The Committee on Duplication of Work reported that no courses had been sent to the Committee in time for consideration or to the members of the Senate, but that some of the colleges had courses that they wished to present from the floor as an emergency. The following recommendations were approved:

German 120a, b. Junior Tutorial Work in German. One hour credit per semester.

German 130a, b. Senior Tutorial Work in German. One hour credit per semester.

Journalism 115. Advertising Typography and Layout. An elective course. Two lecture hours, two laboratory hours, three credits. Prerequisites: Junior standing; Psychology 5 or consent of instructor.

Markets and Rural Finance 132. Current Problems in Agricultural Economics. Three credits. Prerequisites: M. and R. F. 108, F. E. 4.

Civil Engineering 8. Residential Architecture. 3 credits; 1st term, Summer session.

Law 104 - Property I and II. Personal and real property - 4 hours for the first semester. This is a substitute for Property I and II which has hitherto run 3 hours per week each semester.

Minutes of the University Senate - Jan. 24, 1934

On recommendation of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Senate approved a request from the Department of German Language and Literature that it be authorized to enter upon the experiment now being conducted by seven Arts and Sciences departments of requiring comprehensive examinations of all senior majors for graduation. The first comprehensive examination in German will be given at the end of the second semester 1934-35.

The Dean of Men raised the question whether the new probation rule was to be retroactive to affect the first semester or whether it was to go into effect at the beginning of the second semester. The Senate voted that the rule was to be retroactive. A later motion was also approved that we use both rules in figuring a student's eligibility on his first semester's work.
