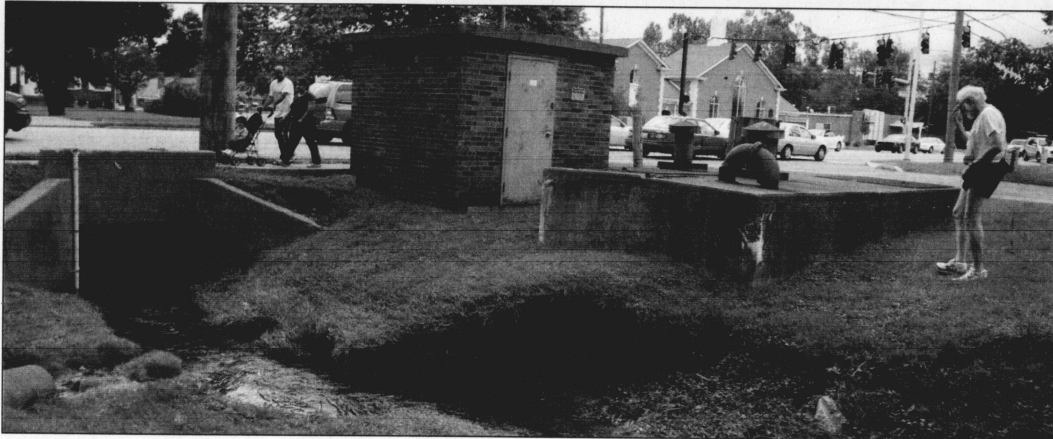

### Body found in childhood creek 'brings it home'

The creek behind John Jessup's house was calm yesterday, flowing as smoothly as it did when he played in it as a child.

But two days ago, it was running rough and high from the nearly seven inches of water that fell during the week-end storms. His childhood play ground was at least four feet deeper Saturday morning when the body of UK pharmacy student Lauren Brooke Fannin, 25, was found floating near the bank. The body of Lindsey Marie Harp, a 25-year-old UK nursing school graduate, passed through the area earlier in the morning and was found about half a mile further down creek.

"I felt just an overwhelming grief for the girls," Jessup said. "Just to think that a life had been snuffed out. It's just a horrible feeling to see something like that."

"It brings me home when something like that happens right in your backyard."

Around 2:15 Saturday morning, Fannin, of Tomahawk, Ky., and Harp, of Frankfort, Ky., got out of cab on Nicholasville Road near Alumni Drive, said Maj. Joe Monroe of the UK police department. The cab was stopped by an officer who was directing traffic away from where high water washed over the road.

The two women were less than 100 yards from Fannin's apartment when they tried to navigate the knee-high water. Both girls slipped and were swept through an underground drainage system.

Harp had just started working at a hospital in Kansas City, Mo., in June and was visiting Fannin. Fannin's younger sister, Elizabeth, said the two went out with friends that evening.

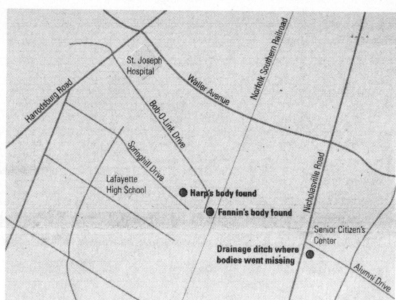

### Nursing grad was destined for medicine; pharmacy student made others laugh

Cheryl Harp choked back tears as she remembered her daughter, Lindsey.

"She was wonderful," she said. "She was my first baby. She was beautiful, the prettiest girl in the world."

Harp was visiting her close friend Lauren Fannin when both women drowned early Saturday morning after slipping and falling into a swollen drainage ditch.

Elizabeth Fannin said that her family will miss her older sister, but knew Lauren would want them to pick themselves up and move on with their lives.

"I know she wouldn't want us to be sad and depressed," Elizabeth Fannin said. "We love and miss her. This is going to be really hard to get over for us, but we'll get to see her again."

Fannin, 25, of Inez, was a third-year pharmacy student at UK and earned her bachelor's degree from Georgetown College.

Harp, 25, of Frankfort, graduated from UK's College of Nursing in May and earned her bachelor's degree at Georgetown College, where she had been a member of the golf team.

Harp's mother said her daughter had just taken a job as a nurse in Kansas City in June. Cheryl Harp said she and her husband,

Ricky, always knew Harp would end up in the medical field but thought she would attend to animals instead of people.

"From the time that she was very young, we could see that she was wonderful with animals," Cheryl Harp said. "We thought she'd be a veterinarian, but she ended up being a nurse."

Cheryl Harp said her three daughters, including 24-year-old Jennifer and 16-year-old Jamie, were very close.

"(Lindsey) loved her sisters," Cheryl Harp said.

