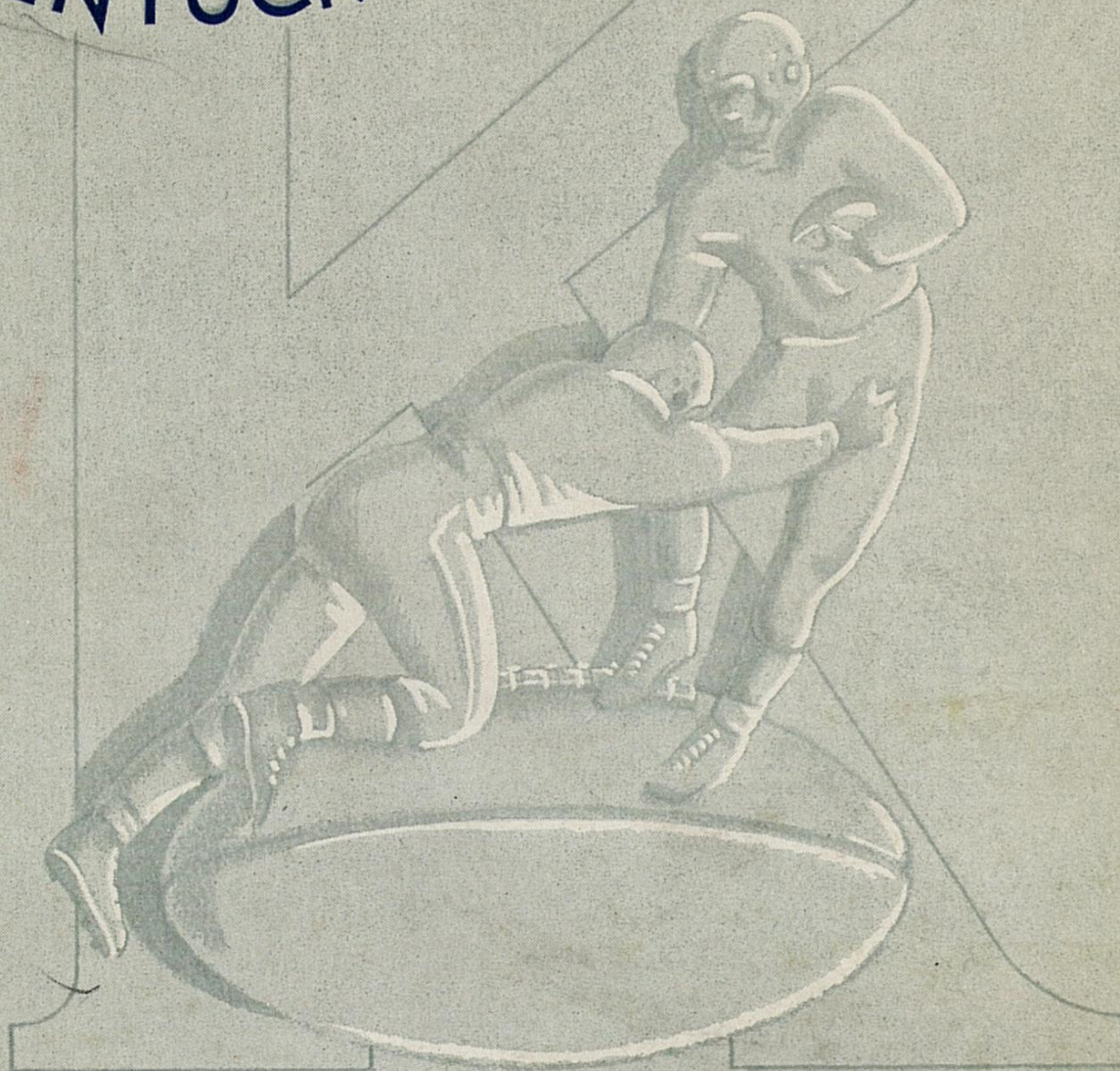

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## TO THE PRESS AND RADIO

Here is your copy of the 1961 Kentucky Wildcats Football Brochure which we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U. of K. football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Publicity Office.

### Information

**WORKING TICKETS**—Address requests to Sports Publicity Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information Window in Memorial Coliseum, directly across the street from the stadium.

**COMPS**—No individual game allotment.

**WESTERN UNION**—Advise if you intend to file from press box so that you may be assigned a seat adjacent to your Western Union operator. It is also advisable to notify the Commercial Manager of Western Union in Lexington.

**RADIO**—Apply directly to Radio Director, University of Kentucky, McVey Hall, Lexington, supplying information regarding proposed sponsors and any network arrangement. Booth assignment will be made and working tickets issued by Sports Publicity Office upon receipt of approved permit from Radio Director. Spotters are available if requested well in advance. Stations should order lines installed by contacting Commercial Department, General Telephone Co., 151 Walnut St., Lexington. Rights to home games in areas outside State of Kentucky and state of visiting team assigned to G. H. Johnston, Inc., New York, N. Y.

**TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES**—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used. An agreement to this effect must be executed before permission will be granted. Application should be made to the University Radio Director and forms may be signed for the entire season. On request, the University will provide accredited newsreel agencies or TV stations-networks with a 200-foot newsclip of game highlights (processed 16 mm black and white film) at actual cost of six cents a foot.

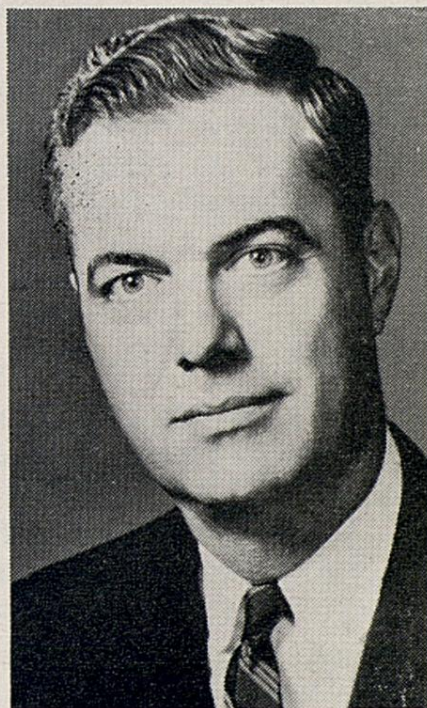
## . . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 100,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution now in its 96th year.

The present school, which last year enrolled 10,157 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a division of Extended Programs, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706-acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

Dr. Frank G. Dickey currently serves as president of the University. The youthful, athletic-minded former dean of the UK College of Education succeeded venerable Dr. Herman L. Donovan in 1956 as the eighth chief administrative officer in the school's history. Dr. Dickey also serves as current president of the Southeastern Conference.

The University is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

## ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in nine different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A Board of Directors, headed by UK President Frank Dickey, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. Dr. Leo Chamberlain, vice-president of the University, has general supervision over the Department and serves as vice-chairman of the Board. Dr. A. D. Kirwan, one-time Wildcat coach and UK's faculty representative to the Southeastern Conference, serves the directors as secretary and Dr. Frank Peterson, UK vice-president for business administration, acts as treasurer in an ex-officio capacity.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is Bernie A. Shively, a former Illinois grid All-American and a veteran of over 20 years in the post of Director of Athletics.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

### BERNIE A. SHIVELY

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is the Herculean task being carried out successfully by Bernie A. Shively.

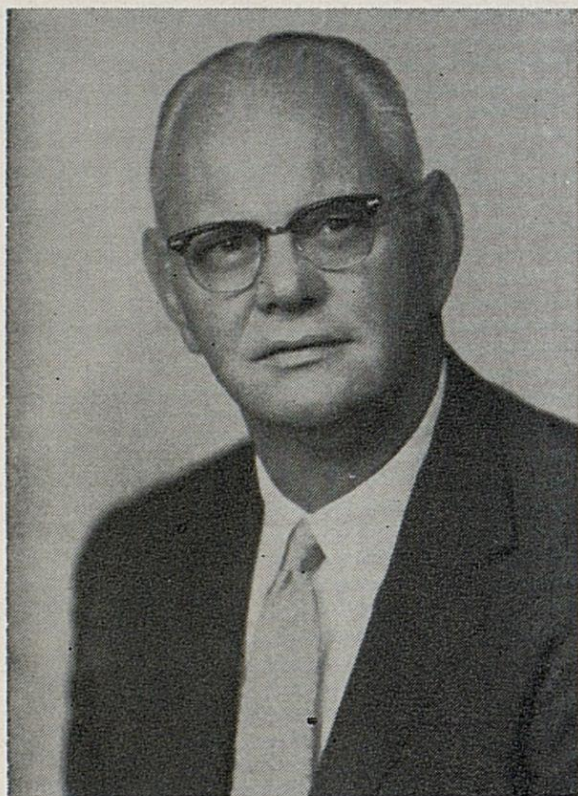
Few who have observed the untiring efforts of the tall, silver-haired former All-America footballer in the service of the University of Kentucky since 1927 and as Director of Athletics since 1938 will argue his fitness as an athletic Hercules. Not only has Shively guided the de-

velopment of Kentucky as a nationally-respected power in major sports, but he has also gained personal prestige through a fair-minded approach to many problems.

During his tenure as Athletic Director, Shively has directly supervised major expansions in Kentucky's athletic plant resulting from the progression of the school's football and basketball teams to greater national prominence and increased patronage by the sports-minded public.

The seating capacity of Kentucky's football stadium, McLean Stadium on Stoll Field, has been doubled to bring the current number of seats to approximately 37,500 and on par with most other schools located in heavier-populated areas. Powerful lighting equipment also was installed during the 1948-49 construction

and a new-type "iodized" light put up last summer to bring night football into new popularity. Partly to satisfy the overwhelming number of basketball devotees, who could not squeeze into the 2,800-seat Alumni Gymnasium, a long-planned Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950. Seating 11,500 persons for cage contests, the four-million dollar Coli-





seum also houses the Athletic Department. More recently, Shively directed the acquisition of a pair of modern, ranch-style living units which have served as the home of the football team since 1954. "Wildcat Manor" and "Kitten Lodge" replace three frame houses which the gridders had occupied since 1949.

A large dressing room building and football practice field, used since 1955, was abandoned in 1959 to make way for a huge new men's dorm. Under Shively's supervision, a spacious new Sports Center was prepared a short distance away on the University farm to take even better care of the footballers and spring sports teams. The Sports Center is generally regarded as one of the finest sports facilities in the nation.

### **All-America Guard At Illinois**

A native of Paris, Ill., Shively attended the University of Illinois where he was an All-America guard in 1926 on the same grid team made famous by Red Grange. Demonstrating a claim to being one of the finest all-around athletes in Illinois' history, "Shive" also laid claim to the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling championship and annexed letters in track before graduating in 1927.

Shively came to Kentucky in 1927 as line coach of football under Harry Gammage and six years later was named head of the UK Physical Education Department. He succeeded Chet Wynne as Athletic Director in 1938. During this period and the years following, he also served as track and baseball coach for several seasons and continued to assist the football staff as line coach until 1944. The next year, 1945, he assumed full charge of the grid squad for one season before turning the job over to mentor Paul (Bear) Bryant in 1946.

The Kentucky Athletic Director is currently chairman of the NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and for the past eight years has been president of the Southeastern Conference Coaches and Athletic Directors Association. He served as chairman of the SEC Basketball Committee for a number of years and is a past chairman of the NCAA summer baseball group. In addition, he has been active in numerous state and civic organizations including office as vice president of the UK Alumni Association and chairmanship of the Fayette County Recreation Board. He is a past Supervisor of Officials for the Ohio Valley Conference.

Shively and his wife, Ruth, have two children. Doug was a star end on the UK grid team for three years ending in 1958 and is now coaching at VPI while daughter Suzanne was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of UK in 1957.

## **BLANTON COLLIER**

### **Head Football Coach**

**(Seven Years — Won 36, Lost 31, Tied 3)**

A quiet-mannered native Kentuckian who is widely regarded at all levels of the game as one of football's most brilliant tacticians and finest gentlemen, Blanton Long Collier is a man of unique background and the personification of a patient, thorough teacher.

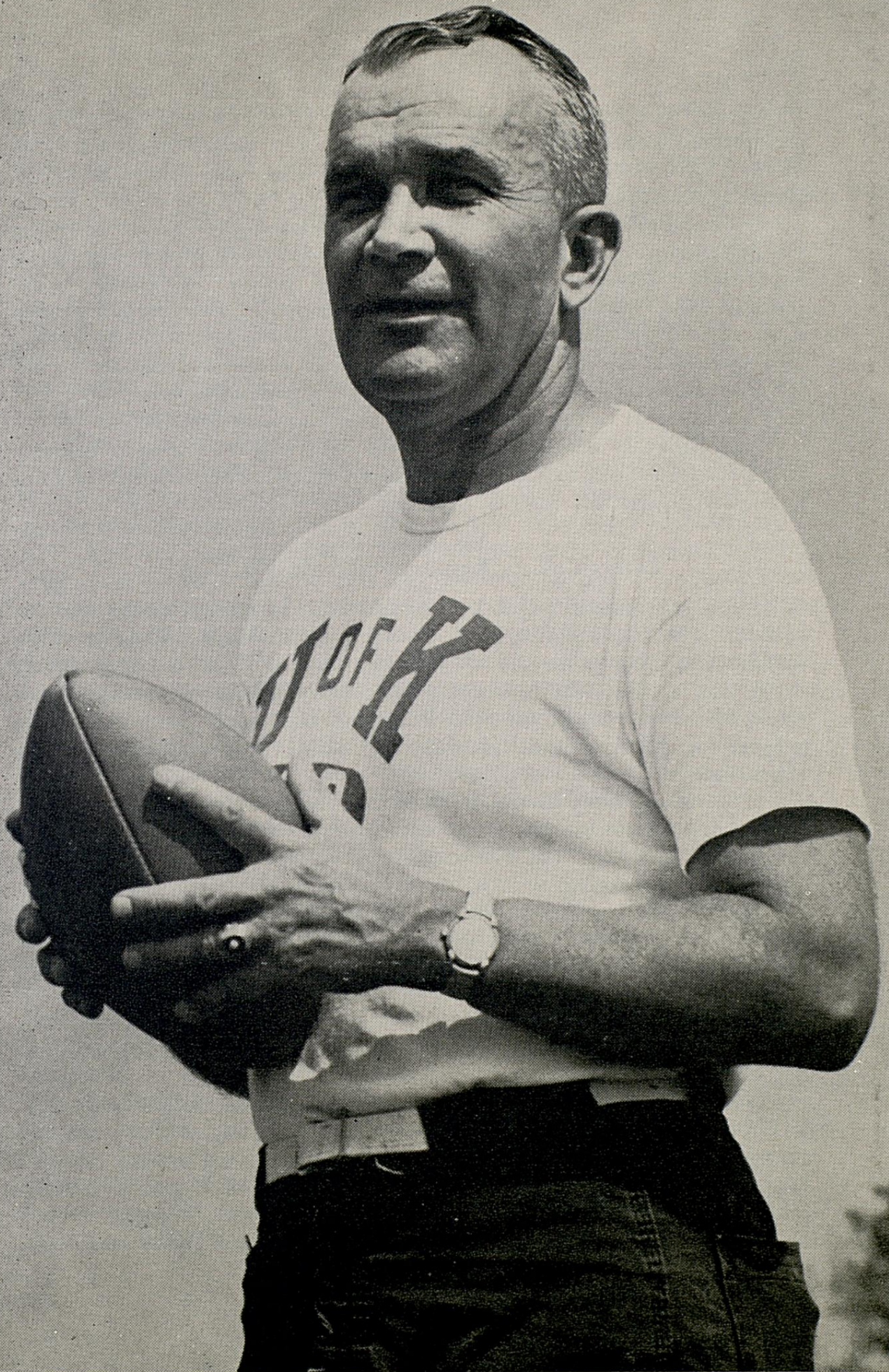
With only seven years in the collegiate coaching ranks behind him, the popular Wildcat mentor might be considered a novice to the uninformed. But to his fellow mentors throughout the country, who know the facts of his background and football philosophy, he is held in the highest respect and already has been accorded "Coach of the Year" honor (1954) in the nation's toughest football league—the Southeastern Conference.

A great many experts feel that Kentucky is fortunate to have the services of one of the keenest minds in the grid sport who needs only a few more "tools of the trade" (outstanding players) to boost the Wildcats to the top. Although his first seven Kentucky elevens have not reached the Southeastern Conference throne room or taken part in a bowl, both University officials and the "Man In The Street" are solidly behind Collier and the program he directs with hard-working efficiency. Illustrative of this confidence is the new contract that the coach was awarded following the 1958 campaign, extending his services to Feb. 1, 1965.

When he gave up the security of a position as backfield coach of the Cleveland Browns to take over at his home-state university in 1954, he fulfilled a life-long ambition and climaxed a unique rise in the coaching game. He became a college coach for the first time after nearly a quarter-century in the profession of tutoring football.

Born in Millersburg, Ky., July 2, 1906, and brought up in Paris, Ky., only 17 miles from the University campus, Collier began his athletic career at Paris High School by playing both football and basketball. Later at Georgetown College, he lettered in both sports. Although not an outstanding gridder because of his lack of size (he weighed only 125 pounds then), he nevertheless was regarded as a close student of the game and, upon graduation in 1927, was named coach of all sports at Paris High.

