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

World AIDS Day

December first is recognized as World AIDS Day. The purpose of this day of observance is to focus attention on the Pandemic, AIDS, a condition caused by infection with a virus known as Human Immunodeficiency Virus or HIV. This virus attacks the human immune system rendering it unable to fight off infections or to control cellular abnormalities.

People with advanced HIV infection are prone to bacterial, fungal, and other viral infections, which can become life threatening. In addition to infections cellular abnormalities, especially certain types of cancer are common among people with advanced HIV.

Most people, of a certain age, in our community have been touched by AIDS. Many were infected with HIV and have passed away or are still living with the condition. Others lost many friends to the illness and some became caregivers, not because they really wanted to, but because no one was willing.

During the 1980s and 90s AIDS was often looked upon as a death sentence; thank goodness that is no longer the case. Advances in medications for HIV infections are helping people with HIV live longer and more productive lives. However we cannot take these treatment improvements for granted. We have no idea how long they will continue to work.

HIV reproduces at a very rapid rate, thus it mutates and evolves at a super fast rate as well. The slightest slip in a treatment regiment may provide the virus with the opportunity to become resistant to the medications that a patient may be taking. When this happens doctors have to switch medications hoping to find another medications that works. This is a risky business considering there are not a lot of antiviral drugs to treat HIV.

The idea that HIV infection is no big deal today could not be farther from the truth. Undoubtedly people living with HIV today have a better prognosis than just a few years ago.

but still living with HIV is something to take very seriously.

As of June 30th 2006, 4,407 Kentuckians have been diagnosed with AIDS. More than half of those people have died. Over half of these people (2,466) were men who reported that the way they became infected with HIV was by having sex with other men.

Over the past few years Kentucky has actually seen a decrease in the number of new AIDS cases diagnosed each year among MSM, but our current reports do not indicate the number of MSM who got infected with HIV; it only reports the cases that actually progressed to AIDS.

Men in our community who practice unprotected sex with partners of unknown status are continuing to place themselves at risk of becoming infected. The current stats for Kentucky do not indicate numbers of AIDS cases among women who have sex with other women, but due to the mechanics of sex WSWs are at a lower risk of becoming infected with HIV.

Among all states, Kentucky ranks 34th in total number of AIDS cases. 19% of Kentucky AIDS cases have been diagnosed in the Bluegrass area, which includes Lexington.

On World AIDS Day this year, please do three things: Remember to honor anyone that you have lost to this illness. Provide support to anyone you know currently living with HIV/AIDS. Acknowledge the fact that HIV infection is preventable, and do what you need to in order to prevent becoming infected.

MAGNUS HIRSCHFELD 1868 - 1935

Magnus Hirschfeld was born in 1868 to Jewish parents in Prussia, which later became part of Germany. He studied medicine and earned a degree in 1892. Throughout his life Hirschfeld studied, researched, wrote and lectured about sexology, the study of human sexuality.

Hirschfeld became a prominent leader of the early homosexual emancipation movement in Germany and spent his life working for the "sexual rights" of those that we would now consider GLBTQ. Biographers have labeled him as gay or as bisexual but Hirschfeld himself believed human sexual and gender expression were too complex and fluid to fit into such categories.

Over a hundred years ago,

Magnus Hirschfeld suggested that

human sexuality and gender

identity were complex and fluid.

His theories were, and still are, a

challenge to our binary concept

of gender as well as our

understanding of homosexuality.

In reading about
Hirschfeld for this
article, I was surprised
at how contemporary
his theories of sexuality
seem. His most
impressive contribution
may be his theory
Zwischenstufenlehre or

"doctrine of sexual intermediaries." Hirschfeld believed that all human beings are intersexual variants, that is, we are unique combinations of masculinity and femininity. He saw not just two genders, but many fluid possibilities. And, perhaps even more revolutionary, he suggested that our gender identity and expression varies over our life time, making a binary, male or female, classification system inaccurate and obsolete. He would be disappointed that our culture still adheres to that binary system today.

