


"All we have of freedom—all we use or know— This our fathers bought for us, long and long ago." —Rudyard Kipling



Wildcat Coach



Joe B. Hall begins his 10th seatons as head coach of the Kentucky Wildcats with 11 returning lettermen, including five starters.

While leading the Wildcats to a 22-6 record last year, Hall upped his nine-year UK record to 205-66, an average of 22 wins per season, to keep ahead of the pace set by his former coach, Adolph Rupp, who averaged 21.5 victories a season over a 41-season span to become the winningest collegiate basketball coach of all time.

Perhaps the best appraisal of the job Hall has been doing at the University came from Rupp, who died in 1977.

"A good coach," Rupp said, "is a person who can take good material and win with it. Joe has done that."

Judging from Hall's coaching honors, Rupp was as usual, right on target with his evaluation.

Hall has won such honors as Kellogg's 1978 National "Coach of the Year," three Southeastern Conference "Coach of the Year" awards (1973, '75, and '78) in seven years, and nomination for Kodak's 1975, '76, and '78 (finalist) "Coach of the Year" awards.

In 1978 when Kentucky won its

fifth NCAA title, Hall was also presented the Rupp Cup (presented to the SEC Coach of the Year by the Birmingham Tipoff Club) and Hall's most coveted personal award, the Dr. James Naismith "Peachbasket" award, which previously had been awarded to UCLA's John Wooden, Oklahoma State's Hank Iba, Kentucky's Adolph Rupp, and the Boston Celtics' Red Auerbach.

The 1978 champions, which had a 30-2 record, became the sixth Wildcat team to win 30 or more games, joining such illustrious company as the 1947 NIT runner-up (34-3), the 1948 Olympic Champions (36-3), the 1949 NCAA champions (32-2), the 1951 NCAA champions (32-2), and the 1966 NCAA runner-up (32-2).

Entering this season, Hall's 15 year career coaching record stands at 281-122, (excluding a 17-2 record on a 1974 Australian tour, a 7-0 record on a 1978 Japan tour, and six pre-season exhibition wins against foreign and domestic teams) and that record was compiled against nationally ranked non-conference teams and teams in a conference that fast is becom-

ing recognized as among the toughest in the nation. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five-year mark at Regis, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 205-66 record at UK.

Hall began his tour as UK head coach in rather auspicious fashion, becoming in 1973 the first rookie coach in the SEC to be designated Coach of the Year by his fellow coaches and by Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Gathering such honors has been one of Hall's trademarks during a coaching career that began at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School in 1956 and continued through Regis College and Central Missouri State College before he returned to UK July 1, 1965, as an assistant to his former coach, Adolph Rupp.

During Hall's two years at Shepherdsville, the Rams won a Mid-Kentucky conference title and he was named "Coach of the Year" in 1958. He then served one year as freshman coach and five years as head basketball coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he was also athletic director and earned special recognition as



coach of the champion independent team in the area.

His next move was to Central Missouri, where he coached the Mules (19-6) to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and their first Christmas Tournament title in history. He was named MIAA "Coach of the Year" (1964-65).

A three-letter winner and team captain in both sports in high school at Cynthiana, Ky., he played freshman basketball and one year of varsity basketball in the "Fabulous Five" era at the University before transferring to the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., where he set a school single game scoring record and was team captain. Coach Lon Varnell, upon retirement, rated Hall as No. 1 of the three best players he ever coached.

After touring Europe with the Globetrotters in 1951, Hall returned to U.K. in 1955 to complete requirements for his B.A. and later (1964) received his M.A. at Colorado State University.

Returning to U.K. again in 1965 an assistant coach and head recruiter, he was instrumental in adopting a running-conditioning program which obviously paid huge



dividends as the Wildcats capitalized on speed and endurance to offset a lack of size and advanced to the championship game of the NCAA Finals.

Hall became No. 1 varsity assistant and head freshman Coach to Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969.

International Flavor

Hall's basketball renown has attracted world-wide attention in international circles and has catapulted him into a much sought-after clinician and guest speaker. He has taken Wildcat teams on tours of Australia and Japan, where he conducted clinics and shared his basketball philosophy.

Hall considers one of his major coaching honors came when he was named guest lecturer for the World Basketball Coaches Congress in the Canary Islands, July 1977, before some 400 coaches from the international set.

He was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee, and in 1972 served under Hank Iba in the Olympic Trials at the Air Force Academy.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County, Ky. They have three children—Mrs. Kathy (Mike) Summers, Mrs. Judy (Rick) Derrickson and Steve of Lexington.

