Tennis Court Shortage

There isn't any tennis play here at the University who needs to be reminded that there are not nearly enough tennis courts to accommodate all those who wish to play. With the tennis team, gym classes, and intramural participants occupying the courts during the majority of desirable hours it has become exceedingly difficult for the average student to get a court for private use. There is no doubt that the situation could be alleviated and one of the best methods of doing so would be more consideration on the part of the tennis coach himself. The tennis team reserves the use of four courts for a two-hour period each afternoon of the week, including Saturday and Sunday. This is well and good. The team should use as many courts as it needs to use. But it would seem that on afternoons when only a few members of the tennis team are present that these courts could be paired off with each other on the courts required and the other reserved courts be opened to student use. Unfortunately, this is not always the case and more than one disgruntled student has observed that the tennis coach and his friends who are not on the tennis team use the courts for private recreation. The coach may engage one of the team members himself and let some of his friends play other members or, as what is just as often the case, the coach and his friends will all take over one of the reserved courts while students must patiently wait for the courts which are "reserved for members of the tennis team." The manager of the tennis courts realizes the unfairness of this situation but is powerless to do anything about it. It seems that he is not delegated the authority to remove non-team members from courts reserved for team use and receives little or no help from the tennis coach when attempting to do so. The Physical Education Department should be aware of this problem and it is the duty of the powers that be in that department to see that tennis team use of the few University tennis courts not be abused by persons who are in position to do so and that student privilege to use the courts not be minimized by such abuse. ### Campus In 1882 Had Lake And Only Three Buildings

Sixty-six years ago the names of Mimmie Howard Combs and Eddie B. Crowwell were scratched, perhaps with a diamond ring or slipkin, on a window pane in the main building of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky.

Through the years since 1882, when the imposing structure, now the Administration Building, was completed, change has followed change. Today only the solid brick walls remain the same—the brick walls and the names of Mimmie Combs and Eddie Crowwell, written on a pane of glass in a second-floor office where English classes used to meet.

In the beginning all of the college classrooms, offices, and laboratories were in the main building. The dormitory—now White Hall—and President James K. Patterson's home were the only other buildings on the knoll that overlooked a lake where the Alumni Gymnasium and Student Union Building now stand.

In those days the president personally greeted and extracted a \$5 matriculation fee from each incoming student. Originally the following were housed in the main building: Basement—the college armory (now occupied by the Accounting Department), a shop, and five classrooms; first floor—the president's office, equipped with fireplace, and classroom; (now the Registrar's Office), a natural history museum, two laboratories, three classrooms, and the Normal Department; second floor—the Departments of French, German, English, and Mathematics, the Preparatory Department, and an assembly room containing an organ; third floor—headquarters for the Union Literary and Philosophical societies, the Latin and Greek Department, and the Weather Observatory.

### Warren Wins DuPont Prize

Donald Warren, senior in metallurgical engineering, has been awarded a research fellowship of \$1800 and tuition fees for one year of graduate study at Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa., by the DuPont de Nemours Company.

DuPont offered only one fellowship of this type to graduates of schools of metallurgy, and Warren will begin his work at the Fall term of 1948. During the summer he will be employed on a research project on power metallurgical methods for fabrication of magnetic materials for the U.S. Signal Corps at Lehigh.

Warren is a member of Tau Beta Pi, national engineering honorary, Triangles fraternity, and former assistant editor of the Kentucky Engineer. He has an accumulative standing of 2.8 and recently received the E. B. Ellis prize of \$100 for highest standing in the College of Engineering during freshman and sophomore years.

### Deadline Approaches For Men To Enter Pilot Training Class

"Only a few more weeks remain for college men to qualify for the United States Air Force's Aviation Cadet pilot training class beginning July 1. Lt. Gen. George E. Stratemyer, Commanding General of the Air Defense Command at Mitchell Air Force Base, New York, said Thursday. The Air Defense Command monitors the Aviation Cadet Procurement Program for the United States Air Force.

Gen. Stratemyer pointed out that there are still some vacancies for the July training program which leads to an officer's commission and a pilot's wings with the United States Air Force. College men graduating in June are urged to complete their applications without delay in order to qualify for the next class. Men who do not complete their qualifications in the next few weeks will have to wait until the October 15 class, it was pointed out.

Successful Aviation Cadet candidates can look forward to an exciting career opportunity in the challenging field of aviation, and are assured of a monthly income up to \$326 after only 12 months of training. Pilot officer training is open to all unmarried male citizens between 20 and 26 1/2 years of age who are in excellent physical condition, who have had two or more years of college, or can pass an examination of the educational equivalent, and can pass the qualifying examination to measure the degree to which they have the aptitude for modern military flying. Men who previously have been eliminated from, or have completed a service flying school course leading to a pilot's rating are not eligible for the training.

