#### ADOLPH RUPP

#### 'Maker of Champions'

Won 496, Lost 82 - 85.6%

The world's poorest prophet, but a coaching genius with a rare talent for consistently winning national championships.

That's University of Kentucky's fabulous cage mentor Adolph Rupp who this year celebrates his Silver Anniversary at the helm of



Wildcat basketball with an incomparable career winning average of 85.6 percent for 496 victories out of 578 starts.

Amazing as his coaching success has been, the usually astute Baron Rupp found himself on the losing end as a prophet last season. The Wildcats of 1954 made a clean sweep through a 25-game schedule and disproved their coach's prophecy of several years ago that "no major school playing a major schedule can go through a season unfeated."

The "impossible" feat of last year's Kentucky team in becoming the biggest-winning, perfect-record unit of all time climaxed an unparalleled honor

roll of coaching success that has stamped Rupp as the nation's most winning cage mentor. In the 24 years he has been at Kentucky, he's won the Southeastern Conference title 15 times, the NCAA Tournament championship three times, and the National Invitation Tournament once as well as Olympic Trials collegiate bracket laurels and a nominal world's championship through participation with the AAU Phillips Oilers as the USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games. Coach Rupp is the first and only coach to guide his teams to three NCAA and one NIT titles.

Besides the distinction of an even 100 victories against only 21 defeats covering action in 21 national classics (NCAA, NIT, UK Invitational and Sugar Bowl Tournaments) plus 21 conference meets and the '48 Olympics, Rupp has guided his Wildcat teams to national championships in the Associated Press Poll four times in the last six years and produced no less than 24 All-Americans.

Furthermore, the UK mentor goes into the current season in possession of another record that no other coach or school comes even close to threatening—124 consecutive wins on the home floor. No Rupp-coached Kentucky team has been beaten at home since Ohio State turned the trick on Jan. 2, 1943—approximately 12 years ago.

The colorful Rupp is credited in most quarters with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern which has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

Rupp has become, without a doubt, the best known and most widely quoted cage coach in America and his personal fame is equalled only by the success he has instilled in the highly-publicized Kentucky basketball powerhouses.

The Kentucky Colonel was named to the Commonwealth's Hall of Fame in 1945 and, in 1949, was honored as the outstanding citizen of the University city of Lexington. Active in civic affairs, he is a Past Potentate of the Oleika Temple of the Shrine and currently is a member of the board of directors of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. He was selected as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation in 1950 and holds honorary memberships in various temples of the order throughout the country.

Recognized internationally in registered Hereford breeding circles, Rupp has four farms near Lexington on which he maintains white-faced Hereford herds and raises fine burley tobacco. He is now in a second term as president of the Kentucky Hereford Association and serves on the board of directors of the Kentucky Hereford Breeders Assn. and the Bourbon Beef Show. The coach also is a director of the Central District Warehousing Corporation, world's largest tobacco marketing organization, and sits on the board directing activities of the Blue Grass Festival and Blue Grass Foundation.

In 1946, Coach Rupp was given the highest individual coaching honor in the cage world when he was elected to the Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame sponsored by the Helms Athletic Foundation of Los Angeles, Calif. The New York Basketball Writers' Association named him "Coach of the Year" for the re-building job he accomplished on the sophomore-studded 1949-50 Wildcats who succeeded the "Fabulous Five."

He was made an honorary citizen of New Orleans for the second time in 1951 and, at the same time, received the first plaque of appreciation ever awarded by the Sugar Bowl committee in recognition of his contributions to their annual tournament.

The Wildcat chief has written books on virtually every phase of the game of basketball, including a good seller entitled "Champion-ship Basketball," and is in great demand during the off season to make speaking engagements and conduct clinics. He also has his own twice-weekly radio show during the season and often is referred to in the press by such titles as "Mr. Basketball," "The Bluegrass Baron of Basketball," and "The Man In The Brown Suit," the latter stemming from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his gamenight wardrobe.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp attended the University of Kansas where he played guard under the firey Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, Iowa, and then at Freeport, III., for four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team complied a respectable 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch was eight in 1940-41, but even that year was a winning campaign (17-8) and the remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is three.

Before Coach Rupp came on the scene, the Wildcats in 26 years won 196 games while losing 129. Tournament invitations were almost unheard of then. Kentucky played in only three and were eliminated each time.

Today, when one thinks of the sport of basketball, one thinks of Kentucky and Adolph Rupp—maker of champions.

#### HARRY LANCASTER

#### Assistant Coach

When Harry Lancaster finds a spare moment to reflect on his days as an all-around star athlete at Georgetown (Ky.) College back in the early thirties, he can recall with a degree of dismay how close



he came to never pursuing the "round ball" sport that in the days since has earned him a somewhat unique position in the basketball world.

An All-Conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons, Lancaster's football career almost overshadowed his play on the basketball court. In the cage sport, he was equally successful—with three All-Conference nominations and two team captaincies to his credit—but considered himself a better football player than cager. Experience, however, proved him a good student and teacher of the sport of basketball as he began his

coaching career and he now carries no regrets over the choice he made.