OTIS A. SINGLETARY University President

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University. His tenure has been marked by rapid growth and a commitment to excellence.

"The University, with all its problems, is still the single most important institution in the state," Dr. Singletary has said. "Its network of influence is felt throughout the state, not just in the instruction of the state's young people but in the great pattern of research, the things we are doing to improve the quality of human life and the wide range of services we are providing throughout the state.

"Contrary to popular opinion, our institutions of higher education are not operated exclusively for students, or for faculty members, or for administrators, or for trustees — or, for that matter, for all of these. Historically speaking, universities have been created and supported by our society to perform important functions for the common good of society. This is the larger meaning of the term, 'the public interest,' as it applies to institutions of higher education."

Before being named UK president in 1969, Dr. Singletary served as executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and as director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The Gulfport, Miss., native holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. He is a nationally recognized history scholar and is the author of two books and several monographs.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 19,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges. UK has gained an international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture. The University also is noted for its research in the fields of energy, tobacco and cancer. The Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging is one of the first facilities of its kind

The UK Alumni Association has

recognized Dr. Singletary's special service by presenting him its Alumni Service Award. It is an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is in the second year of his two-year term as president of the Southeastern Conference. As University President, he serves as chairman of the board of directors of the UK Athletic Association, the body which maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict, he is commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents

Athletics Director



CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

The University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of 1982 and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985. The UK Relays were renewed this past

spring.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level II, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

He was named in 1972, assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975

Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). He went on to star in the NBA with the St. Louis Hawks and in the ABA with the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach.

Sue Feamster joined the athletics association July 1, 1979 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.


A former teacher and counselor, Feamster is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Feamster of Frankfort.



Leonard Hamilton was named the University of Kentucky's first associate basketball coach on Oct. 15, 1980.

Hamilton has been a member of the Wildcat coaching staff for seven years. He came to Kentucky after serving three years as an assistant coach at Austin Peay.

He has always been noted as an outstanding recruiter and as a defensive specialist. Most remarkable in his coaching career is the fact that in nine of his 10 years as a coach on the collegiate level, the team he has been associated with has advanced to post-season play. Only in his first season at Austin Peay has Hamilton not been involved in a post-season tournament

A native of Gastonia, N. C., Hamilton lettered three years in football and two years in basketball in high school. He captained his basketball team for two years at Gastonia Community College, and also served as team captain at Tennessee-Martin, where he graduated in 1970.

The 33-year-old Hamilton is married to the former Claudette Hale of McLemoresville, Tenn. They have a son, Lenny, 11.



During my eight years as head basketball coach at the University of Kentucky, it has been a tremendous thrill to see our basketball teams gain success and notoriety in the academic arena.

It has always been my philosophy that a college athlete's number one objective should be to earn an undergraduate degree. In our basketball program at U.K., we are always conscious of this goal and motivate our players daily in this direction.

Our coaching staff demands the same from our players in the classroom as we do on the basketball court. Through daily academic meetings, tutoring sessions, and study halls, our players develop a

sound routine that is conducive to self-discipline and scholastic emphasis. Our Athletics Association has established a full-time academic advisor, who directs these activities and reports our players' academic progress to me on a daily and weekly basis.



Dick Parsons and Marion McKenna

As Alma Mater beams on fondly, Dick Parsons (AB '61, MA '69), makes an extraordinary midlife "passage."

He becomes a University development officer, a specialist in estate planning and deferred giving—"give and go," if you will.

He gives up those marathon recruiting trips ("I spent three days at home in December 1979") and now takes to woods and stream for the hunting and fishing he has always loved.

He's able to find and refinish odd, old pieces of furniture, take a trip with Celia, his wife of 20 years, to colonial Williamsburg, get really reacquainted with his children, Kathy, 15, a high school cheerleader, and Ed, an 18-year-old freshman at (where else?) UK.

Dick Parsons, standing 5'10" and weighing 160, looks about as he did when he played and coached basketball and baseball at UK, and later when he made those recruiting trips on the trail of Rick Robey, Derrick Hord, Kevin Grevey, et al.

He was a baseball All-American ('61) and varsity captain; he played varsity basketball ('58-'61) and was team captain in his senior year.



Nowadays, Parsons hikes, jogs, plays golf and conducts basketball clinics for his church.

He is in another, office world, and feeling "as if a great weight is off my shoulders."

This new job is competitive, Parsons will tell you, and what he learned in athletics helps him. And, of course, as everybody knows, "having been a UK athlete opens doors for you."

From athletics, and especially from the late, great Adolph Rupp,

he learned to "show a little toughness in life," and "how to deal with pressure."