He held this position until he entered the Navy in 1943. During 16 years in the schoolboy coaching ranks, his teams won or shared two Central Kentucky Conference football titles and six basketball cham-



pionships. His last high school grid team (1943) ranked as unofficial state champions. Also during this period he took postgraduate work at the University of Kentucky and received a master's degree in educational administration in 1942.

It was while he was stationed at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station during his Navy tour that Collier and Paul Brown discovered each other. Brown, a lieutenant and head coach of the Great Lakes football team, became impressed with Yoeman Collier's football knowledge and added him to the staff as an assistant coach. The following year (1946) when the Cleveland Browns were organized with Brown as head coach, Collier made the unique jump from high school ranks (via service ball) to the pros by going along as backfield coach.

During eight seasons with the perennial world champion Browns, Collier made a reputation that stamped him as a great teacher of football—determined but quietly patient.

#### **Enters College Ranks In 1954 As UK Coach**

When the Kentucky job became available in 1954 with the transfer of Paul Bryant to Texas A & M, Collier was lured into collegiate ranks for the first time in nearly a quarter-century of coaching experience.

Given a three-year contract, Collier launched an immediate attack based on his version of the Split T offense and spiced with a generous helping of gridiron fundamentals and stress on perfection in play execution.

The results came almost immediately as the Wildcats forged a victory string of five straight from mid-season, capped with a win over arch-rival Tennessee. The Kentuckians were in bowl contention all the way as they wound up with a 7-3 record for the 1954 campaign.

Coach Collier was rewarded by grateful school officials with a new five-year contract and fellow mentors of the Southeastern Conference voted him "SEC Coach of the Year." In gaining this honor in his "freshman" season at UK, an achievement made all the more noteworthy since it was the first time the title had been bestowed on a coach in his initial year of college tutoring, Collier climaxed a unique rise in the game.

The 1955 campaign was virtually a repetition of the previous year. In carving out a 6-3-1 mark, Collier could point with pride to the fact that his men registered a win over Ole Miss, the only setback suffered by the eventual SEC and Cotton Bowl champs, and a second straight triumph over powerful Tennessee that eliminated the Vols from bowl contention and again boosted the Wildcats' stock for a post-season date.

In 1956, Kentucky slipped to sixth place on a record of six wins and four defeats and in 1957 hit rock bottom in the conference standings as the result of only three victories in 10 starts against some of the South's toughest grid powers. But there was some solace to be gained in the knowledge that impartial observers classed the '56 record as remarkable in view of personnel problems and praised the 1957 outfit, which wound up in a blaze of glory by upsetting Tennessee for the third time in four years, as "probably the nation's best non-winning team." Another point of pride in the luckless '57 record was the Wildcats' near upset of eventual national champion Auburn, who needed a key penalty and questionable help at the goal line to eke out a 6-0 win on their home ground.

The next two seasons saw the Wildcats plagued by injuries and ill luck against many of the top teams of the country while playing a calibre of ball that should have had them winning consistently. The '58 record of five wins and a tie in 10 starts was remarkable to observers in view of injuries and a "killer" schedule while the '59 club, which posted only a 4-6 record, was a gridiron enigma. UK played to the limit of its ability, throwing serious scares into three of the nation's top five teams (Mississippi, LSU and Georgia won by an average margin of 10 points).

Last year's Wildcat crew, again beset by injuries to key personnel and unfavorable schedule, probably was one of the best in the conference despite a final, 5-4-1 record. After dropping close decisions at the start to the "Big Three" (Ga. Tech, Ole Miss and Auburn), Kentucky rolled the rest of the way with only a four-point loss to Georgia and a tie with Tennessee marring an otherwise perfect record. Enroute, the Wildcats registered five shutouts to become the nation's sixth best defensive unit and also ranked fourth nationally in both pass offense and defense.

Coincidental with his success on the football field, Collier has gained increasingly wide popularity and respect throughout the state and nation. Relations with Kentucky high school coaches are at an all-time high and the Wildcat mentor is constantly in demand as an authoritative lecturer at coaching clinics all over the country. In the summer of 1957, he went overseas for the Army and Air Force to conduct clinics for armed services personnel in Japan and Hawaii. He also served as head coach of the Grays in the 1958 Blue-Gray Game and previously assisted on the East coaching staff two straight years (1956-57) for the annual Shrine East-West Game at San Francisco as well as the 1955 Christian Bowl game.

Collier married Miss Mary Forman Varden of Paris in 1931 and they have three daughters—Carolyn, Kay and Jane.

## THE COACHING STAFF



### ERMAL ALLEN

(Kentucky '42)

**Defensive Coach**

One of Kentucky's most famous athlete graduates, Allen, at 40 has had a full career as a collegiate star, pro-football player and successful college grid coach. He starred at quarterback for the Wildcat forces from 1939 to 1941 and entered military service following graduation. Returning as a graduate student after his discharge, Allen played two games of the 1946 season before a rules interpretation made him ineligible. Allen joined the UK coaching staff of Paul Bryant for the remainder of that season, spent the '47 campaign as a T-quarterback with the professional Cleveland Browns, whose backfield coach at this time was Blanton Collier, and then re-joined the Wildcat staff in 1948. He became Kentucky's head freshman mentor in 1950 and was promoted at season's end to backfield coach. Allen was retained in this capacity when Collier became head man of the Wildcats and now is chief aide in charge of defense. In the off season, he plays a lot of golf and copped the state amateur championship in 1955 and 1958. The mentally-sharp Allen holds a master's degree. A son, Ronnie, will start grid play at Georgia Tech this season. Home town: Morristown, Tenn.



### JOHN NORTH

(Vanderbilt '48)

**Offensive Coach**

A former star flankman at Vanderbilt, John North joined the Kentucky coaching staff in the spring of 1956 as Freshman Coach after a full career as collegian, pro player, high school and college coach. The 39-year-old Tennessean played at Vanderbilt in 1941 and 1942. During World War II, he served three years in the Marines. Despite shot-up legs from South Pacific battles, he earned second string All-SEC honors at Vandy in 1946-47 and played end two years for the Baltimore Colts. He started his coaching career in Tallahassee, Ala., in 1951 and three seasons later became line coach at Tennessee Tech, a job he held until his transfer to Kentucky. After guiding the Kentucky freshmen to two straight undefeated seasons, John Moved up to varsity end coach and in 1959 changed duties to take over general offensive operations. North holds a master's degree from Peabody College in Nashville. He is married. Home town: Old Hickory, Tenn.



## **ED RUTLEDGE**

(Western Ky. '41)

### **Offensive Backfield Coach and Scout**

A former FBI man and highly successful high school football coach, Ed Rutledge is starting his sixth season on the Collier staff and again will handle a major share of scouting duties in addition to tutoring the backfield offensive operations. Rutledge played end at Western Kentucky State College, graduating in 1941. He spent the next 6½ years as a Navy pilot and starred on the service champion Pensacola NAS grid squad. The 42-year-old Ohio native coached short stints as an assistant at Bowling Green (Ky.) High, Ironton (Ohio) High and had experience as athletic officer of the Naval Air Technical Training Center in Memphis prior to becoming head coach at Danville (Ky.) High. He also served seven months in 1948 as a special agent of the FBI. His second Danville team captured the state championship on an undefeated season. Ed joined the Kentucky staff in 1956 as freshman line coach and two seasons later became head freshman coach. After two years and a 4-1-1 record, he moved up to the varsity and his present duties. He holds a master's degree and is married with one son. Home town: Ironton, Ohio.



## **BILL ARNSPARGER**

(Miami (O.) '50)

### **Defensive Line Coach**

One of Coach Collier's former grid pupils at Paris (Ky.) High School and a native Kentuckian, Arnsparger joined the UK staff in 1954 as an assistant in charge of offensive line play. The 32-year-old former Marine brought to the staff an excellent background of coaching experience which began at Miami (Ohio) U. following his graduation from that school in '50. In 1951, he moved with boss Woody Hayes to Ohio State where he was tackle coach in charge of offensive line play for three seasons. Arnsparger played at tackle and guard on Collier's teams at Paris High from 1941-43 and entered UK as a freshman in '44. His tour of duty in the Marines began shortly thereafter and he transferred to Miami U. after his discharge to play under Sid Gillman and later Hayes. After seven seasons tutoring the offensive line, Bill this spring shifted duties to the defensive line. Like his current boss, Bill has his master's degree and is married. Home town: Paris, Ky.





## **CHARLES KNOX**

(Juniata '54)

### **Offensive Line Coach**

Regarded as one of the outstanding young line coaches of the country, Charles (Chuck) Knox joined the Kentucky staff last January as a replacement for resigned aide Bob Cummings. Knox's primary duties will be with the offensive line, the same position he filled capably at Wake Forest for the past two seasons. The 28-year-old native Pennsylvanian was a four-year letterman at Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa. Following his graduation in 1954, he stayed on one season as a grid assistant before moving into the Pennsylvania high school field. He spent one year at Tyrone High and was head coach at Elwood City High two seasons prior to becoming a Wake Forest staffer in 1959. Knox is married and the father of three young daughters. Home town: Sewickley, Pa.



## **GEORGE SENDEL**

(Kentucky '48)

### **End Coach**

Newest aide on the Collier staff, George (Chink) Sengel was appointed last January 28 to replace fellow Louisvillian Howie Schnellenberger when the latter moved to Alabama. He is a former three-letter-winning Wildcat end and will tutor Kentucky flankmen as his primary responsibility. An all-state end at Louisville Manual High in 1939, the 38-year-old native Kentuckian played at UK in 1942 and again in 1946-47 after a hitch in the Air Force. In 1948, he was a state revenue agent and spent 1949 as a freshman grid assistant at UK. After picking up a master's degree the following year, Sengel became head coach and athletic director at Clay County High School in Florida and held the position four years. In 1955-56, he was head coach of Opotka Memorial High in Florida and then returned to his hometown where he spent the last four seasons as an assistant at Louisville Male High. He is married and the father of two sons. Home town: Louisville, Ky.



## **GEORGE BOONE**

(Kentucky '61)

### **Defensive Line Coach**

One of the most determined players ever to perform for the Wildcats, George Boone carries over his playing-days determination into his coaching assignment. After a year as a part-time aide on the UK staff last season, George now serves in a full-time capacity and will continue to assist with the defensive line and recruiting. Although he came to UK in 1956 as a virtual unknown without a scholarship, Boone won both aid and a regular tackle post with outstanding performance and was named by the Associated Press in 1957 on the All-SEC Sophomore team. He was bothered as a junior by a shoulder injury, but came back to turn in consistently outstanding defensive play that impressed both opponents and the Kentucky coaches. George helped out on the varsity staff and was made a full-time aide effective last July. Home town: Louisville, Ky.



## **NORM DEEB**

(Eastern Ky. '47)

### **Freshman Coach and Scout**

Experienced in both high school-prep school and collegiate coaching, 38-year-old Norm Deeb was added to the Collier staff in 1959 and assigned duties as line coach of the freshman team. Virtually all of Deeb's years in the coaching profession have been in Kentucky high school ranks. He was head coach at Bellevue High in 1956 and 1957, posting a record of 13 wins against six losses. Prior to this, he served as line coach at Shelbyville High for five years. Deeb also was line coach at Bullis Prep School in Maryland from 1949 to 1951, a period during which the service academy preparatory school won the mythical National Prep School Championship in the Beach Bowl at Daytona Beach, Fla. His last coaching assignment was at Xavier University in Cincinnati, where he coached the line during the 1958 season. After an interruption of 42 months' Army duty, much of it in Italy, he graduated from Eastern Kentucky State College in 1947. He played tackle for the Maroons. Deeb picked up his master's degree last summer from Xavier. He is married and has two sons. Home town: Louisville, Ky.



## JOE SHANNON

(Kentucky '59)

### Freshman Backfield Coach

A former Georgetown (Ky.) College star halfback and UK's Freshman Baseball Coach for the past six seasons, Joe Shannon in 1960 picked up added duties of assisting with the coaching of freshman football backs. He will continue to assist Coach Collier in this capacity again this season. The 48-year-old Shannon also will double in the off-season as frosh diamond chief and assist with the baseball varsity. Although he was an all-sports standout and captained Georgetown's freshman grid squad as well as playing regularly two years as a varsity halfback, much of Shannon's experience has been in baseball. After several years as a professional umpire in the minor leagues and one season as coach of the now-defunct Lexington Colts (Class C), he returned to Georgetown high as Baseball Coach for the '55 season. In 1956, he joined the UK staff as Freshman Baseball Coach and his teams compiled a 35-9 record in five years. No freshman diamond team was fielded in 1961. He served a three-year hitch with the Marine Air Wing (17 months South Pacific). Shannon is married. Home town, Georgetown, Ky.

### STUDENT COACHES

**LEEMAN BENNETT**—Although he never rose to stardom during his playing days with the Wildcats, ending last season, this former Paducah Tilghman quarterback proved himself an efficient student of the game. Leeman came to Kentucky in 1956 with honorable mention All-State honors and had an outstanding freshman season. He was red-shirted in 1957 to gain additional experience and physical maturity and played a leading reserve role during the following three campaigns. Bennett will work with freshmen.

**HARRY JOHNSON**—A sizeable, hard-nose type who might have had a great career as a Wildcat except for a knee injury, Johnson will work on the freshman staff again this season while completing his academic requirements. He was a 12-letter, all-sports star at Fleming-Neon High as a schoolboy, winning honorable mention All-State honors in football twice. He was a starting tackle as a UK freshman in 1957, red-shirted in '58 and then sustained the knee injury in '59 before he could see varsity duty. Helped out with Kitten line last year.

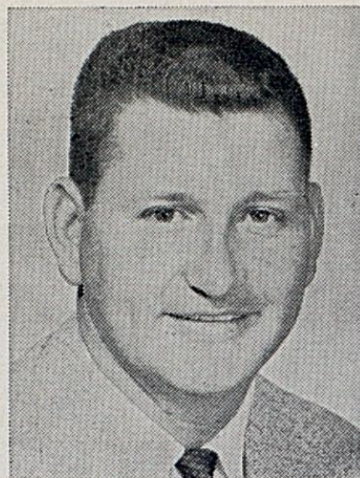
**MIKE COYLE**—Another injury victim who has passed up further activity as a player on advice of doctors, Coyle was just beginning to show the fruits of added experience in the spring of '60 when he broke his leg. He was an honorable mention All-State guard as a schoolboy at Elizabethtown, but switched to tackle as a Kentucky yearling. Red-shirted his first varsity campaign in 1959. **BUSTER BROWN—Equipment Manager:** Handling the duties of handing out approximately \$10,000 worth of football gear to the team is a seasoned veteran, S. C. (Buster) Brown. The tough-but-popular Brown served the University athletic teams in the capacity of Equipment Manager for several years before World War II. After wartime work as a stevedore on the West Coast, Buster returned to Kentucky and his old job in 1952.

**KEN KUHN—Publicity Director:** A veteran of 13 years in the job of publicizing Wildcat football and other sports activities of UK, Kuhn came to Lexington via Michigan State from which he was graduated in 1942 and later served as an assistant in the Public Relations Department. Before moving over to the Athletic Department in 1948, he worked two years as News Editor in UK's Department of Public Relations. Kuhn is a past president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Publicity Association.

**JOHN (Rusty) PAYNE—Trainer:** John first came in contact with Kentucky football when he helped out his predecessor, Smoky Harper, during the Wildcats' pre-Sugar Bowl practice on the Louisiana State campus in 1950. After graduating from LSU that year, the red-haired Arkansas native spent two years in the Marine Corps at Paris Island and Quantico, serving much of the time as athletic trainer. He joined the Kentucky staff in 1954, the same season that Coach Collier came. Payne is a past president of the SEC Trainers Association and on the executive board of the national trainers' body.

## KENTUCKY FOOTBALL OUTLOOK — 1961

It might seem like hedging or outright evasion of the issue to begin thinking about prospects for Kentucky football in 1961 by first referring to the past, but such a procedure best points up the outlook of the Wildcats for the coming season.

The explanation is simple: Last year's Kentucky grid outfit was a good one, far better than its final 5-4-1 record might seem to indicate, and there is a lot of hope and a surprising amount of optimism in the Wildcat camp that it can again be as good despite severe losses.

There's hope too that a better record can be posted in '61 with a little better shake in the luck department. Although four men counted on as leaders were hurt much of the time last year, Kentucky still managed to make a comeback that was the envy of the conference. After opening tussels with the Southeastern's "Big Three"—Georgia Tech, Ole Miss and Auburn—in the initial three weeks of the season, UK lost only one game and tied one. Five shutouts were chalked up and it can be rightly claimed that the Wildcats' really great second half comebacks deserved them a better fate in the games they didn't win.

### Sixteen Lettermen Lost From '60 Team

Losing 16 lettermen from a team of this calibre might be basis for a pessimistic outlook on chances for matching or improving, but Kentucky's youngsters give every indication of "taking the bit in their mouth" in the best traditions of the horse country and going to work in the race for high laurels in '61.

The challenge to improve on last season's record will fall to a predominantly sophomore-junior outfit whose morale and confidence belie underlying problems that will have to be solved.

Seventeen letter winners of last year return to form the nucleus of a potentially fine unit to build on, but the depth so necessary for making a good showing in one of the nation's toughest leagues must be supplied for the most part by a group of 30-odd sophomores or generally untested juniors.

