Board games

Trustee's meeting brings no change. Tie vote leaves Wethington's contract intact despite heavy criticism from media and UK faculty and staff.

The UK Board of Trustees still can't seem to resolve the issue.

At Tuesday's open meeting, the Charles T. Wethington so-called controversy was finally discussed.

"The sad thing about what the board did one month ago," said Professor Loys Mather, board and faculty member, "is that we have tarnished not only the president, but the board and the university. I feel badly about it."

As did several board members, though not enough to convince others to resolve the conflict.

The facts were clear. On May 4, 1999 some members of the Board of Trustees met in a closed meeting and discussed an extension of the president's contract through 2003, which would violate the board's 1988 decision to require top UK executives to retire at age 65. Wethington will be 67 by the time his retirement rolls around.

They also gave Chairman Edward T. Breathitt permission to negotiate with the president, which resulted in a 19 percent pay raise in his salary, from \$192,651 to

\$229,439. Contrary to rumors, this figure is comparable to the salaries of UK's benchmark schools' presidents.

The actual vote was held in an open meeting of the board, with the votes in favor of the contract extension, but a lot of the controversy lies in the fact that the matter had not been placed on the agenda. Two days later, the University Senate asked the board to think about their actions and reconsider.

But Wethington's contract stands, for now, after the vote to reconsider was split 10 to 10. Thus, resulting in the failure of the motion due to no majority vote. But the vote was not taken without hot and heavy debate.

"I feel without a doubt we violated the law," said Billy Joe Milles, board member. "It's not like we ran a stop sign. This is serious business."

Milles stated the board acted without regard to the "open meetings law", KRS 164.170.

For some, the answer was clear. "There's no question in my mind what we need to do," said Grady Stumbo, board member. "We need to undo what we did in May."

For others, the answer was to take no action at all.

It was only discussed in closed session and the actual vote happened in open session, said Paul Vanbooven, UK Office of Legal Council.

Therefore, it was not illegal. It would only have been illegal if the matter was voted on in a closed session, he said.

Although Wethington has weathered a number of tough political battles during his nine-year tenure as president, he was silent during this debate.

Nate Brown, former SGA president and board member, finished his term at the meeting, but not after he explained the importance of sticking together.

"Whatever the vote turns out, we have to put that behind us," Brown said. "And not look at this person or that person as an enemy or a friend."

Whether or not this issue would divide the board bothered many of the members.

"A family divided can never succeed," said Governor Edward T. Breathitt. "I think it's terribly important that we leave here united."

The board may have been united, but the issue is far from finished, according to Grady Stumbo.

We did not solve the problem, we will talk about this again, he said.

Train track murder suspect sought

Police name suspect in August 1997 slaying of UK student

Lexington Division of Police investigators are currently searching for a suspect for the homicide and rape/assault of two UK students in August 1997.

Police suspect 39-year-old Rafael Resendez-Ramirez of Puebla, Mexico has committed more homicide crimes, five more to be exact, in Texas. The most recent being on June 5 in Houston, Tex.

"We hope to connect him with physical evidence soon," said Assistant Police Chief Fran Root.

At least two police investigators from Lexington are assisting Texas police with the search for the suspect.

On Friday, August 29, 1997, at 2:48 a.m., two UK

students were walking along the railroad tracks by the GE plant on Edison Drive between Rosemont Garden and Waller Avenue. A male suspect murdered Christopher Maier and raped and assaulted a female victim.

Christopher Maier, 21, had been a member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity. The female was a 20-year-old sophomore at the time.

He was found dead in the weeds about 10 feet from the railroad tracks, possibly beaten to death with a board.

"The suspect [Ramirez] travels the rails," Root said.

We think that's why he was in Kentucky, he said.

Texas authorities are offering a \$50,000 reward and Lexington authorities

are offering a \$25,000 reward for any information on the investigation.