Parsons is a very serious man, whose sense of humor emerges only "after he gets to know you and feels comfortable with you," says Terry Mobley, UK director of development. Mobley praises Dick Parsons' devotion to UK, his word-ishis-bond sense of honor and his great energy. Parsons believes that when he helps arrange a gift to the University of Kentucky he "brings fulfillment into the life of the donor."

Many people, he says, want to make gifts to UK, and "I brief them on their options." Those options require an intimacy with law and finance that Parsons has learned from scratch and with typical diligence. Sometimes he consults other professionals, such as members of UK's legal and business staffs, trust officers of banks, attorneys, accountants and the like.

Parsons loves this new job. "Terry," he said, "has created a good place to work."

Terry says, "Dick Parsons has made a wonderful transition from sports. You know, he had many coaching offers, but he has tremendous loyalty to this place. He wanted to stay at UK."

When Marion McKenna finished high school in her native Worcester, Mass., she made a "practical decision" and chose nursing from the three options generally open to girl high school graduates in 1940 (nursing, teach-

ing, secretarying).

After earning her diploma from the local hospital and serving a year as night supervisor, she joined the U.S. Army Nurse Corps and spent three adventurous, satisfying years in the Mediterranean Theatre during World War II. Lt. Mc-Kenna was for four months in charge of pre-op at an evacuation hospital where "sometimes we did 120 operations a day." Later she served in a 5,000-bed hospital operated by the American army for German prisoners of war.

Perhaps more than most other people, Dr. McKenna is likely always to remember where she was when World War II ended-at sea, enroute from Florence, Italy, to Manila, The Philippines, preparing to serve in the Pacific Theatre.

The news came to the captain via ship's radio: the Japanese had surrendered; Nurse McKenna's ship was to turn around and head

for Newport News, Va.
"What a celebration we had," she recalls. The war years were, in retrospect, a time when "we knew what we were there for," and "we were appreciated." It seems to Dr. McKenna that because "everybody pitched in and worked" those years produced a kind of cameraderie "I have not seen since.'

The G.I. bill helped earn her B. S. N. at the University of Pennsylvania; that and fellowship aid helped with the M. Ed. and later the

Ed. D. from the University of Flor-

And, too, there were people. "Significant individuals came along at the right time in my life," the director of nursing at Delaware Hospital in Wilmington who gave nurse McKenna her first teaching job (science instructor) and the dean of Florida's nursing college who "insisted" she pursue the highest academic degree and a career in teaching and administra-

Coming to UK was for Dr. Mc-enna "the best decision I've Kenna "the best decision I've made." She has learned "to bet on horses and to love basketball, since arriving in the Bluegrass. When she goes to UK men's and Lady Kats games, she "practically coahes from the bench," says her friend Virginia Lane, a retired UK nursing professor.

Dr. McKenna recently retired from the U.S. Air Force, with the rank of colonel. She remains a military consultant to the USAF surgeon general and a member of the Defense Advisory Committee of Women in the Services.

As member, consultant and delegate she has served health, nursing and acadamic associations and conference for the past 20 years.

She is valuable in such roles because of her ability, her colleagues say, to be assertive without being at the same time disagreeable.

A sense of humor moderates it all, and a life philosophy that says: "I wouldn't change a thing. I've been fortunate—in my family, my friends, my career."

The Kentucky-Notre Dame game rolls around each year just after Christmas, at a time when the festive mood is still in the air but everyone is finished with giving things away.

National attention for the past 21 years has been focused on Louisville and the battle of two teams with great tradition. It is a chance for Notre Dame to begin a run that in recent years has led to the NCAA tournament and a chance for Kentucky to let its fans out in the Commonwealth see the Wildcats in action.

The game has been played each year since the 1957-58 season when the teams squared off in the NCAA Midwest Regional in Lexington. But the series dates back to 1929 with UK holding a 27-15 series edge. Louisville has hosted the game 29 times since 1937 and, while the site has been officially considered "neutral," Notre Dame Coach Digger Phelps let it be

known he didn't enjoy coming to Kentucky each holiday season just to be beaten like a Christmas drum.

Phelps got his way and next year's game will be in South Bend. No doubt national television will continue to consider the UK-Irish contest worthy of our attention.

The Wildcats have won 20 of the last 24 games and eight of the last 11. They have won every game since 1974—except for last year when Phelps achieved only his second win over the Blue and White. Last season, the Irish upset the Wildcats 67-61 behind the clutch play of senior forward Kelly Tripucka. In 1973, the Irish thrashed the Cats 94-79. That year Notre Dame started John Shumate (now a Phelps assistant), Gary Novak, Adrian Dantley, Gary Brokaw (also a Phelps assistant) and Dwight Clay and compiled a 26-3 record on the season.