General Stratemyer advised college men interested in the Air Force training to inquire immediately at the nearest Air Force Base or Recruiting Office. They may also write for information directly to the Chief of Staff, United States Air Force, Washington 25, D.C., Attention: Aviation Cadet Branch.

several new buildings on the campus. This loan approval made possible the erection of the present structure.  
Promotional ventures by the leadership fraternity and by other campus organizations helped to raise the initial funds for furnishing the building. Tag sales were sponsored, and donations were made by the University and by various campus groups.  
Finally, on April 7, 1937, The Lexington Leader carried this spirited bit of information:  
"I'm thrilled at being able to take part in the opening paragraph of a chapter of expansion at the University of Kentucky, which will lead to new heights in education and research," Acting Governor Keen Johnson said Tuesday afternoon at the ground breaking ceremonies for the University Student Union Building.

Completed in 1938, the project cost an approximate \$250,000, and its furnishings were purchased by money gleaned from campaigns mentioned heretofore.

**Need For Center Obvious**  
That there was a real need for a center of student activity was obvious in the years prior to the existence of the structure now standing between Frazer Hall and the Alumni Gymnasium. Dances often interfered with basketball practice and various other athletic engagements in the gymnasium. Students had no place in which they could schedule and hold organizational meetings. There were no recreational facilities on the campus. The Student Union Building has cured these deficiencies in campus life.

When you, as a student, walk through myriads of "coke-sipping," "billiard and ping-pong playing," "jitter-bugging," philosophizing and appreciative groups of fellow-students who use the facilities of the student center, you're strolling through a new era in Kentucky's campus life. When you return to the University as a graduate you will be entranced again into this strange world. A million enchanting memories hovering about the walls of this structure, by and for the students will bring your footsteps to these halls. Sulzer as director. He has headed the department ever since.  
This school was one of the first in the country to have its own FM station.  
WBKY, the oldest FM station in Kentucky from the standpoint of continuous operation, grew from a meager two-studio setup in the old Art Center to today's efficient layout.

### Awards

The station has received several awards for its programming. In 1943 a series on venereal diseases merited the George Peabody award. This series was the first in the nation to discuss the subject openly. A series on hobbies done on WHAS with the cooperation of the Lexington Homecrafters, won the Popular Science Monthly plaque in 1938.  
The station's cooperation with WHAS since 1929 marks the longest continuous operation between a school and a commercial station in the United States.  
The University is noted for its excellent dramatic productions, which are supervised by Mrs. Lolo Robinson, program director. Many of the plays are originals from members of her script-writing classes.

### Program Series

Four interesting program series are being conducted this quarter by students in advanced production in dramatic form. They treat social security, tolerance, and scientific improvements. Many requests have been received from various agencies for copies of the scripts used for these programs. The fourth series consists of inform on-the-spot interviews inside Lexington industries. These shows are done outside the studios with a tape recorder.  
Recently a new policy was adopted by the station in regard to transcriptions made in the studio. A plan has been worked out so that WBKY transcriptions can be exchanged with other educational stations throughout the country.  
Plans are being made to continue exchanging transcriptions with French universities. One program was translated into French in the studio and transcribed. Designed to present outstanding University traditions, it was enthusiastically received in France according to reports. WBKY has carried similar programs by French students to depict their life to us.

this year that townspeople are being approached by the University for too many contributions, and since the delegate represents the students, the money should come from the student budget. Expenditures above the \$400 can be supplied and earned by the student through speaking engagements and newspaper articles. Charles Boggs, last year's delegate, reported total expenses of approximately \$500.  
The assembly in passing an appropriation over Dr. Donovan's unofficial veto, expressed the opinion that the money collected from students for SCA should be spent by that body according to the needs of the students. However, if Dr. Donovan will limit the appropriation to \$200 after student opinion has been expressed, other means of raising the deficit will be worked out by the assembly, Crockett said.

The Villanova-Texas A&M game on September 18 will be one to watch. We believe that the Philadelphia team will come up with one of the best in the East this fall.

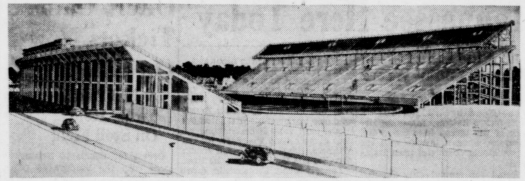
Georgia Strong
