# **DEFINING PROGRESS**

During his inaugural address, President Lee Todd told the campus community that "we must create a climate on this campus that embraces diversity. Almost two years after taking the helm, Todd boasts of significant achievements in hiring minority faculty, promoting minority administrators and funding many more minority scholarships. But about one week ago, the university released a strategic plan that set minority hiring goals far below those suggested by the President's Commission on Diversity. Now some of those who cheered the new president two years ago look befuddled, wondering why their ambitious leader will settle for mediocrity. In this two-part series, the Kentucky Kernel examines diversity at all levels of the university.

BaRhonda Dickerson graduated from Louisville Central High School in 2001 with many choices. With her high grades and extracurricu-lar involvement, she said she had her pick of colleges. De-

Phi Kappa Tau is lauded as one of the most diverse of UK's fraternities. This spring, they are also pledging an Asian student. In recent years, several other fraternities have been pledging black students. But this inclusiveness doesn't mean that Greek groups overall are more diverse. According to data gathered by Greek Affairs, the number of black students in traditionally white Greek or canizations is only one more than 1992 statistics.

While black member-

While black member-ship in white Greek groups remains stagmant compared to 10 years ago, the number of Hispanic and Asian mem-bers in all groups has in-creased by 11 and 10, respec-

tively, according to the office of Greek Affairs.
Despite subdued growth in black membership, Greek members and officials said groups are becoming more racially diverse. They cited increased pledging of blacks and improved cooperation this year between Greek um-brella organizations: the his-torically black Nubian Coun-cil and the historically white Panhellenic and Interfrater-nity councils.

For the first time, Nu-bian groups joined Greek Sing, an event organized by two traditionally white groups this year. This spring, a Nubian group and a histo-ically white group held an in-terracial dating forum, and a full Nubian group attended

### Economics professor Mark Berger dies

Prolific researcher: Berger, 47, remembered as leading expert on the Kentucky economy

Mark Berger, director of the Center for Business and Economic Research and a business and economics professor, died Wednesday, He was 47.

The cause of death is still unknown, although he did have cancer Berger had recently finished chemotherapy and radiation treatment "with great hope," said Glenn Blomquist, director of the Department of Economics, in an e-mail to students, faculty and staff in his department.

Berger's wife, Pam Berger, said,
He was really committed to building
up the Department of Economics"
and "took great pride" in his 22 years at the university.
'He took really great interest in his grad students.'
Berger was appointed director of the center in 1994
and was named the William B. Sturgill Professor of Economics at UK in 1998.

At the center, Berger conducted research on labor,
health and Kentucky economics. He also was editor of the
center's Kentucky Annual Economic Report, a review of
studies by UK, the University of Louisville and state
economists.

He head recently returned from sabbatical in Ireland

He had recently returned from sabbatical in Ireland as a Fulbright scholar doing research in health economics. Eric Thompson, a professor in the center and the College of Business and Economics, said that Berger was a frequent author of scholarly articles, "a good colleague and mentor" and a "leading expert on the Kentucky economy."

Thompson said, "I think he was a very engaging professor in the sense that he gave lectures that were interactive ... they were discussion-based."

Marie Hart, staff associate at the center, said, "He was a really super-intelligent man. He was a great director. He really was on top of things, and he did an excellent job."

Hart said Berger and she had developed a "wonderful friendship." She said he would sometimes tease her about keeping the Baptists praying for his health — which had been looking better — because he was Catholic and she

"He was a spiritual man," she said. "We talked about things like that, even though our faiths were not the

same."

Berger is survived by his wife; three children, Andy, Beth and Katie, his parents, three bothers and a sister. A visitation is set for Friday from 3 pm. to 9 pm. at Milward Funeral Directors on 159 N. Broadway. The funeral will be 10 a.m. Saturday at Saint Paul's Church, 501 W. Short St.

# **Education needs justify** increased cigarette tax

State legislators recently tabled the debate on whether to increase Kentucky's paltry 3-centsper-pack-cigarette tax to help lessen the burden of

per-pack-cigarette tax to neip lessen the buttlet of a sagging economy. By deciding not to increase the tax, legislators decided cheap tobacco is more important than an inexpensive education.

UK students have been forced to swallow another tuition increase — this time a 15 percent hike — to help cover UK's budget shortfall that

hike — to help cover UK's budget shortfall that was brought on mainly due to a severe reduction in state funding. An increased tobacco tax would have gone a long way toward preserving the same level of state funding and helping rescue the state government from its budget debacle.

Opponents of a tax increase cite out-of-state business as a reason for maintaining the 3-percent rate. Residents of neighboring states frequently purchase their cigarettes in Kentucky to avoid high tobacco taxes. Some worry an increase in Kentucky's tax will eliminate this busi-

On the contrary, any lost revenue as a result of an increase would be more than covered by a new tax. At 3 percent, Kentucky's cigarette tax is the second lowest in the nation. The national average is 58 cents per pack. Even a small tax in-crease would generate millions for the state's general fund.

Michael Kennedy, faculty representative on

Michael Rennedy, lactury representative on the UK board of trustees and an associate pro-fessor of Geography, called for UK students and their families to begin contacting their state congressional representatives and encouraging them to work toward an increased tobacco tax next legislative session. The Kernel joins Kennedy in this request. We urge students to contact their representatives and let them know affordable education is more important than cheap cigarettes.


# Will a dominant Europe emerge again?