Among the problems that must be solved satisfactorily before heading into the difficult, 10-game card of next season is that of breaking in last year's alternate backfield combo as a starting unit and developing reserve strength to replace them. Departing stars included right half Charley Sturgeon, the team's leading ground gainer; left half speedster Calvin Bird; regular fullback Jimmy Poynter, second best ball carrier in rushing yardage; and the quarterbacking duo of Jerry Eisaman and Tom Rodgers.

Prospects for a solution of this problem seem pretty good, at least from an offensive standpoint, since last season's leading reserves saw a considerable amount of game action. Sparkling Jerry Woolum returns as the heir apparent to the top quarterback job. With a knack of being at his best against the best teams, Jerry wound up a terrific sophomore campaign ranked as the No. 4 passer in the SEC on 63 completions in 125 attempts for 767 yards. Also a fine runner, he attained the fourth position among SEC total offense leaders as well. Backing him up are much improved junior John Rampulla and promising soph Elmer Jackson.

The halfback posts are due to be held down by understudies of last year who showed themselves capable in spring practice scrimmages. Probable first unit left half is senior Bill Ransdell and Gary Steward, a junior, heads the prospective candidates on the right side.

#### **Halfback Darrell Cox Leads Soph List**

They will carry the burden, but strong competition is in prospect from a bevy of talented sophomores and a couple of returnees. Letterman Clarkie Mayfield, used primarily as a place kick specialist last year, has blossomed into a fine runner and senior Dave Chapman had one of his finest spring practices. In the soph department, the list starts with diminutive (5-8 and 172) Darrell Cox, leading back of last year's frosh outfit, and includes such promising hands as Billy Bird, Bob Kosid, Karl Crandall and Denny Cardwell.

Gary Cochran, 200-pound senior letterman, furnishes the only experience at the fullback spot and will be backed up by a sophomore group headed by 186-pound native Kentuckian Ken Bocard.

Whereas nine experienced hands departed from the backfield, Kentucky in '61 will be able to confront opponents with a solid front line of at least one letterman at every position. The main problem here is a general lack of desirable experience in the depth that it takes to play the calibre of schedule being tried.

Although the number of men lost in the line was not excessive, their value can hardly be discounted. Among the chief losses was ace linebacking guard Lloyd Hodge, a key man in Kentucky's national ranking as the sixth toughest overall defensive team. Also missing will be key operatives like Dickie Mueller at right end, right guard Don Sinor and left tackle Bob Hunt.

The roster of veterans likely to be very much in the running for No. 1 unit jobs includes ends Tom Hutchinson, Dave Gash and Tommy Simpson; tackles Junior Hawthorne, Bob Butler and Wayne Dixon;

guards Jerry Dickerson, Mel Chandler, Red Hill and Jon Jurgens; and centers Irv Goode and John Mutchler.

Best of the Wildcats next season could be Hutchinson, a stellar receiver who made the All-Conference first team as a sophomore in '60 and was beaten out by one catch in the final week for the SEC pass receiving leadership. He paced the conference most of the season and wound up eighth in the country with 30 catches for 455 yards and four touchdowns.

Along with teammate Dave Gash, on the left flank, and ace quarterback Woolum (top returning passer in the league), the 'Cats should present a very formidable aerial combination and are counting on it to give them a repeat leadership in SEC pass offense. The aerial arm also could increase the efficiency of the Kentucky running game. A year ago, UK stood second in combined running-passing attack only to national champion Mississippi in the SEC with an average 302.4 yards per game.

#### **Pro Scouts Like Kentucky Center Goode**

Mention of top individuals also has to include, besides Hutchinson and Woolum, the Wildcats' man-mountain center—6-5 and 220 pound Irv Goode. Equally efficient as an offensive ball snapper or defensive linebacker, the big Kentuckian is the "apple" of pro scouts' eyes.

Sophs due to play a major role in Kentucky success plans include halfback Cox, fullback Bocard; ends Dan Riveiro and Dennis Schrecker; quarterback Jackson; guard Bobby Lee; halfbacks Bird, Kosid and Crandall; linebacker Hugh Sturgeon; and tackles Fred Rader and Herschel Turner.

The schedule confronting Head Coach Blanton Collier's eighth edition of Wildcats is not an easy one by any stretch of the imagination. In fact, there is only one major change from the assignment that has faced the team for the past several years. This change could be an important one, however.

Georgia Tech, opening foe in four out of the last five seasons, has been replaced with Miami's Hurricanes, due to be one of the country's best independents. Principal reason behind the change was a reasonable desire to rid the Wildcats of their back-breaking assignment of facing three conference powerhouses in the opening three weeks of the season. With no chance to point for any one of the trio, Kentucky generally found itself saddled with at least two league losses before mid-season—a morale-busting factor since the circumstances very adversely affected the team's chances at the league title or a bowl berth.

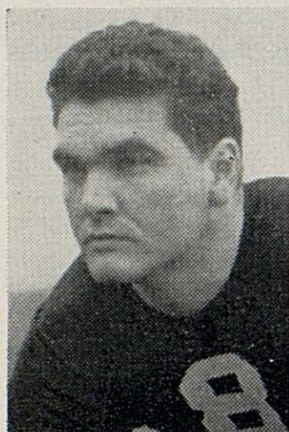

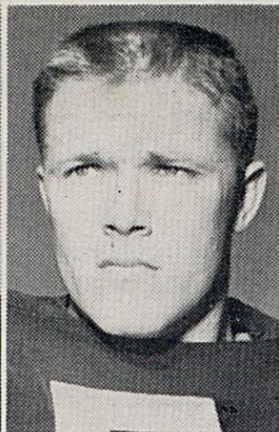

### ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

While the name is old in origin, no claim is made regarding precedence over similar nicknames boasted by Northwestern, Villanova and about 10 other major athletic teams.

An alumnus in 1947 presented a live Kentucky Wildcat to SUKY, student pep organization. Named "The Colonel," the cat served as a live mascot for UK teams until his death in 1955. The current mascot is a stuffed wildcat obtained from a Brooklyn taxidermist just before the 1958 football season and named "Tucky."

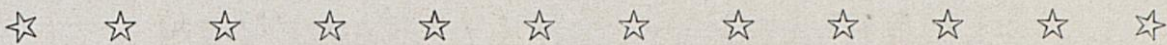

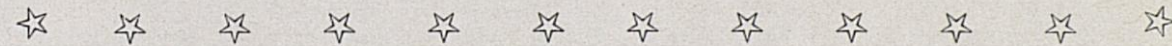

### INCENTIVE TO CATCH UP

If Kentucky's 1961 Wildcats needed any urging to register a victory every time out, they might check the series record against the 10 foes to be met this season. UK leads in only three of the series—showing a 5-0 record against Miami, 1-0 versus Florida State and 16-1 over Xavier. They are behind in rivalries with Mississippi (5-11-1), Auburn (2-6-1), Georgia (4-9-1), Vanderbilt (7-23-3) and Tennessee (17-30-9). The series with LSU is knotted at five wins apiece and one tie going into the Oct. 21 contest at Baton Rouge and Kansas State is being faced on the grid-iron for the first time. Tennessee's Vols have been on the schedule since 1893 and Vandy came on three years later.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Gridiron relations with University of Miami date back only to 1948, making the Hurricanes one of the newer rivals on the Kentucky schedule. This season, the series takes a back seat only to newcomer Kansas State and once-met Florida State. Significantly, the Wildcats have taken all five games played to date by decisive scores and Miami has managed to score only one touchdown while registering but 14 points. Kentucky used a 21-6 walloping of a good Hurricane team in 1949 as a stepping stone to its first bowl invitation—to the Orange Bowl where it lost a heartbreaker to Santa Clara. This year's visit will be only the second game played in Lexington.

**LAST MEETING:** Nothing went right for the home-standing Hurricanes on the October night in 1959 marking the last meeting between the Wildcats and powerful Miami. Not even the 148 yards in penalties assessed against erratic UK prevented the Kentuckians from overcoming the frustration of their own mistakes for a 22-3 victory. Miami filled the air with foot-

balls, utilizing the dangerous throwing arm of Fran Curci, but registered its only points on a first period field goal by Al Dangel. UK's Calvin Bird unreeled a 55-yard punt return early in the game and added his team's final TD with a 39-yard jaunt in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Jerry Eisaman sneaked over for the other one in the third period and added a two-point PAT pass to Ledger Howard.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** A growing power in the South for many years, 1961 promises to see the Hurricanes at their highest peak as one of the country's leading independents. Despite an ambitious schedule, Miami ranks high on the strength of a rugged line—anchored by All-America end Bill Miller—and a versatile backfield. In the latter department are many of the stars among 21 returning lettermen. Terrific Eddie Johns has been shifted from quarterback to left half to make a place for highly talented newcomer, George Mira. Reports out of the Sun City of Coral Gables also sing the praises of another soph quarterback, big John Bennett. Cagey Andy Gustafson, in his 14th year at Miami, should have a razzle-dazzle multiple offense second to none with such operatives and could ruin Kentucky's sparkling record of 17 straight victories over non-conference foes. Last loss was to Maryland's defending national champions here in Blanton Collier's first game as UK coach back in 1954.

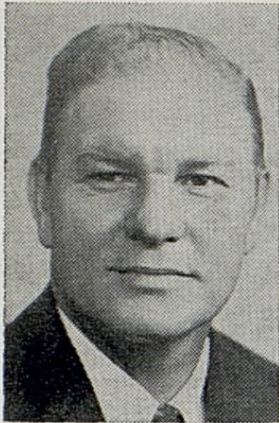

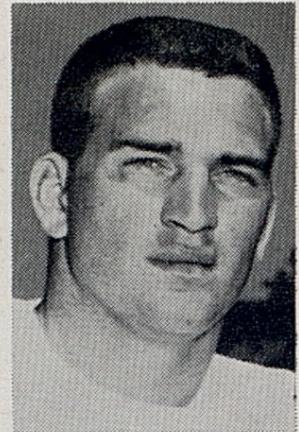

**SERIES HISTORY:** A strange sequence of upsets and near-upsets flavors the comparatively young, but colorful and intense rivalry between the Wildcats and Ole Miss. Seventeen meetings have been held since the series got underway in 1944, but it was 1958 before the Rebels could claim a distinctive edge in the battling. The Wildcats got the series off to an auspicious start by winning the first game, but Mississippi took the decision in three out of the next four meetings. The fireworks really started in 1949 as Kentucky claimed a 47-0 upset in Oxford and started on the road to big-time prominence. Since then, the Kentucky game has been a “make or break” situation on the Rebels’ schedule. The 1954 meeting in Memphis was a penalty-marred spectacle resulting in several conference records for violations that still stand. In 1955, UK added new fire to the “beat the favorite” series history by upending the defending SEC champs in Lexington for their only loss enroute to a second straight title and Cotton Bowl win. Ole Miss got its revenge by recording wins in the next five meetings, but the final result on the scoreboard failed generally to reflect the closeness of the battles. This was particularly true in the last two games. UK extended the SEC “Team of the Decade” two years back by forcing a long field goal and a freakish 51-yard quarterback sneak TD in

final seconds for a 16-0 decision. Last year, the Rebs won again but were in trouble throughout.

**LAST MEETING:** Significantly ranked No. 1 in the polls, the eventual National Champions found themselves again with a bruising battle on their hands as they entertained the Wildcats in Memphis last year. True to series tradition, they won out (21-6) but not before Kentucky staged a second half comeback that had the Rebels almost on the ropes before (again true to tradition) they padded their slim, endangered margin with a closing seconds score. Chief threat for the Wildcats was soph quarterback Jerry Woolum, who caught the fancy of the crowd as he moved Cats 87 yards for a marker in the final period and almost engineered a chance to tie in the fading minutes.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** All-America T Director Jake Gibbs departed along with 17 other experienced hands (9 of 11 starters lost all told) and the Rebels are not supposed to be at their 1959-60 peak this season—on paper. But there's plenty of respect for Coach Johnny Vaught coming up with necessary replacements from the material left over and the always-plentiful red-shirt squad. Ole Miss makes no secret of pointing for a good showing against Kentucky as the key to repeating as SEC champion and bidding for another national championship. Leading operatives of the Rebs' highly-gearred Wing T offense will be end Ralph Smith, tackle Jim Dunaway, fullback Billy Ray Adams and quarterback Doug Elmore. Touted as prospective soph sensation is QB Perry Lee Dunn.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Former Southeastern Conference football “doormats” Kentucky and Auburn first got together on the gridiron at Lexington in 1934, the year after the league was organized, and played another game the following season at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 scrap, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision in the Wildcats’ favor. Tilts between the new-found grid powers in four of the last five years have been fraught with frustration as neither could boast of decisive change in a trend to close games until Auburn smashed the visiting Kentuckians decisively (33-0) in 1959. The rivalry reverted to its usual form last season as the Tigers squeezed out a 10-7 decision. Now ahead in the rivalry six games to two (one tie), the defense-minded Tigers are able to boast that only one Wildcat has crossed their goal line in the last five years.



**LAST MEETING:** Injured Auburn fullback Ed Dyas kicked a 28-yard field goal late in the fourth period to provide his team with the margin needed for a hard-fought, 10-7 victory. About the only consolation that disappointed Kentuckians could gain out of the frustrating night encounter on Stoll Field was that the Tigers' winning goal was set up by a Wildcat gamble that misfired and that UK scored for the first time in five years. Auburn got its lead in the second period on 46 yard scoring jaunt by fullback John McGeever and Kentucky ended a 17-quarter scoring drought as Calvin Bird crossed the goal later in the quarter. With game deadlocked at 7-7, Wildcat QB Tom Rodgers gambled on a pass from deep in his own territory, the aerial going astray into the arms of halfback Jimmy Burson. After the Auburn drive bogged down, Dyas came in to use his educated toe for the win.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** The War Eagles look every inch a contender for 1961 and well could be a sleeper behind most-frequently favored Ole Miss, LSU and Alabama. Coach Shug Jordan frankly admits to a more experienced team than the club which finished with an 8-2 record last year, is especially pleased with overall prospects in the line and with ace halfback Jimmy Burson. Also high on the star list at Auburn are 205-pound sophomore fullback Larry Rawson, who could make fans forget the feats of departed All-America Ed Dyas, and halfback George Rose, called the fastest back in school history. In addition, much hope is being pinned on the return to sophomore form of QB Bobby Hunt. Auburn again will utilize mainly a Spread T formation.

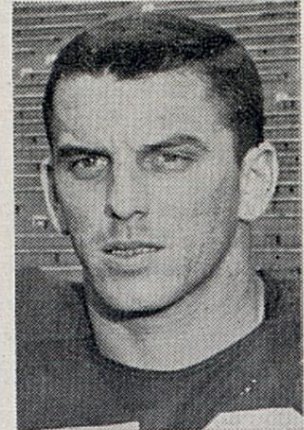

**SERIES HISTORY:** The Manhattan Wildcats and University of Kentucky's Wildcats have only a nickname in common when it comes to gridiron relations. They have never met before in football and so Kentucky will face a complete newcomer on its schedule for a fourth straight year. In 1958, the new face was Hawaii; in '59, it was Detroit; and last season's meeting with Florida State was also a first. Kentucky and Kansas State are not utter strangers, however, as the record shows three previous clashes in basketball—in 1939-40 at Lexington, 1940-41 at Manhattan, and 1951 at Minneapolis. Significantly, all three games resulted in UK victories and last one gave Adolph Rupp and crew their third NCAA title. Only other Kentucky football clash with a Big Eight school came in 1951 when UK achieved one of the most renowned victories in history with a monumental, 13-7 upset of Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl.

**LAST MEETING:** No previous games. At this point in the schedule last year, Kentucky crushed hapless Marshall by a 55-0 score in their first meeting since 1923. In the six other years of the Collier Era, Auburn was the foe at this stage.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** In one big word, the '61 grid outlook at Kansas State is "IMPROVED" and that may spell trouble for Kentucky or anyone else banking on an easy mark because the Manhattan Wildcats had their troubles last season (1-9 and cellar finish in conference). The ranks have been swelled by sophomores who are being counted on to bolster weak line spots of 1960 and add needed depth all around. As Coach Doug Weaver encouragingly states it: "We seem to have more men with good football instinct, native ability and aggressiveness." One big problem apparently due to continue to frustrate K State is a lack of speed. Last year, it contributed to the Wildcats being limited to an average of less than 100 yards a game rushing. Experienced punters and quarterbacks are missing, too. There's not one experienced man to handle the Wing T signal calling duty. Despite these shortcomings, there is cautious optimism that the sophomores and a few good experienced hands can get the job done. Best of the veterans are Al Kouneski, standout linebacker and offensive center; halfback Jack Richardson, top rusher of '60 with 5.8 yard average; and junior end Darrell Elder. Nineteen lettermen return, including seven first team regulars of 1960. If it has gotten past Miami in the season opener, Kentucky will be trying for its 19th straight win at the expense of non-SEC competition.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Inaugurated with a game at Baton Rouge in 1949, the Kentucky-Louisiana State grid series is the youngest rivalry within the Southeastern Conference. Eleven meetings make up the series which has been played annually with the exception of the 1951 season and the count is all even going into this year's renewal, each club boasting five wins and a 6-6 tie in 1953. The Billy Cannon-led Tigers, enjoying their greatest seasons during the 1957-59 period, overcame the Wildcats' 4-2-1 edge by taking three straight decisions in these years. Then UK rose to one of its peak performances of the season to even up the rivalry again with a 3-0 win last October. Although they are close friends, Collier and LSU Coach Paul Dietzel have something of a friendly personal rivalry going on the side. The Tiger mentor, an ex-UK aide under Paul Bryant and an unsuccessful applicant for the Kentucky job Collier got, shows a 4-2 edge since he became LSU boss in 1955. However, Collier has the last win and can point out he was beaten in '58 by the National Champion and in '59 picked up "Coach of the Week" honors in the SEC for a near-upset of the Cannon-led, nationally-third-ranked Tigers.