Lancaster bosses a promising group of yearling cagers and holds down the position of assistant varsity basketball coach and general right hand man to the fabulous Adolph Rupp. When he was made a full-time assistant by Coach Rupp in 1948, Lancaster joined a very select group due to the general scarcity of such positions at major colleges and universities. Even today, most teams rely on only part-time assistants.

Born in Paris, Ky., in 1911, Lancaster attended Paris High School where he played four years in all sports, being coached at one time by Kentucky's current Head Football Coach Blanton Collier. Following graduation in 1928, he continued his athletic career at Georgetown College and gained star recognition in football, basketball and baseball. After finishing at Georgetown in '32, Harry remained on for the next school year as an assistant coach in both the grid and cage sports be-

fore moving into the high school field. He coached several sports, mostly basketball, for nine years and was a high school principal for six years before coming to the University of Kentucky in 1942 as an instructor in physical education.

Soon thereafter, the war intervened and Lancaster saw 26 months' Navy duty, rising from apprentice seaman to Lieutenant (Senior Grade). Returning to UK, he became a part-time assistant to the Wildcats' famous cage mentor, Adolph Rupp, in addition to carrying on his teaching duties and studying for his master's degree. He also served as Kentucky's baseball coach in 1946-47 and picked up the assignment again starting with the 1951 campaign.

He was promoted to full-time Assistant Varsity Basketball Coach in 1948 upon Coach Rupp's recommendation. In addition to his coaching duties, Lancaster manages to sandwich in a large slice of traveling. Besides checking on the nation's best high school cagers as potential material for future Wildcat national champion crews, his travel stems from a plan to extensively scout upcoming opponents. Coach Rupp was one of the first in the country to inaugurate this widespread scouting system in basketball and believes it has contributed materially to Kentucky's past success in carrying off championships with almost reckless abandon.

Lancaster also traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U. S. State Department. The mission called for the Kentucky aide to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials on Olympic procedure and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics, coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport as played in the U.S.A.

Lancaster's coaching success with his freshmen teams has been commendable. The yearlings have lost only two contests under his tutelage and go into the current season with a record of no losses since Kentucky Wesleyan turned the trick back in the 1949-50 season.

the group are Gerry Calvert, 5-11 guard; and Sonny Corum, 5-10 guard.

With the personnel available limited in experience and the losses greatest suffered by any team in the country, Coach Rupp foresees a big re-building job ahead this season. "We can't possibly be as strong this winter as we were last year," he declared. "I doubt that we will ever be that good again and probably nobody else will be either. That was my idea of an ideal team in every respect. We had a great first team, plus enough reserve power to carry on when we needed to make substitutions."

The transplanted Kansan, who has moulded championship calibre teams with amazing regularity since he took over Kentucky's cage dynasty 24 years ago, observed that the '55 Wildcats 'may run into early-season difficulties because our team will lack experience at the start. However, I think we could have a very fine team by the middle of January with a little luck.

"I am not at all gloomy over our prospects," he continued, "despite the fact we lost the best three men in America and must play possibly the strongest schedule of any team in the nation. We apparently are not very highly regarded and we are not picked to be among the best in the country by any of the pre-season polls I have seen. But I suspect our boys will be getting more than an average share of mention when all the shouting is over."

Exactly how this year's edition of the Wildcats will line up for the opening gun is a problem that the Kentucky mentor may not fully decide before mid-season. Capt. Evans, who operated at forward last season, probably will be shifted to a guard post to make room for more rebounding height on the back line. Once this key fits into place, the rest of the lineup might see Grawmeyer and Bird at forwards, Burrow at center and either Puckett or Rose at the other guard location. However, sophomore Mills could break into the starting group at forward if Bird beats Burrow out for the pivot spot.

And there are seemingly endless other combinations available too, all of which leads Kentucky's opponents to fear that Coach Rupp may prove as poor a prophet as he was last season in reiterating a previous prediction that no school playing a major schedule could go through a season undefeated.

#### LOOKING BACK

#### (A Resume of Wildcats' Undefeated 1953-54 Season)

When a team makes a liar out of its coach, it can generally be stamped as "great" or worthy of the dubious title "goat."

The question of the appropriateness of one classification or the other would seem to be academic when the coach is none other than Baron Adolph Rupp, the nation's winningest basketball coach with a record of being right better than 85 percent of the time over the past 24 years.

But when the team is University of Kentucky's pride-of-the-Bluegrass cagers and the situation involves an oft-repeated assertion by their coach that no collegiate quintet can expect to go undefeated through a lengthy schedule of all-major competition, you can take the word of "Mr. Basketball" himself that the tab of greatness is what rightfully belongs to the incomparable 1954 Wildcats.