The game last year was close






throughout but it was the coolness under pressure of Tripucka, Orlando Woolridge, John Paxson and Tracy Jackson that won out in the end. Sam Bowie was Kentucky's standout performer. Big Sam had 18 points and 11 rebounds.

The three games before that, the underdog Cats have come up with impressive performances and thrilling victories. In 1978, Notre Dame entered the contest No. 2 in the nation. Coach Joe B. Hall installed freshman Dwight Anderson, a guard, at the forward position and the Dayton flash starred in Kentucky's 81-76 win.

Two years ago, Kentucky again was the underdog. The Cats played without Anderson, Bowie and Dirk Minniefield who were benched for disciplinary reasons. Kentucky pulled out an 86-80 victory.





Scouting Report: Notre Dame

One are seven letttermen, inlettermen, inwho made themselves the most successful class in Notre Dame basketball history by posting an overall record of 92-26 (.780 winning percentage) and helping the Irish to wins over number-one ranked teams from Marquette, DePaul, Kentucky and Virginia. As freshmen, the talented crew helped Notre Dame to its only appearance in the NCAA final four.

But despite the heavy losses, Irish coach Digger Phelps, beginning his second decade at Notre Dame, feels his 1981-82 squad can continue the streak of eight straight trips to the NCAA tournament and six consecutive 20-win seasons.

"We lost a lot of key people, and

"We lost a lot of key people, and a quick glance at our roster shows only a couple of household names," says Phelps. "The last few years our starting lineup has been pretty well established heading into the season. That's not true this year. The players who sat on the bench last year know this is their chance — this is their time to make a significant contribution in the scoring and rebounding columns. They've helped us win in the past in reserve roles. Now they will have their share of the spotlight."

One familiar name on the Irish roster is John Paxson, and the steady, reliable guard, who often played in the shadows of seniors Orlando Woolridge, Kelly Tripucka and Tracy Jackson last season, may very well be the best in the country at his position. The 6-2, 180-pound junior led the Irish in assists (138) and minutes played (36.6 per game) last season while starting all 29 contests and averaging 9.9 points. He scored in double digits 10 times, including a careerhigh 22-point performance against San Francisco in the Athletic and Convocation Center. Also a standout defensive player, he held Brigham Young All-American Danny Ainge to 12 points on 4-of-10 shooting; limited Virginia scoring ace Jeff Lamp to just nine points; and went head-to-head to Olympian and All-American Isiah Thomas of Indiana.

Paxson's backcourt mate will emerge from a talented group of candidates. Senior captain Mike Mitchell (1.3 ppg.) has undergone knee surgery prior to his sophomore and junior seasons and hopes to enter the 1981-82 campaign healthy. The 6-2, 175-pounder possesses an excellent outside shooting touch and a stellar reputation as a passer.

Freshman newcomers Dan Duff and Ron Rowan should see plenty of playing time at guard. The 6-0 Duff, who hails from Lincoln, III., has drawn raves for his passing and ballhandling antics, while the 6-5 Rowan, a native of Beaver Falls, Pa., rates as an excellent shooter.

Varner, a 6-6 junior, should be a prime candidate for one of those starting berths after two seasons as a reserve. Last year he averaged 4.9 points and 2.1 rebounds while playing 17 minutes a game. He also started two games when Woolridge and Jackson were injured. An accurate shooter from almost anywhere on the court, Varner boasts quickness and ballhandling ability.

Sluby, who contributed 3.2 points and 14.0 minutes per game last season, may occupy the other forward slot. A patient shooter who rarely takes a bad shot, the 6-4, 200-pound sophomore reminds

Irish fans of Adrian Dantley with his rugged and aggressive style of play. Sluby, who doesn't hesitate to use his muscle, also can play quard.

Spencer, a 6-7 sophomore, saw action in 15 games last season and tallied 20 points and hauled down 18 rebounds. The former prep All-American from Detroits Catholic Central High School was bothered by a nagging foot injury late in the season but should be healthy and able to contribute when practice opens. Spencer, like Sluby, could also play guard. Spencer played three positions in high school and averaged 24 points and 15 rebounds.

The lanky Rucker, 6-8, 190 pounds, became an ACC crowd favorite in his first season with the Irish as he canned 13-of-22 field goal attempts (mostly from long range) while playing only 40 minutes. A smooth, finesse player, Rucker handles himself well around the boards.

