

# Out-of-this-world F/X

The world of film: Special effects allow more freedom but often replace plot and character

Whether it's for good or bad, there's no denying that special effects are changing the face of cinema. Some people say it's destroying movies, while others will praise the facts that there are no limits to what you can do on film. During the late 1960s and on into the '70s, cinema was in the hands of the young, creative di-

rector who released one strong character-driven piece after another. It all started with Easy Rider and Midnight Couboy.

Directors like Martin Scorses and Francis Ford Coppola crafted masterpieces like Mean Streets, Taxi Driver, Raging Bull, Apocalypse Now, and the Godfather I and It. Some say it was the golden age of American cinema.

Then came along two more young directors who changed film forever. Steven Spielberg released

Jaws in 1975, followed by Close Encounters, Raiders of the Lost Ark, and E.T. They were all big production spectacles that brought in bundles of money.

The biggest bomb dropped, though, was by George Lucas in 1977 when he released the first Star Wars. Audiences had never seen the likes of what these two visionaries brought to the big

Is your walk safe? Several UK safety representatives joined SGA Tuesday for their annual Safety Walk

Student safety was the business of the evening Tuesday night at the annual Safety Walk sponsored by the Student Government Association.

"The purpose is to make aware the changes needed on campus and the safest places there are to walk." said Kevin Regenhold, executive director of Student Services, who organized the walk.

Representatives from the UK Police, Residence Life, Environmental and Occupational Health and Safety, UK Fire Department, and the Physical Plant Division were among the participants at the event.

Regenhold said these groups' attendance was especially important. "Areas can be pointed out directly to them so they can fix them as soon as possible," he said.

During the walk, Regenhold pointed out areas of concern, such as bad lighting and overgrown shrubbery, and also showed how the emergency towers on campus work.

Members from several sororities

that were concerned about campus safety were present as well.

For example, the new Student Centre lights are an addition from last year's Safety Walk.

"We've made a lot of improvements since last year," said Jack Applegate, director of Physical Plant Division, "about \$100,000 on lighting alone."

Regenhold said he thinks UK is a safe campus, and he's never had a student tell him he or she doesn't feel safe.

No matter how safe students feel, however, UK Police Chief Rebecca Langston wanted to remind students that UK is a wide-open campus in a large urban area, and emphasized that people need to take responsibility for keeping themselves safe.

"No matter how much we enhance safety, it doesn't take the place of common sense crime prevention," Langston said.



# Virtual athleticism The next generation: Incorporating state of the art technology the new consoles will have stunning graphics

There's a global battle on for your hard-earned dollars, yen or marks. With home video game systems enjoying a growing number of followers, the makers of these systems are producing new hi-tech systems are producing new hi-tech systems. In the beginning of 1999 Sony's PlayStation systeming with the release of Sega's newest system, Dreamcast, on Sept. 9.

The Dreamcast is now on the market and selling well. It retails for \$199 and games weigh in at \$50 or so apiece.

David Fow, manager at video game

retailer Babbage's in Fayette Mall, says the pre-sale campaign for the Dreamcast, "has set the precedent for the other companies to ride their coattails."

Sony's Playstation 2 is the next in line to be out sometime in next fall. The Playstation 2 boasts faster and more advanced hardware and features the ability to play current Playstation games. It can also play DVD movies. It will come with a memory card, a controller and a demo disc. With the dual function of the system, the price is projected to be close to \$300, with games running close to \$70.

There has been no date or prices set for Nintendo's next system, currently nicknamed Project Dolphin. Fow suggested that Nintendo's system could be as late as 2001. The Dolphin's projected specifications are even more impressive than

those of the Playstation 2. But questions are being raised about such a late release and if the American public would be interested in it with two next-generation systems are already out. In response, Fow said, "Nintendo has always been the late bloomer. But their tried and true fans will be there for them."

It might be difficult to pick which system is best for you. Although Dreamests is less technologically advanced than the other two systems, it will have better developed games by the time the Playstation 2 Nintendo Dolphin are released.

Fow suggests looking for game support by strong game development companies like Namoo, Capcom, Konami and SquareSoft. "Huge graphics are nothing but pretty pictures to hide bad game play," he said.



# Religious **quote OK**

ACLU overzealous in latest charge to keep church, state separate

Tension has risen in recent years between those who want to increase religion's influence on our public lives, and those who want a strict separation of church and state.

Among the issues that illustrate this fissure is the debate over teaching creationism vs. evolution in state schools, the posting of religious documents, like the Ten Commandments, in public buildings.

In most of these legal struggles, the Supreme Court has come down squarely on the side of separating church and state. This is unlikely to change in the near future.

But in some cases, this track record has given groups like the American Civil Liberties Union far too much confidence. Its position of universal equality leads the ACLU to attack even the most vague and trivial mention of religion in public life. An example is last Thursday, when the ACLU sued the state of Ohio for placing a plaque with the state's motto. Though God, All Things Are Possible' outside the state courflow.

"Through God, All Things Are rossume outside the sade coarbouse.

Most people can see the advantages of assuring citizens that our government does not force a particular religious belief on people. Using this state motto is no more a case of imposing a belief system on anyone than the "In God We Trust" motto stamped on our currency.

The tension created by the Ohio motto controversy is less the result of any influence the statement might have on people than its source in the Book of Matthew. The expression has lost any real religious significance, and has become little more than an Idlomatic expression in modern times. Its ambiguity allows it to be accepted by people with any religious background. Even atheists and agnostics recognize it from popular usage as a trivial statement, such as "With a little luck, good things can happen."

Ohio's state motto does not challenge any belief, or even espouse any significant point of view. The ACLU's decision to make a stand on this issue is not only misguided, it also leads people to lump the whole of its work to preserve and protest the Bill of Rights as insignificant.

If it ever hopes to shake its perception as an organization that wastes taxpayer money with frivolous lawsuits and petty bickering, the ACLU should focus on more substantive violations of the First Amendment.
