Laying down the law: Barnhart behind change

New UK Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart is beginning to implement some of the changes he had in mind when accepting the top position in UK Athletics.

After last year's basketball team earned the dubious title of "Team Turmoil," Barnhart has outlined his discipline policy for all UK athletes in hopes of deterring future problems.

Barnhart's plan is a three-strike policy, escalating with successive infractions.

tions. Upon first offense, an athlete will lose 10 percent of his or her season, and undergo mandatory counseling if the offense is related to drugs or alcohol, as Barnhart said the majority of offenses are.

fenses are.

After a second offense,
the athlete will lose 50 percent of the season, with a
third offense resulting in
loss of the complete sea-

son.

Barnhart said the plan
is a base plan for the athletics department.

"We're going to have discipline in our program,"

cipline in our program," he said.

"But if a coach wants to dismiss somebody or sit them for a longer period of time and we discuss it, I have no problem with that."

He said he has implemented the same plan at each program where he has served.

"It's something I'm comfortable with and we'll continue to do it here," he said.

Barnhart has also re-cently discussed a need to increase ticket prices for general admission and pri-ority seating at basketball games so UK can build a new basketball gractice fa-cility and remain competi-tive with other Southeast-ern Conference schools, he said.

But Barnhart said he does not see the department moving to increase student ticket prices.

"I want (students) to come and enjoy the games."

Three and a half hours later, she was up again, getting ready to teach her 8 a.m. American Government class at Lexington Community College.



FAIRFAX, Va. — Sniper suspect John Allen Muhammad and 17-year-0id John Lee Malvo were charged Wednesday in the Oct. Has laying of an FBI analyst in Fairfax County, police said.

The two men have been accused of shooting 17 people, killing 12 and wounding five in Alabama, Louisiana, Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D.C.
Police said in a statement that the two were each charged with capital mur-

Fed makes surprise rate cut

Fed makes surprise rate cut
WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve
on Wednesday reduced a key interest rate by
one-half of a percentage point as the central
bank tries to keep America's stop-and-go recovery from stalling amid rising worries
about a war with Iraq. Commercial banks
were expected to respond by moving a
benchmark consumer rate to its lowest point
since 1959. The Fed moved the federal funds
rate from its already low 1.75 percent, where
it had stood for 11 months, to 1.25 percent,
surprising many analysts who had forecast
a quarter-point move. They believed the Fed
would want to conserve its power to aid the
economy, given the bank's aggressive cuts
last year that left it with little room to lower
rates. Wall Street had climbed to its highest
level in two months in anticipation of a Fed
rate and finished Wednesday with the Dow
Jones industrial average gaining 92.74 points
to close at 8.771.01.

found that even modest exercise changes the size and density of cholesterol-carrying proteins so they do less damage. And the benefits occur even if people's total amount of cholesterol and their weight stay the same. Staying active has many health benefits, but improving cholesterol is not usually considered one of them. People who exercise often lose weight, and while that can improve their cholesterol levels, exercise by itself was thought to have little or no effect. Workouts fail to lower LDL, the dangerous form of cholesterol, and only rigorous exercise can nudge up HDL, the good form that protects against heart attacks. But the study, by Dr. William E. Kraus of Duke University, found a new way that exercise can affect cholesterol by altering the number and size of the particles that carry cholesterol through the bloodstream.

National Airlines to stop operating

National Airlines to stop operating LAS VEGAS — National Airlines, which flew tourists to the nation's gambling capital, said it was ceasing operations Wednesday after nearly two years in bankruptcy court. A \$Z million financing deal that would have kept the carrier flying fell apart last month. "We kept fighting and a lot of people kept working with us." National spokesman Dik Shimizu said. "But the airline industry is still hemorrhaging red ink and obviously it's not an easy task to attract new capital." The Las Vegas-based airline began service in May 1998 and filed for bankruptcy in December 2000. National said it would offer no refunds on tickets, and was telling customers to contact their credit card companies. The company's Web site also was shut down.

SALT LAKE CITY — A South Carolina man was charged Wednesday with trying to extort \$3 million for the safe return of Elizabeth Smart, the 14-year-old girl who vansished from her bedroom in June According to an arrest warrant, Holloway confessed he kept up a regular correspondence with Salt Lake City police and the Smart family boasting he was "the only real kidnapper," threatening to hurt the girl and demanding, "Tell Ed he can have Elizabeth back as soon as I get the ransom." The family did not return a telephone message Wednesday from Treturn at telephone message of extortion and sending threatening messages across state lines. FBI agent James H. He was using the screen name "Elizabethsmartikidnapper."