The Irish lack personnel at center when junior Tim Andree returns after starting 18 games as a sophomore. The 6-10, 230-pound Andree averaged 2.6 points and 2.4 rebounds while playing 13.9 minutes a contest. Last year his role was to concentrate on defense, but he must emerge as a dominant factor on the boards as well as the scoring column for the Irish. An aggressive and enthusiastic player, Andree also will have to stay out of foul trouble, a problem that plagued him last season. Rucker and Grassey could move to center to add depth.

DIGGER PHELPS Head Coach

During his 10-year tenure, Digger Phelps has molded the Irish basketball program into one of the nation's most respected and successful outfits. Notre Dame boasts an enviable 206-84 (.710 winning percentage) during his reign. His last eight Irish squads have advanced to NCAA regional play, a distinction no other coach in the country can claim. Since 1975-76 the Irish have posted six consecutive 20-win seasons.

Prior to joining the Notre Dame ranks in 1971, Phelps began his head coaching career at Fordham in 1970. He inherited a 10-15 squad and gained the attention of the basketball world as he guided the Rams to a 26-3 mark and third-place finish in the NCAA East Regional in his first season as a college head coach. The Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association voted Phelps its Coach of the Year award for his efforts. That same year he finished fourth to Marquette's Al McGuire in the United Press International poll.

Beginning his 12th season as a head coach, Phelps boasts an impressive list of achievements that many veterans in the profession can't match. His overall slate reads 232-87 for a .727 winning percentage. Phelps has guided nine teams to NCAA tournaments and 10 to postseason play. Eight of his 11 clubs have surpassed the 20-victory plateau. Only one of his squads, his initial unit at Notre Dame, has experienced a losing season.

Five of Phelps' assistant coaches

at Notre Dame have gone on to assume head coaching positions at other universities.

A native of Beacon, N. Y., Phelps attended Rider College in Trenton, N. J. He competed with the basketball team there for the next four years, gaining a reputation for his tough defensive play. As a senior Phelps helped the Rider squad to an appearance in the 1963 NAIA Tournament in Kansas City.





REV. THEODORE M. HESBURGH University President

In 1952 Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., became president of the University of Notre Dame. That same year Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C., became Notre Dame's executive vice president, treasurer and chairman of the University building committee.

Under their leadership, Notre Dame has grown in public esteem and academic distinction. While moving to the forefront in American higher education the University's student body has gone from 5,000 in 1952 to about 9,000 today.

The operating budget has soared from \$9 million to \$108.9 million, but sound fiscal management and the most successful development program in American Catholic higher education have made the Hesburgh-Joyce years ones of sound growth, financial stability and academic development.


The physical expansion of Notre Dame's campus over the past 29 years has been striking. More than \$100 million has gone into new or renovated physical facilities and more than two dozen new structures have transformed the University skyline.

The Hesburgh era also has seen substantial progress in graduate studies and research. The postbaccalaureate enrollment has gone from 375 in 1952 to about 1,900 today. The amount received for research and sponsored programs has increased from slightly more than \$1 million in 1952 to more than \$12 million annually today.

Consistently ranked among the most influential Americans in both education and religion, he has served six presidents and four popes in varied capacities and has been deeply involved in key social and moral issues. Notre Dame's president held the rank of U.S. ambassador (the only Catholic priest ever to do so) as head of the U. S. delegation to a United Nations conference on the transfer of technology from developed to underdeveloped countries.

The 1980 recipient of the Alexis de Tocqueville Society Award from United Way of America for exemplary service to the voluntary movement. Father Hesburgh currently is chairman of the Select

Commission on Immigration and Refugee Policy, chairman of the Rockefeller Foundation, chairman of the Washington-based Overseas Development Council which lobbies for the needs of underdeveloped countries, and a member of the board of trustees of the Chase Manhattan Bank. He was given the nation's highest civilian honor, the Medal of Freedom, in 1964 by President Lyndon B. Johnson for his work on behalf of civil rights. He served on the U.S. Civil Rights Commission from its inception in 1957 until 1972, including three years as chairman.



Truly one of the leading land grant institutions in the nation, the University of Kentucky has a national and international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture.

Situated in the heart of the beautiful Bluegrass region of Kentucky, the main campus at Lexington has more than 23,000 students enrolled.

Another 19,000 students are enrolled in the 13 community colleges operated by UK across the state.

The main campus, near down-town Lexington, comprises about 625 acres of land on which there are more than 200 buildings and other structures, walks, malls, gardens, playing fields, recreation space and parking.