Lexington police say the suspect is a Hispanic male, medium height and build, short dark hair and a possible mustache. He sometimes wears glasses. He also speaks relatively good English.

Kings Island fun in the sun

It's the land of the free.

This spectacular place is free of books, no teachers and definitely no homework. If you are lucky enough to have the opportunity to get away from the slave-laboring eight-week classes, then this amusement park is right up your alley.

No it's not Candy Land.

It's Kings Island. Kings Island is an amusement park that has 12 roller coasters and sports the longest wooden roller coaster in the world, "The Beast."

New rides for the 1999 season include, "Face Off." This is an inverted roller coaster that allows you to face people in the car in front of you and see them scream and shout while dangling your feet below the track. Also bringing in the crowd is Kings Island's first Gyro-drop free-fall tower named "Drop Zone" that drops down thirty stories, that's higher than their Eiffel Tower.

More exciting rides include the "King Cobra," the world's first stand-up looping roller coaster and the "Vortex,"

which speeds through six loops, corkscrews and dazzling drops to get your keester turning.

Paramount's Action Zone is new for 1999. It gives spectators a chance to experience stunts and performance by some of the top Hollywood stunt performers.

If you are looking to beat the summer heat as well, they also have a water park called "Water Works" that's free with the price of admission. It has huge water slides, tubes and a wave pool.

Lifeguard Randy Johnson advises all to wear plenty of sunscreen.

"A lot of people come here and think the water protects them from the sun," Johnson said. "But some don't know that the sun reflects off of the water and burns your face to a crisp."

Johnson says that this time of year is when "Water Works" gets most of their business because of the weather and most people are out of school or on vacation.

You will need a little dough to enjoy the short getaway. The admission cost is \$39.95, although there is always a chance to get discount tickets from scalpers. Prices for food vary from \$3 to \$10.

Kings Island is just two hours from Lexington. The park is located just 24 miles northeast of Cincinnati, off of I-71.

Where: The Library.
The digs: Convenient for getting your caffeine fix while you study. The tables are large enough to spread out while studying, but the seats are uncomfortable hard. Ordering at the counter makes getting your food and coffee quick. Open until four Monday through Friday for the summer.
The clientele: Students who don't refill. Also, the coffee isn't all that great. It's a quick walk from anywhere on campus, and inside the library you can't beat the location. The outside tables are a bonus for smokers.
The Intermzzo
Where: Patterson Office Tower
The digs: In the middle of campus, the prices are reasonable and it's open during eight week until three in the after-

noon.
The clientele: In the middle of campus, you figure it out.
The Line: Ten minutes between classes in Whitehall, where else are you going to go?
Coffee Times
Where: 2571 Regency Road
The digs: The décor is a nightmare landscape of tackiness, from the art to the color of the walls to the tables themselves. The service can be slow at times. Open until 10 p.m. on weekdays and midnight on weekends.
The clientele: Expect to see SUVs with "Growth is Good" bumper stickers.
The line: The coffee is cheap and good if you can deal with the obnoxious décor.
Where: 115 Locust Hill Dr
The Digs: Located on Richmond road near Man o War. It's small, but cozy and the prices are reasonable. The service is decent and the lighting and music are pleasantly subdued.

Open until 10 p.m.
The clientele: A pretty random mix.
The Line: Not a bad place to drop in if you're at the nearby movie theater or in the area.
Café Joseph Beth
Where: In the Mall at Lexington Green off Nicholasville Road
The Digs: Not really a café at all. Joseph Beth is more an overpriced American Bistro with an espresso machine. Going here just for coffee would be like going to Applebee's just for a Coke. Open until 10 p.m. during the week, 11 p.m. on weekends.
The clientele: Mostly older professionals with money to burn on \$13 pasta dishes.
The Line: Definitely not a place to get a cup of coffee and study for that economics midterm.
Starbucks
Where: In Barnes and Nobles at Hamburg Place.
The digs: The Wal-Mart of

coffee. Their coffee tastes good, however.
The clientele: Mostly random book shoppers.

