Action on
the alleged
charges of
Senator
C. J. Branstow.

The Faculty convened at the call of the President, who laid before them the attack of Senator Branstow upon the College. The President read the correspondence between himself and Senator Branstow, on this subject. After some discussion of the matter in its various bearings, it was moved by Prof. Nelson that (1) "the Faculty heartily endorse the action of the President as reported by him, and the matter of the grave charges recently alleged to have been made against the College by the Hon. C. J. Branstow, Senator from this District; (2) the Faculty request the President to call freely upon them in such a manner as he may deem best, for the proper meeting and reputation of the alleged charges; (3) the Faculty realize the gravity of this matter and desire that prompt and effective measures be taken to see that justice is done to the College and to its President and Faculty, and to the interests of the State in this important Institution." This motion received the unanimous vote of the Faculty. In accordance with sec. 2 of the motion, the President appointed a Committee of the following gentlemen: Messrs. Neville, Nelson, Shepley, Scovell, Roark, Kastle, White.

Comm. to con-

Prof. White moved that the school year be divided into three terms, nearly equal, the first to end at the beginning of the Christmas Holidays. The matter was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. White, Anderson, Kastle, Miller. On motion of Prof. Nelson it was resolved to

between the President and Senator Brew-
ster.