Jennifer Cowley, an instructor in the College of Nursing who taught Harp, could tell she was very passionate about nursing.

"Lindsey was a very bright student who was very articulate and compassionate about her nursing," Cowley said. "I feel like it's a great loss. She had a bright future ahead of her."

Harp's mother said Fannin was "one of (Lindsey Harp's) best friends."

Both attended Georgetown and roomed together during their first year at UK until Fannin had an automobile accident and had to leave school for a year.

Fannin's younger sister, Elizabeth, 17, said Fannin was an "amazing" person.

"Lauren was really fun and ex-

### Basement flooding causes dorm outage

Flooding from heavy rain early Saturday morning left residents in Keeneland Hall without electricity, said Jay Blanton, director of public relations at UK.

"Water filled up the mechanical room in the basement," causing an electrical shortage, Blanton said.

"That was early this (Saturday) morning," Blanton said. "The power was back on by 11 a.m."

Blanton said other sporadic outages were possible later on. "(But) right now, this is the only one we're aware of," Blanton said Saturday afternoon.

Willie Miller, a computer science junior and RA at Keeneland, said he was in his room about to go to sleep when the electricity went off.

"It was really early in the morning," Miller said. Miller described the outage as "strange."

"The power didn't really go out, it was more like half-out," he said. "It was enough to knock some of the appliances out. And the lights didn't go completely out, but they were extremely dim. They got it taken care of pretty quickly."

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### Profs tackle Ky. poverty problem on KET

In a state with over 19 percent of its residents living at or below the poverty line, Kentucky is frequently ranked as one of the poorest states in the country.

In Appalachia alone, nearly 30 percent of residents live below the poverty line, according to the Appalachia Regional Commission.

Two UK professors are appearing on this week's edition of "Kentucky Tonight" to show Kentuckians how serious this problem is and to offer suggestions for remedying it. The show airs tonight at 8 p.m.

Joanna Badagliacco, a sociology professor, and James Ziliak, an economics professor and the director of UK's Center for Poverty Research, will discuss recent poverty trends, homelessness and public policy with other guests and

"Kentucky Tonight" host Bill Goodman. Ziliak thinks that having a forum to discuss poverty is important because this concerns so many people across the country.

"Poverty directly affects about 37 million Americans," Ziliak said. "Families, as well as individuals, are affected by this."

Badagliacco thinks Americans need to realize how serious the poverty problem is throughout Kentucky and the U.S.

"When you look at the census data, the gap between the rich and the poor is getting wider and wider," Badagliacco said.

Poverty especially affects Kentuckians, and Kentucky has a history of high poverty rates. As Kentuckians, we have to understand what we can do to end this problem, Ziliak said.

"Poverty is more acute in Ken-

tucky than the nation as a whole," Ziliak said. "Understanding how poverty manifests itself in the Commonwealth in relation to the U.S. is important."

Kentucky has a very defined and unique region of poverty that is not necessarily seen in the rest of the country.

"Appalachia has a big impact (in the U.S.) in terms of coal research, but it is continually defined by high poverty rates," Ziliak said.

Badagliacco agrees that the poverty in Appalachia is not something that can be overlooked any longer.

"I encourage people to find out how people live in the poorest counties of Kentucky," Badagliacco said. "Most people at UK don't know how bad the situation in Appalachia really is. In order to get a decent job, you have to leave the area. There are simply not enough jobs

## The mystery deepens

Did Smith's son die from a deadly drug cocktail? After two autopsies, officials still have no answers about his sudden death

ruled "unnatural" by Bahamian officials, rumors and speculation have mushroomed, and the facts that are known only deepen the mystery. Even her relatives are in the dark. "We are all worried," cousin Melinda Hudson, 27, tells Us. "Nobody has told us anything."

Now, after two autopsies, one by a Bahamian doctor and a second by Cyril Wecht, a pathologist brought in by Smith, comes a new twist. According to Wecht, who performed his examination Sept. 17, Daniel, a student at Los Angeles Valley College in Valley Glen, Calif., had been taking an antidepressant. "I was told that he had been prescribed, about four to six weeks ago, a low dosage," Wecht tells Us, adding that until lab work is complete, no connection should be made to Daniel's death. But a source tells Us that in addition to the antidepressant Lexapro, Daniel had taken the sleep medication Ambien for his September 9 flight. Combining such drugs, says Wecht, who claims he has no knowledge Daniel took sleeping pills, is "not good and potentially dangerous."

#### What Is Known

While lab results on tissue samples will take weeks (an Oct. 23 inquest has been scheduled), Wecht has ruled out one cause of death: "I find nothing

to suggest to me any kind of foul play." (He also ruled out cancer, heart disease and pulmonary embolism.) Foul play had been played up in the press, thanks to a misreading of local legal protocol. "When someone dies here suddenly and it isn't apparent why," Bahamas magistrate Linda Virgill tells Us, "we call it suspicious." A local newspaper, The Nassau Guardian, also reported that Daniel was found in a blood-soaked room. Not so, assistant police commissioner Reginald Ferguson tells Us: "Our crime scene investigators noticed nothing unusual about the condition of the room."

