Bush leads in recount



W. Bush led with less than 300 votes with 65 of 67 Florida counties reporting Thursday night. Officials say the recount may not be official until Tuesday, and will Tuesday, and will not certified until Nov. 17.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. —
George W. Bush's lead over Al
Gore in crucial Florida
shrank to fewer than 300 vestes by unofficial count Thursday
with allegations of irregularities swirling and ballots from
overseas residents still to be
counted.

Recount results from 65 of the state's 67 counties gave Republican Bush a lead of 225 votes out of nearly 6 million cast, according to an unofficial tally by The Associated Press. The original "final" margin had been reported at 1,784.

AP called each county election official for each candidate in their county.

The official recount ilagged behind, and Secretary of State Katherine Harris told an early evening news conference that it could be as late as

next Tuesday — a week after the election — before the state has certified ballot results from all 67 counties. She also pointed out that it would take even longer — at least until Nov. 17 — to tabulate ballots cast by Floridians overseas and postmarked by Election Day,

The Gore campaign has criticized the ballots in use in Palm Beach County as confusing, and has asked for a hand count of votes cast there and in three other counties.



DES MOINES, Iowa — State Republican Party officials are exploring the possibility of requesting a voter recount following Al Gore's racorthin victory in Iowa. Bush campaign officials said they are looking at the possibility of a recount in Iowa, as well as in another closely contested state, Wisconsin. To ask for a recount, bush would have to personally write each of Iowa's 99 county auditors by 5 pm. Nov. 16 or 17, depending on the county. With all Iowa precincts counted, Gore leads 635,026 to 630,077 — a mere 4499 votes.

Various offices facilitate matching students of scholarship awards. Various offices facilitate matching students of the matching students of the scholarship office in 211 Funkhouser might be a good first stop for someone looking for funds. They award cash each year to those who qualify. According to Crystal Shepherd, staff support associate for the Merit Scholarship Office, they offered 83 scholarships to incoming freshmen last year, worth anywhere from \$700 per semester to foverage of full tuition and costs. Transfer students were awarded 39 scholarships, worth between \$500 per semester to roll utilition.

Scholarships worth between \$250 and \$500 per semester were awarded to currently enrolled UK students.

Winning students who are currently enrolled or are transferring in must be enrolled full-time and have completed at least 12 semester hours, either at UK or at their previous institution. They must also have a GPA of 3.5 or higher.

Incoming freshmen must have an unweighted GPA of at least 33. and either a 250 on the ACT.

The application also requires an essay. The due date for these applications for the Fall 2001 semester is Jan. 15 for freshmen, Mar. 1 for transfer students and April 20 for continuing students.



Performances make Dancer redeeming

Split personality: Music star becomes character in new movie and in real life

Dancer in the Dark, the most recent effort from Danish film-maker Lars von Trier, split audiences straight down the middle almost from the moment of its preniere. As infuriating as it can be endearing, it managed to win the Palme d'Or and the Best Female Performance prizes at the Cannes Film Festival this

But, really, what do you expect when a foreign director best known for his minimalism deides to take on an extravagant movie world of musicals?







A RAND Corporation study found that for every additional \$1 spent on substance abuse treatment, taxpayers would save \$7.46 in societal costs (due to crime, violence, loss of productivity and other factors).

In other words, treatment is much more cost effective than imprisonment. Other studies have shown that treatment has led to a decrease in welfare use and significant increase in employment. Arizona has already begun a program of mandatory treatment for non-violent drug offenders with great success.

The U.S. government has approved more than \$1 billion in aid to Colombia to combat drug production.

While the aid is actually to suppress a 30-plus year socialist rebellion, let's accept the government's claim for now. will likely increase the supply in another, and will only increase demand here (economics professors, please correct me if I'm wrong).

So what's the bottom line in all of this? The same as it always was — money. The corrections industry is one of the fastest growing in the country, taking in billions of dollars per year.

Everyone from Wall Street to construction firms to phone companies benefits from the increasing number of provided companies rush to cash in. Imate phone calls by themselves generate \$1 billion in revenues per year.

It is time to rethink and rewrite drug policy in the United States. Illicit drugs may alter a person's mindset, but that in itself cannot be a crime worthy of time in prison.