Sharon's party favored to emerge as Israel's strongest faction

Turmoil: Israeli prime minister holds slim edge over main rival

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Ariel Sharon's Likud Party is favored to emerge as Israel's strongest faction in an abbreviated election campaign, and Sharon holds a slim edge over his main rival for party leader. Benjamin Netanyahu, according to polls published Wednesday in the polls published Wednesday in the polls published Wednesday in the polls published Wednesday in Mideast violence. Despite a long rivalry with Sharon, former Prime Minister Netanyahu agreed to serve as foreign minister in Sharon's caretaker government. Parliament aproved the appointment in a 61-31 vote Wednesday.

However, Netanyahu said he and Sharon should make a joint statement saying the winner of the upcoming Likud party leadership race can count on the other's support. In Israel's tumulituous politics, such unlikely alliances are common.

The caretaker government will be in office less than three months and is not expected to make major policy decisions. The United States recently proposed a "road map" for relaunching Mideast peace negotiations, but Netanyahu said he believed

The electoral system leads to unwieldy
coalition governments that are chronically
unstable. No government has completed

years. The alliance between Sharon and Netanyahu is seen as part of a competition between the two, with each trying to win points with Likud voters for seeming to place national interest ahead of the rival-

No date has been set for the Likud primary. Sharon wants to hold it soon, perhaps later this month, while Netanyahu wants more time to campaign.

Sharon leads Netanyahu by 44 percent to 38 percent among Likud members, according to a poll by the Dahaf institute published in the Yediot Ahronot daily. The survey had a margin of error of 4.2 percentage points.

Speaking to reporters, Netanyahu expressed confidence he would win the leadership race. "What people are looking for today is a way to get the country out of the mud," he said, "I believe I have that way."

The Labor party, which has the largest number of seats in the outgoing parliament, holds its leadership contest Nov. 19 Party chief Binyamin Ben-Ellezer, the recently resigned defense minister, faces two dovish candidates, Haifa Mayor Amram Mitzma and legislator Haim Ramon.

Sharon dissolved parliament Tuesday and called the new elections. The move came after Labor left the coalition last week, citing Sharon's refusal to cut funding to Jewish settlements in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Under the electoral system, voters choose a party, not a candidate. The party leader first able to form a coalition is named prime minister.

The general election is tentatively set for Jan. 28, though legislators have the option of moving the date up two weeks.



Activists talk race, social reform, war

Get moving: Social reform begins with yourself, Angela Davis and Patricia Hill Collins tell crowd

Young people today often powerless because they not part of a larger social vement, said two black

movement, said two black feminist lecturers.

The key to social reform is to "change the world from where you are right now in your life," said activist Angela Davis, who is teaching at the University of Louisville this semester.

Davis, along with fellow academic and author Patricia Hill Collins, spoke to a packed audience at Worsham Theater last night in a discussion moderated by UK English professor Yolanda Pierce.

People of all ages and races listened intently as Davis and Collins explored such topics as black history, sexism, war, racism, and

prison life.

Though the talk was not intended to cover any one theme in particular, the speakers continually returned to the need for activism and reform.

"Academic discussions don't change anything. Active service does," said Collins, who teaching at UK this year.

She and Davis are no strangers to the concept, with an extensive history of activism between the two of them.

Davis was a philosophy

After her capture in 1970 she was eventually cleared of all charges, thanks in part to

the international Free Angela Davis campaign.
She used the movement's energy to found the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression, which is still active today.
Today, she is the history of consciousness department

still active today.
Today, she is the history of consciousness department chair at the University of California, Santa Cruz, and has lectured all over the world on racism and prison reform. She is also the author of several books exploring racial politics.
Collins is also an accomplished scholar, with three books and numerous articles in professional journals.
She is currently the sociology chair in the department of African American studes to the collins of the collins and the collins and the collins are several colleges, held editorial positions with professional journals, and princip sheld editorial positions with professional journals, and, like Davis, has lectured widely in the United States and abroad.







The performance of Ralph Reed's faction showed that the Religious Right is far from dead, and nowhere near ready to punt on the issue of abortion.