Another aspect of his theory of Sexual Intermediacy was that all people contain layers of potential sexual expression, making people too complex to fit into categories of sexual orientation. He believed that the human race contained potentially infinite sexual varieties. By

proposing this complex understanding of human sexuality, Hirschfeld challenged the common way of thinking about sexuality and gender and laid the ground work for theorists that are challenging these concepts today. I can imagine that Hirschfeld would be comfortable in a modern day classroom discussing queer and transgender theory.

Hirschfeld is known today for his support of the concept of a "third sex," which is not altogether consistent with his fluid theory of sexual intermediacy. He did use this term, preferring it to the term "homosexuality" which he saw as overemphasizing sexual activity. But he never used the term "third sex" in his scientific publications. He seems to have used it as a compromise, a term that challenged the common understanding of gender but was more comprehensible than

"intersexual variant."

Hirschfeld's life was not just one of ideas, he was an outspoken political activist. He believed that a scientific understanding of human sexuality would lead to tolerance

and acceptance of sexual minorities. His motto was "Through Science to Justice." He used his scientific publications and lectures to promote his ideas and to challenge laws against Homosexuality.

In 1897, Hirschfeld joined with others in founding the Scientific-Humanitarian Committee, the first political organization in the world dedicated to improving the treatment of sexual minorities. This group collected the signatures of 6,000 prominent Germans in a petition calling for repeal of paragraph 175 of the Imperial Penal Code of 1871. In 1929, over 30 years after this effort began, a bill favoring repealing paragraph 175 was reported from a committee of the German Parliament, but the legislation never came to a vote. Paragraph 175 remained as part of the legal code and was used in the 30s and 40s by Hitler to support



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Hirschfeld - continued from page 12 the arrest, imprisonment and death of many homosexuals in Germany.

In 1899, Hirschfeld began publishing the Yearbook of Intermediate Sexual Types, the world's first scientific journal focusing on the diversity of sexual practices. His publications dealt not only with the new sexual science, but also with general health issues, sexual reform, politics, the history of morals, and racism.

In 1919, Hirschfeld opened the

lay the groundwork for

today's Queer Theory

Institute for Sexual Science, a forerunner of institutions such as the Kinsey Institute. The Institute became an important enter for the study of all aspects of sexuality

and amassed an impressive library. Transgender people became part of the staff and the institute promoted hormonal and surgical services for transgender people trying to change the gendered appearance of their bodies. The first sexchange surgeries were carried out in collaboration with Hirschfeld and his medical staff in the early 1930s.

Being Jewish as well as an outspoken activist for sexual minorities, Hirschfeld became a target of right-wing nationalists early in the 1920s. He was attacked on the streets of Munic and Berlin, suffering several serious injuries. When the Nazis took power in 1929, Hirschfeld's lectures were routinely disrupted and assaults became frequent occurrences.

Hirschfeld's prolific writings had spread his reputation and he was invited to speak in many countries. Perhaps because of the increase of pressure from Nazis, Hirschfeld traveled around the world between 1930 and 1932 speaking about his theories and advocating more progressive policies towards sexual minorities. He was popular in America; the press labeled him "the Einstein of Sex." During his absence, Hitler's government renounced him and withdrew his citizenship. He never returned to Germany.

In 1933, Hirschfeld was sitting in a Paris movie theater when images of the plunder and destruction of his Institute of Sexual Science in Berlin appeared in a news reel. The institute was totally destroyed and the books and research materials were burned by the Nazis. Soon after that heartbreaking event, Hirschfeld died at the age of 67.

Hirschfeld's research and theories have been largely ignored by present day

scholars. When he is mentioned, it is often in connection to his use of the "third sex" concept. To give emphasis to this term is a major oversimplification and

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misrepresentation of his complex theories of sexuality and gender.

If Hirschfeld continues to be only a footnote in queer theory and history, it is allowing Hitler and his destructive impact to prevail. So, talk about this man, read more about him on the internet, and if you are a student, bring him up in relevant classes or write a paper about him. We need an accurate portrayal of this remarkable man; don't let Magnus Hirschfeld be erased from our history.