#### The Next Step

As Daniel's body waits at Butler's Funeral Home for transport for burial in L.A., photo agency Getty has already sold pictures of a happy Anna Nicole, the new baby and Daniel, taken the night before his death, to the highest bidder (a tabloid bought the pictures for nearly \$400,000). While it is unclear what Anna Nicole's take will be, a source tells Us the distraught mom sold the pics in order to pay for her son's funeral. Says the source, "She needs the money."

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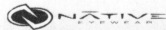
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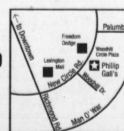

Officer T.J. Doyle stopped the cab carrying Fannin and Harp and the two friends decided to wade through the water to Fannin's apartment.

A witness said the women were walking barefoot. One of the women had made it across on the sidewalk when the other leaned against a shed near the deepest part of the water and yelled that she needed help. The first woman went back for her friend but couldn't tell where the sidewalk was. She accidentally stepped on the sloped creek bank and was sucked into the drainage ditch that flowed under the road. The second girl was either pulled in by the first or slipped when she chased after her friend, the witness said.

Doyle looked up from the taxi when he heard a cry for help and ran to where he last saw the women, Monroe said. He pulled one witness away from entering the creek after she saw the two friends disappear.

Doyle was not available for comment over the weekend. Monroe said Doyle did not see the women wading through the water and believed the officer would have stopped them if he had. He said Doyle felt like he had done all he could on the scene.

"He's just exhausted from everything right now," Monroe said. "He didn't sleep a whole lot yesterday. He feels like he made the right decision. If he had dived in the water, he would have become a fatality."

Doyle reached into the water in search of the women, but couldn't find them. Other UK officers helped search near the drain before Lt. Tia Chilton of UK police called off the immediate search because the rising water was too dangerous.

The women's bodies were found about five hours later where the drainage pipe resurfaced, about a quarter of a mile away. The current was strong enough to rip off Fannin's shirt.

Fannin was found in the creek on Jessup's property on Bob O Link Drive. Harp was found farther down the creek, near Springhill Drive.

Gary Ginn, the Fayette County coroner, said yesterday that urine and blood samples were taken to test for drugs and alcohol, a standard procedure.

"I can't say they were, and I can't say they weren't," Monroe said, regarding whether the women were drinking the night before.

After the women disappeared under the street, Lexington Police and Fire Departments coordinated with the Streets and Roads Department to map the drainage system.

Jessup said members of the Streets and Roads Department knocked on his door at 7:30 in the morning to tell him about the body they had found behind his house. Jessup pieced together what happened to the two women through news reports.

"I found out exactly who the girls were," he said. "When you find out they got a mom and a dad and that mom and dad's over there with their heart broken right now — that brings it back home, that really does."

Lt. Ken Stuart, of Lexington police, said he had been with the department for 28 years but that the intense weather mixed with accidental nature of the drownings was one of the more intense situations he'd seen.

"It's the first time I could remember something of this nature happening to that degree," Stuart said.

Ginn also said that nothing like these violent, accidental deaths had happened be-

fore in Lexington. There had been deaths in high water, but it had been a very long time, he said.

If Ginn's report rules the deaths as accidental, there will be no need for Lexington police to look into the case.

"We are awaiting the coroner's report," said Lt. James Curless of the Lexington Police. "It would appear to be accidental."

Jessup said the memory of Fannin was hard to shake; he had dreams about it Saturday night.

"I'm a minister. I preach a lot of funerals ... I've seen a lot of dead bodies, but this is just totally different from anything like that — knowing how she died, it just boggles the mind."

His wasn't the only one. A quarter of a mile from Jessup's backyard at Alumni Drive, water that went soon be in his creek flowed under Nicholasville Road. Martin Ginocchio paused during an afternoon run, peered into the dark opening of the drainage tunnel and crossed himself.

"What a tragedy," Ginocchio said. "I said a little prayer for them."

cited about life," Elizabeth Fannin said. "She was a very good go-to person. She was really good under pressure."

Elizabeth Fannin said her sister had been a member of the Kappa Delta sorority at Georgetown and "was like any other 25-year-old girl."

In an e-mail, Jessica Sizemore called Fannin her "closest friend here in pharmacy school," and said she had the ability to make people laugh.

"She made me laugh so much all the time — she didn't even mean to be funny — she just naturally had the gift to make people smile," Sizemore said. "She loved life and lived every day to the fullest."

