On the field, Otis Grigsby is a monster, running down, intimidating and dragging the opposition to the ground.

But in the classroom, the 6-foot-4, 253-pound defensive end for the UK football team studies in a major taken mostly by women. Grigsby studies the art of house renovations, furniture placement and space arrangement as part of his major — interior design.

There's no doubt that the big athlete quells some popular myths about interior design majors.

UK Hospital cuts one helicopter from program

Cost-cutting: Facing budget cuts, UK Hospital says returning the helicopter will save \$1 million

UK Hospital will continue its helicopter services, but with one less helicopter than before, hospital officials said Thursday.

before, hospital officials said Thursday.

Air Medical Services will no longer be stationed in the airports in Jackson and Prestonburg because the helicopter that serves those areas will be returned to the company that owns it, said James W. Holsinger Jr., the senior vice president for UK and the chancellor for the UK Chandler Medical Center.

By cutting one of its two helicopters, the hospital plans to save \$1. million. The plan is part of the hospital's \$22 mil-

lion in budget cuts.

The hospital had been looking at cutting the services since this summer. Officials had considered scaling back or closing the service altogether. They had also considered contracting with another service.

Under this plan, they get

ered contracting with anomes service. Under this plan, they get to stay in control, Holsinger said. After reviewing the Air Medical Service budget, offi-cials realized and the Eastern Kentucky which runs for 12 hours a day for seven days a week, was only flying 200 pa-





U.S. was aware of possible plot

government had a dozen warnings that planes could be used as weapons

WASHINGTON — The U.S. government was aware of the threat posed by Osama bin Laden before the Sept. 11 attacks, but didn't have enough specific intelligence to stop the attacks, a State Department official told a congressional panel Thursday. "Basically we know that bin Laden had the means and the intent to attack Americans, both at home and abroad," Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage said in written testimony to the House and Senate Intelligence committees.

Armitage spoke on the second day of the committees' public hearings into the Sept. 11 attacks. The commit-tees, who have been meeting together behind closed doors since June, are ex-amining intelligence failures leading up to the attacks and will recommend changes.

In a preliminary report presented

up to the attacks and whitecommender changes.

In a preliminary report presented Wednesday, staff director Eleanor Hill revealed that the government had many more warnings about terrorist threats before Sept. 11, 2001, than had been previously disclosed. A dozen warnings suggested airplanes could be used as weapons. None specifically pre-dicted the Sept. 11 attacks.

Armitage said the government was aware of the likelihood of attacks and demanded that Afghanistan's Tal-iban rulers stop supporting terrorists.

and demanded that Afghanistan's Taliban rulers stop supporting terrorists. The Taliban were harboring bin Laden and his al-Qaeda organization.

"What we didn't know was at a tactical level," Armitage said. "We did not know exactly what target al-Qaeda intended to attack and how and when." Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz said lessons from the attack show the need for the United States to take action against Iraq.

"When people threaten openly to kill Americans, we should take them very seriously," he said. "That is true of the same by the

Hints of planes as weapons came as early

as 1994

Eleanor Hill, the staff director of the congressional inquiry into the Sopt. II attacks, released a 30-page report Wednesday that details previously classified terrorist threats collected by U.S. intelligence and law enforcement officials. The report lays out a number of signals that terrorists were considering using air-craft as weapons.

Algerian terrorists hijacked an Air Franc airliner and threatened to fly it into the Eiffel Tower. The terrorists were killed when French commandos stormed the plane.

PBlice in the Philippines raided an apartment in Manila and found materials that suggested a plot to crash a hijacked plane into CIA headquarters outside of Washington. One of the plotters was Ramzl Yousek, who was later captured and convicted in the 1993 bombing of the World Trade Center. Another was Khalid Shaikh Mohammed, whom U.S. officials now believe masterminded the Sept. 11 attacks.

1/1996

U.S. intelligence received reports of a planned suicide attack by associates of known terrorists, including an al-Qaeda operative, that would consist of flying a plane from Afghanistan to the United States to attack the White House.

10/1996

U.S. intelligence received reports of a pos-sible Hezbollah plot to hijack a Japanese plane over Israel and crash it into Tel Aviv.

1997

The FBI and CIA received reports that a terrorist group had bought a remote-control plane that could be used to crash into

8/1998

U.S. intelligence learned that a group of unidentified Arabs planned to fly an explosives-laden plane from a foreign country into the World Trade Center. The information was passed to the FBI and Federal Aviation Administration. The FBI took no action; the FAA found the plot "highly unlikely."

9/1998

U.S. intelligence learned that Osama bin Laden's next operation could involve flying an aircraft loaded with explosives into a U.S. airport and detonating it. This infor-mation was supplied to senior government officials in late 1998.

Fall 1998

U.S. intelligence received reports of a bin Laden plot involving aircraft in the New York and Washington areas.

11/1998 U.S. intelligence learned that an Islamic extremist group in Turkey was considering crashing an airplane into the tomb of a Turkish leader.