**LAST MEETING:** For the second straight year, Kentucky rose to perhaps its greatest height of the season and this time successfully turned back the invading Bengals by 3-0. The Wildcat defenders completely throttled LSU

and the game progressed into a bruising defensive battle until the final 2:32 when UK field goal specialist Clarkie Mayfield came off the bench to boot a 28-yarder through the uprights. One of the oddest plays of the season set up the field goal. On a fourth-and-one situation at the LSU 25, Kentucky's soph quarterback Jerry Woolum elected to gamble on a sneak for the key first down. He plunged into the middle of an unyielding Tiger line and seemingly was stopped short, but in the split second before the official could blow the ball dead tossed an improvised pitchout down the line of scrimmage. Sophomore halfback Gary Steward alertly gathered it in and moved forward to the 19 for the first down that led four plays later to the game-winning field goal.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** A hard-luck bunch that lost four games last season by a margin of 14 points, LSU should now be ready to generate the offensive punch that was lacking in the clutch a year ago. And, if the defense (which made the Bayou Bengals the nation's toughest team to score on) can perform again with the same degree of efficiency, LSU could be a threat to repeat their National Champion role of 1958. Most of the experts see the Bengals no worse than a close second within the powerful Southeastern Conference. Reasons behind this resurgence from an eighth place finish in the past season lie in comparatively insignificant losses off the club that wound up the '60 campaign with four straight wins after absorbing an equal number of setbacks in early season—one of them Kentucky's 3-0 decision. Only nine lettermen will be missing from the experience-rich, young club. Heading the returnees will be big, quick and powerful guard Roy Winston, halfbacks Wendell Harris and Jerry Stovall (42.1 punting average) and quarterback Lynn Amedee. Offensive system again will be Winged T.

**SERIES HISTORY:** Georgia and Kentucky began their rivalry on the football field with a game at Louisville on Oct. 21, 1939. The two schools met almost annually from that time until the series was broken off after the 1949 game and not resumed until 1956 with a game at Athens. During the 22 years that Wally Butts tutored the Bulldogs (he switched to full-time Athletic Director duties after the '60 season), Georgia laid claim to nine victories in the 14-game series. Kentucky took the initial game and tied the following year, but it was 1947 before it picked up another win. All told, UK shows but four victories with the last in 1956. Despite Georgia's superiority, the series generally has been interesting as reflected by the fact that Butts' four SEC championship outfits managed an average win margin of only 11 points over Kentucky.

**LAST MEETING:** The story of Georgia's 17-13 success in Lexington last season can be summed up as a case of Kentucky being unable to stand prosperity and the defending SEC Champion Bulldogs having to pull out all the stops to capitalize on and protect UK's gifts. The Wildcats scored

first midway through the opening period after a drive from the Georgia 18 following a fumble recovery. The Bulldogs immediately marched 78 yards to tie it up and, before the opening 15 minutes were up, had tacked on a field goal. A bad center pass on a punt attempt gave Georgia possession to set this up. After a scoreless second quarter, in which neither team could capitalize on the other's mistakes, the Bulldogs hit pay dirt again on a pass from Francis Tarkenton to Bill McKenney. Kentucky added six in the fourth on a 65-yard TD pass play from Jerry Woolum to Dave Gash. A two-point PAT aerial try was no good.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** The experts are predicting a rough initiation for new Head Coach Johnny Griffith, saying the Bulldogs are sure to finish deep in the SEC's second division. On paper, the problems look difficult as Georgia graduated T-quarterback Francis Tarkenton along with the league's leading receiver, halfback Fred Brown (who beat out UK's Hutchinson by one catch), and two-time punting leader Bobby Walden. Up front, the Bulldogs will be missing star guard Pat Dye and a couple of other regular hands. However, Georgia admits to expectations of a rugged eleven with improvement showing in the defense and in all phases of line play. Four regulars return from the No. 1 line unit of last year, headed by outstanding tackle and team captain Pete Case. Alternate Captain Bill McKenney, who caught two TD passes in last year's Kentucky game, returns at right half and teams with regular fullback Bill Godfrey to give Georgia a backeld nucleus to build on. Griffith expects to retain the Straight-T, Split-T offensive style used by his predecessor.

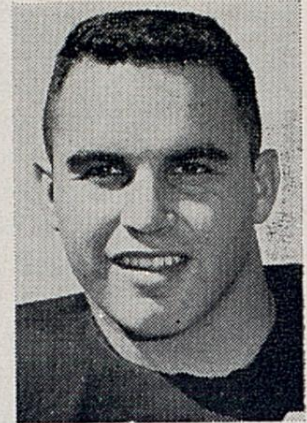

**SERIES HISTORY:** The Seminoles of Florida State, a fast-rising southern independent, became the newest Kentucky football rival when gridiron relations were inaugurated with a game at Tallahassee last October. Although UK had met other Florida teams (University of Florida and Miami), the only previous athletic relationship with Florida State had been in a basketball meeting at Lexington opening the 1958-59 season. The Seminoles have been playing football only 15 years, but are regarded as a coming power in the sport. Kentucky took the initial game last season by 23-0.

**LAST MEETING:** Facing the Seminoles for the first time in history last year, Kentucky turned Doak Campbell Stadium into a happy hunting ground and rang up a 23-0 win to spoil FSU's homecoming plans. The fired-up Wildcats, their comeback interrupted the week before by a four-point loss to Georgia, seemingly could do no wrong as they scored twice in the opening quarter, again in the second period and then got their final points in the fourth stanza with a field goal and pass interception return. The first TD



came as Calvin Bird raced around outflanked Seminole defenders to cap a 76-yard rive and quarterback Jerry Eisaman tossed a 37-yard pass to Tom Hutchinson in the end zone for the second period score. Then, in the final 15 minutes, Clarkie Mayfield added a 32-yard field goal and Hutchinson tipped a misdirected Florida State pass into the air at the 15, caught it on the 10 and raced unmolested into the end zone. FSU's furtherest penetration was to the Kentucky 22 and saw its sparkling record of not having been scored on in the second half go by the boards.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** Coach Bill Peterson's second edition of Seminoles look for better days this year than they had in 1960, although the record shows they dropped three games by a total margin of six points. Halfback Bud Whitehead, most valuable player and statistical leader of FSU, has departed along with 14 other lettermen, but the returning contingent of 20 experienced hands is promising. Best of the lot are likely to be quarterback Eddie Feely and end Fred Grimes and Coach Peterson, ex-LSU assistant, makes no secret of plans to fill the air with footballs. He apparently believes the aerial arm will be the best bet to gain ground against a formidable list of foes since a shortage exists on dependable halfback running talent. Peterson also has said he plans no changes in FSU's "flexible T" offense, mainly a wing T formation. If Kentucky has managed wins earlier in the season over Miami and Kansas State, it will be looking for a 20th straight non-conference win at the expense of Florida State.

\* \* \* \*

Today's game will be the highlight event of K Day activities. Former Wildcat gridiron lettermen will be on hand and a special 50th anniversary reunion of 1911 team members is planned.

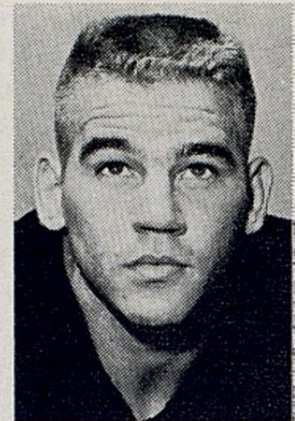

**SERIES HISTORY:** Kentucky and the Vanderbilt Commodores first got together on the gridiron way back in 1896 at Nashville and the rivalry has been perpetuated intermittently ever since with the result that it is one of the oldest in the South from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. History shows a record solidly in Vandy's favor—23 wins to Kentucky's seven and three ties. Vandy registered 12 shutouts in the first 26 years of the rivalry and UK did not get into the win column until 1939. However, the post-war record shows only four setbacks. Kentucky's 27-0 homecoming rout of the Commodores last season ended a three-year trend to close games.

**LAST MEETING:** Kentucky thrilled a chilled Stoll Field crowd with its 13th straight homecoming win and got back into the win column in the Vanderbilt series last year by trouncing the Commodores solidly, 27-0. Paced by the aerial team of Jerry Woolum to Tom Hutchinson and the running of veteran Charlie Sturgeon, the Wildcats slashed for 130 yards through the air and 214 on the ground while limiting Vandy to a total of 56 yards.

Achieving its fourth win in the last five starts, UK was never in difficulty as the Commodore line yielded for touchdowns to Sturgeon, Gary Cochran, Calvin Bird and Jim Fisher and the secondary failed to stop clutch passes. Vanderbilt was in Kentucky territory only three times.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** While the pre-season experts generally give Vandy little chance of finishing out of the SEC cellar again, the Commodores themselves are more enthusiastic and figure their chances good to turn the tables on some of the clubs who trounced them last season. Eleven lettermen were lost from the 1960 team, but among the record-sized group of 24 experienced men returning are 16 who have been starters at times during the past two seasons. Probably the biggest improvement will come in linebacking and end play. In the first category, much help is expected from Cody Binkley—a two-year starter voted in the Birmingham News poll as the SEC's prospective best linebacker. An ambitious, coast-to-coast schedule will not make improvement easy. Offensive system again will be "Variegated T."

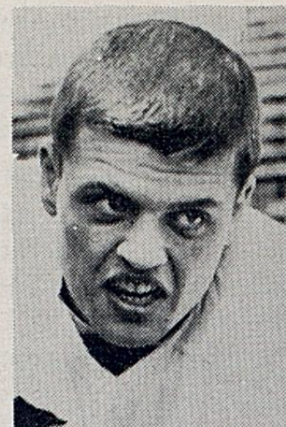

**SERIES HISTORY:** Kentucky and its neighbor to the north of the Mason-Dixon line have met on the gridiron 17 times with the initial contest taking place in 1935 at Cincinnati and the last at Lexington a year ago. The meeting in 1956 resumed the rivalry which had been interrupted after the 1949 renewal and contracts have been inked to extend the annual games through the 1961 season. The Muskies' lone triumph in their series with the Wildcats came in 1938 as they posted a 27-6 success at Cincinnati. Kentucky has taken all the others, generally by decisive scores. A 70-0 shellacking administered by UK in '46 stands as one of the biggest point-production efforts ever seen on Stoll Field. The record high is an 83-0 debacle involving hapless North Dakota in a 1950 meeting with one of UK's greatest teams.

**LAST MEETING:** Chalking up a 49-0 shellacking of a willing, but out-classed band of Musketeers last season in Lexington, Kentucky tied a modern school record for number of shutouts in one season at five, extended its

win string over non-conference opposition to 17 and recorded the second highest victory margin of the series. Stars of the second biggest win in 1960 were halfbacks Bill Ransdell, who posted three touchdowns, and Dave Chapman with two. While the score would indicate an offensive show, Kentucky's defense shined as well. Xavier did not get to run a single offensive plan in the first 8 minutes and its deepest penetration of the game was to the UK 26. The Muskies' feared passing ace, Ron Costello, was ineffective against Kentucky's pass defense which ranked fifth nationally at this time.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** Passing ace Ron Costello is gone and without him Coach Ed Doherty may have problems in bolstering Xavier's attack. Seventeen lettermen return to provide the nucleus of another dangerous outfit, however, and the Musketeers are reportedly better off in the depth department than at any time during the past half dozen years. Little Irv Etler (5-7, 181) will take over quarterbacking role in Doherty's special brand of T operations and the remainder of the starting backfield returns intact along with four line starters. Mainstay of the forward wall is 227-pound guard John Nelson, Xavier's candidate for All-America honors. Sophomores on whom much hope is pinned include Cincinnati transfer Jim Thrush, 226-pound tackle, and speedy halfback Jim Price.

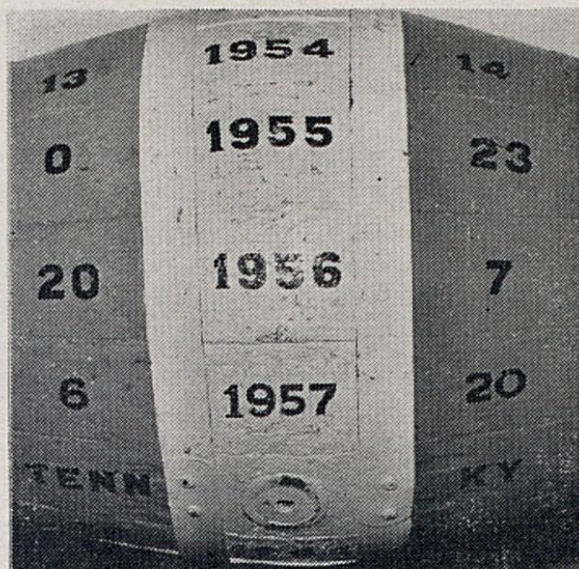

**SERIES HISTORY:** Among the six oldest football rivalries in the South, the Kentucky-Tennessee series dates from a memorable encounter in Knoxville 67 years ago. In that meeting, Oct. 21, 1893, the Wildcats annexed a 60-0 victory to get the warfare off to an auspicious start in a fashion that hasn't been equalled in the many and colorful renewals of the traditional rivalry. Except for three war years (1917-18 and 1943), the two schools have met annually on the gridiron with the result that the Vols hold a distinct-but-fading edge of 30 wins to Kentucky's 17 and nine ties. Tennessee's sparkling advantage has become tarnished in the past few seasons as Kentucky started reversing the victory trend with an upsetting tie in 1952 and ate into the Vols' polished record with successes in six of the last seven meetings. The seniors on the 1955 UK squad became the first class in 43 years to graduate with the accomplishment of never playing in a game in which the Vols emerged victorious and they bowed out in a blaze of glory,

triumphing to the tune of 23-0 over the bowl-hungry Vols in the most one-sided Kentucky win since 1935. Current Wildcat mentor Blanton Collier has enjoyed the greatest success of any UK coach against Tennessee, taking five decisions in seven tries and able to boast of losing but once (1956).



Since 1925, the two schools have stimulated their grid rivalry with a rotating trophy — a battered old beer barrel. Much shenanigans on the part of the rival student bodies have added to the color of the series. Following the 1953 UK win, disgruntled Tennessee students raided the Kentucky campus and “kegnapped” the barrel and held it in a secret hiding place in Knoxville until persuaded to return it by threats of reprisal against their coon dog mascot, Smoky. In 1955, UK students visited the Tennessee campus hiding place of Smoky and “dognapped” him. UT

students promptly retaliated by painting up the Kentucky campus in a surprise raid and carting away “Colonel,” UK’s stuffed wildcat mascot. A trade was engineered as an added attraction at the ’55 game. For a couple of years, things were comparatively quiet. Then the stunts erupted again in the 1958 renewal at Knoxville as Vol students caught a guard “napping” and slipped away with UK’s stuffed Wildcat. Despite promises to return it at halftime of a nationally-televised basketball game, the mascot wasn’t given back until nearly four months later. A post-game sidelight to Kentucky’s victory in 1959 saw a strange calm shattered by rioting UK students protesting a faculty refusal to reward the win with a traditional pre-Thanksgiving holiday. Up to 5,000 demonstrators and onlookers carried on for about four and one-half hours, marching on the UK president’s campus home and setting a bonfire at a main intersection in downtown Lexington. Last year at Knoxville, it was a post game fracas on the field that added fuel to the rivalry’s torrid history. Tennessee players, protesting UK quarterback Jerry Eisaman’s retention of the game ball he had possession of when the game ended in a 10-10 tie precipitated a “free for all” involving both players and spectators. The famed beer barrel, which had remained in hiding during “Tennessee week,” came up missing almost four months later under unusual circumstances. Vanderbilt students “kegnapped” the trophy in a surprise attempt to gain support of Vol fans for the Commodore basketball team which was meeting the Wildcats in Knoxville in a playoff for an NCAA Tournament berth. The stunt backfired, however, as UK won. Embarrassed Vandy students still had not returned the trophy several months later.

**LAST MEETING:** In the 56th game of the ancient series, Kentucky Coach Blanton Collier maintained his sparkling record against the Vols that has seen his seven teams beaten only once (1956). At the same time, he found little consolation in the 10-10 deadlock that resulted from the latest renewal. The feeling was prevalent that Kentucky was the stronger team this day and could have won with any semblance of good play in the first half. The final statistics told the story as the Wildcats failed to make a first down and netted only one yard the opening 30 minutes. Tennessee had cashed in first on a 23-yard field goal and before halftime had accumulated 10 points as star tailback Glenn Glass scored from the one after a 52 yard drive. The second half saw a complete reversal of form for both clubs. The seemingly-beaten Wildcats staged one of the greatest comebacks in series history to match Tennessee with first a touchdown march and then a field goal. After a Vol punt rolled dead on the six, QB Jerry Eisaman drove his club 94 yards in a steady march to score. Bill Ransdell plunged over with 55 seconds left in the third period and the PAT kick was good. The tying points came in the fourth quarter when Clarkie Mayfield connected on a 16-yard try from the field. The kick came at the end of a 70-yard drive highlighted by a long aerial from Eisaman to "Old Automatic" Tom Hutchinson, who made one of several great catches of the day.