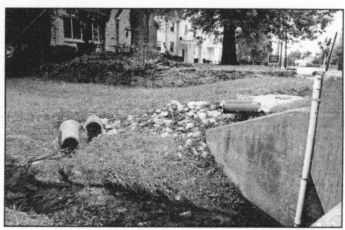
Tyler Whizman, also third-

year pharmacy student, was a friend of Fannin's and said her death will be hard to cope with for the close-knit third-year class.

"I've been talking to people in my class," Whizman said. "We all just can't imagine what it's going to be like on Monday, looking where she sat. But hopefully, together, we'll get through this."

Cathy Penfold, director of student services for the College of Pharmacy, sent an e-mail to the third-year pharmacy class late Saturday afternoon to let them know that a counselor from UK's Counseling and Testing will be available to them today during their 8 a.m. session.

"While it may be difficult for some of you to think about your academics and attending classes right now, we know that being together as a community will be very important for you," Penfold said in the e-mail.

to go around."

Remediating Kentucky's poverty problem will require the help of not only its citizens but also the politicians.

"We have to raise the general awareness of the extent of poverty in the Commonwealth and in America," Ziliak said. "That's going to require some serious at-

tention from policy makers to reduce the extent of poverty."

Policies already in place need to continue to be funded, Badagliacco said.

"In Kentucky, it's really important that the people who are receiving aid continue to be able to receive it," Badagliacco said.

Policy makers need to look beyond the numbers of poverty data.

"Not only do we need to look at the statistics, but we also need to look at the people behind them," Badagliacco said.

"Kentucky Tonight" is produced by Kentucky Educational Television and

airs Monday nights at 8 p.m. Since 1996, "Kentucky Tonight" has broadcast discussions on issues that affect Kentuckians.

"Our show tackles issues that a lot of mainstream or commercial media don't have time to devote to," Goodman said.

Badagliacco is happy that "Kentucky Tonight" addresses issues that are not widely covered by other media outlets.

Coverage of the poverty problem is one step in raising awareness of the problem.

"I want to give a voice to the voiceless and give a face to the homeless and very poor," said Badagliacco.

### Stage antics define Of Montreal show

With a mixture of glam rock and psychedelic tunes, indie rockers Of Montreal performed for more than 1,100 people in the Student Center Grand Ballroom Friday night.

Of Montreal, one of the most popular and influential bands in the indie music scene, were brought to UK by WRFL, 88.1 FM, and the Student Volunteer Center.

Originally from Athens, Ga., Of Montreal sounds much like nothing you've ever heard. The band combines jangled, playful 60s pop, electronica-driven beats and child-like lyrics and mix them with cartoon-like sound effects and various rhythmic changes.

As difficult it is to imagine this sound, it's even harder to figure it out when they're performing live.

Because WRFL and the Student Volunteer Center worked together to sponsor this event, students got to see this concert free of charge; instead, students were asked to provide a canned good or money donation to be given to the Lexington Red Cross.

Tara Bonistall, director of the Student Volunteer Center, said she was excited about how many people chose to donate.

"We raised about \$200 for the Red Cross and received a lot of canned goods," Bonistall said. "We hope to do more with WRFL in the future."

Nick Kidd, WRFL's public-relations director, agrees that WRFL would like to do more events with student organizations, especially if they turn out as well as the Of Montreal concert did.

"We are making an initiative this year to work with other student organizations," Kidd said. "This one was such a big success. When we put in the work and get such good bands, it encourages us to do it again."

Matt Jordan, director of promotions for WRFL, said the station wanted to bring Of Montreal because of its national and local appeal.

"Money (for funding) comes from the students, and we want to (choose bands) with students in mind," Jordan said.

It definitely seemed like this concert was what students wanted. Of Montreal entered the ballroom in a glorified fashion, complete with the sound of

horns blaring from speakers and their faces hidden behind large, hand-painted masks.

Most songs played came from the band's newest album, "Satanic Twins." Others were from the 2003 album "The Sunlandic Twins" and the 2004 album "Satanic Panic in the Attic." Popular songs that rocked the crowd were the laid-back and dance-oriented "Oslo in the Summertime" and the euphoric "Forecast Fascist Future." The crowd shouted with the band as it played the Of Montreal treat, "My British Tour Diary."

Throughout the performance, lead singer Kevin Barnes changed into several outfits, including bright red shorts and jean cutoffs. The band, like Barnes, was dressed in women's clothing. Barnes sang to audience members close to the stage and even kissed a female audience member.

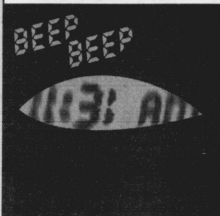
Of Montreal's alternative performance was a great concert to bring to UK. Both the band and the audience seemed to thoroughly enjoy the show.