The Kentuckians upset the predictions of the best brains in the business during the past campaign by breezing through their 24-game regular season schedule without defeat and, for the most part, without being seriously extended. Then, without batting an eyelash, they went into a unique playoff game and polished off an upstart Louisiana State five that brashly disputed their claim to a 15th Southeastern Conference championship.

#### Playoff Made Necessary

If not for the fact that only the conference champion is eligible for the NCAA tournament, no playoff would have been necessary after both Kentucky and LSU finished their conference schedules unbeaten. The conference has no objection to shared honors of a titular sort. The Wildcats and Tigers did not meet in regular season due to a dispute of where the contest should be played.

Having mastered LSU in what many experts maintained was the best game they ever saw, the Wildcats withdrew from the NCAA tournament. The collegiate governing body refused to allow Kentucky's "Big Three" to participate on grounds they studied too hard. The actual rule, not applicable in the Southeastern Conference, bars post-graduate athletes from competing in NCAA-sponsored tournaments.

Thus disqualified were 6-foot, 4-inch Cliff Hagan, 6-3 Frank Ramsey and 6-5 Lou Tsioropoulus. They scored 600, 490 and 363 points, respectively, representing 66 percent of the team's scoring punch.

The decision to bow out of the tournament was, for the most part, heartily applauded as a sensible stand by UK authorities who had contended that an exception should be made in the case of the three boys due to the fact that the NCAA itself was to blame for the predicament. Kentucky officials reasoned that it was the NCAA's suspension of two-seasons ago that created the situation of three good students finishing their scholastic work before their athletic eligibility ran out. And, it was further pointed out, the governing body's decision to disallow the three UK stars essentially made a farce of rules requiring athletes to make "normal progress" toward degrees. Except for the National Collegiate Athletic Association rule which that body refused to waive on appeal by Kentucky, the Wildcats would have been strong, if not prohibitive favorites, for their fourth NCAA crown since 1948.

#### NCAA Champs Lost To Kentucky

With the Wildcats out of the national tournament picture, Holy Cross walked off with championship honors in the National Invitation and LaSalle's Explorers—beaten soundly by Kentucky in the UK Invitational Tournament last December—came through to gain the NCAA title. But experts the country over placed the final stamp of greatness directly on the Ruppmen by naming them national champions over both of the major tournament winners. "Ol' Kaintuck" was given top ranking in the Associated Press poll for the fourth timein six years and the Helms Athletic Foundation named the Cats as the nation's best basketball team for the fifth time in history and fourth time in the last seven years. Only the United Press, which conducted its poll among the nation's cage coaches and made final rankings before tourney play began, ignored the country's lone undefeated quintet. This poll rated UK second to Indiana's Big 10 champs, a team that had already lost three games during the regular season and was to be handed another loss in the NCAA Tournament.

In becoming the first major college team to complete its season undefeated since Long Island U. accomplished the minor miracle in 1938-39, Kentucky scored 2,187 points, battering its 25 opponents by an average margin of 87.5 to 60.3. The Wildcats hit 100 points or better six times. In true champions' style, the Cats rallied to over-

come Louisiana State's four-point second half lead and win the conference title in the unprecedented playoff game, March 9, on Vanderbilt's neutral court in Nashville. The score was 63 to 56.

Kentucky's 25 wins came despite the lack of two very desirable ingredients winning basketball teams had — (1) a tall player of the goal-tender variety, and (2) a bench that, at the outset, lacked competitive experience.

It was Adolph Rupp's 24th year at Kentucky. Although he was a sick man at the end, it probably was not the last for this remarkable 52-year-old, Kansas-born coach. His teams have now won 496 games and lost 82, a winning average of 86 per cent. They haven't been on the short end at home in Lexington since 1943. Drawing 145,000 in 14 home games, Rupp's Cats extended that amazing streak to 124.

#### Wildcats Of '54 Greatest

Coach Rupp, who supposedly declared after UK's suspension in '53 that he'd not retire until his boys captured the NCAA tourney crown again, unhesitatingly called the 1954 Wildcats one of the great cage aggregations of all time and was inclined to think of them as his best team. This took in a lot of territory, however. Although this was Kentucky's first totally perfect season since 1912 (9-0) and represented a new national record for consecutive wins in an undefeated season, the veteran mentor pointed out that there have been numerous other Wildcat teams good in their day: The 1933-34 outfit that racked up a perfect regular season of 15 wins only to be upset in the first round of the SEC tournament; the 1945-46 team that lost only two games, while rolling to the school's first national tournament (NIT) title; the Olympic crew of 1947-48 which engineered a brilliant 36-3 record and aided the successful effort of the United States to gain the world basketball championship; the Fabulous Five of 1948-49 that tried for a national tournament "Grand Slam"; and the 1950-51 team that made Kentucky the first team to win three NCAA and one NIT title and which won a record of 39 ½ games and lost only two during regular season, tournament play and an exhibition tour in Puerto Rico.

Just how good the 1954 crew of Kentucky basketeers was may never be known.