**1961 OUTLOOK:** There's every indication that the Tennessee Vols of 1961 may come up with one of their best teams in recent years and rate as a serious contender for the conference crown. Twenty-five experienced hands return and a gang of eager sophomores admittedly are talented enough to "build a fire" under some of the veterans. Coach Bowden Wyatt frankly admits to the strong point of better depth than 1960—a situation that helped ease the unexpected loss to the pros of star tackle Ken Frost and should help the Vols over the hump of other unexpected setbacks. Most pre-season forecasts are pinpointing Tennessee to be among the top four teams in the SEC and one of the big reasons is the presence of one of the finest backs in Dixie, dazzling Single Wing tailback Glenn Glass. Other standouts include stellar center Mike Lucci, fullback J. W. Carter and blocking back Wayne Coleman.

## COLLIER GOES FROM SINGLE WING TO MULTIPLE T IN 30 YEARS' COACHING

Collier's football philosophy has varied little during more than 30 years of coaching experience. During his high school days at Paris, he taught the Single Wing system and didn't change over to the T formation until he was coaching the quarterbacks at Great Lakes during the war. He first gained experience with the "T" as a spectator during his boot camp training at Bainbridge, Md., and later while observing the pro Philadelphia Eagles of Greasy Neale. During his tenure as backfield tutor of the Cleveland Browns, he stressed the straight or "back-up" T formation. At Kentucky, he chose to utilize the Split T and plans to stick with the system this season with minor variations that make it a Multiple T now. He considers himself basically a running coach and attempts to keep a 60-40 balance in favor of the ground attack.

Lettered three years at Valley as an end . . . All-Jefferson County and honorable mention All-State . . . Moved to tackle as a UK freshman in 1959 . . . Good student.

**BUDDY BELL Soph. Tackle 6-0 220 18 (1/9/43) Louisville, Ky.**

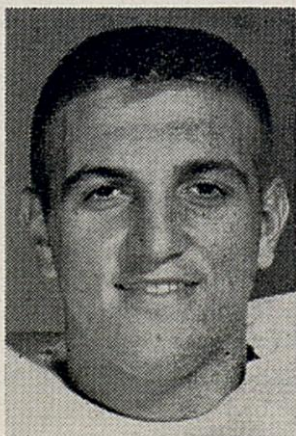
One of six Louisville-area representatives on the 1961 Wildcat roster, Bell is the only graduate of Eastern High and is determined to bring glory to his school before he's through at UK . . . He has trimmed down some from his freshman weight and can be expected to see reserve action in his first varsity season . . . Missed this spring's Blue-White contest due to a minor injury, but is due to be OK physically this fall . . . The big fellow was a second team All-State choice in football and named to the All-Jefferson County team three years running . . . His parents named him Harry.

**BILLY BIRD Soph. Halfback 5-11 170 21 (4/7/40) Corbin, Ky.**

One of the famed Corbin Bird boys who have made University of Kentucky their second home, Billy seeks to take up where brother Calvin (Wildcat halfback star who graduated last June to the San Diego Chargers) left off . . . Another brother, Jerry, starred with the UK basketeers a few years back and still another, highly-touted Roger, is ticketed for Kentucky when he finishes a stellar grid career at Corbin . . . A speedy, breakaway runner like Calvin, Billy likely will operate in a reserve role this season at Calvin's vacated left half position . . . Although proud of his brother's accomplishments, Billy is determined to be a good football player in his own right and turned in a good performance in the spring game . . . Looked good as a freshman last season . . . A four-sport, 12-letter star at Corbin High, the All-America-mentioned Bird set a state prep scoring record in 1959 with 66 points in one game . . . Had 172 for year to rank third in state.

**KEN BOCARD (Bo'-card) Soph. FB 5-10 190 19 (3/29/42) Ashland, Ky.**

Son of a former All-State basketballer, Ken (correctly it's Kendall) looms as one of the brightest newcomers in the Wildcat grid camp this season . . .



He turned in a terrific spring practice and capped it by becoming the second leading ground gainer of the winning Blues in the spring game on 32 yards in seven carries . . . After winning honorable mention All-State honor as a quarterback at Ashland High, Bocard was tried alternately at halfback and fullback as a Kentucky freshman last year . . . Saw some early duty at both positions again this spring, but his best position seems to be full and he's ticketed to be the number two man there . . . Development held back by slight injuries as a freshman, but he was one of hardest hitting backs in spring practice . . . Plans a business career after graduation.

**JOE BRANDEL** (*Bran'-dell*) Jr. T 6-2 208 21 (1/14/40) Hamilton, Ohio

A versatile football player who has found the road to varsity duty a rough one, Brandel gave indications in spring practice that his experience of three seasons at Kentucky may pay off this season . . . His high school experience at Hamilton (Ohio) Public was as an end, tackle and guard . . . Brandel was stationed at end as a UK freshman in '58, moved to tackle as a sophomore and red-shirted . . . Did not see action last year . . . Likely to see reserve left tackle duty in '61 . . . Married.

**TOMMY BRUSH** Junior Tackle 6-3 215 20 (7/21/41) Jenkins, Ky.

One of the biggest men on the team, this sizeable youngster showed up real well in spring practice and should be ready this season to lend important help at tackle . . . He was a right side tackle reserve in '60 with total action time of 46:28 in seven games . . . Tommy won 13 letters as an all-sports standout at Jenkins High . . . Captained his high school football team and won All-State honors . . . Picked up a freshman numeral at UK two years back, but did not see enough action last season to letter.

**PERKY BRYANT** Soph. Fullback 5-9 190 19 (2/13/42) Everts, Ky.

As a Kentucky freshman halfback last season, Perky showed promise of developing into one of the most dependable young backs available to Coach Blanton Collier in 1961 . . . He was runner-up in rushing for the Kittens with 116 yards on 25 carries for a 4.6 average . . . In a game against the Cincinnati Frosh, he broke away on a 34-yard run that proved to be the longest run from scrimmage by any UK frosh back last year . . . Picked up 13 letters as a four-sport star at Everts, captained the footballers and won honorable mention All-State . . . Missed spring practice as result of brief absence . . . Now listed as a fullback and could move up fast . . . His given name is Charles Verlin, but he's known as "Perky."

**BOB BUTLER** Senior Tackle 6-1 225 20 (10/27/40) Madisonville, Ky.

Number one right tackle of the Wildcats last season, Butler started every game and turned in a total of 305:27 action time that qualifies him as potentially one of the top linemen of the conference this year . . . Bob is one of the hardest workers on the squad, but never the flashy type while getting a good job done . . . Almost equally at home on offense and defense . . . One of only four UK linemen with two varsity letters to their credit, he will carry a big responsibility and his coaches are counting on strong leadership from the serious-minded, quiet Butler . . . Excels as a blocker . . . Also a threat as a place kicker, he made the only PAT kick he tried last year and two out of two in '59 . . . Kicks off at times and has power for field goal attempts . . . Won All-State honors and mention on the schoolboy All-America team as an outstanding end and halfback at Madisonville High . . . Also was leading scorer of high school cage team, centerfielder in baseball and shot putter in track to pick





up total of 11 letters . . . His apprenticeship as a Kentucky freshman in '58 was served as an end and he shifted to tackle as a sophomore . . . Saw 165:48 action time in all 10 games as a soph reserve tackle . . . A brother, Ron, entered UK last February and went through spring practice preparatory to playing with the Kittens this fall.

**DENNY CARDWELL Soph. Halfback 6-2 175 19 (4/21/42) Louisville, Ky.**

A former Louisville Trinity High standout quarterback, Cardwell was impressive as a Kentucky freshman last fall and as a prospective varsity halfback this spring . . . UK coaches are high on the potential of this boy, particularly for his defensive ability . . . Although a quarterback as a schoolboy and UK yearling, he was used mostly at right half this spring and is likely to play that position this season . . . He had no offensive record as a sub quarterback for the Kittens . . . Honorable mention All-State footballer, pole vaulter and hurdler in track and cage player at Trinity.

**DON CARSON Junior Halfback 5-11 178 21 (9/24/40) Oneida, Tenn.**

One of five Tennesseans on the current Kentucky varsity squad, Carson seeks to become the first Oneida athlete ever to earn an athletic letter at UK . . . He saw only brief (7:13 total) action in three games last fall as a sophomore—not enough to pick up letterman status—after being held out of competition in 1959 . . . Carson had a good spring practice and should be ready for more extensive duty this season, probably at right half . . . Best defensively . . . Played four years at quarterback with Oneida High and the same position as a UK yearling.

**MEL CHANDLER Senior Guard 6-1 205 21 (8/24/40) Corbin, Ky.**

Although handicapped by an elbow dislocated in the Ole Miss game last year and a later bruise to the elbow in the Vandy game, Chandler was a real tough customer to handle when physically fit . . . Missed three games following first injury, but alternated at number one right guard for four starts and total action time of 161 minutes . . . With experience of two good varsity seasons under his belt and a good spring practice showing, Chandler is expected to rank as top man at right guard in '61 . . . Mel is the hard-nose type and rated by his coaches as the squad's best defensive guard . . . He's a product of Corbin High School, which produced graduated halfback star Cal Bird along with present teammates Billy Bird and Fred Rader . . . Football was his only sports activity as a schoolboy and he excelled at it, notching All-State, All-Southern honors and mention in 1957 on the All-America team as an end and guard . . . Comparatively unimpressive as a UK yearling in 1958, but found the spark of consistency during his soph campaign . . . Looked good in reserve right guard role while totaling 102:10 action time in nine games.



**DAVE CHAPMAN Senior Halfback 5-11 170 22 (11/25/38) Richmond, Ind.**

One of three Indiana high school products on the current varsity roster, Chapman came to the Wildcats in 1958 after a brief stay at Purdue . . . The former schoolboy All-America quarterback, who was ineligible under transfer rules in '58 and was red-shirted in '59, saw his first action in a Kentucky uniform last season as a reserve right halfback . . . Failed to see enough duty (32:57 in four games) to letter, but came back this spring to turn in his best performance since he has been at Kentucky . . . Operated some in spring at left side and may be a key swing man this fall . . . Picked up 46 yards on three carries and caught four passes for 110 yards and two TD's last season . . . Long play was 52 yard pass catch.

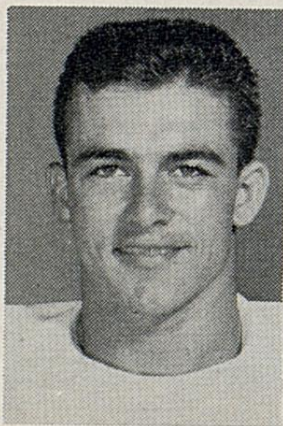
**GARY COCHRAN Senior Fullback 5-11 200 21 (2/8/40) Etowah, Tenn.**

Although he lists Etowah, Tenn., as his current home town, Cochran is a native of Kentucky (born in Corbin) and educated within the state's borders (Ft. Thomas Highlands) . . . His father is a railroad employee in the Tennessee city . . . The solidly-built young man will carry a big burden in the power and defensive departments this season as the lone letterman at his position . . . As number two fullback last year, "Bull" turned in a creditable offensive ledger of 194 yards on 35 trips for a 5.5 average that ranked him fourth among UK backs . . . Also came a long way defensively and in his blocking . . . His action time totaled 138:22 in all 10 games with two starts . . . As a soph, Cochran alternated at the number two fullback spot and had 108 yards to his credit during 61:51 action in eight games . . . Never a starter . . . Broken wrist in his freshman year handicapped his development . . . As a schoolboy fullback at Ft. Thomas, Gary posted a sparkling 10.3 rushing average and led his team in scoring . . . Earned second team All-State.



**DARRELL COX Soph. Halfback 5-8 172 20 (2/20/41) Miami, Fla.**

A widely-sought, highly-touted schoolboy All-America star, Cox eliminated any doubts as to his qualifications by outstanding performances as a Kentucky freshman last season and this spring . . . The former Miami Edison High standout led the UK yearlings in rushing (147 yards on 29 carries for 4.6 average), punting (37-yard average), kickoff returns (3 for 62 yards) and punt returns (3 for 88 yards) . . . One of his most sensational showings came in a brilliant, 63-yard scoring runback of a punt against the Vandy frosh . . . Also was second in pass receiving and kicked four PAT's . . . In support of the belief that there is little that he can't do well, Darrell highlighted a fine spring practice showing by turning in some near-sensational defensive secondary work despite the obvious disadvantage of a lack of size . . . He's likely to start out the season as the alternate at left half with more experienced Bill Ransdell and is



expected to come along fast . . . Coach Collier calls Cox the best punter on the team and probably will "wild card" him into the game on some kicking situations when he is not already in . . . Although he is a natural left-hander, Cox kicks right footed . . . The boy has exceptional speed and, coupled with the fact that he is built so low to the ground, is difficult to bring down in open territory . . . He was Most Valuable Player in Miami area and Florida's top prep scorer with a record 167 points . . . Gained 1,482 for undefeated team . . . All-State and All-America . . . Won Outstanding Player award in high school North-South Game as picked up 147 yards on 21 carries.

**KARL CRANDALL** Soph. Halfback 6-1 194 18 (11/13/42) Millerburg, Ohio

Moved to halfback this spring after freshman year duty as an end and fullback, Crandall emerged as one of the squad's more promising young backs and should see extensive reserve action if his improvement continues . . . May alternate between right half and fullback . . . Showed no statistical record as a freshman . . . Born in Akron, Ohio, but now calls Millersburg home town . . . As a schoolboy, he played end-fullback in football, served as co-captain of both gridgers and cage team and was four-event track man . . . Celebrates his 19th birthday week of the Xavier game.

**JERRY DICKERSON** Senior Guard 6-0 205 22 (9/2/39) South Point, Ohio

This husky product of Ohio high school ranks is a prime example of unselfish willingness to sacrifice the headlines a backfield man gets to perform in the line for the good of the team . . . Jerol,



or Jerry as he is popularly known to teammates and Wildcat fans, was a star halfback during prep days at South Point (Ohio) High . . . He captained his team and attained All-South mention . . . Dickerson remained at halfback as a UK freshman in '57, but switched to guard to help the team cause when he returned to the squad in '59 after a year's absence . . . He insists that he has never regretted the move and Kentucky fans recognize him as one of the top linemen on the team . . . Saw 215:10 action time as a sophomore two years back and accumulated 259:39 in all 10 games last season while alternating as a starter between left and right guard . . . Ranks as the No. 1 left guard candidate going into the current

season . . . Married . . . Born Huntington, W. Va. . . Pitched for high school baseball team and was high point man in track, setting records in 440 and hurdles.

**HOWARD DUNNEBACKE** (*Dunn'-e-back*) Soph. FB 5-8 181 20 (7/16/41)

Oak Ridge, Tenn.

One of the toughest men on the Wildcat squad and a real hard-nose type who loves defensive contact despite lack of size. Dunnebacke is being counted on to see a lot of service at fullback this year . . . He is a good linebacker (possibly one of the smallest in the SEC) and likely will be spotted in defensive situations for the most part . . . But he can lug the leather too and ranks about No. 3 in the overall fullback picture . . . Born

in Nashville, Tenn., but attended high school in Oak Ridge where his father is an IBM operator . . . High school team used Single Wing . . . Playing halfback and fullback as a UK freshman in '59, Howard was second leading ground gainer with 72 yards on 20 carries for 3.6 average . . . Held out of competition last year . . . Married.

**WAYNE DIXON Senior Tackle 6-0 219 21 (2/19/40) East Point, Ky.**

One of only three experienced hands at tackle, Dixon again this season will find himself cast in a pressure-filled role of key reserve duty or alternate starter status . . . The big Eastern Kentucky product appears to have the physical qualifications and determination to be a big asset in line plans and could make a big mark if he continues to improve as he did last season . . . Operated extensively as tackle reserve in 1960, mostly on right side, for total action time 195:36 in all 10 games . . . As a sophomore, he accumulated only 51:45 action in six games . . . Comes from a family of fine athletes . . . Brothers played football and basketball at other colleges . . . Father is a coal miner . . . Wayne won 11 letters in four sports at Prestonsburg High . . . Tutored in football by ex-Wildcats John Griggs and Doc Ferrell . . . Third team All-State pick at center . . . Switched to tackle at UK.



**BOB FARRELL Junior Center 6-4 197 21 (1/12/40) Cincinnati, Ohio**

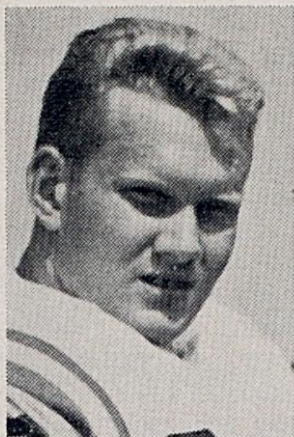
One of eight Ohio high school products on the Wildcat varsity this season, Farrell is the lone Cincinnati representative . . . He was a top-notch tackle and linebacker while playing four years at Cincinnati Elder High . . . Converted to center after brief try as an end as a UK freshman in '58 . . . Injuries have hampered his development into the strong player he is potentially able to become . . . A recurring ankle injury caused him to be held out in his first varsity year . . . He saw 40:47 action in four games as an alternate No. 2 center last season . . . Further minor injuries plagued him this spring, but he should be ready . . . Also a baseball pitcher of note in high school, winning seven straight for state champion team.