This concert proves that the best things in life really can be free — and fun.

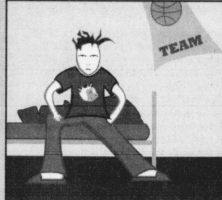

## UK loses its momentum

Some of the loudest cheers of the night were for made extra points.

Florida fans, who once so embraced the Fun 'n' Gun passing antics of Steve Spurrier, were calling for the running quarterback and booing when he was replaced by the passing quarterback.

A true freshman wide receiver even lined up at quarterback and ran for a first down when the game was on the line in the second half.

Welcome to Surreal Night in The Swamp.

What would have really made it surreal would have been a Kentucky win. But the Florida Gators didn't let things turn quite that strange Saturday night.

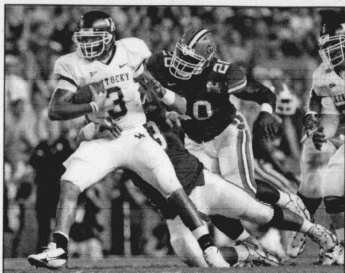
Despite heavy doses of weirdness, the No. 5 Gators provided some normalcy with a strong second half that produced a 26-7 victory over the Cats before 90,292.

UK almost equaled the Florida yardage in the first half. The Cats allowed 202 yards and two touchdowns while Florida allowed 193 yards, a touchdown and an extra point. Florida improves to 4-0 overall and 2-0 in the SEC, while UK falls to 2-2 and 1-1.

Following their big win in Knoxville a week ago, the Gators were hoping for a comfortable victory at home against a 23-point underdog. But the Cats wouldn't cooperate.

After Leak ended Florida's opening possession with a 33-yard touchdown pass to Jemelle Cornelius, it looked like the rout might be on.

Florida managed to steal back the momentum with a touchdown drive engineered by Leak. The two-minute drill culminated with a 13-yard touchdown run by tailback DeShawn Wynn with only 22 seconds left in the half. Leak completed five consecutive passes in the drive.

"That (the touchdown drive) was key," Meyer said. "We were dead in the water. That obviously gave us some momentum going into the halftime and gave us a little confidence. Up until that point we were totally out of sync. That drive obviously gave us momentum going into the halftime."

Andre Woodson and the UK passing game created fits for the Florida defense and the Gators found themselves trailing 7-6 with only 1:54 remaining in the first half after Woodson threw a 1-yard touchdown pass to fullback Maurice Grinter.

During the game Woodson completed 26 of 37 passes for 210 yards. His backup, Curtis Pulley, who played as a receiver for most of the game, completed six of eight passes for 57 yards. Pulley had 63 all-purpose yards while receivers Dicky Lyons Jr. and Keenan Burton added a combined 156 yards.

This was the first game in which Lyons did not have a touch down pass.

Without the Cats star, tail back, UK relied on Tony Dixon and Alfonso Smith who combined for 56 rushing yards.

Woodson's touchdown pass to Grinter was his tenth of the season.

Despite the Gators' erratic offensive performance in the first half, the team rolled up 514 yards of total offense and had a near-perfect balance (235 yards rushing and 279 yards passing). The Florida defense overwhelmed UK in the second half.

"I was proud of the way our players came out and dominated the second half," Meyer said.

Early in the second half, Florida defense started hitting and sacking Woodson, and the Gators shut down the UK offense over the final two quarters, limiting the Cats to only 65 yards of total offense.

Woodson was sacked six times with a loss of 37 yards, while Pulley was brought down twice for a loss of nine yards.

"What I saw was great pressure coming from the edge in the second half, and that quarterback didn't have a chance," Meyer said.

Florida ends Jarvis Moss and Derrick Harvey combined for three sacks in the second half, and defensive tackle Ray McDonald had two.

