

Officials doubt scholarship's future

Appalachia: Dwindling coal, logging revenue leads to smaller than expected endowment

As its mining income vanishes, a popular scholarship program for Appalachian students is struggling to survive at UK. Robinson scholarships renewable, all expenses-paid awards — help first generation with the standard of the standard press of the standard press. When you for the program, started five years ago, comes mostly from coal mining and also from logging on one-hird of the 15,000-acre Robinson Forest that UK owns in Knott, Perry and Breathit counties.

Those revenues have dwin-

counties.

Those revenues have dwindled, as a result of low coal prices and a lower-than-expected supply of coal — leading to a smaller endowment than expected. Meanwhile, investment

income on the endowment also has been lower than projected. Officials don't think their current endowment of \$15.4 million will be enough to handle the number of students they want the program to cover.

As a result, UK has permanently scaled back the scholarship program, and officials and its relatively modest endowment may not allow it to continue past this decade.

MAYFIELD, Ky. — Despite a sour economy
that has thumped the auto industry — Ford Motor Co. in particular — the Mayfield Continental
General Tire plant has Ford largely to thank for
a production increase requiring 65 new workers.
The plant has been named sole supplier of tires
for Ford's 2003 Expedition sports utility vehicle
to be launched at midyear 2002, and also will
make new products for Continental, General and
private-brand tire markets, said Ken Herndon, a
plant manager. The plant will increase production by 2,000 tires a day by May 1. The influx of
new, union tire workers will raise plant employment to 1,350 and increase production to about
20,000 tires daily.

Bush not informed about Enron's woes

Bush not informed about Enron's wees WASHINGTON — Two Bush cabinet members said Sunday they never considered intervening in Enron's spiral toward bankruptcy, nor informed President Bush of requests for help from the fallen energy giant. "Companies come and go. If's ... part of the genius of capitalism," said Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill, when asked if he was surprised at the sudden collapse of Enron. The company's failure has left the one-time energy trading behemoth's stock virtually worthless and thousands of workers' pension funds in disarray. Last fall, a month before declaring bankruptcy, O'Neill received two telephone calls from Enron's chief executive, Kenneth Lay, Lay also called Commerce Secretary Don Evans at the time, reaching out for help to harness the energy company's financial silde.

White supremacists converge in Pa.

White supremacists converge in Pa.

YORK, Ra. — Witnesses reported minor confrontations in the streets on Saturday as police kept hundreds of demonstrators at bay during a rally by white supremacists in a city still feeling the effects of deadly race riots more than 30 years ago. Matthew Hale, leader of the white supremacist group World Church of the Creator, spoke to about 70 supporters inside a library while police officers in riot gear, some on horseback, separated shouting groups of his supporters and antiracist protesters. Marion Kinard, 31, of York, said he attended the speech with his two sons, 4 and 6, to teach them about racism. Witnesses reported seeing car windows broken and minor confrontations in the streets throughout the afternoon. Witnesses reported a clash between the two sides before Hale arrived, although police did not confirm it.

Marines killed in Pakistan sent home

Marines killed in Pakistan sent home WASHINGTON — The bodies of six U.S. Marines killed in an air crash in Pakistan were on their way home Sunday, and more than two dozen al-Qadida and Taliban prisoners were en route to detention in Cuba. Military investigation of the designation of the continuous area of southwest Pakistan for the last of the seven victims and clues to what caused the crash of the military refueling plane Wednesday. U.S. warplanes struck again near the eastern Afghanistan village of Zawar, at the site of a huge complex of caves, tunnels and buildings the Pentagon says was used as an underground hide-out by al-Qaida and Taliban members. After more than a week of strikes, Sunday's bombing appeared to be the heaviest attack since last month's strikes on the al-Qaida cave complex at Tora Bora farther northeast.