NCAA Champion LaSalle, Pacific Coast titlist Southern California and powerful Utah of the Skyline Conference, along with Kentucky's defending national champions, will be participants in the second annual University of Kentucky Invitational Basbetball Tournament carded for Memorial Coliseum on December 21 and 22.

The stellar lineup of four of the nation's top cage powers is expected to surpass in calibre virtually every other basketball tournament held since the Olympic Trials of 1948 because of the prospect of a rematch between LaSalle's Explorers and the Wildcats.

The inaugural two-night, four-team tournament last year, played before capacity audiences in UK's spacious Coliseum and resulting in a national record tourney dividend of \$8,200 to each participating team, saw Kentucky smash LaSalle for the championship and UCLA take the consolation title from Duke.

This season's meet will pair LaSalle against a good Southern California club and pits defending tournament champion Kentucky against a Utah outfit that is fast returning to their former level of national prominence.

Selection of teams to take part in the Kentucky tournament is based on considerations of national reputation in cage circles, potential calibre of play expected this season and the desire to give the holiday meet an intersectional flavor with a top team representing various parts of the country. The tournament originated as the result of an increasingly-popular trend toward the scheduling of holiday tournaments and round-robin meets in college-controlled arenas. It is the first tournament of a national scope ever presented in Lexington and UK's Athletic Director Bernie A. Shively serves as tournament manager.

All four of the 1954 participating teams meet the specifications set up for the tournament. Host Kentucky toppled all existing records as they swept through a major 25-game schedule without a defeat last season and were proclaimed national champions by virtually everyone

but the NCAA, whose tournament the Wildcats did not play in due to restrictions on the use of three senior stars.

LaSalle looms as the nation's most powerful quintet this season with two-time All-America pivotman Tom Gola back for a final campaign. The Philadelphia Explorers finished with a 26-4 mark for the season, including a clean sweep of the NCAA dribble derby, after showing improvement over their 73-60 loss to Kentucky in the UKIT last December.

Southern Cal's Trojans are picked as one of the top teams in the Far West again in '55 with 11 of the top 12 performers back for a try at making the favorite's role pay off as handsomely as did their ''darkhorse'' rating of a year ago. The men of Troy were beaten out in the national tourney by Bradley, the squad that succumbed to La-Salle in the finals.

Utah's Utes are said to be "shoo in" favorites in the Mountain States (Skyline Eight) Athletic Conference stemming from the outlook based on Coach Jack Gardner having the services of his entire squad of last season plus a pair of crack transfers. Kentucky and Utah have met twice before in national tourney play, most notable of which was Utah's 49-45 win in the NIT semi-finals of 1947.

#### PERFECT HOME FLOOR PERFORMANCE

It's been 11 years (going on 12) since the amazing University of Kentucky basketeers, under the guidance of the fabulous Adolph Rupp, have lost a game on their home court. While this season may prove a different story, Kentucky can look back over an all-time national record length victory string unequalled by any team, college or pro, in any sport.

Going into the 1954-55 campaign, the mark is 124 consecutive wins over all opposition. The last defeat at home came at the hands of Ohio State, 45-40, on Jan. 2, 1943.

Against Southeastern Conference teams only, Kentucky's home floor success is even more startling. No SEC outfit has bested UK at home since Tennessee turned the trick by a 30-29 score Jan. 21, 1939. The record stands at 68 straight victories within the conference.

The first 84 wins in the overall record and first 47 against SEC opponents were compiled in old Alumni Gym. Memorial Coliseum became the home floor at the start of the 1950-51 season.

# BACKGROUND BRIEFS

BILL EVANS (Captain)—Senior—Guard—Berea, Ky. One of the nation's outstanding players, Evans earned his spurs furthering the lost art of defensive play but in his final year is expected to turn into a top



scoring threat as well. The 1955 Wildcat captain has been shifted back to guard, a position he played as an outstanding freshman and during his sophomore year, after operating at forward throughout last season. The 6-1 native Kentuckian was chosen to the pre-season All-Southeastern Conference team in the Atlanta Journal poll of coaches this fall and is expected to rank as a serious contender for All-America honors. Very business-like on the court, Evans is a steady and dependable performer who makes few mistakes in carrying out his assignments and generally can be expected to deliver just as well in the clutch as in an easy contest al-

though he rarely looks spectacular. He's usually given the somewhat-unwelcome task of guarding the opponent's top scorer, if he can handle the height, and often outscores his man in the process. Ranked right behind the "Big Three" in scoring last season, averaging better than eight points a game. Evans is just as good in the classroom as he is on the basketball floor, making straight A's in his final undergraduate year. He has completed the requirements for graduation and will be ineligible for the NCAA Tournament should Kentucky win a berth. He is one of two married men on this year's squad.

