

Besides the UK people who participated as immates, Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity, Alpha Delta Pi sorority and the Army and Air Force ROTC provided almost 200 volunteers to help run the event.

The spirit of cooperation so evident in the Jail-a-Thon provides an example of what any fundraiser should be. Many groups got together — and got involved.



William Schroeder spent 30 minutes of a
sunny Saturday afternoon riding through
Louisville neighborhoods on his first trip
away from Humana Hospital Audubon with
the compressed air-driven
spokeswoman said yesterday.
Schroeder became the first of the
world's three human recipients of a permanent mechanical heart to leave hospital
grounds.
Schroeder, 53, of Jasper, Ind., had been
in the \$45,000 van once before but the vehicle did not leave the hospital parking lot on
that occasion. The van has its own "Utahdrive" equipment to provide the pulses of
air that power his heart; a portable unit
was used during the wheelchair ride to the
van.

#### Soviets cut U.S. visit short

SAN FRANCISCO - A high-ranking Soviet delegation led by a member of that nation's ruling Politburo yesterday unexpectedly cut short by two days its visit to the United States, U.S. officials said.

The delegation, the highest-ranking Soviet group to visit the United States in more than a decade, was leaving for New York, and was to take a special flight to Moscow today, officials asid.

Officials declined to comment on speculation that the delegation's sudden departure, two days before it had planned to leave for the Soviet Union, may have been be prompted by death or critical illness of Soviet leader Konstantin U. Chernenko.

#### Car bomb kills 9 in Lebanon

CAT DOMD KIIIS 9 IN Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon - A lone suicide attacker drove his bomb-laden car into an Israeli army truck in south Lebanon yesterday, killing nine Israeli soldiers, military sources said in Tel Aviv.

At least 11 soldiers were wounded in the attack just across the border from the Israeli town of Metulla, according to hospital officials. Most were severely burned.

In Beirut, the capital of Lebanon, an anonymous caller told the leftist radio that the tarbomb was driven by a member of the Lebanon was driven by a member of the Lebanones National Resistance in revenge for a car bomb that killed 75 people and injured 250 on Friday near a west Beirut mosque. The caller said there would be a longer statement later.

WASHINGTON (AP) — An unreleased Agriculture Department report says \$9,000 U.S. farms, holding 47b tillion in debt, are technically insolvent or on the verge of going broke — a 45 percent increase from earlier figures.

The new report by the department's Economic Research Service, circulating on Capitol Hill, reiterates data issued several months ago indicating that some 36,000 of the 2.3 million total U.S. farms — or nearly 18 percent — are likely to be suffering some financial stress.

But it goes beyond those numbers to paint a worsening picture for the 679,000 farms that are the mainstream of production agriculture, the so-called "family farms" grossing between \$50,000 and \$500,000 a year.