Casinos could be an ace in the hole

Much speculation has swirled about the push to allow slot ma chines at Kentucky's horse tracks. It seems horse tracks are not as profitable as they once were because of increased competition from riverboat gambling. Plus, shortfalls in the state budget are forcing legislators to look elsewhere for revenue — one alternative being

isiators to 100k eisewnere for revenue — one alternative being slot machines.

The resulting question is both simple and obvious: Why is gambling in Kentucky, outside of horse tracks, still illegal?

Obviously, the question is not entirely a moral issue, since no one is suggesting the horse racing industry be shut down. On top of that, hundreds of thousands of Kentuckians trek across the river every year to one of the many riverboats.

The main opposition to both land-based and riverboat casinos in Kentucky stems not from religious or moral inclinations, but rather from the extraordinarily powerful thoroughbred industry. For years, every plan to allow legalized gambling outside the tracks has been opposed by the state legislature until, of course, revenue problems became an issue. Now we need slot machines just to survive.

That said, legalized gambling, while carrying a significant amount of baggage, could also offer some benefits. Restaurants, hotels and other stores would be included in a casino, which would bring jobs (mostly well-paying) and increased tax revenue from tourism.

This stands in stark contrast to our current system, comprised of

ly well-paying) and increased tax revenue from tourism.

This stands in stark contrast to our current system, comprised of horse racing and a state-run lottery. The former has enjoyed a monopoly for years that in almost any other industry would be illegal. The latter is simply a regressive tax on the poor, provides no new jobs and offers a low payout (45 to 55 percent), much lower than casinos (95 percent) and horse tracks (86 percent).

It is time that horse tracks and those who own and operate them loosen their grip on Kentucky's gaming industry. Horse racing is a proud tradition, but if it cannot withstand competition from without, then what is the point of propping up a hollow industry, when the costs of missed opportunities could be extraordinary?





Take It From the Chief: **Common Sense Keeps** the Good Times Rolling



Chief Robert H. Harding

Spring break is fun time, and meeting new people is part of it. But one person you don't want to meet is Bob Harding.

It's not that he's not a nice guy. He is. And he really wouldn't mind meeting you.

But Bob Harding is a cop. Panama City Beach's top cop. The chief.

"We are a nice little town of about 7,500 which grows to more than 10 times its

size each week for six weeks during spring break," the chief says. "That kind of growth, with the kinds of activities that go on, can mean a lot of headaches."

Still, the chief looks forward to the influx of visitors from the first of March to the second week of April. "Most of these kids who come are great, and they bring millions of dollars with them, which is absolutely great for the economy."

The only thing Harding asks is that the students bring something with them besides money - common sense. "We want the kids to have a good time," he says. "We just want them to not leave their common sense or manners at home." "Our biggest problems are just the sheer numbers of people and the traffic, which can be overwhelming at times."

The main drag through town is U.S. Highway 98, which the locals call Front Beach Road, and it is only two lanes. "That's why I say bring your manners," Harding says, "because there are going to be times when you need them with that kind of traffic."

The chief says it helps to have patience, too, when some of the locals run out of theirs. "The loud music, noise and rowdiness can get a bit much" for some residents, he says.

Harding says that the biggest legal problems college students have during break are underage drinking (the legal minimum is 21) and disorderly conduct - often related.

"We are tolerant." he says.

Not drugs, though. "That is one thing we are definitely not tolerant about," the chief says. "No warnings. Zero tolerance on drugs."

Actually, that hasn't been too much of a problem in Panama City Beach. "During the entire six weeks of spring break, we usually have between 2,000 and 2,500 misdemeanors, which is a very low number considering there are 450,000

to 500,000 visitors overall.

He wants the visitors to have a good time. "There's plenty to do. I would like for the kids to look after each other. Don't leave a buddy stranded if he has had too much

"Just be nice; come down and enjoy sunshine."

If students bring their manners, he says, "then we like to treat people the way we would like to be treated when we are on vacation."

See, he's not such a bad guy. Hope you don't get to meet him.


