Whites dominate greek community

UK sororities, fraternities self-segregate

"Nigger, get out of my frat."

Those words jumped off the page of the letter that William Summers received last

letter that William Summers re spring.
Growing up in racially-integraville, Ky., Summers had never seen or heard such hate-filled words before.
But as a freshman at UK, and a rushee in a predominantly white fra-ternity, he met racism face to face for the first time.



"You read about it. But you really don't believe it until it happens to you," Summers said. The incident strikes at the heart of a greek community that is almost completely segregated by race.

Of the 1,109 students who were members of UK fraternities during the spring 1991 semester, only 29 were black. But of those, only six belonged to traditionally white fraternities. The rest were members of UK's three, black, greek-letter fraternities.

The situation was more unbalanced among UK's traditionally white sorroities, which had only one black member out of a total of 1,555.

A second letter followed a week later that contained similar language, only this time the anonymous writer told him to "quit kissing ase"

kissing ass."

The Dean of Students' Office, UK police and the fraternity itself looked into the incident, but came up with no leads.

"To this day we don't know if it was someone within the fraternity or it may have just been someone I was rushing with." Summers said.

Phi Kappa Psi President Ted Supulski said he was certain the letters came from outside the fraternity.
"Definitely. Without a doubt," he said.
Associate Dean of Students Victor Hazard said the case was examined, but no charges were filed with the police.
"Whoever the source was, they were very careful," Hazard said. "It was very unfortunate."

"To a certain extent I appreciated that. But the kind of racism that goes on today—it really isn't the kind that comes out at you. It's behind the scenes. People tell you one thing and then act another way," Summers said.

Kappa Alpha defends Confederate flag, 'Old South'

Two Confederate flags hang in the windows of the Kappa Alpha social fraternity house. Another is apinted on the wall inside the house, but with an inscription written under it that simply states: "Southern heritage, on to hatred." The words are simple, but the debate about whether Southern heritage can be separated from racial hatred is not. It's an issue visation of the control of the c

ternity," Andersen said.

In addition to the prominence of the Stars and Bars, KA also celebrates "Old South" week each year. To kick off the week, the KAs "secede" from the University, Andersen said.

At one point during "Old South," members of the fraternity dress up in Confederate soldier costumes and march to sorority houses to pick up their dates for a formal dance.

Their use of Southern symbols has camed the KAs a reputation for being racist — one that Andersen says they do not deserve.

MANCHESTER, N.H. — President Bush gained a grudging victory last night in the New Hampshire presidential primary, with challenger Patrick J. Buchanan claiming more than 40 percent of the Republican vote to fuel his conservative rebellion.

Asian faculty hiring on rise, council says

WASHINGTON — The proportion of Asian faculty members at U.S. colleges rose sharply over the last decade while black. Hispanics and American-Indians showed smaller gains, according to the American Council on Education.

The conecil's 10th Annual Status Report on Minorities in Higher Education, released Sunday, said the overall minority faculty percent in 1979 to 2.0 spercent in 1979 to 2.0 spercent in 1989.

Asian representation rose from 2.9 percent to 4.7 percent, according to the report, and Asians now cutnumber blacks on college faculties.

Hispanic faculty representation rose from 17.7 percent of all college faculties.

Many of the Asians are not U.S. citizens, according to the study. Only 2.8 percent of all college faculty members are American-born or naturalized Asian-Americans.

Mississippi State senior Quard Tony Watts is averag-ing more points (19.7) than UK starters Richie Farmer (9.2) and Sean Woods (7.6) combined. Watts was the SEC Player of the Week last week.

State junior Chuck Evans leads the SEC in both steals (3.0) and assists (8.3). Only one other player, Alabama's Terry Coner in 1984-85, has completed a season leading those categories. Evans is poised to break school records in both categories.

But what Pitino is most im-pressed with regarding the duo goes beyond the statistics. He called State's backcourt the quickest in the SEC and is working to make sure that Woods and Farmer can keep the Bulldogs guards in front of them.



UK tennis team defeats No. 9 Pepperdine Waves

Yancey stayed on the baseline in the last two sets and began gunning his service returns and making a bunch of passing shots.

"In the second and third sets, I tried to make him play a lot more volleys," Yancey said. "I got in a good groove and started returning better."

All the doubles matches went to three sets as Emery's insatiable ap-petite squirmed from court to court.



So deadly, in fact, that 50 frater-nity pledges have been killed in hazing incidents at U.S. colleges in the past decade, said U.K. Dean of Students David Stockbam. While no one has been killed in pledge hazing at U.K, the school is not immume to the practice, which is defined in the Code of Student to immune to the practice, but in the Code of Student to Conduct as "subjecting ... students to unnecessary and excessive abuse, humilation, or physical danger." Earlier this year, Sigma Chi social fratentily was placed on a one-year probation after a UK investiga-

es of hazing.