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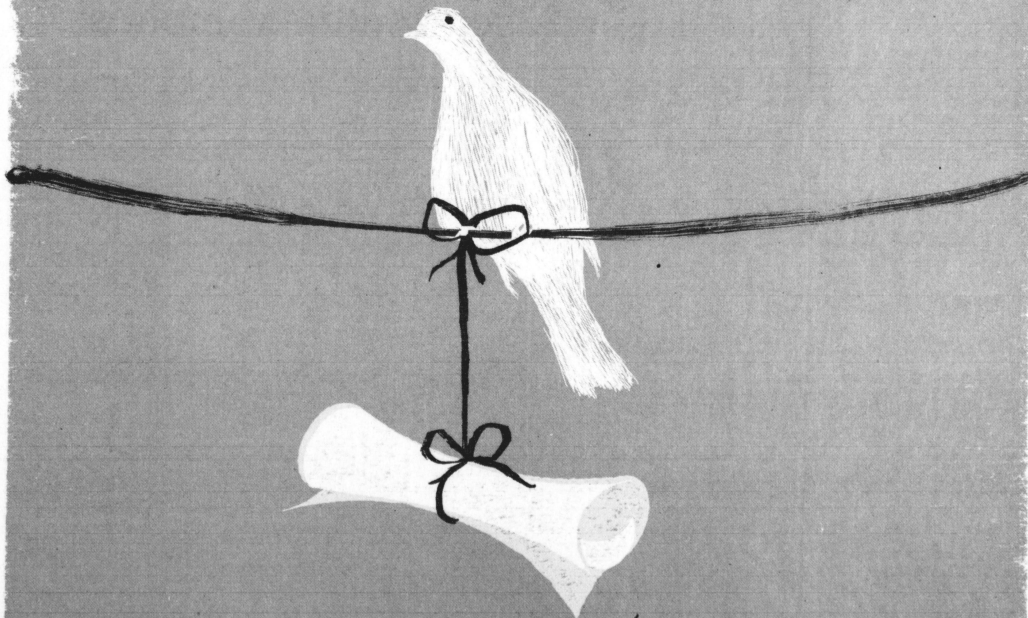
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## Panel highlights need for checks on spy programs

UK students got a rare opportunity Sept. 21 — to hear about U.S. history told by a group that has shaped it.

The panel discussion "Who's Watching the Spies? Intelligence Activities and the Rights of Americans" brought members of the U.S. Senate Church Committee, which investigated U.S. intelligence practices in 1975 and 1976, to UK's campus.

These were Walter Mondale, a former U.S. vice president; Walter Dee Huddleston, a former U.S. senator from Kentucky; and Fred Schwarz, former chief counsel of the Church Committee.

The Wendell H. Ford Public Policy Research Center, the School of Journalism and Telecommunications and the First Amendment Center deserve praise for bringing these historic figures to campus.

"It's not often we get a former United States vice president (and presidential candidate) on campus, let alone a U.S. senator and the chief counsel to a Senate select committee," said Beth Barnes, director of the journalism school, in the Kernel last week.

"So just the opportunity to hear from these historic figures is incredible."

The panelists discussed their work on the Church Committee and its relevance to U.S. surveillance activities today.

"(The committee) asked the right questions," Schwarz said.

"Should America adopt the tactics of the enemy? Should the American people be allowed to know what the facts are?"

Mondale suggested that President George W. Bush's administration's decision to bypass the court system set up by the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, which resulted from the Church Committee's work, was unnecessary to fight America's enemies.

"The whole idea of getting a warrant was not about holding law enforcement officers back," Mondale said.

"When we obey the law, we can do everything we need to do, and we can do it with accountability."

The Church Committee's work demonstrates an important lesson about U.S. politics. The checks and balances set up by the Constitution are there for a reason, and all branches of government should respect them.

In regard to the current situation, congressional oversight is necessary to ensure that the president and the executive branch are not engaging in illegal surveillance activities.

By prohibiting the tactic of assassination and mandating warrants for all electronic surveillance, the FISA law that emerged from the Church Committee ensured that future presidents could not abuse their power.

What we need now — as news has emerged

about the National Security Agency wiretapping U.S. citizens without warrants, not to mention any other dubious programs whose existence hasn't been leaked — is a modern-day Church Committee

What we need now is a modern-day Church Committee to ensure that the president's intelligence programs are constitutional and legal.

to ensure that the president's intelligence programs are constitutional and legal.

Any less would be antithetical to the spirit of the checks and balances built into the U.S. Constitution.

Without these checks, our republic (as in the political structure, not the party) system is frighteningly vulnerable to being hijacked by those with more dictatorial impulses.

It's time for U.S. citizens to demand that Congress step up to the plate and make sure that the activities being undertaken in our name comport with our American values.

#### Chavez ally, not foe

I read with interest Jason Nahmer's Sept. 22 letter, which chastised the "madman" Venezuela President Hugo Chavez for calling George W. Bush "the devil" in front of the United Nations last week. Much media attention has been given to the incident, but I encourage others to read the full text of Chavez's speech before making an ill-informed judgment of the Venezuelan leader.

Chavez correctly asserted that the Bush administration approaches the world from an imperialist standpoint. "As the spokesman of imperialism, Bush came to share his nostrils (at the UN), to try to preserve the current pattern of domination, exploitation and pillage of the peoples of the world," Chavez said.

He also had words for Bush's penchant for creating an environment of fear. "Wherever Bush looks, he sees extremists. And you, my brother — he looks at your color, and he says, oh, there's an extremist. Evo Morales, the worthy president of Bolivia, looks like an extremist to him. The imperialists see extremists everywhere. It's not that we are extremists. It's that the world is waking up. It's waking up all over, and people are standing up."

