

Minutes of the regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky for Saturday, May 31, 1930.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular quarterly session in the President's Office at the University of Kentucky at 10:30 a. m. on Saturday, May 31, 1930. Those present were: Governor Flem D. Sampson, Mr. James R. Rash, Mr. Robert G. Gordon, Dr. W. W. Wash, Judge R. C. Stoll, Mr. J. C. Utterback, Mr. James W. Turner, Mr. Louis Hillenmeyer, Mr. James Park, and Mr. E. B. Webb. Meeting with the Board were President Frank L. McVey and Wellington Patrick, Secretary of the Board.

(2) Attorney's Report on Building Construction. A communication was presented to the Board from Mr. J. P. Johnston indicating the situation in regard to payments to the J. T. Jackson Lumber Company for construction work on the Dairy Building and the Memorial Building. No action was taken.

(3) Insurance on Library Books. President McVey made a brief report to the Board of the insurance carried on the various library books at the University. He indicated the amount of insurance now carried on books which are in the various libraries on the campus and also in the general library. The matter was discussed and a motion made, seconded, and carried authorizing the President of the University and the Business Agent in their judgment to place whatever additional library insurance is necessary adequately to cover the value of the books.

(4) President's Report. President McVey made a brief report in which he commented particularly on the building situation at the University and on the granting of degrees. He stated that at present Commencement there are 522 degrees granted, 116 being granted to students who completed their work last December and 406 who completed their work in June. This is the largest number of degrees that the University has ever granted, and is about ten per cent increase of any previous year.

The President commented briefly on the building progress and the financial situation at the University, indicating that the future commitments of the University 1930-1931 amounted to approximately \$337,000, including construction of the library, a small animal house, and observatory. If this building work is completed during the year 1931, he indicated that there would be a deficit of \$114,000 over surplus and a bank deficit of \$360,000. The situation financially is a difficult one and requires careful handling to return to a bank balance by 1933. He stated that the University has built \$2,000,000 worth of buildings and that only \$600,000 of this amount has been appropriated by the Legislature.

Three dormitories were built on the amortization plan amounting to \$270,000. The teacher-training building which cost \$300,000 was built out of an appropriation of \$150,000 from the Legislature and \$150,000 from the General Education Board of New York City. The Dairy-Products building, costing \$150,000, was built from an appropriation from the Legislature. The Memorial Building which cost \$140,000 was built by subscription from the alumni. The University stadium was started and completed in part by subscription from the alumni and friends of the University.

(5) Granting of Degrees. President McVey presented to the Board a list of candidates for degrees. He indicated that these degrees have been recommended by the University Senate and in all instances the students' records show that all have completed their requirements. The following is a list of degrees to be granted. On motion, duly made and seconded, the degrees recommended were authorized to be conferred.

(6) Rebuilding of Farm House. President McVey reported to the Board that a farmhouse at the Poultry Plant was burned during the winter, and that this house was insured for \$3,000, and the insurance has been collected on it. Bids for reconstruction of the house were received and tabulated. The low bid was that of A. R. Henry of Arcadia Park, Lexington, for \$3,336. A motion was made, seconded, and carried that Mr. Henry be awarded the contract for the construction, and that a satisfactory bond be required.

(7) Bids for Small Animal House. Bids for a small animal house were received and tabulated. The low bid was that of Skinner Brothers of Lexington, who bid \$10,978.40. A motion was made, seconded, and carried that this bid be accepted, and that the company be required to execute bond.

(8) Purchase of Tobacco Warehouse. President McVey brought to the attention of the Board the fact that the warehouse in front of the University campus is offered for sale to the University. The matter was discussed and the following resolution was offered, seconded, and carried:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the University of Kentucky lease from Central District Warehousing Corporation for the purpose of the University of Kentucky the following described real estate, to-wit:

All that tract or parcel of land situated in the City of Lexington, County of Fayette and State of Kentucky between Limestone and Upper Streets, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point (G) in the west property line of Limestone Street six (6) inches north of the northeast corner of the warehouse building, corner to American Tobacco Company; thence parallel to and six (6) inches from the north wall of the warehouse N 44° 0' W 255 feet to the point (H) in the line of the American Tobacco Company; thence N 45° 11' W 100 feet to the point (I) in the east line of Upper Street, corner to American Tobacco Company; thence S 13° 47' W 267 feet to the point (B) in the east line of Upper Street, corner to the property proposed to be conveyed to the University of Kentucky by Central District Warehousing Corporation; thence S 43° 59' E 212 feet to the point (A) in the west line of Limestone Street, corner to the property proposed to be conveyed to the University of Kentucky by Central District Warehousing Corporation; thence N 46° 6' E 227.3 feet to the point of beginning, containing 64,535 square feet; and being a part of the same property conveyed to said Central District Warehousing Corporation by Independent Tobacco Warehouse

provided, however, that said University shall not be required to pay any cash consideration for or during any extended term of said lease but shall only be required to pay the rental, as above specified; with the further right and option in the University of Kentucky, at any time during the original term, and each extended term of said lease to purchase said leased premises for Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00), with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from June 30, 1930, to the date of the exercise of said option, credited, however, with all payments of rent made under said lease for the original term and each term for which the same may be extended, but not including the said Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) hereinabove referred to, nor any amounts paid for taxes, special assessments and insurance, said purchase price to be paid as follows, to-wit: Not less than forty per cent (40%) thereof in cash and the balance thereof in not exceeding two equal installments to be evidenced by purchase money notes maturing not later than one and two years, respectively, after date and bearing interest at the rate of six

Whereas, there has been appropriated by the General Assembly the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the acquisition of a Service Building by the University of Kentucky.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the University of Kentucky purchase from Central District Warehousing Corporation the following described real estate, to-wit:

Beginning at a point (A) in the west line of Limestone Street, corner to the property proposed to be leased by the University of Kentucky from Central District Warehousing Corporation; thence N 43° 59' W 212 feet to the point (B) in the east line of Upper Street, corner to the property proposed to be leased by the University of Kentucky from Central District Warehousing Corporation; thence S 13° 47' W 163.5 feet to the point (C) in the east line of Upper Street, corner to the property of the City of Lexington; thence N 47° 0' E 52 feet to (D), corner to the property of the City of Lexington; thence parallel to and six (6) inches south of the south wall of the warehouse S 43° 59' E 127 feet to (E) in the west line of Limestone Street; thence N 42° 44' E 51 feet to (F) in the west line of Limestone Street; thence N 46° 0' E 36.5 feet to the place of beginning, containing 16,981 square feet, and being a part of the same property conveyed to said Central District Warehousing Corporation by Independent Tobacco Warehouse Company by deed dated June 21, 1922, and recorded in the office of the Clerk of Fayette County Court in Deed Book 212, Page 28.

for the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) in cash, and that said real estate, together with the building thereon be acquired and used for the purpose of said Service Building in accordance with said appropriation; and that upon the execution and delivery by said Central District Warehousing Corporation of a deed, approved by the Attorney General, as required by law, conveying said property to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky in fee simple, with general warranty of title, the President and Business Agent of the University of Kentucky be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to pay to said Central District Warehousing Corporation the said Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) appropriated by the General Assembly for the purchase of said Service Building.

(9) Claim of J. T. Jackson Lumber Company. A communication was read from the J. T. Jackson Lumber Company making a claim for certain payments which the University of Kentucky is alleged to owe that company for various projects at the University. A report on the matter from the Business Agent was read. After discussion a motion was made, seconded, and carried that the matter be referred to the Business Agent and Mr. J. P. Johnston, Attorney for the University.

(10) Ellen C. Semple Medal. The following communication was read from President W. W. Atwood of Clark University. A motion was made, seconded and carried that the medal be accepted and the Board of Trustees extend to Doctor Semple an expression of sincere thanks.

My dear President McVey:

Perhaps you know that our very dear friend, Dr. Ellen C. Semple, whom you have so highly honored, is at Memorial Hospital here in Worcester, seriously ill. She has been confined to her bed for about six months, and the doctor informed me yesterday that she would never be any better than she is at present. This is a very sad case and affects all of us and her entire family and group of friends and admirers most deeply.

Yesterday she called me to her bedside and asked me to take from her personal effects the gold medal which was awarded to her by the American Geographical Society for distinguished services in the field of Anthropogeography. She gave me a message which she had written to the University of Kentucky, and this I am quoting to you: "I send my gold medal, awarded to me by the American Geographical Society to the University of Kentucky as a mark of my affection and as evidence that the children of my native state show the heritage of their vigorous ancestry in this country, and that they also contribute to the best development. I send it also in the hope that the students of the University of Kentucky may be stimulated by this medal to better and nobler efforts".