And in 1990, UK ordered Phi
Kappa Tau social fraternity to close
down for three years, citing "serious hazing violations" that involved
alcohol.

alcohol.

UK and fraternity officials were vague about specific violations, but Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Robert Hemenway said "serious physical abuse" also was involved.

wolved.
While the Phi Kappa Tau incident was widely publicized by local media, Stockham said hazing is not a "commonly occurring event" at UK, in part because fraternities national organizations have become more concerned about the dangers or hazing.
This has resulted in conscious-ess-raising at the campus level, Stockham said.
Another factor that may contribute to UK's greek community is increasingly receptive to this attitude, and he präsed them for having a "positive and appropriate posture."

he said.

UK's Interfraternity Council, Panhellenic Council and Dean of Sudents' Office took a step in confronting the issue last year by co-spousoring a program on hazing.

All potential members and pledges were required to attend the program, which was presented by a woman whose son was killed in a hazing incident.

Jeremy Bates, IFC president, said he program reflected the greek systems of the program reflected the greek systems. smately three compiants in the past few years.

In the Sigma Chi incident, the fraternity was reprimanded for quiz-zing pledges and subjecting them to rpsychological pressure" – viola-tions that the fraternity's national office regarded as minor. Stockham, however, said UK must guard against all forms of haz-ing.

Jeremy Bates, IPC president, said he program reflected the greek system's concern about hazing and its potential dangers.

"The biggest thing you can do to combat hazing is to educate people." Bates said. "It's fair to say that some members have committed hazing and they haven't realized it was hazing."

Fred Wiedenhoefer, who was president of Sigma Chi in 1990 and 1991 and is still an active member,

welcomes the new focus on hazing. During the mid-'80s, Wieden-hoefer said pledges often were sub-jected to psychological pressure and tactics akin to what a soldier might encounter during basic training. But he said the process has changed dramatically at UK within the next five second.

changed dramatically at U.N. within the past five years.
"I have noticed changes just through the past few years," Wie-denhoefer said. "I'm a fifth-year senior, and I've known a lot of peo-ple from the greek community. I think there's been a dramatic change.

think there's been a wave of conservation that just hit our country, and I think that most of the national headquarters of fratemities) aren't going to stand for hazing anymore.

"Fraternities used to be a focus mainly for alcohol and the parties that they had. But now, we are being held more responsible and accountable for our actions.

Wiedenhoefer said abusive treat-ment of pledges is antithetical to the principles of brotherhood for which fratemities stand.

"Some people who I am associated with would disagree with me of his point, but ... when you have 18-year-old kids coming into colege— and I'm using the word 'kids' loosely— and when you have kids nor much older than that guiding the pledge program. I don't hink that we should be allowed to (practice) ... boot camp psychology."



Buchanan showing gives Bush camp needed wake-up call

The voters of New Hampshire sent President Bush a strong message yesterday in that state's primary — and it appeared to be a surprising message for the White House.

Republican challenger Pat Buchanan secured well over 40 percent of the vote, a startling showing for someone who jumped into the campaign only 10 weeks ago. Buchanan's vote probably was split between those who actually supported Buchanan and those who wanted simply to send Bush a message. Either way, the incumben

wanted simply to evaluates.

The Bush campaign continually seemed not to take the Buchanan threat seriously. Even on the last day to campaign, the president sent first lady Barbara Bush to campaign and did not go himself. Hardball, however, now will be the name of the game. Though seen before as merely a nuisance, Buchanan has shown the White House that he is a serious contender. Buchanan will not be treated with kid gloves anymore. Expect to hear about commercials attacking Buchanan for his opposition to the Persian Gulf War last year as well as veiled accusations that Buchanan is anti-Semitic.

Of course, Buchanan will know how to respond to these charges. He has made a career of defending his stands on issues, which differers from Bush's record of changing his stands. But the amount of cash Bush has to make the charges far outweighs the Buchanan indust to ward them off. funds to ward them off.

funds to ward them off.

Even with the strong showing in New Hampshire, the odds of Buchanan winning the nomination are still slim to none. It will be next to impossible for Buchanan to overcome not only the money but also the institutional control Bush has of the Republican Party nationwide. At every possible chance he gets, the Bush campaign has tried to block Buchanan's access to the polls and the party. It may

uneu to block Buchanan's access to the polls and the party. It may not be fair, but it is effective.