Episode I. Face it, no movie could possibly live up to that kind of hype. But, even if you're not a die hard fan this movie is still worth your time. The crowds have cleared and the furor has died down. There are just a few things to keep in mind when you see it.

To watch and enjoy this movie you need to reconcile yourself that it really couldn't live up to the hype. Like any movie, problems exist. The Jar Jar Binks character is tolerable at best and down right irritating through most of the movie. Jake Lloyd is ten years old. He's not a good actor. In fact, he's so bad at times that I concentrated more on his inability to deliver a convincing line than on the movie itself. You simply can't expect that much pathos from a ten-year-old. But you could expect a seasoned filmmaker like Lucas to realize this and have written an older character.

To look at this movie you need to keep the whole plot arc in mind. Yes, on many levels

it's overly basic. It certainly doesn't embrace any of the complex themes that the other movies do. But, it's the beginning of a six-part epic. It stands alone more than any of the other movies do or will. It sets all of the elements in place for the other five films. It's also geared toward children more than any of the other movies were.

Still, the movie entertains. The special effects are dazzling, the story moves quickly with few brakes in the action and the cinematography is lush. It's a good movie, even for the casual viewer, but it's just a movie.

So, what's next? The following movie, to be released in 2002, jumps seven years ahead in movie time to focus on an older Anakin. Lucas has said it will be a love story between Anakin and Queen Amidala.

Expect to see more evil Jedi, and the beginning of Anakin's fall to darkness. Early production sketches indicate you may see TIE fighters and star destroyers as the Republic crumbles and the Empire rises.

Also expect to see the "Clone Wars" mentioned in A New Hope.

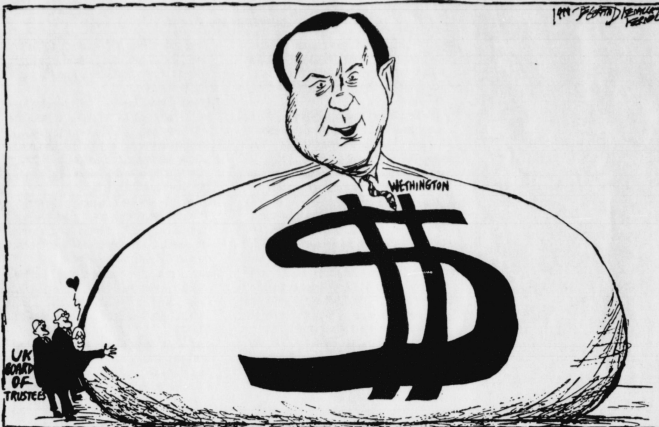

Old president, new money

Board of Trustees' stealth on important matters alienates entire campus

Maybe we're just a bunch of idiots. Uninformed. Loudmouth.

Then again, maybe the UK Board of Trustees should send us an ear every now and then.

Maybe some of our mindless rantings could produce a good idea or two throughout the course of our lives. Maybe the secrets of making UK a Top 20 research institution lie hidden in one of UK's richest resources: everyone *not* on the Board of Trustees. Nonetheless, you'd never hear that from the Board.

In fact, you don't get much of anything from the Board except the occasional deprivation of a much-needed elevator in the Patterson Office Tower and a closed-meeting contract negotiation for the University's elusive pharaoh—er, president.

Why slip and say pharaoh? Because it begins with a 'p' like president?

Doubtful. More likely is the fact that pharaohs were at one time and rarely seen by their lowly subjects.

The latter is something students and faculty alike understand, seeing that Charles Wethington is scarcely re-

garded ambling about campus, engaging in conversations with the members of our campus community.

But keeping himself concealed from the campus masses is not all that likens our president to royalty.