**GAYLE ROSE**—Senior—Guard—Paris, Ky. A leading candidate for a starting guard berth this season, Rose saw action in 23 games last year, alternating between starting and reserve duty. The dependable



six-foot Paris product is considered by many observers to be among the best change-of-pace dribblers in the business. It was Rose's dribbling artistry that enabled Kentucky to control the ball in the closing minutes and whip LSU for the championship in the SEC playoff last year at Nashville . . . The senior guard is regarded as an excellent long shot artist and also has developed a good one-hand jump shot . . . Rose is a fast-driving type of player who operates with extreme effectiveness in the fast-break type of offense that Kentucky relies upon. He made the schoolboy All-America cage team in his senior year at Paris, mainly on the basis of


his ball-handling ability, and was selected "Mr. Basketball" (equivalent to most valuable player) following the annual North-South High School All-Star Game in 1950. Rose is studying a pre-dental course to follow in the footsteps of his father who is a doctor.

JERRY BIRD—Junior—Forward—Corbin, Ky. Apparently fully recovered from a chest ailment that sidelined him after the first four games last season, Bird is bidding strongly for a starting post and likely will




open at one of the forward spots. The 6-6 native Kentuckian, who was regarded by many in his hometown as a better prospect than another Corbin product by the name of Frank Selvy, showed up exceptionally well as a Wildcat freshman two seasons ago while being groomed as the probable replacement for All-America center Cliff Hagan. He was used briefly early last year as a reserve center before being forced out by illness, but was shifted from center to forward in preseason practice this year to make room for transfer pivotman Bob Burrow. Only lack of actual game competition is expected to handicap Bird in his bid for honors since he

is very agile for his size and operates equally well on the back line or in the pivot. He possesses a good jump shot, shows fine accuracy on his hooks and rebounds with exceptional efficiency plus defensive ability. An All-State selection two seasons at Corbin High and star of the North-South Cage Classic at Murray in 1952, Bird was named to a first team position on Chuck Taylor's High School All-America squad in his senior year. He is being tabbed by national magazines this year as one of the top stars in Coach Rupp's stable.

BOB BURROW—Junior—Center—Wells, Texas. A junior college transfer seeing his first action with Kentucky, Burrow has a great reputation that should stand him in good stead as he attempts to fill




the pivot shoes of graduated All-America Cliff Hagan this season. The lanky Texan was a sensation during two seasons at Lon Morris Junior College in Jacksonville, Texas, where he became known as the "Bevo Francis of Junior College Basketball" on the basis of his scoring efforts. Burrow tossed in 2,191 points for a 26-point per game average over the two-year period. He was the nation's leading Junior College point producer in 1954, with 1,264 points and a 30-point average in 42 games, and was selected as "Player of the Year" in JC ranks. The former Wells (Texas) High ace never failed to win All-Tournament honors and was

named to the Junior College All-America squad for both 1953 and '54. Burrow found the adaptation to Kentucky's race-horse style of offense and stubborn defense a bit difficult at first, but as the season neared he seemed to have familiarized himself well and now is regarded as a very vital factor in the Wildcats' operational plans. He moves with surprising smoothness for a 6-7, 206-pound giant and has demonstrated a variety of shots, good rebounding skill, and capable defensive ability.

**PHIL** (Cookie) **GRAWEMEYER**—Junior—Forward—Louisville, Ky. The biggest man on the squad at 6-7½, Grawemeyer is expected to blossom into one of the real standouts this season. "Cookie" started




in over half of the 25 games that he saw action in during the 1953-54 season, scoring 147 points—good for a 5.9 average. Grawemeyer ranked high among the leaders in rebounding last year and is being counted on to provide the youthful Wildcats with considerable rebounding strength this season. Grawemeyer was instrumental in Kentucky's victory over LaSalle last year in the UK Invitational Tourney as his "pinch-hitter" scoring pulled the Wildcats from behind an 8-point deficit. Equally adept at either forward or center, he has a good jump shot and also scores surprisingly well on the fast break. Phil led his Louisville Manual High

team to the final round of the state cage tourney in the Coliseum on two consecutive years, earning All-Tournament and All-State honors both seasons. He was the leading hurler on the Wildcat mound staff last spring. LINVILLE PUCKETT—Junior—Guard—Winchester, Ky. A late-season headliner who started the final seven games and proved a vital cog in the Wildcats' attack in the latter stages of the highly successful



1953-54 campaign, Puckett is expected to develop into one of Kentucky's top offensive threats this season. The 6-foot ace looked very impressive in pre-season practice sessions and led many cage experts to expect stellar play from him before the present season is very old. The three-time All-State star of Clark County's state champions is rated as one of the craftiest passers in the game and is also a standout on defense. Puckett developed well with each game last season and fits almost perfectly into the style of play that the Wildcats employ. He has proven himself to possess plenty of scrap and hits exceptionally well close to the basket. He

connects with unusual accuracy on his set shot and has developed a good one-hand push shot. Puckett set a Coliseum record last year against Mississippi State when he connected on a 53' 6" shot and still holds the state high school tournament record for the most points scored in a single game—47 in the 1952 meet.