**DAN HALEY Junior End 6-1 190 20 (9/15/40) Pineville, Ky.**

In the past seven and one-half years of his prep and collegiate football career, Haley has played just about every position there is and generally looked pretty good anywhere he was stationed . . . During four years at Pineville High, he was a tackle and won All-State honorable mention . . . As a UK freshman in 1958, Haley switched to end and showed promise . . . During his initial varsity season two years back, he was tried at halfback, then fullback and later at guard while being held out . . . Spent another year on the red-shirts last season as a guard and this spring moved over to end . . . Leading scorer in conference as schoolboy basketball player . . . Good student in Engineering.

**DAVE GASH Junior End 6-2 190 22 (11/11/38) Louisville, Ky.**

Along with teammate Tom Hutchinson, this boy will give Kentucky one of the most feared end combos in the Southeastern Conference this season . . .



Gash led Hutch a merry chase most of last year for pass receiving leadership of the league before finishing in sixth place with 19 catches for 293 yards . . . Only one other player, besides Hutchinson, returns with better credentials than Gash for top contention in this department of SEC play . . . A converted fullback and self-made man, who picked up a lot of confidence and developed real well last season, Gash was honored on several All-Conference Sophomore teams and should be a strong candidate to move up this season to All-SEC laurels . . . Expected to continue to hold down the regular left end job that he performed so efficiently last season . . . Started nine games and posted third highest action time total of 366:45 in 10 games . . .

He was on the receiving end of a 65-yard touchdown pass in the Georgia game for his only scoring venture and the longest aerial shot of the year . . . The blonde-thatched former Louisville Shawnee star fullback stood out as a UK freshman in '58, leading the Kittens in ground gained with 111 yards in three games . . . Spent a year on the red-shirts in 1959 by design . . . Gash, who was born in Mercer County, Ky., also led his high school team in scoring with 114 points, captained the team and achieved second team All-State honors . . . Due to celebrate his 23rd birthday on the day of the Vanderbilt game, Nov. 11. (LATE NOTE: Gash suffered a back injury on a summer job with a construction company near his home town and the extent-effect was not known at press time in late August.)

**IRVIN GOODE (Good'-e) Sr. Center 6-5 220 20 (10/12/40) Florence, Ky.**

Widely regarded as one of the top centers in the Southeastern Conference, Goode also is the "apple" of pro scouts' eyes because of his good size,



tremendous linebacking ability and adeptness as a ball snapper and blocker in an offensive role . . . He was tabbed three years ago as one of the best blocking centers ever to play for Kentucky and has materially improved since that time to the point where he enters the '61 campaign rated as one of the South's best all-around linemen . . . Averages 100 percent on his blocking assignments at least three out of five times . . . Although he rarely makes the spectacular play that pinpoints attention on himself, Irv almost always turns in one of the top all-around games of anybody on the field . . . One of his best efforts last season came against National Champion Mississippi as he was credited with being in on 23 tackles and turned in an outstanding offensive game as well during 42 minutes of action . . .

He hasn't missed a game in two varsity seasons . . . Earned two varsity letters . . . Played only two years of high

school ball at Boone County, but captained team and won honors ranging from All-State to All-America mention . . . Two seasons back, Goode, posted a total of 203:51 action time in 10 games as a top reserve center and last season had the second highest total of playing time with 369:45 and started in all 10 games . . . Born in Newport, Ky., and will celebrate his 21st birthday two days before the Kansas State game this fall.

**JUNIOR HAWTHORNE Jr. Tackle 6-1 222 22 (11/12/38) Pomeroy, Ohio**

One of the best defensive men in the league, Hawthorne almost never got an opportunity to show his true potential with regular duty last season . . . He was slotted at a guard spot as the season opened and, despite showing fast development during a year on the red-shirts in '59, was scheduled for reserve duty behind ace linebacking guard Lloyd Hodge . . . Fate came to his rescue, however, as regular left tackle Bob Hunt was injured in the season opener and Hawthorne was moved over to start the next game against Ole Miss . . . He looked good and started at the post during the remainder of the season, piling up 275:28 action time . . . Mentioned on the All-SEC Sophomore Team . . . Hawthorne was a tackle and fullback at Pomeroy High, captained his team two years and was named to the prep All-America . . . He's a good blocker, but at his best defensively and a hard man to keep out of opponents' backfields when



he barrels in behind 222 pounds of weight . . . His real given name is Pearl, but prefers Junior . . . Celebrates a birthday day after Vandy game.

**RAY HEFFINGTON Soph. Guard 6-0 198 18 (12/22/42) Cadiz, Ky.**

Converted from his high school fullback role to center as a Kentucky freshman last season, this former Trigg County High luminary looked good defensively in his initial experience at collegiate competition against the Vanderbilt freshmen . . . Then he had the misfortune to suffer a broken leg on the opening kick off of the Kitten's next game against the Baby Vols of Tennessee . . . Recovery has been a slow process and he layed out of rough work this spring on advice of team physician . . . Probably will be red-shirted this year to assure full recovery . . . Switched from center to guard this spring . . . Played under his father, an ex-UK gridder himself, at Trigg County.

**JOHN HELMERS Soph. Halfback 6-0 180 19 (8/9/42) Owensboro, Ky.**

Another Wildcat with great ambition, Helmerts has his sights set on a great career in football at UK and later on a degree in Law and politics . . . The speedy Western Kentucky product has seen his football ambitions held back by injuries, but will likely see some reserve service at right half this season while picking up additional grid savvy . . . He was a third team All-State selection and All-South mention while playing under ex-Wildcat Ralph Genito at Owensboro High . . . Posted a 10.1 rushing average . . . Good on defense . . . He was president of student body at Owensboro and an honor graduate.

**JIM HILL** Junior Guard 6-1 195 22 (5/13/39) Neon, Ky.

Much more important action appears in store for this red-headed, aggressive young man this season . . . After laying out of competition in 1959 to pick up additional gridiron know-how and allow a fractured thumb to heal, he earned his first varsity letter last year . . . Alternated at the line-backing left guard post, starting two games and piling up 132:36 action time in seven contests . . . He had a particularly good spring practice and is being counted on heavily to provide experienced depth at guard . . . Mentioned on the All-America and All-South units and was a first team All-State choice while playing fullback at Fleming High in Neon . . . Captain of football team and winner of 12 letters in four sports . . . As a Kentucky freshman, he was a right halfback and led the club in pass receiving and punt returns besides shining on defense.

**TOM HUTCHINSON** Junior End 6-1 189 20 (6/15/41) New Albany, Ind.

One of the country's leading pass receivers as a sophomore last season, Kentucky's stellar flankman Tom Hutchinson aims at another assault on the



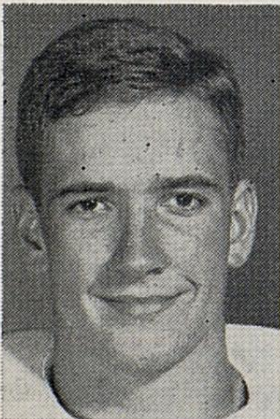
record books with unusual credentials as the lone returning SEC player with All-Conference first team honors under his belt . . . Pre-season polls have already marked him to repeat for All-SEC honors and voted him the league's best pass receiver-offensive end . . . He captained last year's All-SEC Sophomore Team and was the only non-senior on the first unit All-SEC . . . His 30 catches for 455 yards and four touchdowns paced the tough Southeastern Conference most of last season before he was beaten out in the final week (after Kentucky had finished its schedule) by one catch . . . He ranked eighth nationally in pass receiving and there's great confidence that this tremendous athlete is headed for greatness . . . Opposing players and coaches say that Hutch's greatest

attribute is his agility downfield in running pass routes in a deceptive manner that makes him almost impossible to cover . . . He'll either outrun, outfake or outjump defenders to make catches . . . The best description of his ability is that he normally runs a deceptively lazy route that lulls the unthinking defender into complacency and then turns on a blazing burst of speed to get into the open in that split second necessary to get a pass thrown in his direction . . . A star high jumper in track as well as a dashman, Hutchinson is extremely agile and possesses an uncanny ability to get to a pass . . . And he can run with the ball after he gets it . . . Generally overlooked is his strong blocking and defensive ability which are steadily improving . . . No finer example of his all-around ability presented itself than the final game of last season against traditional rival, Tennessee . . . Hutchinson turned in a tremendous performance to materially aid his team's second-half comeback for a 10-10 tie . . . Besides doing a splendid job of blocking, "Old Automatic" (as Knoxville sportswriters dubbed him) caught four key passes that gained 71 yards . . . His greatest effort of the day was the clutch catch of an aerial from quarterback Jerry Eisaman late in the fourth quarter that gained 39 yards and set up Kentucky's tying field

goal . . . On the play, he completely outwitted Tennessee's Bill Majors (considered the SEC's outstanding safetyman) to get open and then had to put on the brakes and come back up field a few yards to make a sensational catch of an underthrown pass . . . Although he never started a game, Hutch piled up a total of 207:30 action time in all games last season and tied for the team scoring leadership with 30 . . . He's due to operate as the No. 1 man on right side this year after seeing most of his duty at left end behind Dave Gash in '60 . . . Observers are freely predicting, on the basis of his anticipated improvement and more experience on the part of tosser Jerry Woolum, that Hutchinson will surpass the school record of 38 catches in one season . . . The mark is owned by All-America Steve Meilinger and came in 11 games of the 1951 season . . . Although he was hampered by a sprained ankle midway of spring practice, Hutch turned in a fine performance in the Blue-White Game, catching four Woolum aerials for 60 yards and getting open numerous other times when the ball was not headed in his direction . . . Right after the football game, he drove all night to participate in the SEC track meet at Auburn, Ala., and high jumped 6-4 to tie for fourth . . . Paced the UK track team in points last season as a five-event man . . . As a UK freshman, Hutch provided indications of greatness to come by leading Kittens in pass receiving (11-136-3 TD's in three games) and scoring . . . During prep days at New Albany High, he was recognized as one of the finest all-around athletes in the state—starring in football, track and basketball . . . All-State gridder and state champion high jumper . . . Born in nearby Stanford, Ky., and has unusual hobby of bee keeping.

**ELMER JACKSON** Soph. Quarterback 6-0 180 19 (1/13/42) Danville, Ky.

An intelligent youngster with fine powers of concentration on the fundamentals of his position and a real tough competitor, Jackson is going to be hard to keep out of the lineup . . . He may be ready for important varsity duty this season after coming very fast in spring practice and Coach Collier has said he "would not hesitate to use him early next year if needed" . . . Shows a great potential that might be best served by an added year of experience with the red-shirts, but the move might also be too "expensive" . . . Elmer reminds many sideline observers of ex-Wildcat quarterback Bob Hardy in that he does not possess great speed and exceptional natural ability for the position, but he gets the job done (moving the team) with intelligence, concentration and inner toughness . . . Good passer, punter and field general . . . Led freshmen in passing . . . Born in Hazard, Ky., and won honorable mention All-State two years as a quarterback at Danville High.



**NEIL JAMES** Soph. Halfback 6-0 177 18 (11/26/42) Cleveland, Ohio

Although he played only two years of prep football at Cleveland's John Marshall High, James looked impressive as a quarterback and landed second team All-State honors as well as All-City selection . . . Completed 49 of 95 passes for 905 yards and starred as a high jumper in track . . . Played



quarterback (No. 1 man at times) with UK freshmen last season, completing two of eight tosses for 53 yards and rushing for 26 additional yards on nine carries . . . Switched to halfback in spring practice, but may also play some at quarterback . . . Born in Lakewood, Ohio, and plans a career in industrial management . . . Turns 19 the day after Tennessee game.

**JIM JARRETT** Soph. End 6-2 195 19 (4/25/42) Charleston W. Va.

Only representative of the neighboring state of West Virginia on the '61 Kentucky varsity, Jarrett joined the Wildcats last year with the reputation as one of the state's top gridders . . . Not only did this 6-2, 195-pound end make West Virginia's first honor squad but also was on the first All-Southern team . . . In addition, he was left fielder on Stonewall Jackson's 1959 state baseball champs and starred on the track team . . . Played left end as a UK freshman.

**MARSHALL JOHNSON** Junior Guard 6-0 195 20 (1/24/41) Lancaster, Ky.

After experience at Lancaster High as an end, center, tackle and quarterback, "Whitey" (his blonde hair is very light) was tried at the guard position when he reported as a Kentucky freshman in 1959 . . . The shift has paid off as Johnson proved impressive as a Kitten starter and as a key left side reserve in his first varsity campaign last year . . . Saw 91:32 action time in five contests and should be ready for more extensive work this year . . . Made the All-State honorable mention list twice in football . . . Valedictorian of graduating class . . . Marshall has ambitions to become a doctor . . . Born Edmonton, Ky.

**JON JURGENS** Senior Guard 6-4 201 20 (12/16/40) Newport, Ky.

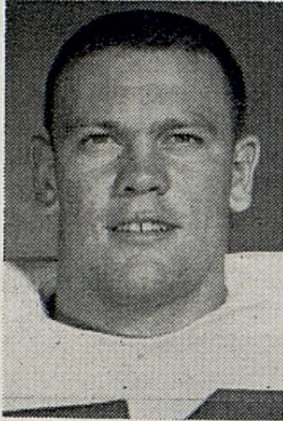
One of the best defensive operatives on the squad, Jurgens should see much more action in a more important reserve capacity this season . . . It's possible he will rank as the No. 2 man at right guard after showing up well in spring practice . . . Jurgens is at his best barreling in on opponent passers . . . Biggest of the guard corps at 6-4 and 201, Jon (he dorps the usual "h") picked up a varsity letter last season while seeing 74:53 action time in eight contests at right guard . . . Played tackle in high school at Newport Catholic, captained the team and made the All-State honorable mention list . . . Converted to guard as a UK freshman . . . **BOB KOSID** (*Kah'-sid*) Soph. HB 5-10 183 19 (2/27/42) Glenview, Ill.

One of two foreign-born players on the Wildcat varsity (Riveiro is the other), Kosid lists Brandon, Manitoba, Canada, as his birthplace . . . The native Canadian came fast toward the end of spring practice, showing fine improvement over his freshman campaign in which he carried the ball only six times for 22 yards . . . Played high school ball at Glenbrook in Glenview, Ill., as a left half and was leading scorer (72 points) on his team . . . Most Valuable Player and special mention All-State . . . High point man in track as dashman . . . Likely to operate as left half reserve, same position he played as UK freshman . . . Good tackler.

**BOBBY LEE** Soph. Guard 5-11 218 19 (10/22/41) Ashland, Ky.

One of the most promising young interior linemen in the Wildcat camp, Bobby has quick reactions, good size, fine speed and tremendous natural ability that should make him a valuable man to have around . . . Could rank as high as No. 2 man at right guard this season if he continues progress shown this spring and as freshman . . . No. 1 left guard as a Kitten . . . In his prep days at Ashland, Lee won first team All-State honors as a guard and tackle . . . Also mention on units of the All-Southern and All-America squads . . . After graduation, this sizeable youngster—heaviest of the guard candidates at 218—hopes to play pro ball and then enter the coaching profession . . . Born in Catlettsburg, Ky., and celebrates his birthday on the day following the LSU game.



**SHELBY LEE** Soph. Quarterback 6-2 185 19 (2/4/42) Miami, Fla.

Taking up where he left off while compiling a county TD pass record as star quarterback at Miami (Fla.) Edison High, Shelby Lee turned in a terrific first season as a collegian last year by pacing the UK Kittens in passing yardage . . . Picked up 95 yards on seven completions in 12 tries during the freshman unit's three-game schedule . . . His longest toss of 1960 was a 35 yarder in the Kittens' 34-6 romp over Vanderbilt Freshmen and he also recorded two TD's passing in this season opener . . . He'll rank high in the quarterback picture this season . . . Lee was a teammate of two other current Wildcats (halfback Darrell Cox and guard Kenny Willits) at Miami Edison . . . In starring at quarterback and tossing for 11 touchdowns, Shelby won All-City honors . . . Captained both the grid and cage teams and was All-City in baseball . . . Undecided between law career and coaching.

**CLARK MAPLES** Soph. Tackle 6-1 200 18 (4/11/43) Murfreesboro, Tenn.

One of seven Tennesseans who got away from the Vols, Roger Clark Maples is a star graduate of Murfreesboro Central High . . . Besides laying claim to being a good student both in the classroom and on the field, Clark captained his prep team and was an All-Conference choice in football plus an outstanding player in basketball and a 10-4 baseball pitcher . . . Operated as an end and tackle on high school Single Wing team . . . Switched to guard as UK freshman and played on the left side until injured late in the season at a time when he was progressing rapidly . . . Moved back to tackle at start of spring practice . . . Member National Honor Society . . . Studying Agriculture.

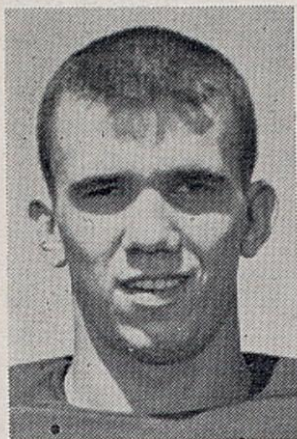
**PHIL MARTIN** Soph. Tackle 6-2 205 18 (10/10/42) North Canton, Ohio

After schoolboy duty as a guard and Kentucky freshman team experience as a center, Martin this spring was shifted to tackle where UK coaches hope to make the fullest possible use of his size and particular attributes . . . He attended Hoover High in North Canton and learned his football under

his father, Coach Don Martin . . . An All-County second team choice, he also was named "Most Valuable Defensive Player" for his team . . . Also a heavyweight wrestler and track standout as a schoolboy . . . Celebrates a birthday the week of the Kansas State game.