Riches are in order, are they not? An increase of 19 percent to \$229,439 was woven into a contract which was conspicuously absent from the publicized agenda for the May 4 meeting of the Board of Trustees. The contract also extended Wethington's reign—oops, tenure—two years, keeping him in office two years beyond the required retirement age of 65.

Maybe \$229,439 is the appropriate salary for the president of a major university, but a 19 percent increase seems pretty steep.

Are the professors getting a 19 percent increase in pay?

What about the secretaries?

The grounds crew?

Are students, both undergraduate and graduate, getting 19 percent more scholarships, fellowships and financial aid?

No.

The Board of Trustees would not creep behind closed doors to negotiate such a change for any of us, which

leads to the major problem with this entire scandal.

Why did the Board of Trustees rush the president's new contract through in an arguably illegal meeting on May 4?

Why is the Board of Trustees unwilling to reconsider the contract after listening to the voices of UK's campus community?

If Wethington is doing such a great job raising money and driving our institution toward Top 20 status, why does the Board of Trustees not want to know what anybody else thinks about a contract extension?

For that matter, why extend his contract two years beyond the age limit, regardless of how great a job he's doing? Why are the rules there?

The true answers to these questions lie hidden in the hearts of a very few people—people far wiser than ourselves.

After all, we, the normal, everyday members of the campus, have never been blessed with the knowledge of university management which is bestowed on people by virtue of membership on the UK Board of Trustees.

Some of us are so confused and disdainfully stupid that we even think

Muhammad Ali center opening delayed

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The opening of a center honoring Muhammad Ali will be pushed back by fund-raising delays, but backers remain optimistic that it will be built.

"I am confident about our ability to raise the money," businessman Larry Townsend said Monday. "Of course, we are going to get it."

Townsend, who has worked with Muhammad and Lonnie Ali to build the center, declined to say how much has been raised or pledged so far. But he acknowledged that fund-raising delays will prevent it from opening by January 2001 in the former boxing champion's hometown.

The center will include a museum and an institute promoting good sportsmanship. It will also sponsor retreats to help young people develop self-esteem.

Ventura's autobiography has bookshelf competition

MINNEAPOLIS, Mn. — One of the books includes flattering and relatively tame details of a politician's career; the other reveals seamy stories of that same politician's sexual tastes and personal quirks.

Guess which one is the autobiography, and which is the unauthorized biography? Hint: The subject is Gov. Jesse Ventura.

Quietly competing with Ventura's "I Ain't Got Time to Bleed" on the national bookshelves this month is "Body Slam," a 246-page paperback that provides some new details about Ventura's career.

"Body Slam" maintains a mostly positive tone about Ventura's rise in show business and politics. "I can't compete... especially when he tells the world he doesn't wear underwear," joked author Jake Tapper, a writer for the online magazine Salon. "I wasn't out to get him. I was just trying to explain him to the rest of the world," said Tapper, who was denied interviews with Ventura.

Shooting satire cut from New York cable date

NEW YORK — The Bravo cable network said it won't air a satire about a "teen sniper school" produced by filmmaker Michael Moore because of public sensitivities following the Columbine High School massacre. The four-minute segment, produced five months before the April 20 shooting in Colorado, was to run on Moore's Bravo series, "The Awful Truth."

Moore said his satire takes easy access to guns to its "logical extreme," by arming children and teaching them to be better shots as part of the school curriculum. Bravo didn't object to the content, but felt the timing was inappropriate, spokeswoman Sommer Hixson said Tuesday. "We're hoping after some time goes by the original intent of the satire will be more clear to viewers," she said.

LOS ANGELES — Actress Reese Witherspoon and actor Ryan Phillippe exchanged nuptials this weekend at a ceremony in South Carolina, their publicists said.

The public relations firm Baker Winokur Ryder said Monday the two were married Saturday in Charleston.

Witherspoon, star of *Pleasantville* and *Election* is pregnant with Phillippe's child. The two co-starred in *Cruel Intentions*.