But Buchanan has shown he cannot be written off easily. As the campaign moves to the Georgia primary, Buchanan once again may catch the wave of anti-Bush sentiment and ride it to another strong showing. This could be a drama that endures — right up to the convention.

Paul Tsongas wins, Dems still at a loss

Yesterday in its Democratic primary New Hampshire former Sen. Paul Tsongas from neighboring Massachusetts won the race and Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas coming in a strong second.

Tsongas moved to the head of the pack after former front-runner Clinton was shelled with several questions of character. The other three major Democratic candidates all had weak showings in New Hampshire. Look for at least one and possibly two of the three to drop out of the race soon. With so many men in the race, there will not be enough support or money to go around as the candidates gear up for the Super Tuesday Primary in the South.

Moving to warmer climes should also heat up the Clinton cam-paign, which has been cooled by accusations of extramarital affairs and draft-dodging during the Vietnam War. But being from Arkan-sas, Clinton will offer much more appeal than he would against vir-tual native son candidate Tsongas in New Hampshire.

And Tsongas will have a hard time convincing the more contive Southerners that a liberal from Massachusetts can win the tion in November.

tion in Novemoer.

All this points to Clinton securing the nomination, but if questions of character continue to plague the campaigns, the religious and partious South may not approve. This gives rise to increasing rumors that another Democrat will enter the race and win the nomination. Even though this is unlikely, it is certainly possible. New York Gow. Mario Cuomo and House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt are the leading candidates in the rumor mill.



Doctor offers tips on prevention, treatment of acne

Acne is a common skin disorder, the exact cause of which remains unknown. There are, however, multiple factors observed to be related to its development and progression. Compound found to treat some cancers

HOUSTON — A combination of an acne drug and a natural com-pound used to treat cancers asso-ciated with AIDS has been found

The vitamin A derivative Accu-tane combined with laboratory-made interferon appears to improve Accutane's cancer-fighting abili-ties, said research leader Dr. Scott M. Lippman, assistant professor of medicine at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

Accutane, marked for treating severe acne, has been shown in earlier published studies to prevent precancerous mouth lesions from becoming malignant. Lippman cites other studies that suggested the drug blocks formation of new tumors in people treated for smoking-related throat cancer.

Lippman's results will be published this week in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute. He

said they could prove especially promising to developing nations, where cervical tumors are one of the most deadly cancers among

"We feel it's a very important lead, but it needs further work be-fore we can really make statements about impacts on mortality," Lipp-man said. "But the potential is there."

Cervical cancer is rarer among American women, who tend to have better medical treatment, which leads to earlier detection and

how the combination of Accutane, called 13-cis retinoic acid, and interferon works, except that one drug apparently makes the other more effective.

The finding implies the combina-tion drugs might be used along with radiation or other treatment to ex-tend the lives of cancer patients, Lippman said.

Interferon, a natural disease fighter already used to treat leuke-

mia and genital warts, was later ap-proved to battle Kaposi's sarcoma, a cancer that primarily attacks AIDS patients.

Adverse reactions include flu-like symptoms. Neither drug is recom-mended for use by pregnant women since animal studies have shown in-terferon may cause abortions and Accutane causes serious birth de-

Houston researchers found that among 28 patients with inoperable skin cancers, all evidence of tumor disappeared for seven patients for a least four weeks. Twelve of the patients had at least a 50 percent reduction in tumors at all sites for at least four weeks. Nine of the skin cancer patients had no response, the study says.

Most skin cancers are curable, except melanoma. Still, a small percentage of cancers cannot be treated and result in about 3,000 deaths nationwide every year.

Among 26 patients with advanced cervical cancer, one experienced a complete disappearance of a tumor, and 12 had at least a 50 percent reduction in tumor, the study said. Among the 13 non-responders, the disease stabilized, or stopped growing, in nine patients, and continued to progress in four.



The responses people gave were present interesting.



sons were arrested for possession of alcohol, and more than 900 false driver's licenses were con-fiscated by law enforcement officials (last year).

"Florida laws are very strict, and the police department actively works with all agencies of law enforcement to pursue violators."

Woodman said the letter was

not intended as a scare tactic

"The primary purpose was to

let (students) know there are rules and regulations that are very strict," she said.

The police department has been advised to enforce strictly the drinking laws because of acci-dents, especially with mopeds.

"There was a Kentucky student who was killed in a moped acci-dent two years ago. It was an al-cohol-related accident," Wood-

"We want people to come down but to be responsible," she said.


Another letter from Key West, sent to the Kentucky Kernel,

"If you are not yet 21, avoid the spirited, or you may be invol-untarily escorted.

"Obey local parking laws, or you will be booted or towed.