Kentucky Fairness Alliance Looks Forward with Confidence

Recent election results clear a path for the Kentucky Fairness Alliance (KFA) to continue fighting for equality in Kentucky. Many of KFA's over 10,000 members see the results as an opportunity to advance equality for the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community. Indeed, the celebrated defeat of an anti-marriage amendment in Arizona will hopefully be one of many to come.

The brave voters of Arizona, when asked to define marriage solely as an institution of one man and one woman, clearly responded, "NO!" KFA commends what Arizona has done and hopes that spirit of tolerance and equity will spread nationwide.

However, we cannot rest with progressive victories in Washington and in Arizona fresh on our minds. We must continue in Kentucky. The new legislative season starts in January, and KFA is already strategizing.

In Frankfort, KFA lobbyist Wes Wright continually watches for pro- and anti-fairness legislation. Stan Lee has already drafted a bill that would forbid public universities from providing domestic partner benefits to its employees, gay or straight. In response to that bill and others, Wright is developing lobbying strategies involving members and volunteers from across the state.

Encouraging people to come out and lobby, Wright explains, "our presence in Frankfort is an important part of our plan to build a Fair Kentucky from the ground up. Talking to legislators in person and putting a face on Fairness issues is the most persuasive thing you can do. We offer training, talking points, and all the tools you need to make lobbying effective and empowering instead of intimidating." Locally KFA chapters are also jumping to the forefront. **The Gray Dove Chapter** based in Richmond will push for a local fairness ordinance this summer. They have been working diligently at the local level, have formed a strategic plan, and believe their efforts will pay off by bringing protection to people who live in Richmond.

The Bluegrass Chapter held its annual retreat November 17th and 18th. During the retreat, the chapter reviewed its goals and mission and set forth its strategic plan for the on-coming year. KFA Bluegrass now looks forward to a year of developing more educational/outreach opportunities to help increase GBTQL visibility, supporting Gray Dove's efforts toward a fairness ordinance, collaborating with other social justice organizations, and helping to train volunteers to lobby in Frankfort.

The Bluegrass Chapter is in the process of nominating and electing new steering committee members but could always use more volunteers as well as people interested in leadership roles. For ways on becoming more active, donating money, or getting the latest news, go to www.bluegrassfairness.org.

In addition, the Bluegrass Chapter and the Gray Dove Chapter are working to outline strategies for creating KFA chapters in Kentucky's underserved areas. I have found it really difficult to "fit in" with straight organizations. When I do things with straight organizations, I always have the issue of "coming out" with them. I always feel uncomfortable when I get the leading question: "have you ever been married...." Since I have not, it begins the "suspicion" that I might be gay.

On the flip side, if I don't "come out" with people in the organization, I find I can't be even close to being myself around them. I find myself trying to avoid discussions of family so the dreaded question won't even come up. I find myself never talking about my social life at all. So instead I am avoiding a huge facet of life — both for me, and the person I am talking to.

But "coming out" to a straight person is NOT an issue that I take lightly. At worst, I know in the back of my mind that people are being killed in this country for being gay. I have no idea if the person I am talking to has some deep-seated hatred for gays that I would never expect.

Even if the person I am talking to doesn't automatically hate me for being gay, there are a lot of sexual issues that arise. If the person I am talking to is the same sex, I don't know if they are worrying that I will make "a pass" at them; or if they are wondering why I don't make "a pass" at them; or if they will turn some comment I make into a sexual innuendo.

If they are of the opposite sex, I am wondering if they will make it their life's mission to try to "convert" me somehow and I will have to figure out a polite way of refusing. It is a VERY difficult tightrope act to try to walk.

After many years of trying to "fit in" with straight organizations, I am VERY happy to have an organization like the GLSO, where I can be myself. I plan to give it all the dedication I can to help keep ithe Pride Center open and the programs up and running. I hope everyone who reads this will help in the ways they can as well.

Readers Write



Statement of Belief by mary crone

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