Miss Semple was very proud of this medal and took the greatest care of it. She asked me to tell you that the surface of the medal should "never be touched by a hand". I know it would give her great satisfaction to receive word from you that the medal has been properly delivered. Her present address is: Memorial Hospital, Worcester, Massachusetts. The medal is going forward by insured mail.

(11) Employment of Architect for Agricultural-Engineering Building. A communication was read from Hugh Meriwether of Lexington, Kentucky, asking the privilege of submitting architectural plans for the Agricultura-Engineering building. The matter was discussed, and a motion made, seconded, and carried, referring the matter to the President with power to act.

(12) Purchase of Equipment for the Teacher-Training Building. The attention of the Board was called to the fact that recently the Legislature had made an appropriation of \$30,000 for the purchase of equipment for the Teacher-Training building. A motion was made, seconded, and carried, authorizing the preparation of a list of material to be purchased, and the list to be submitted to the State Purchasing Agent for purchase, and that the equipment shall not be in excess of \$30,000.

(13) Campus Bookstore. The following report from the Student Council commenting on the Campus Bookstore was read and ordered incorporated in the minutes. The whole matter was discussed, and a motion made, seconded, and carried, requesting the President and the Business Agent to submit to the Board a recommendation for the operation of the Campus Bookstore.

Report of the Committee for the Investigation of the Campus Book Store

The Committee appointed by the President of the Men's Student Council investigated the management of the Campus Book Store, and compared the prices with those of other book stores. The Committee has the following to report:

1. In most cases the prices charged by the Campus Book Store are the same or less than the prices charged by other supply houses or book stores in Lexington.

2. The prices of most books are the same as those at which the publishers list the books to retail; with the exception of books which have been ordered in small lots. To the list price of books which have been ordered in small lots is added the cost of the telegram.

3. The method of recording sales is very inferior. Change involved in the purchase of small articles is made from the pockets of the salesmen, which to say the least gives a bad impression to the students.

Much complaint, which cannot be backed by definite proof, has been made by students. The complaint seems to center on the salesmen, and many students accuse the salesmen of raising the price on them at times, especially in "rush" season.

A large amount of dissatisfaction with the prices of books and supplies can be traced to the following:

1. Sale of supplies at a lower price by Kresge and Woolworth.

2. Cut price sale of books, which were bought up from other universities by such stores as the Ohio State Cooperative.

It is the suggestion of the Committee that some more efficient method of recording sales be developed.

I have been requested to submit the above report by the Student Council Committee.

(14) Norwood Hall. Upon recommendation of President Mc Vey the mining building was named Norwood Hall in honor of the late Charles J. Norwood.

(15) Purchase of Trucks. President McVey indicated to the Board that the University wished to purchase two trucks; one for use of the Geology Department for students in making geological trips, and the other for the use of the Department of Anthropology and Archaeology in making investigations. The President stated that the University would be reimbursed for the trucks by the organizations interested in that purchase. Motion was duly seconded and carried that the purchase be made.

(16) Operation of Training School. The matter of plans for the operation of the Training School was submitted to the Board of Trustees by President McVey who reviewed the situation as it exists at the present time. A motion was made, seconded, and carried requesting the President to submit a report to the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

(17) Student Deposits. President McVey indicated that students are required to deposit \$5.00 on rooms in the dormitories and that during the last several years the University has accumulated \$800 or \$900 which has not been called for by the students. He recommended that this money be turned over to the Student Loan Fund with the understanding that should the students call for the money it will be paid to them and the University be reimbursed from the Student Loan Fund.

(18) Appointments, Changes in Status, and Resignations. The following list of appointments, changes in status, and resignations was recommended by President McVey and on motion, duly seconded, approved:

Continuation of employment of Mr. H. S. Patterson, county agent of Grayson County, effective June 1, 1930, to May 31, 1931, at a salary of \$225 a month.

Appointment of Miss Mabel McKinsey, assistant home demonstration agent for McCracken County, effective April 1 to May 31, 1930, at a salary of \$125 a month.

Appointment of Mrs. Mignon Q. Lott, camp assistant, Fayette County, effective July 6 to July 26, 1930, at a salary of \$150 a month.

Appointment of Aaron Lee, assistant county agent for Fayette County, effective May 26 to December 21, 1930, at a salary of \$100 a month.