BILL BIBB—Junior—Forward—Owensboro, Ky. A dependable work-horse who could provide considerable help if he continues the fine



relief work turned in last season. Bibb hails from the same hometown and high school that produced All-America center Cliff Hagan and All-SEC guard Bobby Watson. The 180-pound cager saw action in 16 games last year and is one of the six returning lettermen this season. Bibb uses his 6-4 frame to give an exceptionally good account of himself on the boards and operates with perfection in close to the basket. Bill possesses a good jump shot and can rebound equally well. The former All-State star carries out every assignment with near perfection and has made a steady improvement since his arrival at Kentucky in 1952. Bill was the

regular first baseman on the UK baseball squad last season.

DAN CHANDLER—Junior—Guard—Versailles, Ky. Small and fast in the typical style of Kentucky guards of the past, Chandler will prob-



ably see limited relief duty this season. Dan can be depended on to put up a lot of scrap whenever he is in action. Due to heavy competition, Chandler failed to see much action last season but gave a good account of himself during the brief period that he did play. The 5-11 scrapper could be the "darkhorse" among a highly-regarded group of reserves and could possibly lend considerable help to the Wildcats this season. Dan is the son of former Kentucky Governor and ex-Baseball Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler.

CHARLES HADDEN—Junior—Guard—Lexington, Ky. A hometown cager, who graduated from Lafayette High, Hadden is returning for another season with the Wildcats after a one-year layoff. A former All-State star, Hadden guided his Lafayette club to the state championship during his senior year. The local standout was also an excellent high school gridder, but has never participated in the sport at UK. The 5-11 ace attended North Carolina State for one year before enrolling at Kentucky. Hadden is considered a deadly set shot artist and connects with accuracy on his one hand push shot. The scrappy performer should see some reserve action this season.

HAROLD HURST—Junior—Center—Waltersville, Ky. A 6-7 pivot-man who is expected to lend considerable reserve strength to the Wild-



cats this season, Hurst is beginning to show signs of developing into a dependable center. The former Powell County High star has a good shooting eye and possesses a good hook shot. Harold saw only limited relief action during the 1953-54 campaign. He was a third team All-State selection during his senior year in high school and also participated in the East-West All-Star tilt shortly before enrolling at UK. The rangy pivotman averaged 29 points a game at Powell County.


**EARL ADKINS**—Sophomore—Forward—Ashland, Ky. A promising 6-3 forward with exceptional potentialities, Adkins is classed as a dependable, steady performer who will be counted upon for front-line



reserve duty and is one of the sophomores given an outside chance to break into the starting lineup late in the campaign. The Ashland product displayed great promise as a yearling guard last season and emerged as the second highest scorer on the frosh squad with a 15.5 average. A good rebounder, he also is considered an excellent set shot and the possessor of a good one-hand jump shot. Adkins earned All-State and schoolboy All-American honors during his senior year at Ashland. The 21-year-old ace was chosen "Mr. Basketball" (most valuable player) following an outstanding performance in the North-South Cage Classic


at Murray two seasons back. He is one of the pair of yearling standouts whom Coach Rupp considered promoting to the varsity early last season when hit hard with injuries. Adkins wears contact lenses on the court. He is married and the only father on the team.

PAUL (Sonny) CORUM—Sophomore—Guard—Midway, Ky. A diminutive but scrappy performer, Corum could provide the Wildcats with



helpful reserve strength this season if he comes through as expected. The 5-10 guard was impressive in pre-season cage drills, displaying exceptional speed and aggressiveness plus an ability to connect on his set shots. Corum saw considerable action on the undefeated yearling squad last season, averaging 7.5 points a game. Although Corum hails from nearby Midway, only 12 miles from Lexington, he played his high school basketball at Darlington Prep School in Rome, Ga., earning All-Mid South honors for two successive seasons. Paul was the regular second baseman on the UK baseball team last spring.

RAY MILLS—Sophomore—Forward—Manchester, Ky. A strong candidate for a starting forward berth on the basis of his outstanding play as a yearling last season, Mills paced the unbeaten frosh in scor-



ing (sporting a creditable 18.3 average) and also ranked as the club's top rebounder. The 6-4 athlete's performances in pre-season scrimmages this year led many cage experts to anticipate stellar play from the All-State product during the forthcoming campaign. Operated chiefly as a center last year, but will probably confine his efforts to forward duty this season. Mills is developing well with hard work and attentiveness in practice. He possesses a good jump shot and is equally effective with his two-hand set shot. He drives exceptionally well and uses his 6-4 frame to give a good account of himself on the boards. Tremendous spring in his legs

has made Mills into one of the most remarkable rebounders for his size seen at Kentucky in many a year.

GERRY CALVERT—Sophomore—Guard—Maysville, Ky. One of the fastest guards on the squad, Calvert is comparatively small (5-11) but overcomes this handicap with a sheer desire to play and by being ex-



tremely aggressive on defense. The two-time All-State speedster averaged 9.4 points per game on the undefeated frosh club last season and seems destined to provide the defending national champions with plenty of help in his initial season on the varsity. The Maysville product is a driving type player who shoots with exceptional accuracy from the outside. Calvert suffered a broken finger on his right hand shortly before the season opened which will hinder him during the early portion of the campaign. He was the regular center-fielder on the Wildcat base-ball team last season.