**CLARKIE MAYFIELD Junior Halfback 6-1 184 19 (10/11/41) Alva, Ky.**

Mayfield's educated toe has made him one of the most talked about Wildcats in recent years, but he is far from satisfied yet—and not for the



reason you might think . . . Although his field goal kicking won the LSU game and achieved a tie against Tennessee and he ranked 21st nationally in scoring by kicking, Mayfield won't be entirely satisfied until he unleashes his full offensive self . . . For this reason, the determined former Black Star High ace is likely to see more than just spot place kicking duty this season . . . He has pretty good speed and maneuverability and looked good carrying the ball in spring practice as a left half . . . Mayfield's kicking record last season saw him try five from the field and make three—a 28-yarder vs. LSU, 32 vs. Florida State and 26 vs. Tennessee . . . Also booted 17 out of 20 extra points . . . Action time totaled only 13:38 in eight games and he carried the ball only once, gaining

three yards in the Marshall game . . . Letterman Mayfield checked his credentials as a freshman with four out of five conversions and a pair of field goals . . . Third team All-State as schoolboy . . . Captained both football and basketball teams, played baseball . . . Birthday comes week of Kansas State game.

**STEVE MCGEE Soph. Center 6-2 205 19 (2/10/42) Ashland, Ky.**

Although he is the least experienced of the center corps, everyone is banking on this fine looking youngster from Ashland to make a place for himself at center . . . He was the number one center of the UK freshmen at the end of last season and could rank as high as No. 3 this year with determination . . . Under Coach Rex Miller at Ashland, he played three years as a center and won honorable mention on the All-State team . . . Voted "Outstanding Lineman" of the Tomcats and took fifth in the state high jump . . . Has plans to become dentist.

**BILL McMANIGAL Soph. Fullback 6-1 188 19 (2/10/42) Lexington, Ky.**

Only Lexington high school product on the varsity squad, McManigal is the first local boy since Doug Shively of Lafayette joined the team in 1955 and went on to become Co-Captain of the Wildcats and a stellar end . . . He also is the first product of the Lexington junior high grid program to play collegiate ball . . . Led Lafayette and city in scoring his senior year of '59 with 82 points from his fullback position . . . Although he never played defense until his senior high school year, Mac was a standout defensively as well and twice made the honorable mention list All-State . . . Fourth in rushing as UK freshman last year, averaging 3.1 yards per try on 14 trips for 43 yards . . . Kicked one PAT . . . Should see reserve action at fullback.

**BENNY MONROE** Soph. Quarterback 6-1 174 19 (12/2/41) Athens, Tenn.

Another Tennessee import who holds the unusual distinction of being named on the honorable mention list of the prep All-America squad without first making All-State . . . For his outstanding quarterback play at McMinn County High, during which he set a school record with 1,035 yards gained, he achieved All-East Tennessee and All-Conference recognition . . . Tossed 15 touchdowns and had 85 completions . . . His only completed pass try as a Kentucky yearling last season was a 44-yarder for a touchdown in the season opener against the Vanderbilt Frosh . . . It stood up as the longest pass play of the Kittens' year . . . Alternated at halfback some during spring practice . . . Might be held out to improve his academic standing and pick up grid savvy . . . Born Isabella, Tenn.

**JOE MORAJA** (*Mo-ray'-jah*) Jr. T 6-1 215 21 (1/14/40) Springfield, Ky.

Experience of three collegiate seasons, including a year on the red-shirts in 1959, and in-born potential should put Moraja in good shape to see much more important reserve action this year . . . "J.C.," as he is known to his teammates, backed up left tackle last season with action time of 15:30 in two games . . . Failed to letter . . . Almost equally at home on offense or defense, he plays on the right side this year . . . Prior to entering UK in 1958, he played four years of football at St. Joe Prep in Bardstown, Ky., as a tackle . . . Captain and honorable mention All-State.

**JOHN MUTCHLER** Junior Center 6-3 200 19 (9/11/41) Paducah, Ky.

This rangy footballer alternated as Kentucky's number two center last season and was improving fast at season's end . . . The coaching staff is looking for a lot of help from John this year . . . Must avoid costly injuries which have hampered his development somewhat . . . An outstanding line-backer as well as an offensive center, he intercepted two passes last season and had a 13 yard runback against Auburn on one of them . . . Earned his varsity letter while seeing 169:18 action time in all 10 games . . . Mentioned on the All-SEC Sophomore team . . . He was a second string All-State selection while starring at end for Paducah Tilghman High . . . Converted to center as a UK freshman and almost immediately picked up regular duties . . . Born in Scottsville, Ky., and celebrates his birthday during second week of pre-season practice.

**GARY MYERS** Soph. Guard 6-0 215 18 (10/15/42) Knoxville, Tenn.

Another Tennessee "escapee" (one of seven), Gary joins the Wildcat varsity after schoolboy experience at Knoxville West High where he attained All-City honors two years . . . Prep positions included tries as guard, tackle and end . . . As a Kentucky freshman last season, Myers picked up starting duties at right guard against the Baby Vols . . . He is likely to see reserve action at the same position in his first varsity campaign . . . Although Knoxville is present home town, Myers has Kentucky ties since he was born in Frankfort . . . Birthday comes day after Kansas State game.

**DOUG O'BRIEN** Junior Tackle 6-2 214 22 (10/19/38) S. Attlesboro, Mass.

Only New England native on the varsity, Doug O'Brien was born in Pawtucket, Rhode Island, where he attended St. Raphael Academy three

years . . . As a tackle, he later starred at Greenbriar Prep in Virginia and was a third team All-State pick . . . Also on the basketball and baseball teams . . . Now lists South Attleboro, Mass., as home town . . . He was a late developer as a UK freshman in 1958 and spent a year on the red-shirts in '59 . . . Did not see action last season, but should play this year in a reserve capacity on left side . . . His birthday comes two days before the LSU contest.

**LOUIS OWEN** Soph. Quarterback 5-11 168 18 (12/5/42) Nashville, Tenn.

Born in Chattanooga and educated at Isaac Litton in Nashville, Owen chose Kentucky for his college education and further grid play over other colleges interested in him . . . He was a second team All-Tennessee choice at quarterback and a star in basketball, baseball and track at Litton . . . Plans to become an architect . . . As a reserve quarterback with the UK frosh last year, he completed one of two passes for 19 yards against Tennessee's yearlings and also had 19 yards rushing during the season.

**FRED RADER** (*Ray'-der*) Soph. Tackle 6-2 230 19 (8/22/42) Corbin, Ky.

Down to a trim 230 pounds after putting on excess weight while recuperating from a knee injury, this Cincinnati-born and Corbin-educated tackle prospect is considered potentially very promising . . . Coaches think highly of him and hope that knee trouble he had as a UK freshman last year (injured in summer All-Star game) is now past . . . Should play in a key reserve capacity, probably on left side . . . The big tackle is a powerful kickoff and PAT-field goal man . . . Kicked a record 21 extra points at Corbin, two in as many tries as UK freshman . . . Missed his only field goal attempt last year . . . Most Valuable Player at Corbin as offensive tackle and defensive linebacker . . . Second team All-State . . . Captain East All-Stars in East-West All-Star game . . . Starred also in track, baseball and basketball . . . He was teammate of halfback Billy Bird and joins another Corbin native, guard Mel Chandler, on UK varsity.

**JOHN RAMPULLA** (*Ram-pew'-lah*) Jr. QB 6-0 186 21 (2/5/40) N. Miami, Fla.

Injured much of last season and held out of competition in 1959, Rampulla has yet to display his full potential under game conditions . . . However, he had a fine spring practice and is being counted on to help the Wildcat cause materially this season . . . Plans call for John to alternate with Jerry Woolum at the No. 1 quarterback job . . . Turned in a good spring game, completing 10 of 16 passes for 70 yards . . . A fine punter, he was used primarily in that capacity last season and ended up as the squad's second best in this department with a 33.6 average on 18 boots . . . Longest was one traveling 53 yards against LSU . . . Action time totaled 8:12 in seven games . . . Born in Jamaica, N. Y., but attended high school in Florida—one year at St. Leo Prep and then three years at Archbishop Curley High in Miami . . . He was honorable mention All-State and All-Conference two years, team captain and Catholic All-State in baseball as a centerfielder . . . Italian descent.



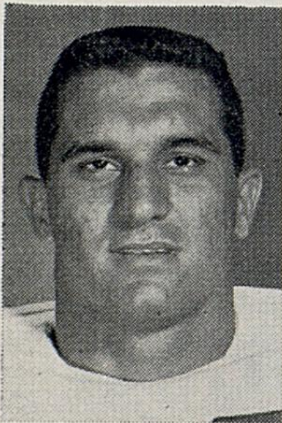
**BILL RANSELL Senior Halfback 6-1 180 22 (8/15/39) Elizabethtown, Ky.**

Heir apparent to the left half berth vacated by graduated Calvin Bird, Ransdell proved himself a capable understudy last season as he saw about equal action time as Bird (206 minutes to 267) and started a couple of games . . . Bill wound up as the third best ball carrier on the team with a 6.6 average on 30 carries for 199 yards, caught 10 passes for 95 yards and tied Tom Hutchinson for the team scoring leadership with 30 points . . . Played a major portion of games late last season . . . He's also a capable punter and is considered by Coach Collier to be the best runner on this year's team . . . Probably play safety on defense as he possesses quick reactions and a keen diagnostic mind . . . Also good speed and balance . . . Picked up his first varsity letter on 142:59 action time in all 10 games as a sophomore left half reserve in 1959 and added his second with 206:16 time last year, again in all 10 games . . . He was sixth in rushing as a soph with 93 yards on 23 trips . . . Ransdell starred as a schoolboy at Elizabethtown in a quarterback role and was a second team All-State choice . . . Converted to halfback after his freshman season at UK . . . Born Louisville, Ky., and a good student.



**DAN RIVEIRO (Re-ver'-o) Soph. End 6-2 197 20 (12/1/40) Miami, Fla.**

One of the top freshmen in the Southeastern Conference last season, Riveiro figures to be high on the list of second year men as he initiates varsity action . . . Currently scheduled to be the back up man for All-SEC Tom Hutchinson at right end, but may see extensive action on both sides and definite prospect to move up in the event of injury or slump on part of top men . . . Riveiro turned in an exceptionally good spring practice, showing excellent form as a receiver and blocker . . . Improving defensively . . . Teamed with fellow Miamian Darrell Cox to dominate UK freshman statistics last year . . . The former Miami Jackson High standout paced the Kittens in scoring with 18 points, led in pass receiving with four catches netting 75 yards and a pair of TD's, and recorded the longest interception return of the year when he ran one back 75 yards against the Cincinnati Frosh . . . Born in Havana, Cuba, but now calls Miami home and attended high school in the Sunshine City . . . Earned four football letters at Jackson High and was the first boy in school history to letter as a ninth grader . . . Honorable mention on the All-State grid list, All-City in basketball and an outstanding All-State baseball player who turned down a professional contract offered after he hit .402 his senior year.



**FRANK SAKAL (Sake'-all) Soph. G 6-1 210 20 (8/14/41) Aliquippa, Pa.**

Important reserve action at a guard position is due from this good prospect after a year on the red-shirt squad last season enforced by a bothersome

ankle . . . He broke the ankle in '60 spring practice after being moved from his high school position of quarterback to center . . . Lacked desirable speed to play the quarterback post effectively and size seemed to be going to waste somewhat as well . . . Moved over one spot to guard in spring practice this year and showed much promise . . . All-Conference as a quarterback at Aliquippa High . . . Hungarian descent.

**LARRY SCHAD** (*Shad*) Soph. G 6-3 200 19 (10/29/41) New Albany, Ind.

Size and better than average speed should qualify this sizeable prospect for considerable reserve action . . . Schad, known to his friends as "Shad-rack," picked up a freshman numeral for reserve duty with the UK Kittens two seasons back and then spent a year on the red-shirts in '60 while gaining experience that should aid him in '61 . . . Probably play on the right side . . . He was an honorable mention All-Indiana tackle on the same New Albany Senior High team as UK end Tom Hutchinson and came to Kentucky with Hutch in '59 . . . Also a wrestler in high school.

**DENNIS SCHRECKER** Soph. End 6-3 196 21 (8/15/41) Louisville, Ky.

Brother of an ex-Wildcat and coached in high school by another former UK grid standout, Schrecker shows good indoctrination in the Kentucky system and is counted on heavily to provide dependable depth at the flanks . . . He had a fine spring practice after laying out of competition last season . . . Will back up top three lettermen ends, probably seeing most action on left side . . . Schrecker is very important in end plans . . . Brother Ray Schrecker played tackle for UK, graduating after the '59 season . . . His coach at Louisville Male High was ex-Wildcat Charlie Kuhn . . . As an end in high school, Dennis earned honorable mention on the All-State team and All-City honors . . . Also participated in basketball and track and was an honor graduate.

**DUANE SCHWARTZ** Soph. Halfback 6-1 174 19 (1/19/42) Louisville, Ky.

Bothered all year as a UK freshman by a knee injury sustained in a summer All-Star game, Schwartz is being counted on to develop into a helpful performer this season . . . Coaches are confident he has the potential to play collegiate ball and will play some at left half . . . Schwartz, a second team All-State choice as a halfback at Louisville Atherton High, is the first from his school on the Kentucky varsity . . . Also captained his grid team, made the All-City selections and earned total of 12 letters in four sports . . . Plans to become a dentist.

**VINCE SEMARY** (*See-Mary'*) Soph. FB 5-10 182 21 (2/21/40) Cleveland, Ohio

A tough "little" customer with an excellent high school reputation who has convinced most people around the UK grid camp that he can more than hold his own in the rough going . . . Switched over to fullback in spring practice after previous experience as a schoolboy and UK freshman-varsity hold out in a halfback role . . . At West Technical High in Cleveland, Semary was leading scorer in the city with 92 points and racked up 1,400 yards . . . In freshman play at UK in '59, he had only five trips with the ball for 16 yards . . . Suffered broken wrist in the second week last season and was red-shirted . . . Should rank high in the reserve picture at fullback this year . . . Italian descent.

**JERRY SHEPHERD** Soph. End 6-3 206 19 (9/3/42) Louisville, Ky.

An operation to correct a shoulder separation that occurred early in spring practice may keep this promising player from fully achieving this season the great potential he seems to have . . . Shepherd had an especially fine initiation to collegiate ball last year as a Kentucky freshman, ending the season as the No. 1 left end and figuring prominently in the end picture as a first year varsity man . . . Nobody is counting the determined young man out of the picture, however, and he should overcome the handicap of injury and experience-lag with hard work . . . Could easily rank as high as No.3 at left end . . . A former All-State and All-South honoree while starring at Louisville Male High, he was third among frosh pass receivers last season . . . Also honorable mention All-America and a place kicker . . . Fifth state shot put while member Male track team coached by George Sengel, who this year will tutor UK ends . . . Married.

**TOMMY SIMPSON** Junior End 6-0 194 22 (12/10/38) Lebanon, Ky.

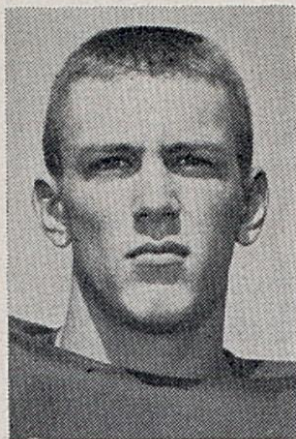
An ambitious hard-nose type of football player who loves the game and the contact associated with it, Simpson is a willing worker who could easily develop into one of the very best ends in the league this year . . . Coaches like his attitude and consider him a key man in plans at end . . . Particularly adept as a defensive operative and a powerful kicker who is regarded as one of the best kickoff men in the SEC . . . Tried two field goals from long distances in 1960 (46 vs. Vanderbilt and 38 vs. Xavier) without success, but he's a distinct threat in this department . . . Had three out of three at the PAT line . . . As No. 3 right end last year, he also caught 4 aerials for 95 yards—longest of them a 39 yarder in the season opener against Georgia Tech . . . Despite a spring operation to remove a calcium deposit in his upper arm, Simpson is expected to be ready for extensive duty at right end as alternate for All-SEC Tom Hutchinson . . . Came to UK in 1958 with reputation as an all-sports star at Lebanon . . . Captained both football and cage squads, won All-State honors as a halfback in grid sport and All-Conference in basketball, did well in baseball and track . . . Held out in '59 to gain experience at new end position and last year saw total of 188:54 action time in all 10 games and had two starts . . . Picked up first varsity letter in '60 . . . Comes from farm family, but has ambitions of playing pro ball.





**GARY STEWARD Junior Halfback 6-1 195 19 (11/7/41) Henshaw, Ky.**

Might be considered the darkhorse of the Kentucky backfield this season as he is tough and capable without being sensational as a general rule . . . Pro scouts watching him last year and this spring were impressed by his drive . . . Counted on as the number one right half after understudying graduated Charlie Sturgeon as a sophomore last year . . .