"Do not partake in physical dis-crimination of any kind, as Key West is home to a variety of life-styles and 'bashing' is taboo and very uncool."

The question now is where to get tickets at a price affordable to the fundless.

Scalpers are the answer. But, as you well know, you must be careful with these characters.

The tournament begins Thursday, March 12. But the teams that finish first and second in their retrinish tirst and second in their re-spective divisions of the confer-ence receive first-round byes and do not play until Friday. (The No. 3 team from the East also will get a bye this year because Auburn is ineligible for postseason play.)

Why?


A quick lesson for those ignor-ant of SEC etiquette: Basic South-

ing with fellow SEC fans, unless, of course, you happen to be a UK fan south of the Kentucky-Tennessee border — in which case you will be pummelled on sight.



Three UK students journey to Russia for week

Bennett Knox, Aimee Waugh and Tonja Wilt have been prepar-ing for their spring-break trip to St. Petersburg for quite a while.

But they don't expect it to be very warm there. Nor do they expect to see masses of college stu-dents lying on sunny beaches.

Unlike many UK students, Knox, Waugh and Wilt don't plan to see any of Florida. In fact, the St. Petersburg they will be seeing is half a world away from the Sunshine State. The three will travel to St. Petersburg, Russia, for spring break.

Through a program jointly sponsored by the UK Russian and Eastern Studies Department and the University of Virginia's Slavic Languages and Literatures De-partment, the students will leave New York on March 13, to see firsthand a society undergoing

tremendous change.

"I've been studying the language and culture (of Russia) for four years now," said Wilt, a Rustour years now," said Will, a Russian senior from Alvaton, Ky, "I thought it was time to go see what I've been studying about." Knox has studied Russian for three years; Waugh, for two years. However, knowledge of

the language is not required for the trip, which will take the students to several Russian cities.

dents to several russian cities.

The three students first will visit St. Petersburg. While there, they will see St. Isaac's Cathedral, the Hermitage Museum, Pushkin and the Peter and Paul Fortress. They also will take in an evening ballet.

Next on their agenda is a trip to the Pskov where they will visit a pedagogical institute and a mon-astery. They also will attend a

Russian folk performance there.

The last few days of the students' week in Russia will be spent in Moscow, where they will visit the Danilov Monastery and

While in Moscow, the trio will meet with the four Russian stu-dents who studied at UK last fall. Mikhail Komarov, Svetlana Ni-kolskaya, Elena Postnova and Iri-

kolskaya, Eiena rosiniova and iri-na Zhokina, who now are attend-ing Vladimir Institute in Vladimir, Russia — about three hours away from Moscow — will join the UK students for sightsee-ing in Moscow.

"I'm really looking forward to being them," said Knox, a natuseeing them," said Knox, a natu-ral resource conservation senior

from Georgetown, Ky. "I know what they were like here, and I'm curious if they are the same over there.

"I really want to see what peo-ple are like there."

ple are like there."

Not only will they be able to visit Russian friends, but, as Knox said, they will be able to see history as it happens.

"My family and friends all think I'm crazy for going there now," said Waugh, a Russian sophomore from Huntington, W.Va., who plans to study at Vladimir Institute next semester.

Even with all the media atten tion that has been given to food shortages in the former Soviet Union, Wilt said that finding food during their trip isn't really a big concern, right now.

"I've been told that tourists are treated with the highest priority there, so we don't think it will be a problem. And if it is (a prob-lem), it's only for a week. We'll make it," she said.

Waugh said: "Before I met the Russian students last semester, I listened to everything on the news. But when things aren't directly affecting you or anyone you know, you just don't really think about it. But since I met them, I'm always worrying about what they have and what they don't have." don't have

"Everything is really unstable there right now, and I don't like that," Knox said. "The worst thing is the instability. You want everything to go OK. You hope it will, but it might not.

"But judging from Misha (Mi-khail Komarov) — if he is repre-sentative of the new generation — they should be OK."

University officials promote safe break

said.

Spring Break Bags" on March 9. The bags likely will contain health and travel items, like con-doms, topical ointment, bandages, aspirin, vitamins, suntan lotion and toothpaste — and brochures on health-related topics like drinking and driving and sexual-ly-transmitted diseases.

"Some students probably take (spring break kits) home with them — because not every stu-dent has an opportunity to go somewhere. We hope we are giving them products they can use, though," Tuttle said.



In Steamboat Springs, Colo., college students have a bad reputation even though the city traditionally has not been a popular spring-break vacation spot.

"College students get a bad rap in resort communities because large groups tend to get out of hand," said Carl Dorrell, front desk manager for the Holiday Inn in Steamboat.
