WASHINGTON — The FBI has stepped up its search for possible collaborators in last Tuesday's terrorist attacks, detaining 49 people global dragnet for a many as 200 others.

FBI Director Robert Mueller confirmed that sever-al secret material witness war-rants have been issued.

The people are believed to have relevant information about Tuesday's events.

He declined to provide es-timates or names, saying courts have sealed the infor-mation. The Justice Depart-ment previously confirmed two have been arrested on such warrants.

Some of those detained have been charged with immigration violations and have requested lawyers, Justice Department officials said.

Mueller said law enforce-ment did not have any ad-vance indications about the suicide hijackings that struck the World Trade Center tow-ers and the Pentagon.

Two puzzling questions linger before any Dwight Yoakam concert.

One: Will Yoakam be able to cram all of his hits into a one show? Two: How the hell does he get into pants that tight?

The answer to the first question is no. There's just not enough time in one evening for all the great music from the man who helped save country from its '30s self-destruction and has continued to evolve as the genre itself regressed.

The answer to the second is still a mystery.

But somehow Yoakam

But somehow Yoakam slithered into his trademark painted-on jeans and shimmed into the beautiful Palace Theatre in Louisville Sunday night to support his eighth studio album, Tomorrow's Sounds Todoy, and the forth-coming soundtrack to his directorial debut, South of Heaven, West of Hell.

Yoakam, a Kentucky native, got the new tunes out of the way in a hurry, opening with the up-tempo "What Do You Know About Love" and then Jumping into a countrified cover of Cheap Trick Spofied cover of Cheap Trick Spofied cover of Cheap Trick Spofied Spof



Early smashes like "Guitar, Cadillacs," "Honkeytonk Man" and "Streets of Bakers-field" are always on the set list, but Yoakam also dusted off old favorites "I Sang Dixie," and "Little Ways" and the Elvis cover "Little Sister."

Yoakam's two best albums, 1980's If There Was a Way and 1983's This Time were also well represented with "It Only Hurts Me When I Cry," "Nothing's Changed Hongon Cry," Nothing's Changed Hongon Cry, "Onling's Changed Hongon Cry," "Supplies such as "I' Got You," "Suspicious Minds" or "Inside the Pocket of a Clown."

The one pleasant play-list surprise occurred when Yoakam pulled out "Home for Sale," a brilliant but seldom

played honky-tonk tearjerker from This Time.

Other than a pause to pay homage to the victims of the recent terrorist-inflicted tragedies with a Raiph Stanley cover, Yoakam hopped from song to song with barely enough time to catch his breath.

He still does the same goofy dance moves he did lo years ago, and the women still scream. Lead guitarist and producer Pete Anderson still walls away on the electric guitarist and still looks cool doing it and still looks cool doing years.

But the more albums Yoakam releases, the more disappointing his concerts get. Not because he's any less of a performer, but because more and more worthy songs are left out.



Substitute teachers a lifesaver

FRANKFORT — Schools pressed for substitute teachers are using hundreds of non-certified stand-ins in more than 30 districts.

The state records show, they are required to be substitutes of last resort— the people when no certified "sub" is savailable. No college education is required. Each is trained within the district. Many already work as office or classroom aides. All are restricted to specific schools; they cannot work anywhere else in the district. Some districts us of them only springly, but some others have to turn to

have to turn to them repeatedly. The non-certified substitutes were an absolute lifesaver for us, particularly in the elementary schools, "Joe Dan Gold, superintendent of Morgan County schools, said in a telephone

schools, salo in a telephone interview Monday. Morgan County, with 2,200 students, closed out the last school year with 32 non-certified subs working 252 days from April 1 onward, according to records at the Education Professional Professional Standards Board, the state's teach certification

certification agency. nion County, with about 2,500 students, had 37 non-certified subs working 156 days from Jan. 1 through March 31.