Phillippe's other film credits include *I Know What You Did Last Summer* and *54*.

Movie ratings more tolerant of violence than sex

LOS ANGELES — Last year's raunchy satire *Orgazmo* was slapped with an NC-17 rating for its constant stream of sex jokes and crude sight gags.

A few months later, the action-packed *Payback* showed Mel Gibson killing a variety of people in a variety of ways before he was tortured, but the ratings board gave the film an R rating.

For years, producers have complained the ratings board has more tolerance for violence than for sex.

That raises questions about whether checking IDs at the theater door — as President Clinton said Tuesday that theater owners have agreed to do — will shield youngsters from violence.

The president may have complicated the issue further by getting the government involved, contends lawyer Alan Dershowitz, who helped push through the NC-17 rating in 1990 to take the X-rated stigma off non-pornographic films with adult themes.

"The system itself is skewed against sex and in favor of violence," he said. "But once the president puts the heavy thumb of government on the scale, it begins to smack of governmental intrusion."

New Hannibal Lecter novel recording hot sales

NEW YORK — Readers were chomping at the bit to get their hands on the latest tale of Dr. Hannibal "The Cannibal" Lecter.

Buyers on Tuesday ate up copies of "Hannibal," the new novel by Thomas Harris that marks the return of the murderous doctor and FBI agent Clarice Starling — the principal characters from Harris' 1988 novel "The Silence of the Lambs."

"It is doing the proverbial 'flying off the shelves,'" said Joe Bailey, merchandising manager of the Borders Books & Music at the World Trade Center. "It's sort of unprecedented."

Between its 7 a.m. opening and 3 p.m., the store had sold more than 250 copies of "Hannibal."

Other stores reported similar sales and Internet retailer Amazon.com also listed the book as its No. 1 bestseller Tuesday.

The 1991 movie version of "Silence of the Lambs," starring Anthony Hopkins and Jodie Foster, won five Academy Awards, including best picture.

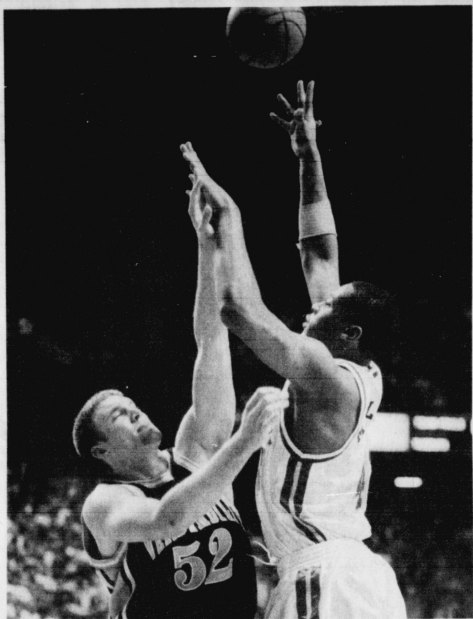

Wildcats hope for best in draft

Movin' On and Up: Ex-UK players will see how they size up against the NBA competition this week, others find new homes.

The moral of the story is some will make it, and some will not.

As for ex-Wildcats Heshimu Evans and Wayne Turner, they are what you could say, "on the bubble," of getting picked in the NBA draft. That is also known as no man's land. Their ex-teammates Scott Padgett and Jamaal Magloire have been projected by NBA experts to be drafted in the mid to late first round at least.

However, starting this past Tuesday in Chicago the NBA is holding a pre-draft camp so the coaches can see what the players have to offer. According to basketball sports information director Brooks Downing, Magloire traveled to Toronto to work out with the Raptors last week. He is expected to go either 17th or 18th in the draft. Magloire has until June 23rd to decide whether he wants to stay at UK or sign with an agent and go pro.

Padgett is expected to go

30th in the draft, and Downing says that Padgett probably will not be working out in the draft camp but he will go through the physicals. Turner and Evans unfortunately do not have the luxury of sitting out this camp. This is their opportunity to show the NBA coaches, scouts and experts that they have improved on their weaknesses.

