A touching story done under tight deadline pressure. Not only was the event itself interesting, but the point of neighbors lending a hand to strangers shows true

Honorable Mention — Theresa Sapp, Cumberland County News A freak explosion makes for an interesting story, but why is the lead sentence identical to the headline? Good detail of cause of explosion and the damage it caused.

Best General News Story

First Place — Kelley Warnick, Gallatin County News

A story that kept the community interest for over six months is handled deftly by the writer. Clear, concise sentences shed light on why a man who initially confessed to the crime was freed.

Second Place - Mike Banks, McLean County News

Good lead, tight writing give impact to an issue that touched many in the community. Quotes placed perfectly to flush out points of contention.

Third Place — Yvonne Coleman, Louisville Defender

Excellent coverage to follow up a heart wrenching story on the death of six children. Issue is played fairly between utility company and social services advocate. A tough call - easily could win a higher honor

Honorable Mention - Rita Mitchell, Fulton Leader

This writer handles an explosive issue with no-nonsense style, giving the reader a clear picture of the issue. Perhaps the story is too detailed, but it certainly deserves recognition.

Good transition from paragraph to paragraph. Quotes from students would strength the story. So would quotes from parents

Good, tight piece but get the local name higher in the story. Some good transitions. Forget Janet Jackson. How about more detail on how she helps her husband?
Honorable Mention (Tie) — Ken Metz, Bath County News Outlook

He did get some support; he was not convicted; only one source interviewed. Was 9-3 vote 9 for conviction or 9 for acquittal? Story bogs down early in recitation of his resume (career). How about a sidebar to break that out?

Best Investigative/Analytical Story

Good in-depth story. Attribution (essential in this kind of story) was clear, and variety of quoted sources established the impact of the situation on the community. Concluding paragraph was a nice touch.
Second Place — Staff, Tri-City News, Cumberland

The strength of this entry was in the continual coverage at each stage of the story. Nice mix of news reporting combined with photo coverage and opinion pieces.

Third Place — Becky Jackson, Trimble Banner-Democrat