These comments by Chavez merit reflection, not only because of their accuracy, but more importantly because they let Americans know how they are understood in a volatile world.

I do want to point to what I consider to be madness, and it is not Hugo Chavez the person, but rather his actions. I consider it to be madness that our society provides such little protection for its poor (e.g., Katrina victims) that Chavez has to provide free oil to lower-income families within the United States so they can heat their homes in the winter.

As the New York Times reported last week, "Mr. Chavez offered to double the amount of heating oil Venezuela donates to poor communities in the United States."

Indeed, this is madness. It is madness that this nation's resources go to making war on people across an ocean instead of maintaining levees or providing heat for the nation's poor, while we are relying on free resources from other countries. It is madness that funding for education is in crisis while the military receives an annual budget of \$440 billion.

Despite this madness, it is little surprise coming from an administration which seeks to re-interpret international human rights agreements in order to justify torture; or seeks to cut taxes for the rich while incarceration rates have doubled in urban poor areas since 2000; or refuses to acknowledge the health care crisis where one in three people between 18 and 35 are without health insurance. All of this in the richest nation in the world.

That is madness — not a South American president who is popularly elected and donates resources to the urban poor in the United States.

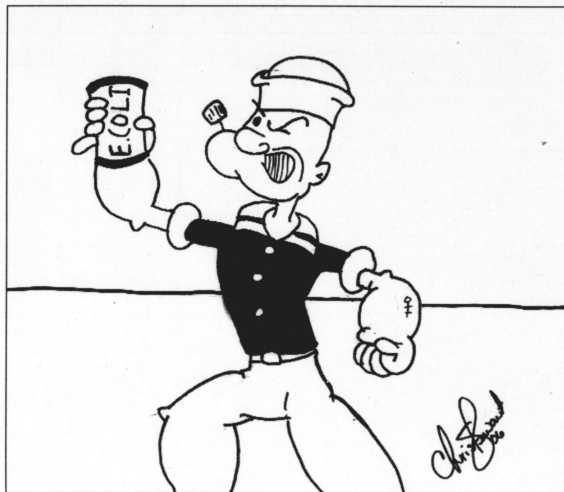

## Hockey team hot in season opener

Tied in the first period against Kennesaw State, it took only six minutes into the second period for UK forward Tony Valerino to record the season's first hat trick. He scored two more goals after that, helping UK to an 8-2 victory over the Owls in the Cats' season opener.

Valerino, who led the team in goals last season with 33, said it was all a matter of being in the right place at the right time. "None of those goals were pretty," said Valerino. "I just happened to be there. I had two linemen feeding me great passes all night."

Head coach Rob Docherty had said he was more than pleased with his leading scorer's performance.

"I've watched him since he was little; he's always impressed me," Docherty said. "He sees the ice so well, and he can score

some goals."

Kennesaw State, a Division III squad from Atlanta, scored eight minutes into the first period. The Cats tied it 1-1 midway through the period, then went on a scoring flurry and out-scored the Owls 7-1.

Docherty said the Cats took advantage of power plays and capitalized on the Owls' mistakes, a big reason why UK found the net six times in the second period.

"We calmed down, realized what we were up against, and opened up the ice," Docherty said. "We stayed disciplined, stayed focused, and kept our concentration."

Junior Drew Matichak was steady behind goal for the Cats, racking up 34 saves.

Mike Barnes, Andrew Serres and Alex Robinson each scored a goal in the second period. Barnes, who led the team in scoring last season (26 goals, plus 41 assists), also had two as-

sists. Pat McAdams and Zach Roberts each had two assists, while Serres and John North both had one.

Both UK players and coaches were pleased with the team's effort in the game and said this was the start the Cats were looking for.

"We needed this to prove we're not overrated," Matichak said. "Everyone was clicking; every line was out there busting their butts. We played awesome."

The Cats came into the season opener with a seven-game winning, dating back to January 20. UK has lost only one game under Docherty since he took over the team midway through last season.

UK will travel to Big Rapids, Mich., next weekend for a two-game series against Ferris State University. The Cats will return to action in Lexington on Oct. 6 in a two-game series against South Carolina.

### Same score, different result for volleyball

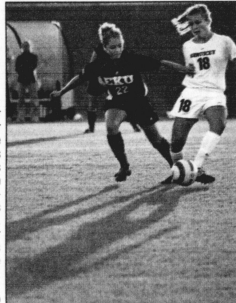
The UK volleyball team won its match against 3-1 Mississippi State on Friday before falling to Ole Miss in a 3-1 loss on Sunday.