JOHN BREWER—Sophomore—Guard—Anchorage, Ky. An exceptionally steady performer for an untested sophomore, Brewer is one of the most highly-regarded newcomers to the varsity ranks this season



and is showing promise of developing into a real standout later in the campaign. The former Louisville Eastern cager was one of the two freshmen that Coach Rupp seriously considered promoting to the varsity last season. The rangy guard showed up extremely well in frosh games last year, averaging 14 points per contest. The 6-3 ace possesses a good set shot and also connects with very good accuracy on his jump shot. His impressive performances in pre-season practice drills have made him a darkhorse prospect for first string guard duty this season. Only the lack of game experience and being exceptionally light in weight (170) will handicap him this year.

# PERFECT RECORD

In becoming the nation's biggest-winning perfect-record team of all time with 25 victories, Kentucky surpassed a record which had been held for 18 years by Long Island University. The mark of 24 straight victories in an undefeated campaign was chalked up by L.I.U. in 1936, back in the days when there weren't any tournaments. However, this season's Wildcats will be shooting at another record of their own making. Over a two-season span, Kentucky has a mark of 26 consecutive victories—dating from the middle of the 1945-46 season (Notre Dame 56-47) to the halfway point in the 1946-47 campaign (loss in Sugar Bowl Tournament to Oklah. A & M). The Ruppmen might also claim a unique record of going undefeated two seasons in a row: No losses in 1952-53 when the NCAA would not let them play and no defeats in 1953-54.

# FRESHMEN

VERNON HATTON—Freshman—Guard—Lexington, Ky. One of the most widely-heralded schoolboy athletes ever to perform in the state, Hatton has the size (6-3, 190 pounds) and cool-headed know how to develop into a topflight guard in the Kentucky system. Known chiefly for his cool and calculated performances on the court, the former Lexington Lafayette All-State sensation tallied 1,059 points during his three-year schoolboy career. He was named to the All-State cage squad two successive years and selected on Chuck Taylor's High School All-American team following an outstanding performance in the North-South cage classic at Murray (Ky.) last June. Vernon repeatedly won "Most Valuable" honors in all-star contests. He is regarded as a good floor man in addition to being an excellent one hand shot.

ED BECK—Freshman—Center—Ft. Valley, Ga. A rangy, 6-7 center who sparked his Ft. Valley High team to two Class B state champion-ships. Beck is regarded as one of the most highly promising prospects on the talent loaded freshman squad which Coach Rupp calls "the best in Kentucky's history". Extremely agile and fast for his size, Ed has displayed an excellent hook shot as well as a good jump shot. Beck averaged 22 points a game in his senior year and was a Class B All-State Tournament choice for three successive seasons. An outstanding rebounding specialist, the 190-pound ace is expected to develop well with experience under his belt. He is a licensed Methodist minister.

PHIL JOHNSON—Freshman—Forward—Lexington, Ky. A home-town product who graduated from University High, Johnson is being converted from a schoolboy pivotman to a collegiate forward, where he has turned in impressive practice performances despite an unfamiliarity with the position. The bespectacled, six-foot-five-inch prospect received All-State honorable mention for two straight seasons. He tallied 527 points in his final campaign at U-High—good for a 25.1 point average. He has a good jump shot and operates well in the Wildcat fast-break type of play. Phil is the son of former Wildcat All-SEC halfback, Bert Johnson.

BILLY RAE CASSADY—Freshman—Guard—Inez, Ky. Rated as one of the greatest hardwood performers in the Commonwealth last season, Cassady captained his Inez club which annexed the State High School Championship . . . He was the number one selection on the All-Tournament team in addition to being named to the All-State cage squad for the regular season . . . The 19-year-old product of Eastern Kentucky also participated in the North-South game at Murray last June, being named to the second team All-American squad. He was the recipient of the "Star of Stars" award (most valuable player) following the Kentucky-Indiana All-Star game at Louisville a short while later. Cassady scored 843 points during his senior year to bring his four-year total to record-breaking 2,295. Although the 195-pound athlete isn't regarded a speed merchant, his shifty maneuvering and ability to hit from the outside was enough to gain him a scholarship on the nation's defending collegiate champions.

JOHN CRIGLER—Freshman—Forward—Hebron, Ky. Relegated to a second team berth on the All-State squad last season, the 6-3 Crigler is showing promise of developing into an outstanding college performer. A tower of strength on defense, especially under the backboards, the versatile athlete operates with perfection in close and possesses an excellent one-hand push shot. He was the vital cog in Hebron High's attack last season, scoring 699 points for an average of 27.8 per game. Crigler attracted the attention of college coaches last spring with his outstanding performances in the East-West games at Pikeville and Paintsville, achieving high scorer honors in the successive games and earning the most valuable player award in each.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN COLLINSWORTH — Freshman—Guard—Salversville, Ky. One of the state's most colorful schoolboy performers last season, Collinsworth had a high school scoring record of 2,652 points over a five year span at Salversville and averaged 28 points per game during his final campaign. He participated in eight different all-star tilts last summer where his stellar play gained the respect of numerous college coaches . . . A driving-type player, "Abe" is particularly impressive on the boards. He has displayed potential that spells future possibilities for stardom . . . Born on the birthdate of the late President Abraham Lincoln, thus his given name.

