made.

During apoptosis, genes are activated to encode the "killer" proteins, and these proteins signal genes to begin during.

The identity of the "killer" proteins and their place in the cascade of events leading to cell death has been a mystery for decades.


"The current research may fill more than one piece of the puzzle," Mattson said.

In previous studies, Mattson's team collected evidence that a protein called anyloid-beta protein, which abnormally accumulates in the brains of Alzheimer's patients by

forming structures called plaques, can cause apoptosis in cultured rat and human neurons.

Amyloid-beta protein increases free radical levels in cells and disrupts the ability of nerve cells to maintain proper calcium levels.

Cell culture experiments in the present study demonstrated that Par-4 made nerve cells more susceptible to being killed by the amyloid-beta protein.