After the incorporation as a perpetual body in 1913, Alpha Kappa Alpha gradually branched out and became the channel through which selected college-trained women improved the socioeconomic conditions in their city, state, nation and the world. In a world in which materialism is pervasive, and technology and competition have decreased the need for collaboration and cooperation, it is critical to have an association that cuts across racial, international, physical and social barriers to help individuals and communities develop and maintain constructive relationships with others. Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority is that vital organization. The Iota Sigma Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Incorporated was chartered on May 9, 1975 on the campus of University of Kentucky. Sixteen beautiful women took the initiative to form a chapter that has helped so many.

The Iota Sigma Chapter is very involved in the Lexington Community. We volunteer at the Boys and Girls Club and at various elementary schools. 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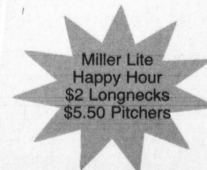

Pi Phi philanthropies include Links to Literacy, Arrowmont Settlement School, Arrow in the Arctic, and CAR (Champions Are Readers). The Arrowmont Settlement School of Arts & Crafts, located in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, is fully funded by Pi Phi's nationwide. There, courses are offered to enhance the academic and industrial enrichment of area children.

## Sigma Kappa

Sigma Kappa was founded in 1874 at Colby College in Waterville, Maine. We are a social organization of collegiate and alumnae women com-

mitted to promoting the ideals of life long friendships, intellectual and spiritual fulfillment and service for the greater good. Our main philanthropies are the Maine Sea Coast Mission, gerontology and the Alzheimer's Association. We raise money through our philanthropy event, Sigma Spike, which is our annual mud volleyball tournament that is open to the entire Greek community. We also raise money through our annual lollipop sales. Our colors are lavender and maroon and our mascot is the dove. Throughout our college career, we will always live *One Heart, One Way*.

## Zeta Phi Beta

Zeta Phi Beta (ΣΦΒ) Sorority, Incorporated was founded January 16, 1920 on the campus of Howard University in Washington D.C. The founders created Zeta Phi Beta because they felt that elitism and socializing had overshadowed what should be the real mission of sororities, which is to address and correct the problems of society, particularly in the African-American community. Though over eighty years have passed since the *Blue and White* family inception, the love between the brothers of Phi Beta Sigma and sisters of Zeta Phi Beta is still strong and very visible in their support of each other.

Regardless of political affiliations, it is important for all students to show through action that UK students **care** and, more importantly, that UK students **VOTE**.

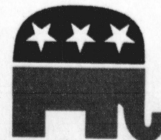

## Back to the Beginning

The National Pan-Hellenic Council, Incorporated is currently composed of nine International Greek letter Sororities and Fraternities: Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Iota Phi Theta Fraternity, Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc., Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. The NPHC promotes interaction through forums, meetings and other mediums for the exchange of information and engages in cooperative programming and initiatives through various activities and functions. On May 10, 1930, on the campus of Howard University, in Washington DC, the National Pan-Hellenic Council was formed as a permanent

organization with the following charter members: Omega Psi Phi and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternities and Alpha Kappa Alpha, Delta Sigma Theta and Zeta Phi Beta Sororities. In 1931, Alpha Phi Alpha and Phi Beta Sigma Fraternities joined the Council. Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority joined in 1937 and Iota Phi Theta Fraternity completed the list of member organizations in 1997. The stated purpose and mission of the organization in 1930 was "Unanimity of thought and action as far as possible in the conduct of Greek letter collegiate fraternities and sororities and to consider problems of mutual interest to its member organizations." Early in 1937, the organization was incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois and became known as "The National Pan-Hellenic Council, Incorporated.

## All UK Chapters Coming Together

The Inter-Greek Programming Assembly is a group of students from each of the three Greek governing councils on campus – the Interfraternity Council, the Panhellenic Council and the National Pan-Hellenic Council. The group's ultimate goal is to ensure quality Greek-sponsored events on campus in which all chapters may feel proud to participate. The IGPA achieves this goal by reviewing event applications from chapters wishing to obtain the assembly's support. Each semester, eight events are chosen based on the event's agenda, charitable organization and overall student appeal. Following approval from the assembly, the IGPA works with the chapters to ensure that the rules and regulations are clearly stated, all necessary safety measures are observed, no drug or alcohol use is permitted, etc. By holding each chapter event to such high standards, IGPA hopes to

exemplify the virtues of the Greek system while also unifying its members.

In addition to event programming, the IGPA also strives to unify and promote the Greek community by planning Greek Week and Greek Service Week. Greek Week takes place each fall semester and has recently included such events as "Greek Graffiti," a Greek-wide cookout and a "Greek God and Goddess" Date Auction. A new event planned for this fall's Greek Week is Greek Chariot Races, which will take place at Haggin Field. Greek Service Week takes place in the spring semester and has a similar format to Greek Week, but the events focus on service and community involvement. Greek Service Week is capped off with the annual Greek Awards Banquet, which recognizes chapters and individuals for their hard work and commitment to the Greek system.