Downing says that means Turner needs to show improvement on his jumpshot. He is currently projected as a 72nd pick.

"That's something a lot of scouts are looking at right now," Downing said. "I have also heard from experts that he has a good chance of getting drafted because he can play back-up point guard and give somebody a breather. His quickness and ball handling skills are a huge asset to the NBA game."

Downing also pointed out ex-Florida State point guard Charlie Ward came into the league with barely a jumper to show.

As for Evans he is currently projected to go 57th in the

draft, that is the second to last pick.

The draft is June 30 at the MCI Centre in Washington, D.C. There are two rounds of 29 picks.

UK head coach Tubby Smith lost three players who said that they wanted more playing time, Myron Anthony, Michael Bradley and Ryan Hogan.

Two of those hitch-hikers have already found homes. Anthony is guaranteed a starting spot at the forward position at Texas Christian University. According to TCU sports information director Rick Covington, head coach Billy Tubbs loves Anthony's style of play.

And with good reason. They run a Pitino-type, run-and-gun game with constant full-court pressure.

Hogan was picked up by Steve Alford over at Iowa, but neither were available for comment.

Bradley is still keeping his options open. He has visited Holy Cross, Villanova and is looking at Ohio State.

Defense gets tough

Big D: After losing only two players, defense is back even stronger

Not every great team has a foundation to fall back on when they lose great players. For the UK football team they have quite a few. Even after losing both quarterback Tim Couch and wide receiver Craig Yeast to the NFL.

But according to George Massey, nothing is stronger than the defensive foundation.

"Our defense is the backbone of the team, we have a lot of players returning," said defensive tackle Massey. "Even though we lost some players, we are strong enough to hold up everything."

It is hard to argue with Massey. Besides the fact that he's 6-3, 280 pounds, he has a great point.

The defensive line is only losing Mark Jacobs and Marvin Major.

Massey has good reason behind his confidence as well. Not only has he had an extremely productive spring, but his team

mates have as well.

Just ask UK head coach Hal Mumme.

"I think George Massey has had a good spring and risen. I think that Gordon Crowe has had some good days," Mumme said. "We like some things that John Robinson has done and also Richard Hardin. We're pretty pleased with those four and we have some good guys coming in, too."

Massey enters next season as the leading contender to grab a starting role at defensive tackle. He is the team's most experienced tackle with 32 games played. Crowe will be the new man on the scene.

Crowe played at defensive end before getting moved to defensive tackle. He brings a lot of experience to the table. Crowe started in all 11 games including the Outback Bowl at which he made 17 tackles. Mumme has been mixing and matching all spring long to find the right spots for each player.

Mumme is working some more blitzes in to the playbook and that is where he says Jim-

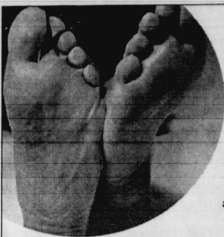
my Haley comes in. Haley has been somewhat of a human highlight reel. His crowd-pleasing one-handed 21-yard touchdown grab was chosen as the CNN Sports Illustrated "Play of the Day."

"Haley has had a really good spring," Mumme said. "Our coaching staff has dropped him in the coverage and he has been in there a lot. When he sees the ball in the air he thinks it belongs to him. He is a very quick guy on the pass rush."

The defense also have strong safety David Johnson and defensive end Dennis Johnson. David was a freshman All-American and will be starting at his position this season, but Dennis is still putting on the bulk according to Mumme.

"He is such a talented athlete that the stronger he gets, the more dominant of a player he is going to be," Mumme said. So what does the defensive line think of the extra pressure on them with the loss of key offensive players.

"We love it," Massey said.

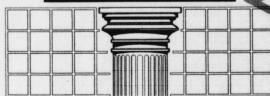