Steward was a member of the alternate backfield that played a major portion of the time in late season . . . His action time amounted to 188:48 in all 10 games with three starts . . . Sixth on the team in rushing as he picked up 110 yards on 29 trips for a 3.7 average . . . Longest run went for 30 yards against Vanderbilt . . . Also caught five passes for 59 yards . . . Never scored by land or air . . . Good blocker and considered team's best corner back . . . One exception to his lack of sensationalism in his play came in the LSU game last year when he alertly grabbed off

an impromptu lateral from quarterback Jerry Woolum (who had been stopped at line of scrimmage on a fourth down quarterback sneak) and lugged the leather for a key first down that set up UK's winning field goal . . . Overlooked in early recruiting, this Western Kentucky product caught the eye of UK coaches with a fine performance in the East-West All-Star Game of 1959 . . . Coached at Morganfield High by ex-Wildcat Bill Dawson and won All-Conference honors as a quarterback . . . Shifted to halfback as a UK freshman . . . Captained his prep football and basketball teams and ran 100 yard dash in track . . . Called "Jock" by teammates . . . Suffered broken nose in spring practice, but will be ready to go full speed.

**HERSCHEL TURNER Soph. Tackle 6-3 220 19 (6/17/42) Alexandria, Ky.**

An excellent report card on spring practice has recommended this good-looking youngster for important action in his first varsity campaign . . .



During the off-season workouts, he moved up steadily and ranked at times as the alternate No. 1 man at right tackle . . . Coaches were very pleased at his showing, both as a defensive menace and a crisp blocker who made relatively few mistakes . . . Few observers are willing to bet that he will not be the No. 1 man before the year is out . . . Seems sure to be alternate for veteran letterman Bob Butler on the right side . . . Discovered in summer All-Star Game . . . Born in Houston, Ky., Turner received his schooling at Campbell County High in Northern Kentucky and now calls Alexandria his home town . . . As a prep tackle, he captained his team but was generally overlooked by the honor team selectors . . . Regular right tackle for UK frosh last season and particularly

outstanding against Vanderbilt Frosh and Baby Vols.

**MARK THOMPSON Junior Center 6-2 199 22 (9/3/39) Franklin, Ky.**

Possessor of an aggressive attitude, good size and fine potential, Thompson is being counted on to lend an experienced hand at the pivotal position this year . . . He starts his third varsity season pegged in an important reserve role and could see extensive action if he shows the improvement he appears capable of demonstrating . . . Held out in '59 and saw only 8:14 action time in one game last year . . . Came to Kentucky in '58 by way of Franklin-Simpson High and Castle Heights Military Academy in Lebanon, Tenn. . . . He was an All-Conferneec halfback in high school and switched to center as UK yearling.

**BOB WADDLE Soph. Guard 6-0 192 19 (2/28/42) Somerset, Ky.**

Although he was born in center of Vol-land, Knoxville, Tenn., Bob has had his heart set on playing for the Kentucky Wildcats ever since he started his football career at Somerset High . . . His ambition is to follow in the footsteps of his boyhood idol, Ray Correll of Somerset, who became University of Kentucky's first and only All-America guard in 1953 . . . And the rugged youth gives every indication that he just might achieve this goal before he's through as a Wildcat . . . This season, he should see reserve action at the linebacking left guard spot and be ready for more important action as a junior and senior . . . As a Somerset Briar Jumper, he was a first team All-State choice.

**MAX WALTON Junior End 6-4 192 21 (8/9/40) Wellston, Ohio**

Biggest target among Wildcat receivers at a rangy six-feet-four, Walton could parlay experience and determination with improvement for more extensive reserve duty this season at both flanks . . . Came to Kentucky in 1958 after only two years of football at Wellston, Ohio, and was an alternate right side starter for Frosh . . . Held out in 1959 during his first campaign on the varsity and last season played mostly on the right side in a reserve role with 34:32 action time in three games . . . Caught two passes for 20 yards and a TD against Marshall . . . Tried at left end this spring . . . Father is strip coal miner in Wellston and Max spends his summers working in the mines.

**KENNY WILLITS Soph. Guard 5-7 180 18 (10/13/42) Miami, Fla.**

One of five Miamians on the 1961 varsity roster at Kentucky and a teammate of halfback Darrell Cox and quarterback Shelby Lee at Edison High in the Sunshine City, Willits is a 5-7 and 180-pound tough customer who seems sure to overcome the handicap of a lack of size . . . Smallest of the guard corps, but makes his presence known with strong defensive measures . . . He's stockily built and shows surprising speed . . . It was this speed and defensive ability that caused UK Freshman team coaches to give him a try at right halfback last season . . . Moved back to high school guard position this spring and should see extensive reserve action as a linebacker . . . As a high school standout at Edison, Willits was team captain, All-City and third unit All-State selection . . . Born Aledo, Ill.

**JERRY WOOLUM Junior Quarterback 6-2 186 20 (5/6/41) Richmond, Ky.**

Fourth best passer in the Southeastern Conference a year ago as a sophomore who shined most brightly against Kentucky's toughest opponents,



Woolum returns as the heir apparent to the passing leadership of the offense-conscious Conference this season . . . Equally brilliant as a strategist and as a runner, he also was fourth among SEC total offense leaders in 1960 and highly impressive in his play calls that contributed to UK's ranking as the second best offensive crew in the league . . . Jerry picks out targets amazingly well and had 63 completions in 125 tries last season for 767 yards . . . With a natural ability that seemingly has just barely been tapped, unusual poise under pressure and increased know-how, Woolum stands out as the SEC's No. 1 quarterback-passer for 1961 and a distinct threat to conference and national records . . . No SEC player returns with a better passing record . . . Although per-

sonally scouted and signed by Coach Collier and promising as a UK freshman in '59, Woolum surprised somewhat by achieving such a high plateau last season . . . Jerry served notice of future greatness by coming off the bench, when his team was in trouble in the season opener of 1960 against Georgia Tech, to lead a sensational second half comeback . . . Tossed 14 strikes in 24 tries for 190 yards and one touchdown . . . Started following week against No. 1-ranked Ole Miss and turned in another good game by nearly engineering a tie . . . It's hard to pick out Woolum's best game of '60, but his best-remembered play came in UK's 3-0 upset of LSU . . . On a fourth-down-and-one situation, he chose to try a quarterback sneak for a key first down to keep the Wildcats moving deep in Tiger territory . . . Banging into the line, he seemingly was stopped cold. But, in the split second before the whistle, demonstrated amazing alertness by tossing off an impromptu lateral that teammate Gary Steward caught and lugged forward for the first down that was to lead to the game-winning field goal . . . Starred this spring in Blue-White Game, leading team to 22-10 win by completing four of six passes for 42 yards and carrying six times for 73 yards . . . Had a beautiful 40-yard TD jaunt after finding no receiver open . . . Action time last season totaled 162:24 in 10 games with two starts . . . Born in Pineville, educated at Madison-Model High in nearby Richmond . . . Honors ranged from All-State to honorable mention on All-America team and MVP choice in Recreation Bowl.

### SHUTOUTS TIE MODERN RECORD

Kentucky's five shutouts in the course of a sensational comeback last season equalled the best defensive mark established by modern Wildcat elevens. UK teams of 1950, 1949 and 1934 posted an identical number. Nine other clubs from 1898 to 1922 also had five or better and the school record in this department of play is nine by the 1907 team. The "Immortals of '98" became the first and only Kentucky grid outfit to show a perfect season as they won seven straight without allowing their goal line to be crossed. Another good mark was the six shutout recorded by the Wildcats of 1911—whose surviving members will hold a 50th reunion at a K-Day celebration in connection with the Kansas State game Oct. 14.

## KENTUCKY'S COLORS

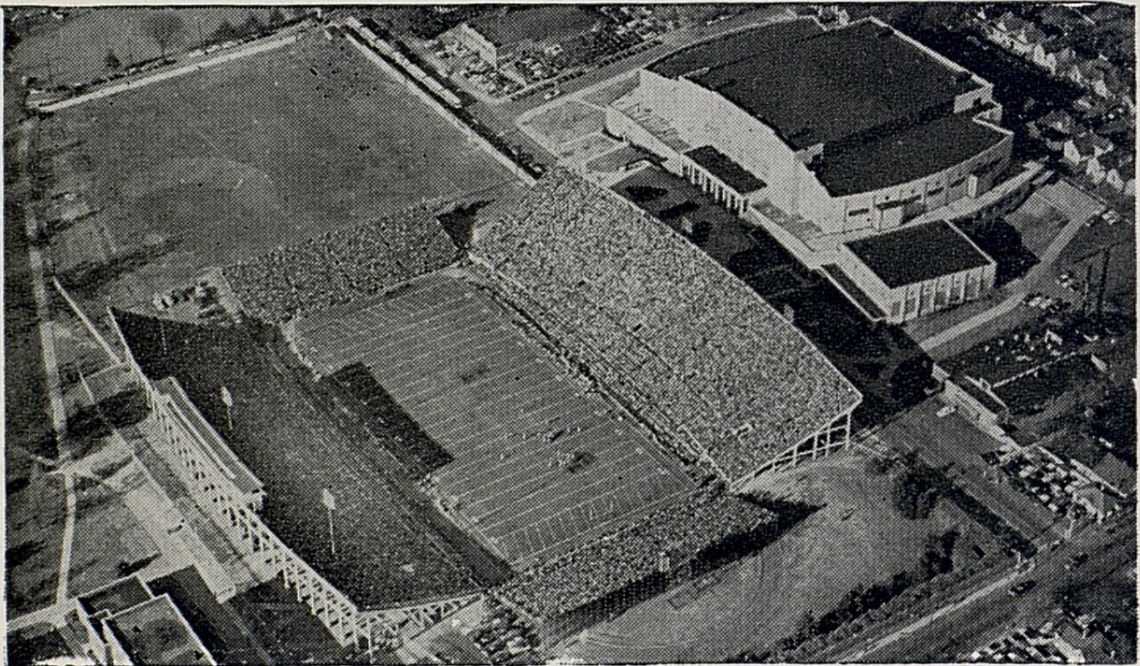
The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

## STOLL FIELD — McLEAN STADIUM

Much confusion among the general public and the sports-writing fraternity apparently exists over a seeming duplication of titles in referring to the University of Kentucky's football setup along "Avenue of Champions."

Officially, by action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the playing field is known as "Stoll Field." Likewise, by authority of the same body, the stadium proper is known as "McLean Stadium."

Kentucky's first football field, occupying the general site of what is now an intra-mural field west of the stadium, was first given a name when it was dedicated on October 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University of Kentucky. Soon after the first sections of



the present concrete stadium were completed on September 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville on October 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team

was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium on November 1, 1924.

The later reference to the concrete stands as "McLean Stadium" has existed since November 1, 1924, when the stadium was officially dedicated in memory of Price Innes McLean and a bronze plaque placed in the south stands by the Class of 1925. McLean, regular center on the 1923 Kentucky football squad, died November 7, 1923, as the result of injuries sustained in the U.K.-Cincinnati game played in the Queen City the afternoon before.

Major expansions of McLean Stadium in 1948, 1949 and 1959 have resulted in a current over-all seating capacity of approximately 37,500. The latest construction installed 3,655 new permanent box seats at a cost of \$115,000 and increased capacity by 1,629.

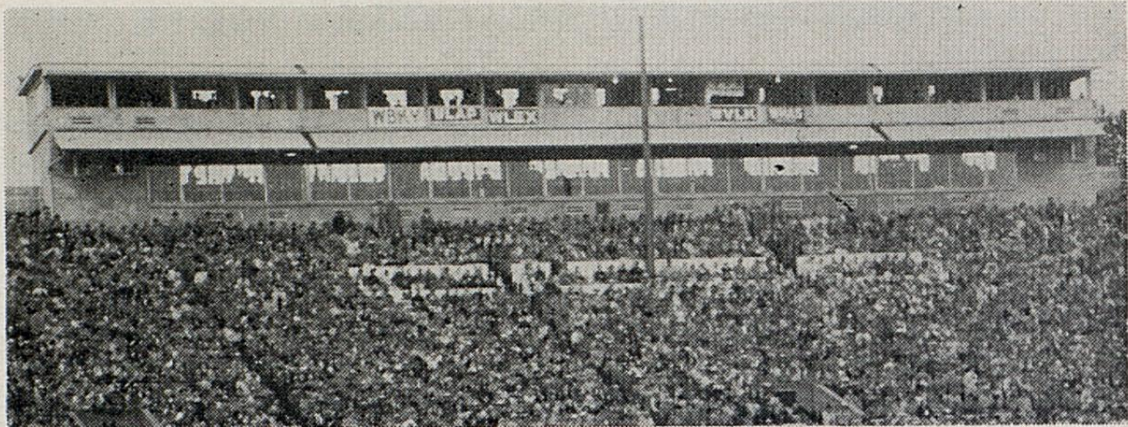
New practice facilities also have been prepared for the football Wildcats on the University farm. As part of a \$320,000 Sports Center, the varsity and freshman gridders now practice on an area equivalent to five football fields in size. Along with the new field, they have space in a large new dressing room building—making a facility recognized as one of the best in the nation.

The former practice lot and dressing room building, off Rose Street, were abandoned to make way for a new men's dormitory.

"Avenue of Champions" came into being in the spring of 1950 as an honorary title for that stretch of Euclid Avenue running between the University's \$4,000,000 Memorial Coliseum and McLean Stadium. The street was officially re-named by the City of Lexington in recognition of the UK athletic teams' unprecedented success of 1950 in annexing the Southeastern Conference titles in both football and basketball and their national championships in the Sugar Bowl grid game and the NCAA cage tournament.

## VICTORY KICKS

A game unique in University of Kentucky football history occurred in 1900. Kentucky beat the Louisville YMCA, 12-6, without running a single offensive play during the entire game. Kicking on first down every time they gained possession of the ball, Kentucky made its scores through the recovery of opponent fumbles in the end zone.



### **FOOTBALL WRITERS SALUTE KENTUCKY PRESS BOX**

University of Kentucky's football press box on Stoll Field rates as one of the best in the country from the standpoint of both working facilities and service to writers—so says the Football Writers Association of America. The national organization in 1958 added Kentucky to an exclusive list of schools that had been cited in both categories. Up to that time, only 67 institutions had won the award for press box services and 45 for facilities since the FWA started officially honoring the nation's best press boxes and sports publicity departments (who are responsible for service) several years ago.

### **RECORD WIN STRING UNDERWAY AGAINST NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS**

When Kentucky's Wildcats sailed past Xavier of Cincinnati on Stoll Field just before the season ended last year, they pushed to 17 straight a victory string chalked up over non-Southeastern Conference foes. The polished mark, dating from a season-opener loss to defending National Champion Maryland in Coach Blanton Collier's initial season of 1954, is believed to be a University of Kentucky record and may also be the best showing posted by any SEC team against outside competition. The Wildcats will have an opportunity this season to extend the record to 20 as they face three non-loop foes—Kansas State on Oct. 14, Florida State on Nov. 4 and Xavier Nov. 18.

## UK TOSSES FIRST PASS IN '06

The first forward pass ever attempted by a Kentucky football team was thrown in a game played at Lexington Oct. 13, 1906—the year that the forward pass was legalized by national rules—against Eminence Athletic Club. Accounts of this early contest do not mention whether the pass was completed or the name of the thrower. Earl Stone was listed as quarterback of Coach J. White Guyn's Kentuckians.

## KICKS OUT OF THE PAST

Although Kentucky's kicking game in general has been one of the weak points in overall operations in recent years, the Wildcats have been blessed with a handful of place-kicking stars in the last decade or so.

Notable efforts were produced by the following: Bobby Brooks booted 25 of 34 extra point tries in 1949, including 17 straight to equal the then-existing SEC record; Bob Gain, the All-America tackle, recorded 37 of 41 placement kicks in 1950; Harry Jones in 1951 had 29 of 40; specialist Bob Bassitt put through 15 of 21 PAT kicks and two of four FG tries in 1952; Delmar Hughes missed only two of 40 placement tries in three years (1954-56); and Lou Michaels kicked 13 of 16 during 1955-57 career and had two out of three from the field.

Hopes for the current season ride on the strong right toe of junior halfback Clarkie Mayfield. In his first varsity campaign last year, he booted through four of five conversion tries and three out of five from the field. A 28-yard field goal won LSU game and his 26-yard kick tied Tennessee. Also had pair of field goals (30 and 35 yards) against Vandy frosh in 1959 as well as four successful conversions in five attempts for the season. Clarkie's longest try to date was a 55-yard kick vs. Vandy Freshmen that landed in end zone just short of uprights.

## STOLL FIELD 'COW PASTURE' BIRTHPLACE OF DIXIE GRID SPORT

University of Kentucky's campus boasts the distinction of serving as the birth-place of Dixie football. Ironically, however, the forerunners of the present day Wildcats were not involved in the early grid contest.

The first inter-collegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably the first to take place west of the Alleghanies, came about April 9, 1880, on old Stoll Field. This gridiron, located adjacent to the present U.K. stadium and now used as a baseball field, was the site of the early tilt that saw Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania College) take the measure of Centre College, 13¾ to 0. The match, which was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby, followed by only six years the introduction of the game of football to the United States.

University of Kentucky (then called A & M College of Kentucky) did not play its first game until a year later on the same field, which once served as the private pasture for University President James Patterson's bovine herd.