BILLY SMITH — Freshman — Forward — Walton, Ky. A schoolboy standout at Walton-Verona High, Smith may turn out to be one of the top surprises among the yearlings this season. The 6-5 ace received All-State honorable mention for three successvie seasons and tallied 1,805 points over a four-year span, averaging 22 points a game in his final campaign. Starred in several high school all-star games last summer. His stellar play in the East-West tilt at Pikeville last June labeled him as a future collegiate star. Operated as a pivotman in high school, but is being successfully converted into a dependable forward by Freshman Coach Harry Lancaster. Smith is classed as one of the top rebounders on the squad and connects regularly with his jump shot.

LEON SCZEPANSKI—Freshman—Center—Chicago, III. A rugged, 6-7 center from Chicago, Sczepanski is being groomed to help fill the pivot spot next season. He has the size and potential ability to develop into outstanding center. Leon has shown excellent rebounding strength and uses his 225-pound frame to tremendous advantages in scrambles under the basket. An All-City choice at Chicago Lindbloom High where he averaged 28 points in his final year, Sczepanski possesses a good hook shot which he connects on with amazing regularity. He was one of the first frosh to enter UK this year, attending the summer session. The Chicago product pronounces his name "Suh-Pan-Skee."

pick Howe—Freshman—Center—Carbondale, III. One of the best rebounders on the freshman squad, Howe uses his 225-pound frame to tremendous advantage in close to the basket. The former Community (III.) High performer was a standout both as a basketball pivot-man and grid end for four seasons. The 6-5 ace was named to a first team berth on the All-Southern Illinois cage team and received honorable mention in the All-State balloting. In addition to his cage honors, Howe was nominated for football honors as All-Conference and honorable mention All-State. The versatile athlete is equally adept at either forward or center and will probably see plenty of action in both positions this year. Dick paced his high school in scoring with a 24-point average and was the leading scorer on the grid squad.

**HAROLD ROSS**—Freshman—Forward—Hickman, Ky. A classy,  $6-2\frac{1}{2}$  forward, Ross was the key man in Hickman High's success last season and is regarded as a good prospect for college play. He had a sensational high school scoring record in his senior year at Hickman, averaging 31.5 points per game. The All-State performer has a good shot from any place on the court but is best with his deadly jump shot. Ross demonstrated in pre-season practice scrimmages that he is equally adept at either guard or forward post. The shifty cager saw action in several All-Star tilts last summer. Ross was the first Kentuckian signed to a grant-in-aid by Kentucky last spring.

JOHN BUTCHER—Freshman—Guard—Pikeville, Ky. One of the state's most colorful schoolboy athletes last season, Butcher should see considerable action with the frosh cage squad this season after serving as quarterback of the yearling gridders. Butcher was one of the state's highest scorers last year in earning All-State honors in basketball and being selected on the All-Conference grid squad. The 5-11 athlete also earned the "Star of Stars" award at Indianapolis last spring after a highly creditable performance.

DWAYNE WINGLER—Freshman—Forward—Beckley, W. Va. One of the most highly-regarded all-around high school athletes ever to enroll at Kentucky, Wingler started as a halfback on the frosh squad this fall before trying his hand at basketball. Wingler earned All-State honors for two consecutive seasons in basketball and was named to the All-America and All-State grid squads during his senior year. Dwayne averaged 25 points a game at Beckley High in leading his high school cage team to four Class A state championships. Wingler put on a record-breaking individual exhibition at the state tournament this spring to better both the single game and tournament scoring records.

JAY BAYLESS—Freshman—Forward—Knoxville, Tenn. A schoolboy sensation at Knoxville Fulton High, Bayless is regarded as one of the more highly promising freshmen although he will be ineligible for frosh games this season. The 6-4 athlete attended a junior college for a week before enrolling for the summer session at UK. Bayless was one of the most versatile high school performers in Tennessee last season, earning a second team berth on the All-State cage squad and was a third team All-State grid selection as a flankman. The 205-pound ace also holds the Tennessee high school discus throw record. Bayless was a vital cog in Fulton High's cage success last season, averaging 22 points a game. As a collegian, he has shown a good outside shot and rebounds very effectively.

PHIL PHELPS—Freshman—Forward—Hamilton, Ohio. An unheralded frosh who enrolled at Kentucky on his own this fall, Phelps should help the frosh in a reserve capacity this season. He captained the Hamilton High club that won the Ohio state championship last year. The 6-2 forward has displayed a good eye for the basket and has proved himself very valuable on the boards in pre-season scrimmages.