U.S. intelligence received reports that Iraq had formed a suicide pilot unit to use against U.S. and British forces in the Persian Gulf. The CIA considered this report disinformation.

U.S. intelligence received reports of an al-Qaeda member, an American citizen, who was planning to fly an explosives-laden hang glider into the Explorer

A walk-in at FBI's Newark, N.J., office claimed he was supposed to meet five or six people in the United States to Ajach a plane and either fly it to Afghanistan or holovir flu p. The man claimed he had been trained in a camp in Pakistan. He passed an FBI polygraph, but the FBI was unable to verify his story.

4/2001

A U.S. intelligence source with terrorist connections speculated that bin Laden would be interested in commercial pilots as potential terrorists. The source was offering speculation rather than specific mowledge, U.S. intelligence officials say.

8/2001

U.S. intelligence learned of a possible plot to bomb the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi, Kenya, from an airplane, or crash an air-plane into it. Two people, reportedly act-ing on instruction from bin Laden, met in October 2000 to discuss the plot.

Bush asks Congress for war authority

Bush: "I don't trust Iraq and neither should the free world"; resolution would give Bush war-making authority, restate U.S. policy with Iraq

WASHINGTON — President Bush asked Congress Thursday for authority to use "all means he determines to be appropriate, including force" to disarm and overthrow Iraq's Saddam Hussein, saying the United States will take action on its own if the U.N. Security Council balks.

The president sent to Capitol Hill his proposed wording for a resolution that would give him such broad warmaking authority. He told reporters in the Oval Office that the power to use force was all-important. If you want to keep the peace, you've got to have the authorization to use force. "he said.

The president immediately began trying to build support for the proposed resolution that fills little more than two pages and that he wants Congress to approve before lawmakers go home to campaign for the Nov. 5 elections.

A letter to Congress accommanied

A letter to Congress accompanied his proposed wording authorizing "all heans he determines to be appropriate, including force, in order to enforce the United Nations Security Council resolutions (on disarmament), defend the national security interests of the United States against the threat posed by Iraq and restore international peace and security in the region."

At the White House, nine Democratic and Republican lawmakers emerged from a morning audience with Bush predicting bipartisan support for the commander in chief. "It hink we have no choice but to have the strongest support possible for the president's efforts here," said Rep. Norm Dicks, D-Wash.

The gap between Russian and American viewpoints was underlined Thursday in comments by Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov. Upon arriving at the Pentagon to meet with Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld, Ivanov said he believed U.N. weapons inspectors will succeed in settling the question of whether Iraq has weapons of mass destruction.

"Being experienced in that sort of business — both Americans and Russians — I think we can easily establish (whether) there exist or not weapons of mass destruction technology." Ivanov said. Rumsfeld, who stood by silently as Ivanov spoke, has said repeatedly that inspections cannot be 100 percent reliable because Iraq has a long history of deceiving inspectors.

And Bush lashed out at the notion that Iraq is in talks with the United Nations about resuming inspections: "There are no negotiations to be held with Iraq. ... I don't trust Iraq and neither should the free world."

He declined to name any of the allese he's counting on for support in the event of war, saying only that "time war, saying only that "time price is Iraqi precautions against a possible surprise U.S. attack, Saddam in recent weeks has moved some millitary forces into civilian areas, officials said. They said it did not appear to be the kind of large-scale movement of forces that would indicate Saddam expects an imminent American-led atack, but rather a precaution against a short-notice assault.

Reed, a graduate of UK's College of Law in 1986, is an excellent choice for such an important position. He is dedicated and brings the position valuable experience gained from practicing law and serving on the board. Reed has

ing law and serving on the board. Reed has served his state in other important ways as well. He worked for former Gov. Brereton Jones as deputy counsel in 1991. Three years later, Jones appointed Reed to the board. Gov. Paul Patton

reappointed Reed in 2000, a term which lasts until 2006.

Kentucky's leaders have promoted Reed into important positions and his peers have lauded him as a capable replacement for Miles. Reed has been described as dedicated to his commu-

nity and education.

Every student of 20th Century history has a keen knowledge of what transpired in Munich, and how it affects U.S. policy to this day, yeel that the United States erred substantially in allowing President Wilson in this ferromagnetic state to see the control of t

erred substantially in allowing President Wilson, in his fatigued state, to set the agenda for the Treaty of Versailles.

That has been a mistake that our nation's leaders have not forgotten. But it pales immeasurably when placed alongside the Munich Conference, a meeting in which we had no official part.

In many ways, the decisions of Chamberlain actually gave the term "peace" a bad name. The legacy of the appeasement that took place more than 60 years ago across the Atlantic still has a hold on our government to this

day.

One could persuasively argue that President Lyndon Johnson was as fearful of becoming Neville Chamberlain as he was of blurring constitutional law during Vietnam. Of course, he provided the leaders of another era with his own syndrome, which would have major ramifications on the Gulf War.

For the first time since the early 1960s, an overwhelming amount of Americans have a gung-ho attitude toward war, although many lack the self-less willingness to make personal sacrifices — a major trait of Brokaw's Greatest Generation.
